Area ranches compete in Founder's Day Ranch Competition, Challenge

Local cowboys in real life ranch work Saturday and Sunday at the Post Stampede Rodeo Arena

The popular Founder's Day Ranch Competition and Ranch Rodeo Challenge will be held this year on Saturday beginning at 7 p.m. and Sunday starting at 2 p.m. at the Post Stampede Rodeo grounds.

Competing local ranches are Humble Farms and Cattle, Macy Ranch, Chimney Creek/Sanderson, Dalby Cattle Co., Beggs Ranch, Stoker/Kirkpatrick, Double U and Rocker A.

Sunday's ranch rodeo challenge will pit Saturday's top two teams with six area ranches—Powell Ranch of Midland, 6666 Ranch of Guthrie, Shipp's Half Circle E Ranch of Roby, Guitar Ranch of Abilene, Moorhouse Ranch Co. of Benjamin and Tongue River/Spur Ranch Headquarters of Dickens.

Events both days will include team penning, pasture roping, team branding, double mugging and the famous sugar booger back-up.

Admission is \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children 10 years or younger.

A "Big Time Rodeo Slab Dance" follows Saturday's events at 9 p.m. with music by Memory Lane. The dance is \$5 per person and will be held at the rodeo arena slab.

One of the social highlights of the year in Post will be held Friday, October 11 at the U Lazy S Ranch, where people from all over West Texas will enjoy an all-you-can-eat buffet and dancing to music by the popular Jody Nix in celebration of the founding of our town.

This year the event is hosted by the descendants of Belle and John B. Slaughter... Ryla and John F. Lott, Mary Belle Macy, the Ronnie Bouchier family, the K.W. Kirkpatrick family, the Jack Lott family and the Bob Macy family.

The annual get-together in a western setting gives people here a chance to either dress in a festive western outfit or more formal. It's quite a sight to see our local cowboys riding their horses with black ties and spurs as they direct parking and help visitors.

To assist people getting to the ranch, a shuttle bus will be leaving on the west side of the courthouse beginning at 6 p.m. Returning busses will bring people back to the courthouse beginning at 9:30 p.m.

The evening includes all you can eat dinner buffet, live auction and country and western dancing to the music by Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys.

The Fifth Annual Founder's Day Celebration in Post begins Wednesday, October 9 with a special presentation of "California Suite" at the Garza Theatre. The play, which is currently in production at Lubbock's Deadwood Theatre, is directed by Toni Cobb and features an all-star cast.

This year's theme, "Building A City," will place special emphasis on the builders and stone masons who participated in creating C.W. Post's "dream city."

The Post Art Guild will honor local artist Polly Cravy with a reception and preview on Thursday from 7 to 10 p.m. the art will be on display to the public at the Algeria Arts Center Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m.

Council takes action to close most of the landfill

Decision aimed at saving money before more expensive EPA rules take effect

The Post City Council voted Monday night at the regular meeting to begin the process of closing approximately 30 of the 35 acre landfill, just beating the Wednesday deadline for the action prior to implementation of new federal landfill guidelines.

The action was taken following an extensive briefing by engineer Butch Davis of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper.

Davis outlined the new guidelines and explained the increased costs of closing landfills after the new regulations begin to take effect today.

By setting plans to close that portion of the landfill that is already filled, the council avoids the extra expense that would be incurred later by the new rules. Those regulations include the mandatory monitoring for 30 years and other stringent controls.

A portion of the landfill still in use is expected to be used for up to 18 months.

A decision about how to manage solid wastes after the final closing of the landfill has not been made.

City manager Bob Turner informed the council that the cost of transporting solid wastes to a regional landfill is anticipated to range from \$30 to \$35 per ton, which would mean a residential rate here of \$15 to \$20 per month per resident.

No action was taken by the council on a discussion of what to do with condemned houses and the resulting debris.

The council appointed Jack Alexander to serve on the appraisal district board and Stanley Butler to serve on the airport board.

The elimination of health certificates was approved, upon the request of the city manager. "We are one of the few cities in the state requiring this, and it isn't really necessary," Turner said.

A second reading of the drug abuse policy was postponed to the November meeting, when the final amended policy will be available for council members to study.

City attorney Harvey Morton gave a briefing on the redistricting process, explaining that a recent public hearing objections were raised by Pat Walker concerning the east-west boundaries of two of the proposed voting wards.

Morton also explained that attorneys settled the Hulen Hoyle condemnation court case before the trial was to begin, with the agreement that the property would come within city codes by the end of the week. According to Morton, the city is satisfied that the property is meeting code requirements.

Attending the meeting were council members Larry Waldrip, Dan Lamb and Jim Schooler, Mayor Jim Jackson, Turner, Morton and Wynonna Kennedy.

SWCD to hold director election

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone three on the Garza Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 16 at the Soil Conservation Service Office announced Sam Ellis, chairman of the board. The elections will be held at 1:00 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

The purpose of the Garza SWCD, with headquarters in Post, Texas is to promote sound soil and water conservation program on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Personal Profile by Polly Cravy

Some of my earliest and most pleasant memories are of a large watercolor set I received as a Christmas present and the long winter evenings I spent sprawled on the living room rug painting.

Seeing puddles of blue and yellow turn to green and red and yellow turn to orange, was miraculous to me. It still is.

Those evenings were made more special by another form of magic, radio, with the wonderful companions who visited our homes regularly. Fibber McGee and Molly, George and Gracie, Red Skelton and others whose names I have forgotten, but were no less a part of that wonderful era.

It was a time when the scenes in your mind were grander than any projected on a screen or transmitted through the air. I realize this dates me a little (or a lot), but I am glad to have experienced it.

Though I have experimented with many crafts through the years, I didn't begin painting seriously until about twenty years ago. I now work in various media, but favorite is oil. I have taken numerous workshops from many artists in this area and study continuously on my own. My work has undergone a major change the past two years. I feel more liberated, striving only to learn, enjoy myself and create original work. I am using brighter colors, bolder strokes and sometimes employing a palette knife to build rich textures.

I believe that progress invariably means change. I continue to look for new avenues of expression, such as the case when I designed my first piece of jewelry in 1985, simply because I wanted something unique to wear. Due to the attention that piece

generated, I began a series of original, one of a kind necklaces called the "Earth Spirit Collection". Pieces from this collection have been displayed as art in several Dallas and Ft. Worth Galleries and marketed in numerous specialty shops in Post, Lubbock, Snyder and Dallas.

A couple of years ago I was featured on the South Plains Profile by Karla Leslie of KCBD-11 Television, Lubbock. That was very exciting to share with the viewers the beautiful terrain surrounding my studio (Angel's Roost) overlooking the Salt Fork of the Brazos River. Many of the soft colors seen in the rock formations appear in my jewelry and paintings.

My long association with the Post Art Guild has been very rewarding. Over the years I've held several offices including past president, and currently serve as Program Chairman. I am especially proud to have been a part of the restoration of the Algerita Art Center.

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Founders' Day Celebration

Scotty Samson

George (Scotty) Sampson epitomized the pioneers who built this region from the ground up, both tangibly and intangibly.

A Scottish immigrant to Post in 1907, Samson was the stonemason who helped transform cereal king C.W. Post's dream of an utopian town into the reality of handsome stone structures that still stand.

From his first day at the foot of the Caprock, until his death at age 93, he was - even more importantly - a tireless booster of his town, his area, his adopted nation and his neighbors.

Samson served for 45 years as a superintendent of the Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock, delighting in assembling the exhibits of the best agricultural products grown in each county of the region.

He also served as president of the Post Chamber of Commerce and had a hand in just about every progressive community undertaking here for more than 70 years.

In 1954, Samson was honored at a special dinner in Post. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's lead on the story was: "After nearly half a century of 'letting George do it,' the people of Post did it for George here tonight."

But he didn't formally retire for another 15 years, at the age of 85, in 1969. And even that did not dull his active interest in building a better world.

Samson arrived in this country by boat in 1905, "with \$5 in my pocket" and a strong desire to work and help others.

He saw an ad that C.W. Post had published in a newspaper, answered, and was delighted when a telegram came, hiring him to help build the county seat of Garza County. When a few years later, Post pioneered in rainmaking experiments, it was Samson who helped set off the dynamite blasts along the rim of the Caprock that Post thought would produce rain.

"If I've ever done anything," Samson once said, "it's nothing more than I owe."

Scotty Samson was born February 3, 1884 and died August 31, 1977.

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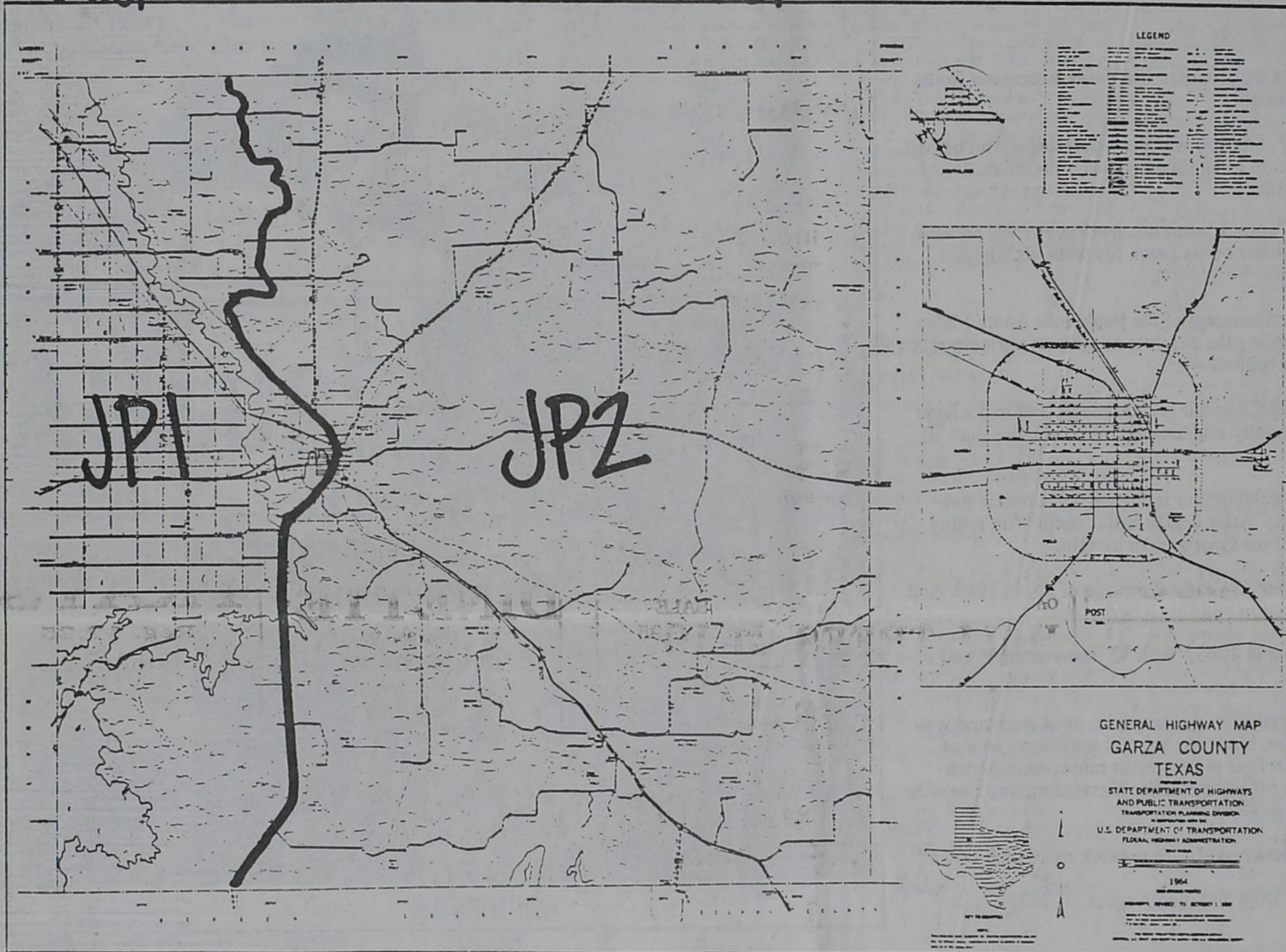
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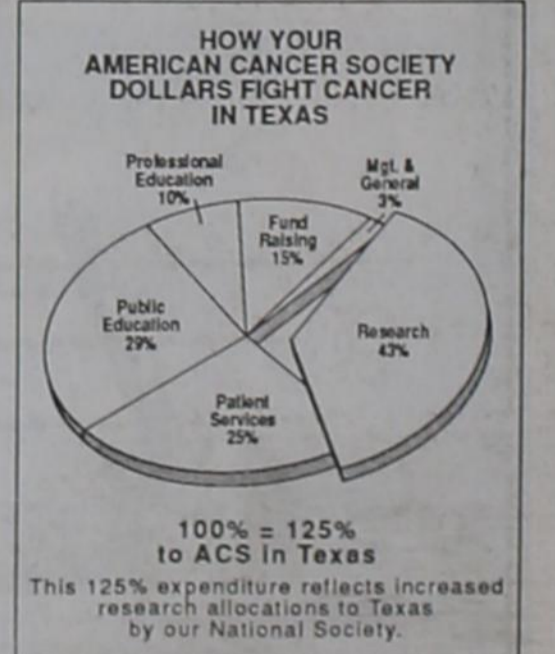
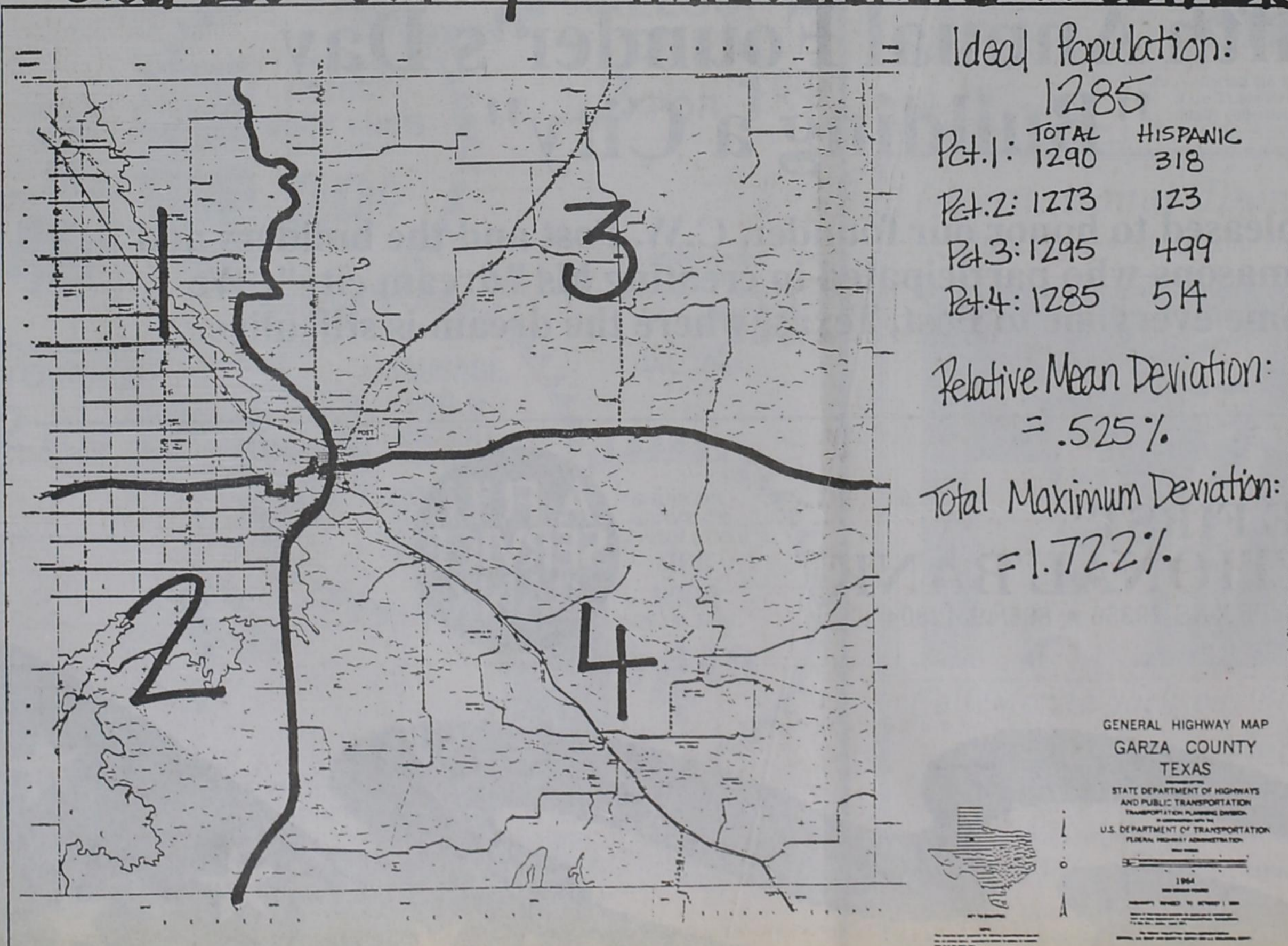

The studies were funded by the Plains Cotton Improvement Committee (PCIC) to provide a basis for generating a change in the way bark is viewed in the classing system and the market. The PCIC was presented with preliminary results of one study and final results of a second dealing with "Barky" cotton at a meeting on October 1 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock. To start the meeting the committee took a tour of Dr. John Gannaway's cotton breeding research plots. Later, several logo designs, to represent the Plains Cotton Improvement Program, were considered. The committee approved a design and the finished logo should be completed by October 15

ready for introduction at the 1991 High Plains Breeders' Tour being held October 15-16. "The logo, which will be used on seed bags, should help cotton producers identify the varieties that have been developed with their funds. It will give them an easily identifiable mark to look for when selecting the cotton varieties they will use," explains Myrl D. Mitchell, committee chairman. As well as sponsoring the development of new cotton varieties for the High Plains, PCIC is trying to determine how the presence of bark affects the spinning performance of cotton at the textile mill. The research was initiated in 1986 and preliminary results of the latest studies were presented to the committee during the meeting.

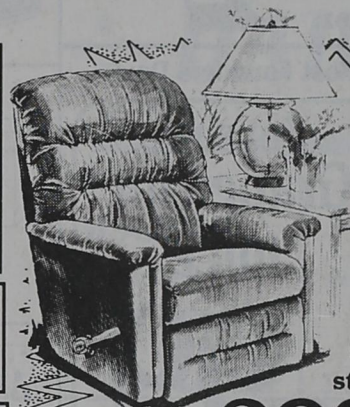

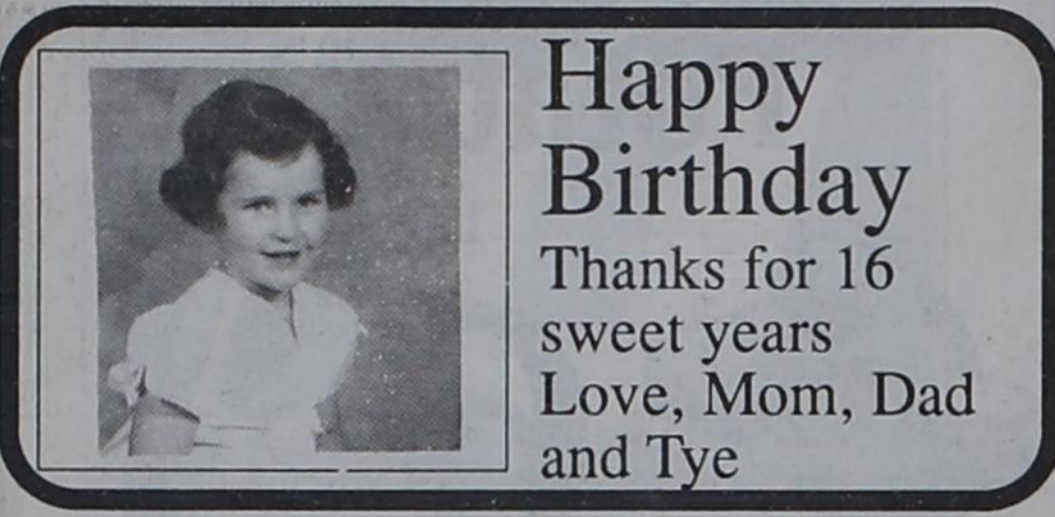

Pioneer family develops U Lazy S

One of the highlights of Founder's Day this year in Post is the "Black Tie and Boots" dinner and dance celebration, to be held at the U Lazy S Ranch... which was founded by John B. Slaughter.

The descendants of Belle and John B. Slaughter are hosting the event at the ranch Friday evening.

The U Lazy S Ranch history, outlined in "Wagon Wheels" paints the story of this pioneer family.

In 1901 John B. Slaughter bought from the Nave McCord Cattle Company, at \$1.60 an acre, the Square and Compass Ranch comprising 150,000 acres. In 1906 he sold to C.W. Post, the famous breakfast food manufacturer, of Battle Creek, Mich., 50,000 acres from the west side of the ranch which Mr Post added to the Llano Ranch that he has previously acquired. Mr Slaughter later refused to sell the entire ranch to Mr Post.

After a period of seven years, Mr Slaughter sold the family home in Fort Worth. He built a home on the U Lazy S Ranch with lumber freighted by wagon from Colorado City. This house, until it burned in 1936, was one of the well known landmarks of West Texas.

Louie Antoninette, the youngest daughter, died in 1912 at the age of 18.

Mr Slaughter was interested, as were other cattlemen in crossing the buffalo with the beef cow. The first cross, the Cattalo, was fairly common but he achieved the impossible second cross, the Vernier, though it had no economic value. The ranch became a State Game Preserve in 1925 and he took great delight in making pets of the five head of deer that were shipped to him from South Texas. From this seed stock have come the deer that now populate this region.

An interesting story is told about the Slaughter buffalo. Evidently they were numerous. Cowboys had made a pet of a small furry black one. Once a nobleman from some foreign country visited the Slaughter's, the story goes, to consider buying the ranch. The Slaughters and the cowboys all ate together in one large room, and the nobleman commented on Mr and Mrs Slaughter eating with their servants.

This incensed the cowboys who decided to play a trick on the prospective buyer. They put the pet buffalo in his room then late that night they created a loud commotion below his window. The nobleman stuck his head out the window to see what was going on and was told that a vicious black bear has escaped and they were searching for him. He started reaching for his clothes and came in contact with the buffalo. Out of the room he came, minus his immaculate clothing and the Slaughter

interests were out one more prospective buyer the next day.

John B. Slaughter literally died in the saddle. After a full day rounding up, he complained of indigestion and died of a heart attack before morning on November 11, 1928, at the age of 79.

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Cotton farmers confronted with late crop

Cotton farmers across the Texas High Plains, confronted with a late-planted and late-developing crop, may want to consider using a harvest-aid chemical to help induce boll opening before a killing freeze occurs, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Although not fully mature, some late set bolls could contribute to yield if the boll opening process is initiated or occurs before a hard freeze," said Dr. James Supak, Extension Service cotton agronomist.

More than half the High Plains cotton crop was planted or replanted in June, Supak noted. Where moisture was generally adequate and insect damage minimal, the crop fruited up well and retained a relatively high percentage of the bolls, he said.

"Below average heat units in July and August, coupled with excessive rains and cool, cloudy conditions in September, further slowed crop development," Supak said. "Consequently, white blooms that occurred after mid-August in the northern counties or late August in the southern sections have a low probability of developing into mature bolls before a killing freeze."

Still, those late set bolls may possibly contribute to yield if they begin to open before that freeze, he said.

"That process can be triggered by environmental conditions or induced with a harvest-aid chemical," Supak said. Decisions about which course to follow will require careful consideration of boll numbers and yield and quality potential against the cost of chemical application and possible lowering of micronaire by mixing immature and mature fibers.

"In most instances, the best management decision will be to allow the crop to stay in the field until frost because of limited yield and quality potential," the agronomist said.

"The exception will be late maturing cotton that has good yield prospects, based on the number of bolls per plant. If by early- to mid-October, the crop has only small percentages of open bolls and a relatively large number of bolls at 5 and 6 nodes above the uppermost cracked boll (NACB) that are still watery, then harvest-aid chemical treatment may be economically justified."

If chemical application is decided upon, Supak suggested that treatment be delayed until 14 to 20 days before the normal frost date. "This will provide as much time as practical for boll development, and yet allow time for the harvest-aid treatment to initiate the boll opening process," he said.

Supak explained that sunny, dry conditions and mild temperatures, coupled with periodic cool fronts in late September and October, usually hasten cut-out and crop senescence.

"As the crop enters this accelerated aging mode, boll filling slows down and boll drying begins. In addition, hormonal changes trigger the loosening of cells in the abscission zones between the burs in the bolls," he said.

These same changes also contribute to leaf discoloration and defoliation. As the leaves drop, sunlight warms the bolls and speeds up their opening. "This is why we sometimes see very immature bolls near the top of the

Underground storage tank rules

The Texas Water Commission has announced that, beginning immediately, owners of underground and aboveground storage tanks who have not yet registered their tanks with the state agency may do so without penalty for late registration until October 15, 1991.

"Many individuals or small business owners who own and operate tanks, or who have unused tanks on their property, have not registered the tanks with the TWC because of lack of knowledge regarding registration requirements or a fear of penalties for late registration," said TWC Executive Director Allen Beinke. "Because our main goal is for every tank to be properly registered in order to protect the environment, we are granting this short 'grace period' for owners to voluntarily comply with the law."

Owners of underground storage tanks that contain petroleum and other hazardous substances have been required since 1987 to register those tanks with the Texas Water Commission. Tanks not currently in use, but not properly closed out according to TWC standards, also must be registered. In addition, aboveground storage tanks that contain motor fuel-type petroleum products have been required to register with the Commission since 1990.

Only owners of registered storage tanks are eligible for clean-up reimbursement from the state's petroleum storage tank remediation fund in the event their tanks leak and result in environmental contamination.

plant cracking open whereas more mature bolls lower in the plant are still green and firm," Supak said.

"Immature but harvestable bolls that are conditioned in this manner are unlikely to be damaged by a hard freeze when it occurs. On such 'hardened off' plants, the leaves usually drop and bolls open within a week or two after the freeze," he said.

Immature bolls also can be forced to open through the use of a plant growth regulator called Prep, the agronomist said. This harvest-aid chemical is a strong formulation of ethephon, which releases the plant hormone ethylene into the plant. Ethylene accelerates loosening of the cells in the abscission zones between the burs.

"For this to occur, a sufficient amount of the chemical must be deposited directly on the boll, as the chemical isn't translocated in the plant," Supak cautioned. And he said temperatures must range from a low of the upper 50s to a high of the upper 70s and above for boll opening to occur.

"Where natural aging isn't conditioning the crop, Prep could possibly be used to force opening of immature bolls to avoid risk of their destruction by a hard, killing freeze," Supak said.

The profitability of such a treatment would depend on several factors, including the crop yield potential and the number of bolls that are sufficiently high in moisture to be susceptible to freeze damage, he noted.

In a 1990 test, a portion of a field with yield potential in excess of two bales an acre was terminated when only 20 percent of the bolls were open. To establish individual boll weights and quality, bolls were harvested from each nodal position and kept separate throughout the drying, opening, ginning and fiber testing.

In this trial, all bolls at or below node 7 were already open. Lint weight and micronaire for the bolls harvested from nodes 7 through 15 are shown in Table 1. These results show that bolls harvested from nodes 8 to 10 were essentially mature at the time of harvest. Bolls at node 11 also were mature (based on lint weight and micronaire value) but still relatively high in moisture at harvest. Bolls at nodes 12 through 15 were immature and very high in moisture.

Supak said these observations indicate that bolls occurring up to 4 nodes above the uppermost cracked boll are mature and in all

likelihood would open following a freeze. The remaining bolls are immature and vulnerable to freeze damage.

"A Prep application could 'save' the immature boll," the cotton specialist said, "but would their contribution to yield and quality justify the treatment cost?" The answer depends on the number of vulnerable bolls located 5 or more NACB, he said.

Assuming that the example crop had 40,000 plants per acre and boll retentions of 35,25,15 and 5 percent at 5,6,7 and 8 NACB, respectively, you could expect a Prep treatment to result in 70 pounds of lint yield, he explained. In that example, about 43 pounds of that yield increase would come from the bolls located 5 NACB and 18 pounds from bolls at 6 NACB, he said.

Using a "micronaire averaging" procedure developed by Dr. Jane Dever, associate research scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock, mixing the example's immature fiber with the mature would lower mike values about six to seven percent, Supak said. In this example, that would drop the micronaire from 4.1 to 3.8.

From these yield and quality

considerations, Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Service economist at Lubbock, approximated the potential increase in return from application of Prep to this hypothetical crop. His analyses are summarized in Table 2, and show a potential increase in net return of about \$20 an acre.

"Remember," Supak cautioned, "that their analyses were made using a 'best case' example. The lint quality characteristics (micronaire) and yield potential of late-planted 1991 cotton fields aren't likely to be as good as those of the crop used in their example."

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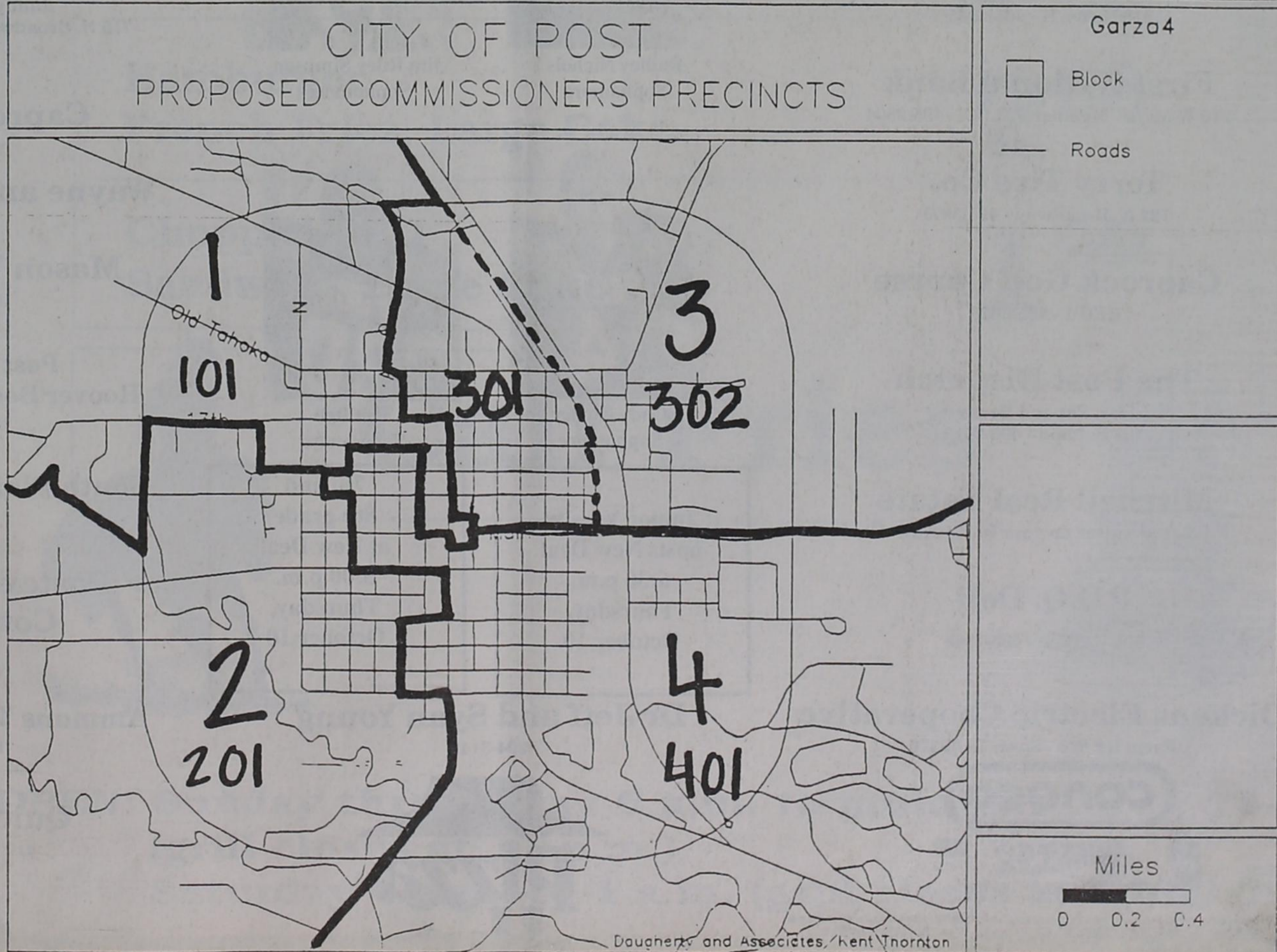
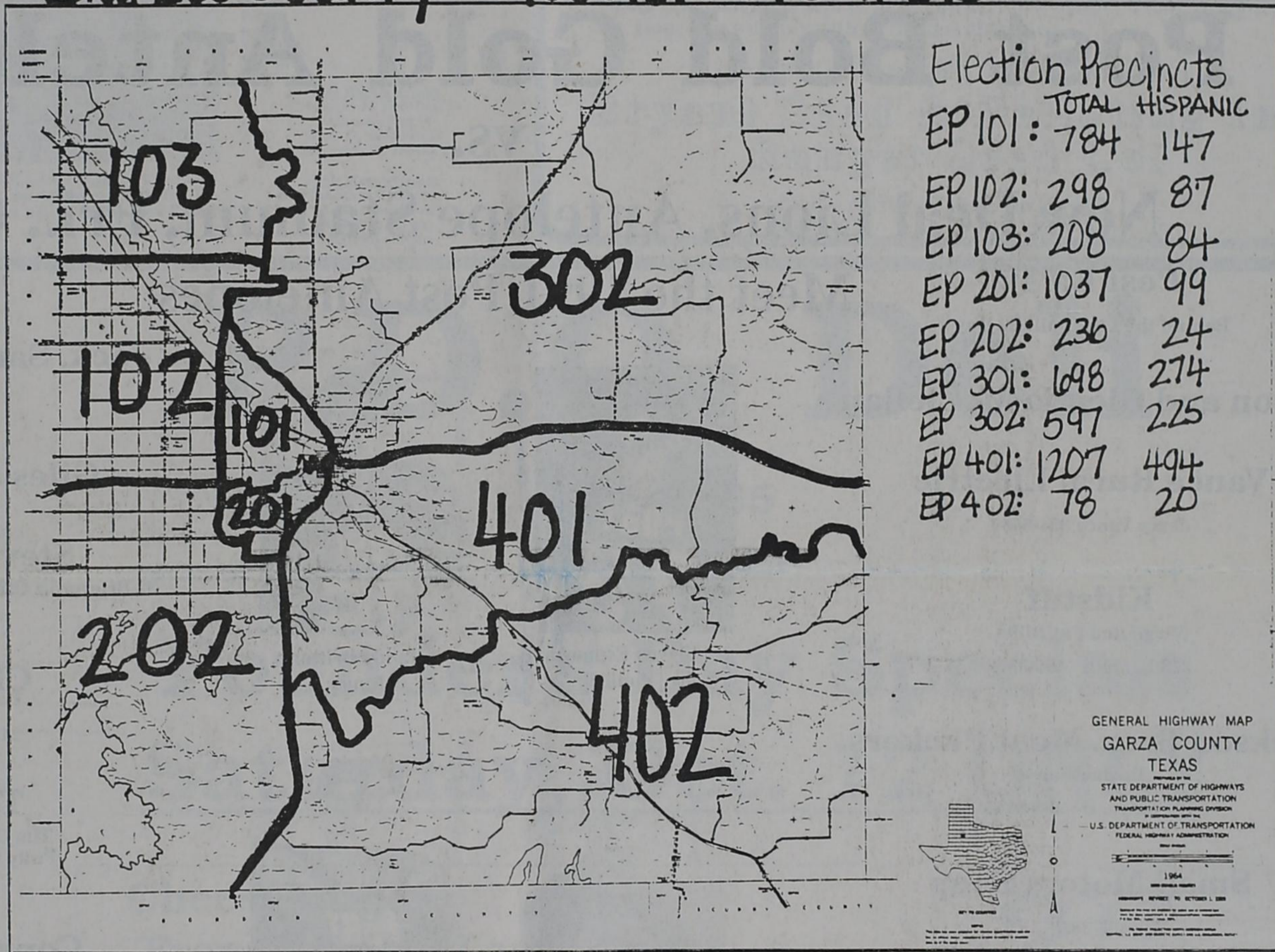
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Wildcats shatter 'Lopes in 46-14 district contest

The Idalou Wildcats ran over, around and through the Post Antelopes last Friday night there in the second District 4AA clash for both teams.

The damage from Idalou came early and quick and didn't let up until the fourth quarter.

A fistful of mistakes, coupled with sloppy tackling early in the game and bad breaks here and there, left the Antelopes clinging to little hope of a rebound in the second half, as they trailed 32-0 at halftime.

Idalou's nifty running back Freddy Martinez gave a demonstration of his prowess on the Wildcats' second play of the game as he slipped out of the hands of would-be tacklers at the Idalou 20 yard line and raced the distance for the first touchdown.

And the Wildcats kept coming. One of the Antelopes' bad breaks came on the ensuing kickoff when the squib kick bounced off a 'Lope and was recovered by Idalou at the Post 45. Seven plays later Martinez hit the end zone for another six points.

The next Antelope possession ended on second down following a first down when quarterback Damon Curtis' pitchout to Brandon Bird went sailing behind the tailback, landing on the ground with a Wildcat on top of it.

The 'Lope defense held and gave the offense another try, but on second down at the Post 21 Curtis lost control of the ball and the Wildcats started another touchdown drive.

With 3:20 left in the first quarter the game was already out of reach at 19-0. Idalou got the ball back after the Antelopes could not muster a first down. The Wildcats took the ball at their own seven and marched steadily down the field, scoring with 7:18 left in the first half, with Martinez doing most of the damage. The extra point attempt was blocked by Anthony Cruse, the Wildcats led 25-0.

The Antelopes were forced to punt on fourth down, then the defense snuffed out an Idalou drive at the Post 14, when on fourth down Josh Bush broke up a pass.

Two plays later the 'Lope offense gave the ball up again when Curtis' second fumble was covered by Idalou at the seven yard line.

The Wildcats cashed in on the turnover, scoring on third down from the two, with guess who, Martinez again. The extra point put Idalou out front 32-0.

With only a little over one minute left in the second half, the 'Lopes ran off four plays when time ran out in the half.

Second Half Action

A spark of offensive energy gave Post fans new life in the opening series of the second half, as Bird slashed and rammed his way down the field, along with hard running by Hiram Gutierrez. A first down conversion on fourth down at the Idalou 45 set up a first down at the 35. A pass to Bird was too high and then a pass to Shane Horton was picked off by Idalou's Toby Lynn, who hauled the ball in at the 25 and dodged tacklers, cutting from his left to his right and racing the distance to the end zone. With 8:01 left in the third period, Idalou led 39-0.

The next Antelope possession finally resulted in a touchdown drive. Bird got the call over right guard from the Post 29 to the 32. Again he got the call on a sweep around right end to the 44 and a first down. Ricky Jefferson went on the reverse around left end to the Idalou 46 and Curtis scrambled around left end, losing yardage to the 47. On second down Curtis found Bird at the end of a pass to the 42 and on third down Jefferson caught a pass at the 35. A late hit penalty on Idalou set the ball at first down on the 20.

A pass to Michael Harper was almost intercepted, then Bird went over right tackle, slamming his way to the 17. The third down pass play to Harper in the end zone was tipped by a defender, setting up a nail-biting fourth down situation. Curtis pulled the option around his left end and with extra effort was finally brought down at the seven. Jefferson took the call over left guard, bursting through the hole to the end zone. The two point conversion attempt by Curtis over right tackle put the 'Lopes on the scoreboard at 39-8 with 4:31 left in the third period.

The touchdown seemed to ignite the Wildcats, and Martinez on first down at the Idalou 37 went around his right end, running through the tacklers and simply outran defenders to the goal line...with 4:17 left in the third quarter, Idalou led 46-8.

J.V. wins at Idalou 20-14

The Post Junior Varsity football team, consisting of sophomores and freshmen, played their best defensive game this year at Idalou last Thursday in the 20-14 win.

BRANDON BIRD (32) cuts around his left end toward the end zone during second half action at Idalou last Friday night. (Photo by Jerry Taylor)

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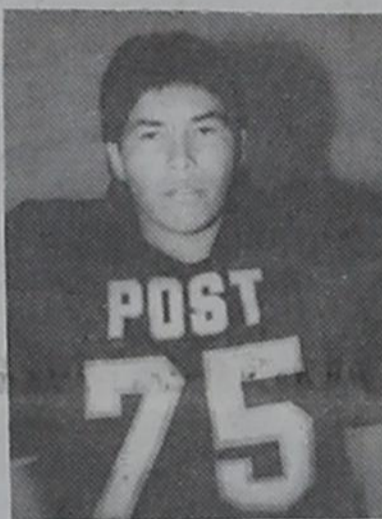

Stenholm corrects checking issue

Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) today announced that on several occasions he did unknowingly have insufficient funds at the House of Representatives Bank during the 101st Congress.

Stenholm issued a statement to correct a September 25 press release where he stated he did not think he had overextended his account.

"I first stated (because I believed it to be correct) that I had not had any overdrafts at the

House Bank. But upon careful review of my account at the bank, I have found that I have, in fact, on several occasions, made errors in the timing of transfers of funds between the three banks in which I maintain accounts with resulting overdrafts.

"I was shocked, to say the least, when I reviewed my account and embarrassed completely that in my own way I have added to the negative attitude expressed by the people toward the Congress. I ac-

cept my share of the blame for permitting, as well as contributing to, a story that sheds bad light on the Congress.

"I am in total agreement with the new policy announced by Speaker Foley," stated Stenholm.

Last week, Foley announced that, effective immediately, overdrafts will be assessed a service charge and that no checks drawn against a House Bank account with insufficient funds will be honored.



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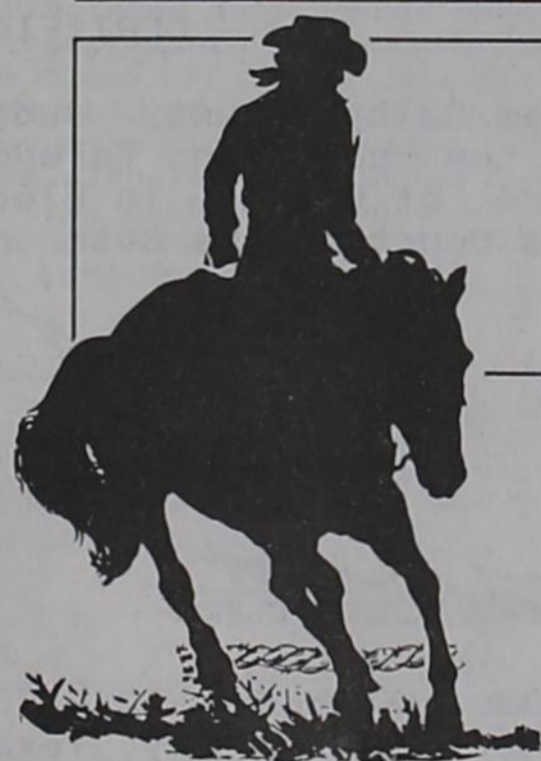

AUSTIN - The speaker of the Texas House of Representatives was handcuffed and jailed three hours last week.

Prosecutors say no one is above the law; the speaker's friends say it was a set-up.

And the average Texan? In coming weeks, he or she will get to judge whether this affair becomes a political circus.

House Speaker Gib Lewis was handcuffed, fingerprinted, dressed in inmate issue, and spent three hours in a cell before the judge released him.

Lewis was supposed to have shown up for a pretrial hearing on

two misdemeanor counts of ethics violations, but he didn't.

Instead, he went hunting in West Texas.

Lewis explained his lawyer told him that the judge said Lewis didn't have to show up in person.

Televised Trial?

Around midnight, Lewis got a phone call from his lawyer, who advised him to get back to Austin for the hearing. Lewis flew back the next morning, stopped at his Capitol office to change into a suit, and went to the courthouse where District Judge Bob Perkins had him jailed for missing the deadline.

Everyone got the message: don't even look like you are toying with Perkins' courtroom.

Perkins let Lewis out of jail and the speaker showed up 10 minutes early for the pretrial the next morning. Perkins delayed on a motion to move the trial to a lower court, and he left open the possibility that TV cameras will be allowed in the courtroom for the next hearing.

The Hunter, The Hunted

Obviously, the judge has the speaker's attention now; Lewis already had the media's attention; and the trial is certain to receive the attention of most Texans.

Those who sympathize with

Lewis feel that he's been picked on by the media and the Austin-based liberal Democrats. His jailing last week set off a sympathy backlash.

The irony could not be better contrived as fiction: the speaker, whose passion is big game hunting, turned out to be the hunted.

Confusing Ground Rules

As a political passion play, this affair is confusing, but some things need to be noted: it's about legislative ethics, it's about power and clout, and it's about Democratic Party factions.

Texas Republicans aren't on the playing field.

Travis County DA Ronnie Earle rightfully wants to clean up the Texas House and lobby, but unfortunately, a lot of practices deemed unethical are legal.

Earle's lengthy probe resulted in only two misdemeanor charges against Lewis late last year just before the session began and Gov. Ann Richards was inaugurated.

Liberal Tie-in?

Gov. Richards, a former Travis County commissioner who used to vote on Earle's budget, worked the ethics issue from the other side. She pushed a strong ethics bill which was weakened in the House and Senate, perhaps because Lewis had already been indicted.

The bottom line is that liberal Democrats, particularly the Austin-based faction, want Lewis out, because he is close with the business lobby; he is the leader and symbol of the "good 'ol boy" system they hate; and he usually kills their bills.

The Lewis faction knows this. That's why they are suspicious of the Austin courthouse crowd and wonder if the speaker was set-up.

Lewis himself is more suspicious of the media: "If this (the jailing) had happened to any member of the media, there'd be front-page editorials every day." Many believe he's right on this point.

More School Days

A business group last week urged the state to lengthen the time students spend in school.

In a report on improving education, the Texas Association of Business called for increased instruction time through year-round schedules and by keeping students in class more days.

"A plan for year-round schools should be developed for all districts in Texas to replace the traditional three-month summer vacation with shorter vacation periods regularly spaced through the academic year," the report said.

It also said the Legislature should consider adding another 10 class days to the school year. The schools this fall increased their class days from 175 to 180.

Other Highlights

The state comptroller's office has ordered an audit of the Dallas Independent School District, which laid off more than 250 teachers at the beginning of the school year but rehired them after protests. Comptroller John Sharp said the audit is in response to requests from parents, teachers taxpayers and district officials.

The State Board of Insurance last week adopted an emergency rule that prohibits Texas auto insurance companies from denying coverage to applicants or charging them higher rates because they previously were uninsured.

Health News

Suffering from a stroke is extremely frightening. However, there are ways to foresee a stroke. A stroke is a disruption of blood flow to a certain portion of the brain, which is damaged when it does not receive blood with oxygen. Blood with oxygen is needed for the brain or damage will occur. When a portion of the brain is damaged then a function of the body is impaired.

Clogged arteries also can cause a stroke. These arteries can cut the supply of oxygenated blood to the brain. Another cause of strokes is hemorrhaging. These are extremely serious because brain tissue or clots break loose from the arterial wall and block an artery.

According to Jacqueline Germain, M.D., medical director of Methodist Hospital's Rehabilitation Institute, the warning signs of a stroke are:

- * Dizziness.
- * A temporary loss in memory or mental ability.
- * Numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg.
- * Garbled speech.
- * Eye problems, including temporary loss of sight or double vision.
- * Recent onset of severe headaches.

A person can also experience a "little stroke," called transient ischemic attack. The following may signal that immediate medical attention is necessary to prevent a serious stroke:

- * Blackouts.
- * Falls which have no explanation.
- * Temporary loss of vision.
- * Dizziness.
- * Temporary weakness in the limbs.

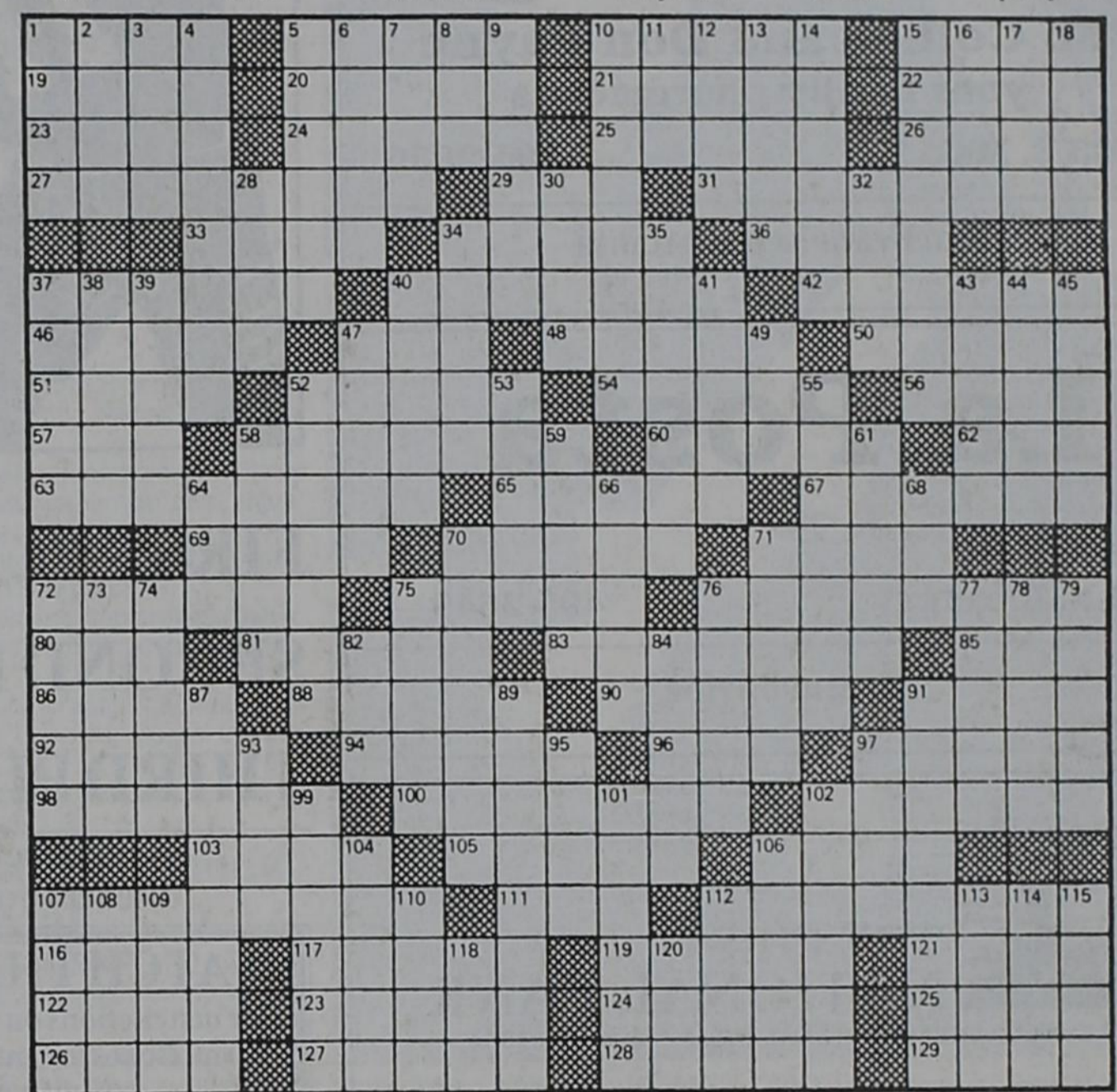
Woman's Culture Club

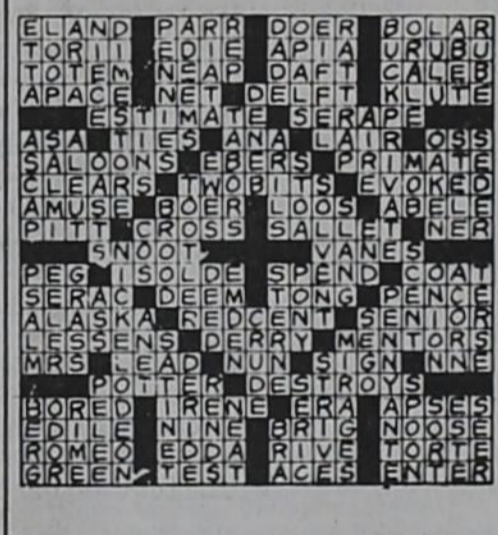

RRC to publish rules boosting pit and quarry safety

New rules designed to prevent Texas motorists from plunging into unprotected quarries and pits across the state have been posted for public comment by the Railroad Commission, according to Commission Chairman Lena

Guerrero. The rules, which will be published in the Texas Register for a 30-day period comment period, implement the Texas Aggregate Quarry and Pit Safety Act passed by the legislature during its regular session earlier this year. Guerrero said a tragic accident two years ago, which sent a school bus plunging into a pit near the city of Alton and claimed the lives of 21 school children, spurred the legislative action. "The senseless

loss of life in that accident graphically illustrates the dangers of unprotected, open pits by public roads," Guerrero said. "These rules will put barriers of earth and steel between the public and tragedy." Guerrero said the legislature not only asked the Railroad Commission to come up with the pit and quarry safety rules, but prescribed fees for pit operators to cover the estimated \$196,000 cost of the regulatory program.

Operators or those responsible for quarries and pits, whether active or inactive, would first have to file an inventory report with the Commission detailing each site's location, age, operational status, and current use. Under the proposed rules, those pits or quarries located within 200 feet of a public road must be protected by guardrails, fences, earthen beams, barricades or other devices designed to prevent vehicles from plunging into the excavation. Op-

erators would have to get a safety certificate from the Commission before opening new pits or re-opening or abandoning existing pits. First-time violators of the proposed rules would be subject to civil penalties of \$500 to \$5,000 for each violation. Second and subsequent offenses would be subject to penalties ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000 per violation.

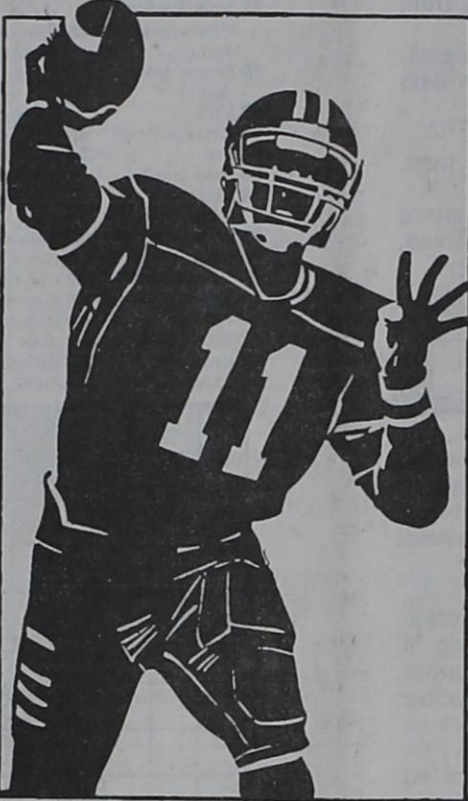
