Committee issues new plan, provides no alternatives

Single member district voting debated at public hearing

A public hearing to review a report by the City of Post redistricting committee last Thursday afternoon at the Holy Cross Catholic Church fellowship hall aired the continuing conflicts between those at the meeting and members of the committee.

The new single member voting districts proposed by the committee include three voting districts with the Northeast Ward to contain 63.8 percent minority population.

Opponents to the plan pointed out that the proposal still does not address the United States Justice Department's requirements that a "safe" minority voting district be established with at least 65 percent minority population.

Committee members supported the proposal as the best and only proposal that could be considered.

Opponents also pointed out that the original plan prepared for consideration by city attorney Harvey Morton with assistance from city staff members provided for a "safe" minority voting district of more than 65 percent. The Proposal One had been rejected by the committee at an earlier meeting.

Other opposition to the newly created plan includes the meandering boundaries and the disjointed arrangement of the South and Northeast wards.

The committee announced that no other plan would be submitted and that the city council will have to decide what action to take next.

Approximately 20 citizens attended the meeting.

The new proposal sets the West Ward voting boundaries on a north to south line starting on the north end of Avenue S from Hwy 84, south to 15th St., then east to Avenue Q and south to West Main, then east one block to Avenue P and

Post ISD Trustees accept royalties from Rural Vision Inc. to establish wireless cable service

New system uses radio frequencies for satellite cable service

Post ISD board of trustees members discussed at length a proposal by Rural Vision Inc. to enter into a contract which "sounds too good to be true," board member Mark Kirkpatrick said.

After hearing a report from the district's attorney Joe V. Boerner Jr., who said that with specified corrections, he could find problem with the agreement and that "it is not an unreasonable contract."

The "too good to be true" part of the proposal centers around Rural Vision's plan to pay the Post ISD an initial \$1,000 for executing the contract and then \$92,500 in royalties for leasing FM radio frequencies over a 10 year period.

The new wireless cable system will use microwave facilities broadcasting FM frequencies. Rural Vision's Thad Busse of Canyon Lake, Texas, explained the process in detail. He told trustees that school districts in Lamesa, O'Donnell, Klondike and New Home had already entered into contract with the company.

With an operating base at O'Donnell, the system will use FM radio frequencies assigned to the five school districts through the FCC approved educational frequencies program.

The system will provide a total of 33 channels, with the schools receiving free equipment and installation for four dedicated channels devoted to FCC approved educational programs.

Busse said that the company can afford to provide these services through the cooperation of the schools in order to boost the number of available frequencies so that residential customers of the new cable service would be provided more total channels than now being offered in the market.

After a lengthy evaluation and discussion, the board agreed to the program. Service is expected to begin within the next year.

Trustees approved renewal of certificates of deposit of \$1,467,385; \$783,604; \$932,984 and \$896,125 for 30 to 31 days at 4.0 to 4.12 percent.

Consideration of the replacement gymnasium was ordered to be placed on the agenda for the January meeting.

The board approved the appointment of members to the text book committee and agreed to establish a separate contract building fund for the purpose of replacement of the gym.

Attending the meeting were trustees Dan Hodges, Barbara Hardin, Gary Workman, Pru Basquez, Rex Cash, Mark Kirkpatrick and Ronnie Gradine.

This ANN That

Madonna, the pop superstar, captured the spirit of the 1980s in her song, "Material Girl." The excessive acquisition of goods - from fine cars to expensive sneakers - became a fetish during the decade, while moral, spiritual and intellectual endeavors took a back seat. Today many American families are taking stock, and most don't like what they see. Children are undereducated compared to peers in other industrialized nations; problem behavior often related to drug use has lowered the quality of life and reckless behavior in our quest for easier and more enjoyable life has fouled our environment.

Parents want to teach their children stronger family values and help them gain a sense of fulfillment and meaning in their lives.

Some pointers for parents are:

- * Provide a good role model as kids watch your every action!
- * Show that you value your freedom to think and act independently, that you don't have to do something just because "everyone is doing it." This helps kids see that negative peer pressure can be rejected.
- * Be consistent in your words

and actions. For example, a phone call interrupts your dinner and you say, "Tell them I'm not home yet." The message your children hear is that it's acceptable to lie for your own convenience.

- * Demonstrate your own sense of self-respect and self-esteem. Taking care of your health through exercise and diet offers a strong role model for your children.
- * Respect your teens' privacy. Knock before you enter their rooms. Never snoop. If your kids think you don't trust them, they will be less willing to share their problems with you.
- * Be cautious in using prescriptions or over-the-counter medicines as a quick fix for pain or stress. Your example can counter or reinforce the media message that any problem can be cured with chemicals.
- * Be aware of how your own use of alcohol can influence your teens. How much you drink will not go unnoticed. Avoid excuses like "having a rough day." Your drinking behavior tends to be the behavior your children imitate.
- * Talk honestly about stress or conflict in your life. Children need to know that such struggles are a normal part of life. They have a good model when they see you are coping with problems without relying on alcohol or other drugs.

1. Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.

2. The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18, 1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1992, 1993, 1994, and 1995.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Runnels, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Marin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, east to the Nolan-Taylor County border; thence, south along the eastern Nolan County line to the Runnels County border; thence, east along the northern Runnels County line, thence, south along the eastern Runnels County line; thence, west along the southern Runnels County line; thence, north along the western Runnels County line to a point where the southern Coke County line meets Runnels County; thence, west along the southern Coke County line to a point 13 miles south of Robert Lee in Coke County; thence, north to Robert Lee; thence, west to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuloniform

clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.

8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather & Climate Section of the Commission.

9. If at least 25 eligible persons make a written request for a hearing, the Commission shall hold a public hearing on this application. Those eligible to request a hearing are all persons at least 18 years of age who reside or own property within the boundaries of the proposed weather modification operational area. A request for hearing must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting a hearing; (2) a statement that each person requesting a hearing is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property within the proposed operational area; and (3) a brief description of each requester's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected by the granting of this application.

10. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days after the first publication of this notice. All requests for hearing should be mailed to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711-3087. ARP Signup announced

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan today announced that the 1992 acreage reduction program signup for feed grains, wheat, rice, and Upland and Elms cotton will be February 10 through April 17, 1992.

These dates could be delayed depending on when congressional action is completed on pending technical corrections to existing agricultural laws, Madigan said.

The secretary has announced a five percent ARP for the 1992 crops of barley, corn, sorghum, and wheat, and a 10 percent ARP for Upland cotton. No acreage reduction will be required for oats. The 1992 acreage reduction percentage for rice has not been announced.

Details of the 1992 farm programs will be announced later and will be available to producers through county offices of the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Dear Editor: My friend Boo Olson called me this morning at 7:15 to tell me to look at the sunrise.

In the cloudless eastern sky, above the orange glow along the horizon, a huge orb of pale purple/pink appeared ENE covering an area the diameter of which extended from about fifteen degrees to about thirty-five degrees above the horizon.

The phenomenal orb was gone by 7:30 a.m.

Travelling along the plains from Plainview to Crosbyton the evening before, the sunset was particularly prolonged and pronounced, due to an unusual, light wispy cloud formation in the west, and lasted from 5:30 to after 6:30 p.m. And about 8 p.m., I saw a huge, soft glowing halo around the moon.

During the very early morning hours (from just after midnight to at least 4 a.m.) of the past Friday, Saturday and Sunday, the annual Geminid meteor showers provided quite a show in the southern sky; the moon setting before midnight and the lack of any clouds made the show much brighter and sharper.

During the past year, we have seen some remarkable, unusual sunsets, eerily hued - all attributable, so they say, to the eruption of Pinatuba. And a few weeks ago, although the television report stated that the southern extent was Crosbyton, I observed the northern lights from a vantage point just west of Post atop the Caprock,

from about 6:45 to well past 8 p.m.

The Urside meteor showers are due about December 22 in the northern sky, but they are not as numerous, and the Full Cold moon on the 21st will further diminish the visibility of the meteor showers.

'Lopes take third at Idalou tourney

In the 1960s a stall may have been considered to be an easy way to protect a lead in basketball... but as the Lubbock Christian High School coach discovered last Saturday, stalling is an obsolete method in the 1990s.
The tactic gave the Post Antelope varsity boys a shot at overcoming an eight point fourth period deficit, setting up a 54-52 Post win in overtime at the Idalou Tournament, claiming third place.
Good defense by both teams kept the game close throughout the first period. Michael Harper suffered an ankle injury early, limiting his first half playing time.

The Eagles got some breaks from the officials and ripped off a seven point run to lead 45-40 in the third period. Poor Antelope rebounding and shooting also accounted for the LCHS scoring spurt.
Early fouls put LCHS into bonus free throws, setting up a 48-40 lead when the Eagles went into their stall game.
Using almost a minute on every possession, the Eagles were unable to score during the stall.
Tommy Ammons showed some great defense, completely shutting down LCHS' Copeland. The Antelopes patiently waited for the turnovers that almost always accompany a stall.
Ammons tied the game at 50-50 with 38 seconds left to play on one of the turnovers. A last second shot by Josh Bush just missed and sent the game into overtime.
LCHS opened the scoring for a 52-50 lead. Harper answered with a good baseline shot to tie the game at 52.
The game came down to an Eagle offensive foul to put Tray Payne on the charity line for a one and one. He sank both shots to give the 'Lopes a 54-52 lead, which they did not relinquish.
The final buzzer put the 'Lopes in third place at the tournament.
Horton led all scorers with 24 points. Harper added another 10, Ammons and Payne contributed eight each.
In other tournament action the 'Lopes defeated Cooper 55-47 and lost to Lorenzo 69-36.
The Antelopes improved their season record to five wins and four losses.

Prevention is best way to save insurance costs

Winter is here and it's time to prepare your home for the freezing temperatures which are expected. Following is some advice provided by a major insurance company to prevent frozen plumbing and the resulting leaks which can cause big problems and really dampen your holiday spirit.
If you plan to leave for an extended period of time, maintain heat in the house or shut off the water supply and drain the plumbing system. Even if the heat is on, it's a good idea to shut off the water while you're gone. Such precautions may be a lot of trouble for a short trip, but the clean-up involved after even a small leak would make it worthwhile to prepare your home for expected or unexpected severely cold temperatures.
Wrap insulation around pipes that are exposed to cold air. Open cabinet doors under sinks that are on exterior walls to allow warm air to circulate around pipes. During extremely cold temperatures, let one faucet run with a steady flow to keep the water circulating.
Disconnect all exterior hoses. Protect outside faucets from the cold. Faucet covers can be purchased from almost any hardware store. Turn off and drain all sprin-

gler systems.
Protect swimming pool plumbing during freezing weather by keeping the water circulating or by using freeze guards that automatically turn the pool pump on during cold weather. Check with your pool company to see what's best for your situation.
Make sure you and your family know how to shut off the water in case your pipes freeze and burst. Turning the water off immediately on discovery of a leak will minimize damage. Call a plumber then your insurance agent.
If your pipes freeze, never try to thaw them with an open flame or torch. Be careful of electric shock in areas where water is standing.

There are some of the more common problems that freezing temperatures can cause. Each home has its own unique problems, so inspect your home keeping these tips in mind and look for other possible problem areas.
The key is prevention. A little time spent now can eliminate the inconvenience and expense that frozen plumbing can cause.

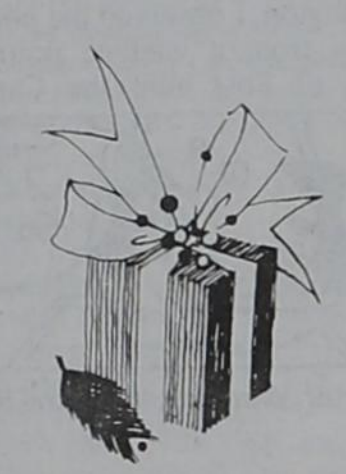
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
