## Post sees slight drop in sales tax rebate

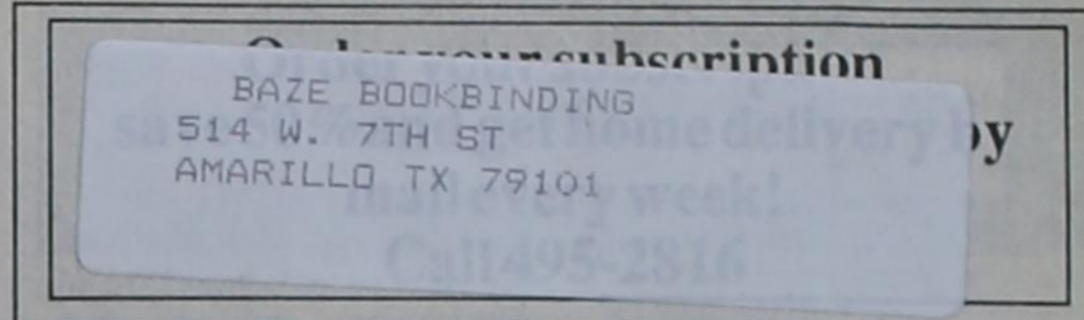
The City of Post received a check for \$18,314.90 in the latest City Sales and Use Tax rebate from the state comptroller's office.

The payment reflects a 4.72 percent decrease from last year's check of \$19,222.43 for the same period.

The total rebate this year is \$122,907.57, compared to \$107,941.93 for the same period in 1990, for a year to date increase of 13.86 percent.

The August check includes taxes collected on June sales and reported in July by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state.

This month's checks also include taxes collected in April, May and June and reported in July by businesses filing quarterly sales tax returns.

## Big crowds cheer cowboys at Post Stampede Rodeo

### 244 contestants compete for \$14,868.60 prize money

#### Fred Lucero wins Garza County steer roping Fred Myers and Karl Hall win team roping

A total of 244 contestants competed for \$14,868.60 in pay-offs during the 51st Annual Post Stampede Rodeo held last Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings at the rodeo grounds in Post.

Big crowds attended each of the events, which were followed by dances on the slab, with Jody Nix providing the entertainment.

The rodeo weekend got a enthusiastic start Thursday afternoon with the parade downtown, which has traditionally been a popular attraction for area folks. The Gamma Mu Sorority float entry won first place, second place went to Post Girl Scouts and third place to Kids 'N' Art. The parade was sponsored jointly by the Post Chamber of Commerce and the Post Stampede Rodeo Association.

#### Rodeo Results

Jr Crump of Clarendon and Twister Cain of Ivanhoe won first place in the team roping event with a 5.64 time. Second place went to Sterling Price and Charlie Price of Tatum, NM (6.11), third to Troy Hubbard of Wolforth and Randy Coleman of Morton (7.27) and fourth to Keith Williams of Amarillo and Brad Crotteu of Canyon (9.00).

Tammy Mullanex of Midland took the barrels event with a time of 16.80. Seymour's Mendy Morris won second with a 16.82 time. Third went to Stephanie Brown of Big Spring (16.88), fourth to Kim Teague of Rankin (16.94), fifth to Kim Coleman of Ackerly (16.95) and sixth to Johnny Jarvis of Stinnett (17.05).

## Terroristic threats get attention from deputies

Garza County deputies arrested an 18 year old man July 31, charging him in county court with terroristic threats on a municipal court warrant. The man was released following the posting of a \$2,000 bond.

A 30 year old man was arrested by Texas Department of Public Safety officers August 4, charged in district court with a felony DWI. The man is still being held in the county jail.

August 9 a 20 year old man was arrested for public intoxication, charged in municipal court. He was released to pay a fine.

A 20 year old man was arrested August 10 on two charges, possession of counterfeit driver's license and public intoxication. He was released on a \$200 bond.

On the same day a 19 year old man was charged with minor in possession of alcohol and failure to show an identification. He was released from municipal court after paying a \$336 fine. ## Commissioners approve new ambulance service rates

A recommendation by the ambulance committee to raise basic ambulance service rates was approved by the Garza County Commissioners' Court at its regular meeting Monday morning.

The committee recommendation also included the transfer of ambulance service billing to the Garza Memorial Hospital.

"Rates should be increased at least to the extent necessary to cover expenses," the recommendation said. "A survey of area EMS services completed last year demonstrates an average of BLS base rate of \$119, an average mileage charge of \$2.95 per mile and an average ALS base rate of \$175," the report concluded.

The committee also recommended a "brief training program for Garza County EMS personnel should be developed to educate them on proper documentation and billing procedures to reduce or eliminate the number of denied Medicare claims."

"Since many of the denied Medicare claims are a result of patients wishing to be transported directly to Lubbock instead of Garza Memorial Hospital, a form should be developed which would inform the patient that is not a Medicare covered service and they will be responsible for the entire ambulance bill if they wish to be transported to Lubbock. Only by having the patient sign such a form

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# The aftermath of a misspent youth

Hometown, U.S.A., for me was a rural community located on the edge of the featureless Texas coastal plains. Settled by pioneer families of mostly German and Slavic descent, there was painfully little manufactured fun, except for the charm and fascination of an establishment named "My Place," which anchored the downtown business district.

For my friends and me, My

Place held a special allure, primarily because our parents strictly forbade us from ever crossing the threshold and entering into what we assumed must be a wondrous place. By negotiating our bicycles along the sidewalk running the length of the building we were able to catch glimpses of the mysteries within: men sitting at small tables shuffling dominoes (straight or "count 'em" was the game of choice) or leaning over a pool table lining up a bank shot in a game of eight-ball.

Occasionally, my dad would stop at My Place on the way home

from a busy Saturday at the feed store and purchase a six-pack of Falstaff for the following day's trip to the beach. I'd do my best to convince him it would be all right if I tagged along while he did his trading, but invariably the answer would come back, "You know your Mother would not approve."

Well, even if my parents would not approve, I knew there was a good chance I could sweet talk my grandpa into a passport inside My Place. Sure enough, Big Papa proved to be an easy touch. I could hardly contain my glee when he parked in front of the building and said, "Come along, son."

You might say I experienced sensory overload in the first few moments inside the watering hole. I was especially taken by one of the pool sharks, who looked to me like a double for James Dean. His mastery of the game was something to see, and at that point I decided I could hardly wait until I was old enough to be a regular at My Place.

Back in the pickup with Big Papa, I literally gushed over what fun it would be to spend my idle hours in My Place, becoming the best stick man in town. He just looked over my way and said, "Show me somebody who can run the table, and I'll show you somebody who wasted their time growing up."

My grandfather's words came back to me during a visit to a couple of TDC units several months ago. As I considered the size of our penitentiary system, it occurred to me that we're really spending most of our time, money and energy on the aftermath of a misspent youth. Our jails and prisons are literally bursing at the seams with individuals who, for one reason or another, lived their formative years in ways that were not conducive to producing a personality and character that honored the basic human values of honesty and respect for one another.

There's a whole lot of talk in Austin about finding "alternatives to incarceration." But the focus of these diversionary programs is largely directed to the adult end of the criminal justice spectrum.

If we are to have any long lasting impact upon reducing the so-called "front end" demand on correctional facilities, programs and services must concentrate on those who will otherwise, as Big Papa pointed out, misspend their youth, and keep the prison pipeline running full bore.

Approximately 31 percent of those committed to prison before the age of 21 have a previous history of commitment to a juvenile correctional facility. This is one type of "graduation" we must take steps to stop.

## Arsonists torch 'bonfire' rubbish

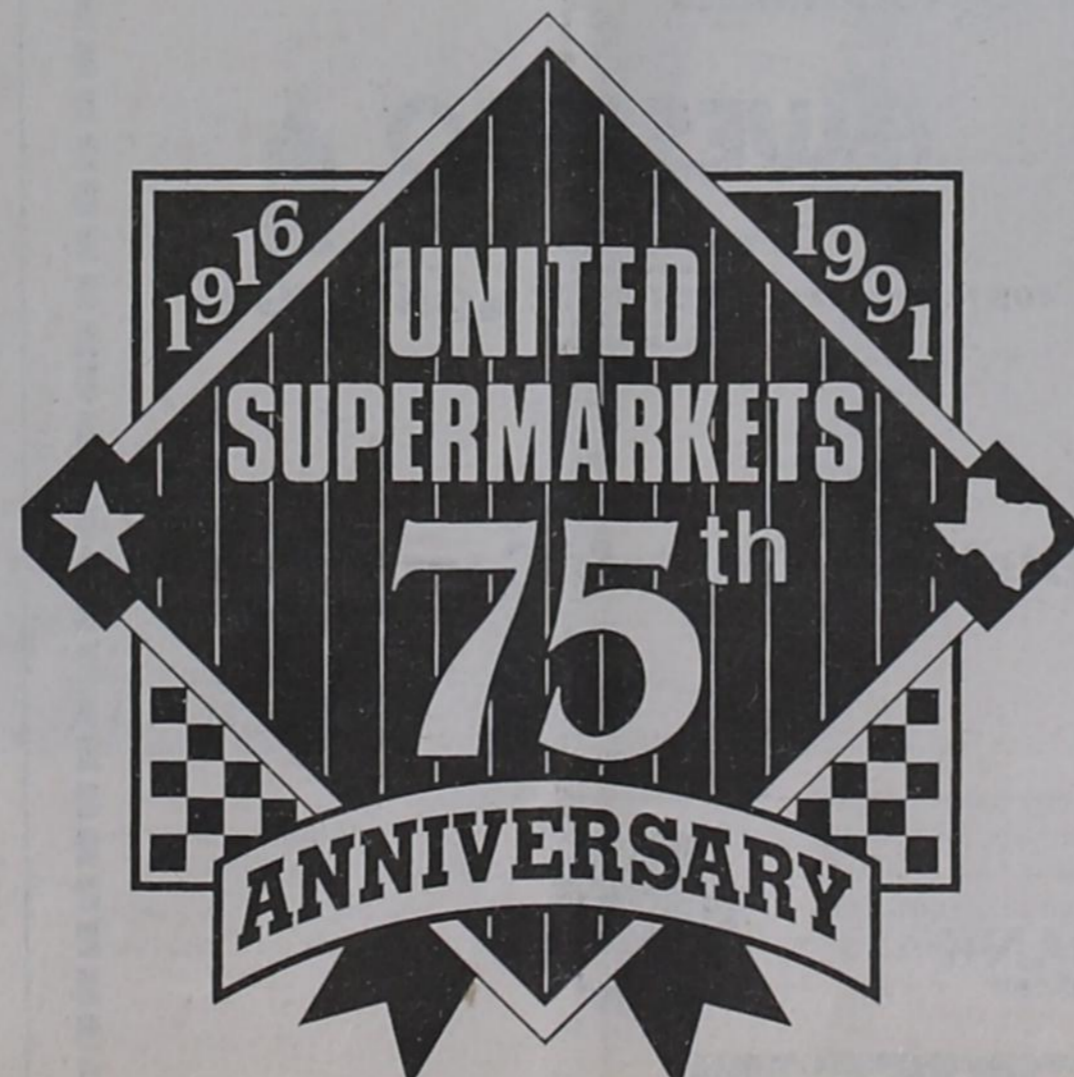

### This ANN That

Deciding on an allowance  
The beginning of the school term is a convenient time to consider a child's allowance. If parents have not been giving an al-

lowance, it may be time to begin. If a child already receives an allowance, the amount may need to be adjusted for increasing needs. Parents have traditionally used two approaches in providing money for children and teenagers: the "handout system" considered

by many to be the least expensive; and the "allowance system." Some parents feel they cannot afford to give their children a regular allowance because of other financial obligations. However, when they take time to add up all the money that is "doled out" during a week, they are shocked at the total amount. Very often the amount of money that is given "as needed" exceeds that of a reasonable allowance.

Money provided in the "as needed" system eliminates the opportunity for a child to learn to plan expenses, allocate funds, and set aside money for use on another day. A valuable lesson in money management can start by simply giving a child one week's lunch money and permitting him or her to take from the total each day to purchase a school lunch. Obviously, the expense to the family is no greater than if the money is "handed out" on a daily basis. But the child is introduced to handling money and making it last to meet needs.

Children learn responsibility by

assuming responsibility. When children are old enough to tell the difference between coins and when they begin to ask for money of their own, that is the time to begin a regular allowance. Most children will be able to handle an allowance by age five or six, or even earlier if they have older brothers and sisters already receiving an allowance.

How much allowance is the right amount? Hold a family conference. Communication skills about money can be learned while the decisions are fairly simple. In assessing the situation, keep in mind factors such as the child's age, family size and income, location of residence, likes and dislikes, and family routine.

A general rule of thumb is to make an allowance large enough to cover a child's basic needs plus some "extra" to permit opportunity to save or spend, yet small enough to force some choices. Everyone needs to develop decision-making skills and an allowance provides an opportunity for a child to build these skills. Also, an allowance

puts the burden of a decision on the child, relieving parents of having to evaluate every request for money or having to be the one to say "no" to purchases.

Probably the most effective way to determine the amount of an allowance is to work out with the child how much he or she actually needs for school or other expenses, and how much he or she will be allowed to spend on choices.

A recent article in MONEY magazine shows that nationwide estimates of allowance given average from about \$1 per week for 4-year-olds to about \$20 per week for older teens, with most parents providing an allowance of less

than \$10 per week for pre-teens. Of course, what is a reasonable allowance amount depends on the level of household income available and the number of children who will receive an allowance.

How often an allowance is given may also change as a child matures. Elementary children may need to be given amounts twice a week. Older children can handle a weekly allowance and teenagers, a monthly allocation.

What is important in providing an allowance and teaching a child money management skills is consistency on the part of the parent. A business-like allowance given in a business-like way teaches the best possible lessons about money.

## Mammograms save lives

A \$3 million federal grant from the Centers for Disease Control will help the Texas Department of Health (TDH) screen low-income women over 40 years old for breast and cervical cancer. This is the first time the federal government has awarded funds to states for cancer screening.

"Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women, and the mortality rates for this type of cancer in Texas are highest among black women," said Charlene Laramey, Director of the Chronic Disease Prevention Program at TDH. "Cervical cancer is the second most common cancer in women between the ages of 15 and 34 years old. Cervical cancer mortality rates are three times greater among black women and two times greater among Mexican American women than among Anglo women. We especially want to target those women over 40 who have ceased having children and probably aren't coming in for regular medical exams anymore." Women who are below 200 percent of the federal poverty level and who do not have medical insurance or other third-party payment will qualify for the new services.

The grant for the first year is \$3

million, with funding to be awarded year to year for five years depending on the availability of funds. All four states, including Texas, which were awarded funds are required to write a State Plan for Breast and Cervical Cancer Control. TDH is now requesting proposals from public and non-profit groups to provide the screening services beginning October 1. For the first year of the new program, it is expected that 25 to 30 contracts will be awarded and that 15,000 women will be provided breast and/or cervical cancer screening services and appropriate follow-up. "That appropriate follow-up can include diagnostic mammograms, biopsies and other diagnostic procedures," explained Donna Nichols of the Chronic Disease Prevention Program. "Mammograms and pap smears are state-of-the-art in detecting breast and cervical cancer, and the earlier the cancer is detected, the better the chance for a cure."

When the screening services become available this fall, TDH and the contractors will alert women about where they can find these services nearest to their hometown.

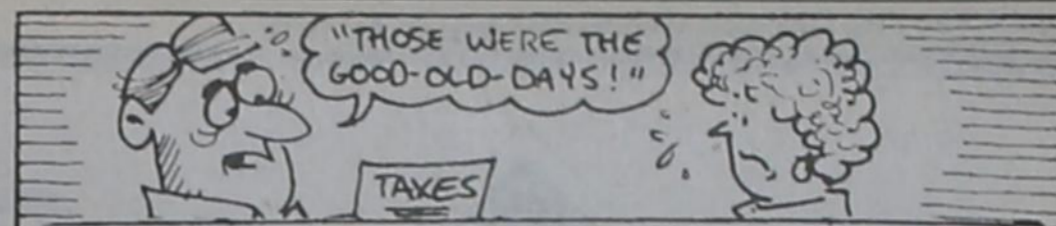

**Public Notice**

On July 22, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of two new optional services, Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement. Exchange Connection Service will permit a customer of the Telephone Company to provide voice messaging service, telephone answering service, or other services to itself or to patrons of the customer. Customer Alerting Enablement will permit residence and business lines to receive an alerting tone (intermittent dial tone) transmitted by an Exchange Connection Service customer. The proposed effective date for this offering is September 23, and will be available statewide where facilities permit.

The calling party's telephone number and other originating network call information will be delivered to the Exchange Connection Service customer when the calling number and the called number are served by the same switch. Additionally, the caller's telephone number and other originating network call information may be recorded and stored by the Exchange Connection Service customer. Customers may be able to identify the caller before the call is answered. All Exchange Connection Service customers will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided service. In the agreement the customer agrees not to disclose the calling party's telephone number unless the customer has written permission from the calling party.

The Telephone Company estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$1.2 million. Providers of voice messaging service and telephone answering services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

Exchange Connection Service is provided to customers in two parts: Local Serving Arrangement, which provides access to the exchange network; and Optional Service Features. The proposed rates, for both Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement, including installation charges, are as follows:

may you bill the patient for services not covered by Medicare," the committee reported.

Members of the ambulance committee are Jack Alexander, Albert Stone, David Tyler, Irene Fry and Herb Walls.

The Post City Council and Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors are expected to discuss the proposals at their next regular meetings.

In other action, commissioners approved the hiring of Scott Zapert to provide general maintenance duties at the courthouse. The position is a six month trial period, with a review of the service to be conducted at the end of the period. Zapert, who has been providing a variety of maintenance and painting services the past three months while serving as a "trustee" in the jail, will begin his duties September 15.

"He has been a real big help," clerk Sonny Gossett said, "and I guess he's probably saved the county as much as \$5,000 just on painting and other minor repairs around here."

Judge Giles Dalby informed the court that the White River Municipal Water District has submitted an application for extension of the permit to build the Post Reservoir in the Texas Water Commission. The extension request cites increased dissolved solids as the reason for the delay in building the dam, to be located east of Post on the North Fork of the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River. The permit application would set a July 24, 1992 starting date with an estimated completion date of 1999.

No decision was made concerning salary increases during a discussion of the budget. A tax rate of 18.4 cents per \$100 valuation has been tentatively set during public hearings, and estimates of expenses indicate a surplus of \$26,000, "which just isn't enough for us to do much in the way of increases," Dalby added.

"You know, there is almost always some expenses that come up that you don't expect, and we sure don't have much room to maneuver," he said.

During the budget discussion, commissioners tackled the county's share of park expenses, with Herb Walls and Dalby reminding commissioners that originally the agreement to share costs did not include the baseball park.

Commissioner Sammy Ellis recommended that written agreements be prepared for all jointly funded projects.

Dalby suggested the need for a joint meeting with the Post City Council, which was approved. Dalby is to set a date agreeable with the city council to discuss the park, community center and law enforcement. Ellis also requested that the county attorney be present at the meeting.

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No action was taken on a presentation to change the county hospitalization and health insurance plan, proposed by Benny Thomas to be administered by Ted L. Parker and Associates of Lubbock. The plan would be "A Controlled Funding" program, which could save approximately \$3500 per month in premiums with the same current coverage.

In a related issue, Dalby informed the court that the Texas Association of Counties health insurance coverage will increase from \$204 to \$224 per month.

The court approved the canvas of voting in last Saturday's constitutional election.

There were a total of 246 votes cast in the election.

Proposition One got 174 votes against and 64 in favor.

Proposition 2 garnered 189 votes for and 63 against.

Proposition 3 collected 160 votes in favor and 79 opposed.

In the Amendment No. 1 there were 131 in favor and 110 opposed.

Amendment No. 2 got 141 votes for and 100 against.

Attending the meeting, which was held in the first floor driver's license room to accommodate Dalby who is unable to climb the stairs following knee surgery, were Dalby, commissioners Walls, Ellis, Albert Stone and John Valdez, clerk Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales last week secured \$14.9 million from seven companies charged with violation of state antitrust laws for their involvement in conspiracies to drive up the cost of public school milk prices through illegal bid-rigging.

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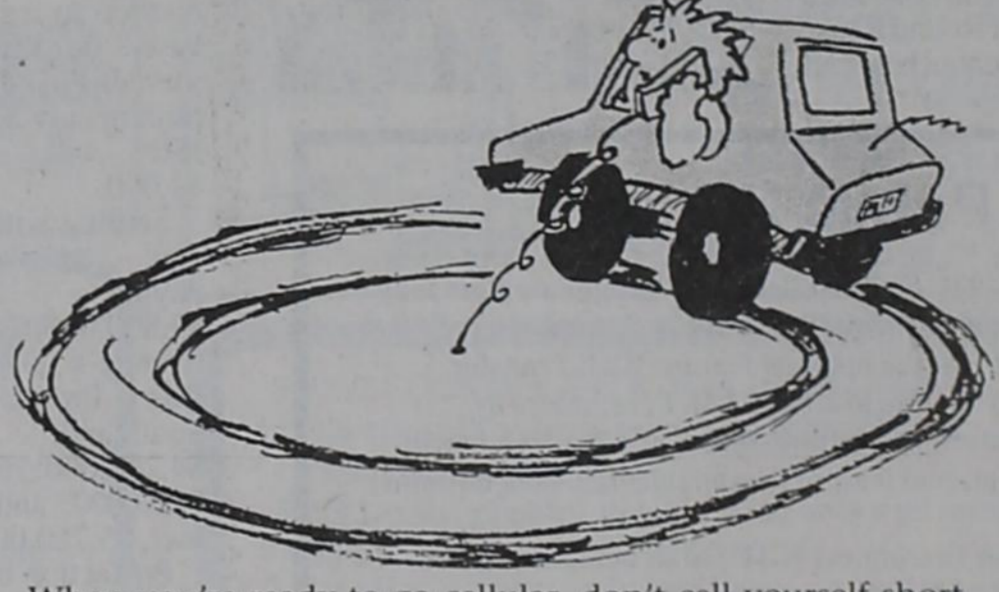
