## Dr Cynthia Herbert works with teachers in 'Think and Learn' program

Area teachers involved in the "Think and Learn Program" here will be working with Dr Cynthia Herbert, recently appointed as Texas Arts Council Education Director.

Dr Herbert helped develop the program and served as a summer instructor the past four years.

"Her appointment will strengthen our education program and allow us to develop additional training programs, in-school presentations, materials, follow-up and evaluation," Texas Arts Council president Peter Fox said.

Dr Herbert grew up believing that all children and adults possess a creative spark and unique talents and abilities. Working her way through school at Baylor University and Trinity University Children's Theatre programs, she collaborated with educator Jearline Wagner at Learning About Learning Educational Foundation in San Antonio and the Center for Learning Studies in Houston for 20 years.

Her specialty was the development of educationally sound programs which promoted the development and growth of the whole child. She received her Ph.D in Developmental Psychology from the University of Houston in 1982 with a focus on metacognition through imaginative play.

Dr Herbert has given more than 300 arts and learning presentations to educators throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico. She has developed programs and written materials for children ages 18 months to 18 years in every elementary school subject.

Two of her books, "I See a Child" (1974) and "Everychild's Everyday" (1980) have been published by Doubleday.

## Post sanitation rates could triple in next 14 months

### Solid waste disposal taxes citizens

Why is it possible that your garbage/sanitation rates double or even triple during the next 14 months?

This is the question Post city and Garza County officials are trying to answer as they come to grips with the problems of how to respond to the recently imposed federal and state solid waste management rules.

The Post City Council has been considering for several years the decision to try to maintain a landfill here, or close the facility and transport the city's solid waste to a regional landfill.

The city's decision will weigh heavily on what action the Garza County Commissioners' Court takes to provide solid waste services to residents outside the city limits.

#### How did we get here?

As readers will recall, the July 17 edition of The Post Dispatch included an article listing violations cited by the Texas Health Department (TDH) concerning the operation of the landfill site.

The violations and potential stiff fines were announced following a TDH detailed inspection of the solid waste management area. The violations were:

1. No site development plan on file as required.
2. Drainage on-site has allowed both ponded water and extensive erosion.
3. The unloading of waste is not confined to the trench.
4. Internal control of sites does not exist.
5. Access to site is not properly controlled.
6. Scrap tires scattered across the site must be picked up and split, quartered or shredded prior to being placed in the trench and covered.
7. Household waste in the brush and construction demolition area must be removed promptly and disposed of in the trench.
8. This site has been in violation of operating hour requirements and posted hours.
9. Windblown material across site and adjoining property.
10. Present trench as waste inside the easement for an oil/gas pipeline.
11. The active trench also abutted the fence which has been described as the boundary marker.
12. Waste, paper and whole tires were noted on the access route. These must be picked up and placed in the trench for proper disposal.
13. Waste material is not being properly compacted prior to cover and the immediate cover is not adequate. Waste is exposed across the entire site and the site must be recovered to provide six inches of earth over all waste.
14. Final cover on the site does not meet requirements for proper grades, contours, thickness and timeliness of application.
15. Cover erosion was seen in numerous places, the worst was along the creek banks.
16. Ponded water was found on-site, with some bubbling seen.
17. No cover log as available for inspection.
18. Permittee failed to comply with previous letter. (It has been noted that TDH has been warning the city of violations since 1986 and prior).

All of the violations were issued with time restrictions in which citations had to be corrected and come into compliance with the TDH regulations and Subtitle D, Section 405 of the Clean Water Act.

Most of the violations had a 14 month grace period to be corrected, but one citation had only a 14 day deadline before fines of up to \$10,000 per day would be issued.

Immediate action had to be taken in order to correct the citation concerning the application of topsoil over all waste sites. Six inches of soil had to cover the exposed pit areas for proper compaction and disposal.

To correct this urgent problem, city officials accepted aid from the Garza County Commissioners' Court. The county offered the use of equipment and labor to help the city come into compliance and meet the deadline.

#### What's the fuss all about?

Why are all these changes taking place, and why all of a sudden is immediate action necessary?

Malcolm Laign, Texas Water Commission inspector, explained what caused the creation of Subtitle D, the legislation which imposes such stringent restrictions of cities which operate landfills.

Laign explained that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) saw a need for the ground water to be protected from contamination by garbage and waste dumped at landfills. The EPA, spurred by conservation groups, has instigated and promoted the regulations for solid waste management in order to protect the underground drinking water.

"Subtitle D was designed because governmental officials were responding to what they thought was the overall need of the public," Laign said. Officials were trying to answer the question, "Do you want clean drinking water?" As a result, Subtitle D was developed and included in Section 405 of the Clean Water Act (CWA).

The federal law also requires state governments to enforce the regulations. Until January 1, 1992 the enforcement was administered by the Texas Health Department. Laign and other solid waste inspectors, now work for the Texas Water Commission which was delegated the responsibility by the state legislature last year.

#### What is Subtitle D?

If you ever get into a conversation with officials about the landfill site, you're sure to hear a lot of reference to Subtitle D and its requirements.

One of the requirements is that a liner, a daily or weekly cover (depending on the type of permit) and a final cover must be maintained on all waste management areas to protect the water and the environment.

The new rules became effective October 9, 1991 and allows for 24 months when all municipal solid waste landfill areas must be in compliance with the regulations.

That means that in October 1993 Post will either be out of the landfill business or be in compliance completely.

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And that is what has city and county officials in a quandary. Citizens have voiced their concerns and are demanding that the landfill remain open.

Federal and state laws make it almost impossible and certainly economically prohibitive to do so.

Take the liner as an example. It is required as a precaution to prevent contamination for developing through the soil and filtering into the water table. The three-foot liner consists of at least a minimum of a 30-mil flexible membrane liner and at least 24 inches of permeable clay with hydraulic conductivity ability.

Also, a leachate collection system will be a part of the overall operation in order to monitor the ground water above and below the pit.

According to Laign, this type of liner could range from \$125,000 to \$250,000 per acre, depending on the type and amount of material used. The Post landfill has approximately 10 acres remaining open for an estimated cost for the liner alone of \$2,500,000.

Are the taxpayers of Post willing to put that kind of money on the line for a 10 acre landfill liner, especially considering that the 10 acres may be completely full within another year?

In conjunction with the liner, a daily or weekly cover, as well as a final post closure cover must be applied so that the landfill will be in compliance with Subtitle D criteria.

Only a weekly cover must be applied to Post's landfill since it is a Type II Permit, according to Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, environmental engineers, and the original city permit.

The six inches of soil that must be applied to the waste area on a weekly basis can be very expensive because of the equipment and labor required to properly administer the soil.

When the solid waste area is to be permanently closed, a 24 inch post closure cover is established.

Eighteen inches of the total amount is impermeable clay used to reduce wind and water erosion. Another six inches of topsoil is added to give a base for vegetation to grow during the reclamation process.

#### What is the City of Post doing?

The Post City Council reacted to the TDH list of violations by taking immediate action to correct the problems and then decided to close as much of the landfill as possible under the old regulations, saving the city and taxpayers about one half what the cost of closing would be after the October 9 deadline.

In order to complete the closing of approximately 25 acres, waste was no longer received for that 25 acre portion. Six inches of topsoil was then applied to

## TPUC lowers telephone rates

The Texas Public Utility Commission today voted unanimously to lower the rates of Cap Rock Telephone customers. The reduction, totaling \$488,000, will include refunds for each of Cap Rock's access customers.

"So often it seems that state government is only involved in actions that take more money from the citizens," said Commissioner Marta Greytok. "It is a real pleasure to be involved in an action that gives something back."

During the Commission's proceedings, Commissioner Greytok commended the telephone company for its quality of service.

"I want to formally complement Cap Rock on its record of no customer complaints for service, billing, deposits, and other areas, for the year ending June 30, 1991," said Greytok.

The telephone rate reductions are to be effective approximately sixty days from the effective date of the Commission's order. Included in the benefits for Cap Rock customers will be a 40 percent reduction in installation costs for new service.

The Public Utility Commission meets regularly to set rates for telephone and electric utilities in Texas. Marta Greytok is a former chairman of the Commission, and has served the Texas ratepayers since September of 1987.

Cap Rock provides local exchange telephone services in the following Texas counties: Dickens, Kent, King, Crosby, Hall, Cottle, Garza, Floyd, Stonewall, Motley, and Foard.

the entire 35 acre site. This was accomplished with the help of Garza County officials.

Precinct 4 commissioner Herbert Walls donated his time, equipment and guidance to oversee the procedure.

"Herb has bent over backwards to help," Mayor Jim Jackson emphasized, "and we appreciate everything he has done to help us come into compliance."

Along with the six inches of soil, another 18 inches of clay was applied to the 25 acres of the landfill. By applying the two-foot post-closure cover on the 25 acres, the area was closed under the old regulations.

Once the final inspection has been

made by the Texas Water Commission, the area will be reclaimed by sowing it with a grass-type of vegetation. It will then be fenced off and permanently closed to the public.

According to city manager Bob Turner, \$94,000 has been spent to close the initial 25 acres. But, the work that had already been completed or that is in the process, has been paid for in full with money set aside by the city council.

Turner estimated that \$60,000 has been saved by the joint efforts of the City of Post and Garza County.

"By contracting the work ourselves," Jackson added, "and by working as a team, we can survive and save money."

"The City of Post would never be this far if it weren't for the fact that your city government has moved so quickly," Laigin said.

Private Pesticide Applicator Training

All homeowners and producers in the surrounding area, who don't have a Private Applicators license will want to remember the upcoming training and testing set for Thursday, April 9. The training will be held in the Community Center in Post. The training is open to all individuals who have a need for a private license in order to purchase and use restricted use or state limited use pesticides.

The schedule for the day will follow an agenda similar to this:  
8 a.m. - registration, coffee and donuts.  
8:30 a.m. - explanation of test and training begins.  
12 noon - lunch.

1 p.m. - testing and licensing.  
There will be no fee charged for the training but, persons who pass the test should be ready to pay the fee of \$50 for licensing, to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The training and testing will be done by the TDA representative who will be on hand for the day. The accompanying test is not extremely difficult - provided the person taking the test has attended the training! What this means is, if you plan to attend the training and receive a license, the preceding slides are very important so attendance is a must. This may well be the only time this year that this testing will be offered in Garza County so hopefully, your schedule will allow you to attend if you still need this type of license.

### New label allows tank mixing for better weed control in pastures






