Founder's Day Ranch Rodeo Competition features local ranches, cowboys and cowgirls

This year's Founder's Day Ranch Rodeo Competition Saturday, October 17 will feature eight of the finest local ranches and their cowgirls and cowboys at the Post Stampede Rodeo Grounds.

Competing in the popular Founder's Day event will be Beggs Ranch, Chapman Ranch, Chimney Creek/Sanderson Ranch, Dalby Cattle Co., Double U Ranch, Humble Farms and Cattle Co., Macy Ranch and the Stoker/Kirkpatrick Ranch.

The top two Garza County ranch teams will then compete against six of the most outstanding ranch teams from this area Sunday afternoon, October 18 at 2 p.m.

The area ranch teams invited to compete Sunday include the 6666 Ranch of Guthrie, Flowers Ranch of Aspermont, Guitarr Ranch of Abilene, Moorhouse Ranch of Benjamin, Powell Ranch of Midland and the Tongue River/Spur Headquarters of Spur.

Ranch Rodeo Competition is different from the everyday rodeo in that the events are more like regular working ranch activities.

Events in the Post Founder's Day Ranch Competition include team penning, team branding, pasture roping, double mugging and the ever-popular "Sugar Booger Back-Up."

Buckles, provided by Post Cereals, Kraft General Foods will be presented to the overall winners and a new award will be presented this year to the "top horse."

Dr Larry Mills and Mark Kirkpatrick are co-chairmen of this event and they are available to answer questions about the ranch rodeo, "if you can catch them," Main Street manager Barbara Hardin emphasizes.

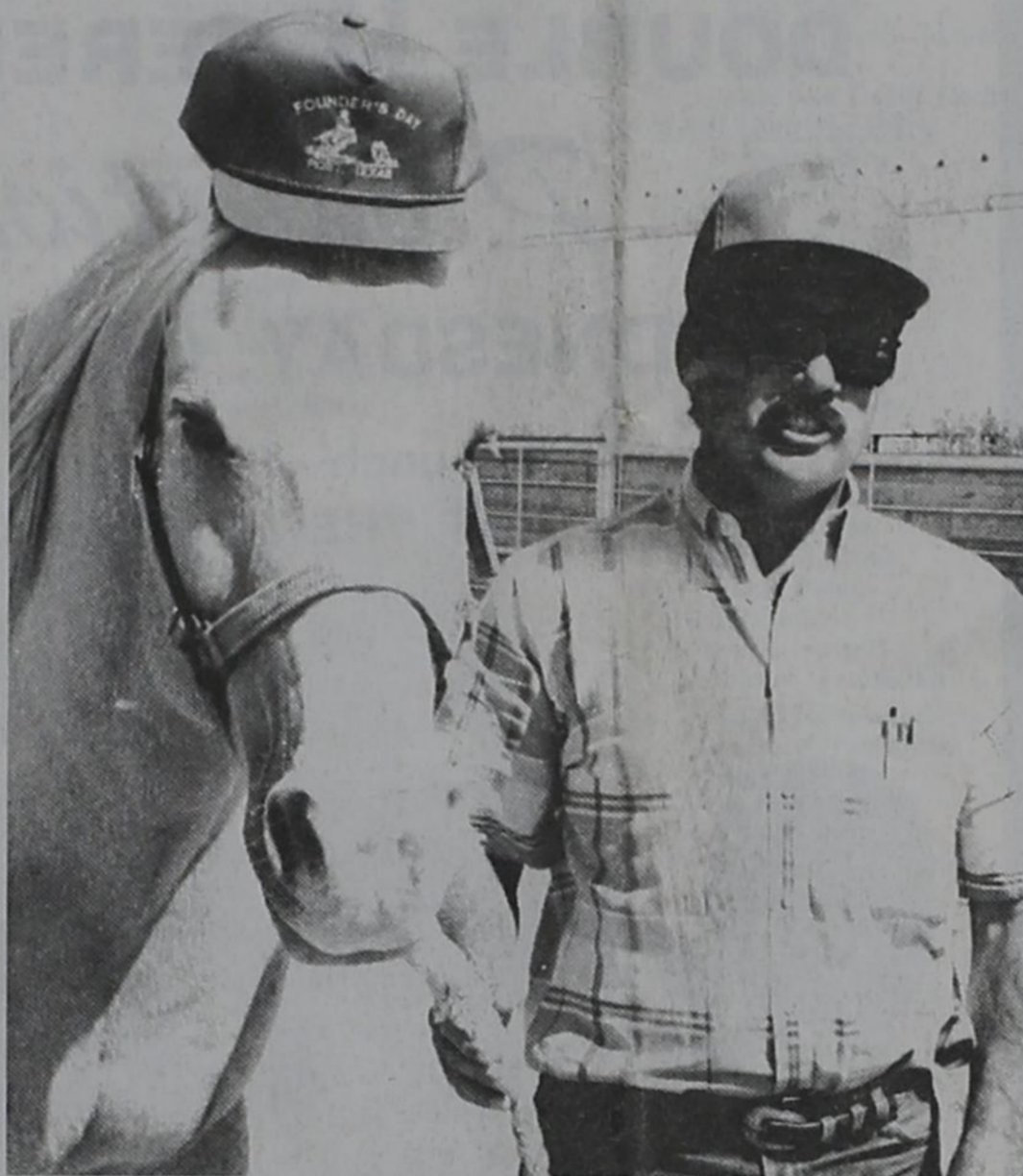
Included in the Founder's Day Ranch Rodeo Competition will be a dance Saturday night featuring Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys, who will provide "boot scootin'" music on the slab at the Post Stampede Rodeo Grounds from 9 p.m. until 1 a.m. Admission for the ranch rodeo each day is \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children 10 years and younger. Dance tickets are \$5 per person.

Emergency farm loan applications being accepted by FmHA

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain and hail between May 1, 1992, through July 30, 1992 are being accepted at the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Tahoka, FmHA County Supervisor, Curtis Barlow said today.

Lynn and Garza Counties are two of 24 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rain and hail.

Mr. Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Mr. Barlow said.

Farmers participating in the ASCS Disaster program or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 10, 1993, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Tahoka is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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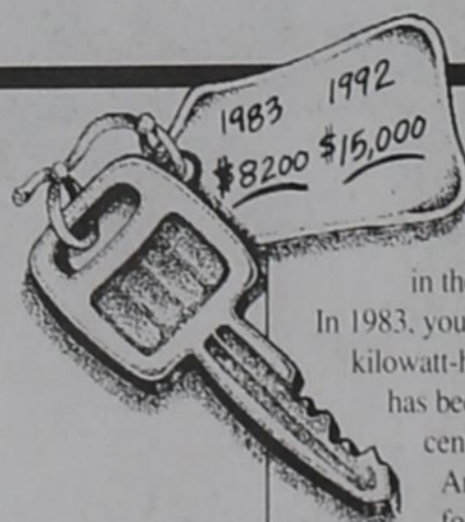
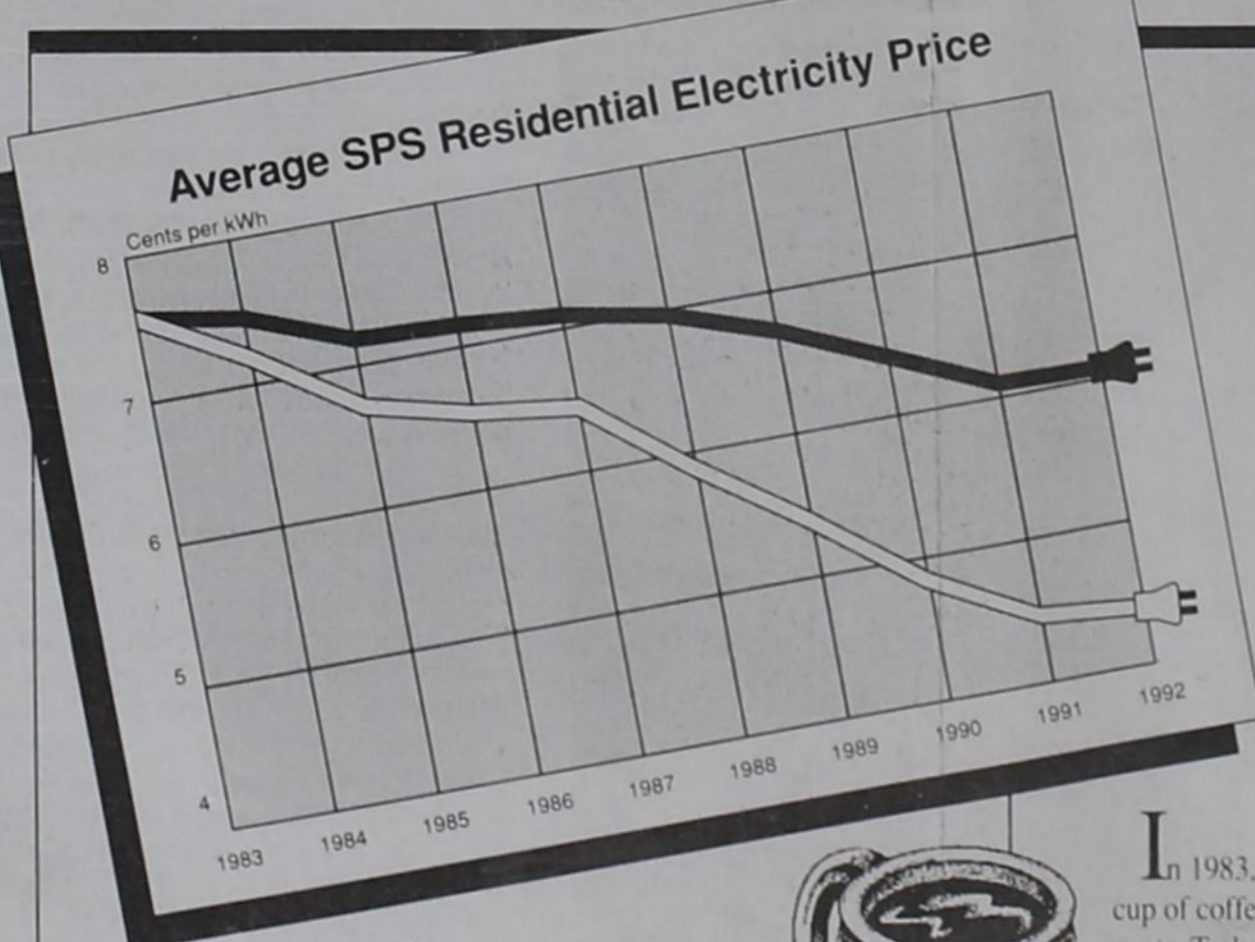

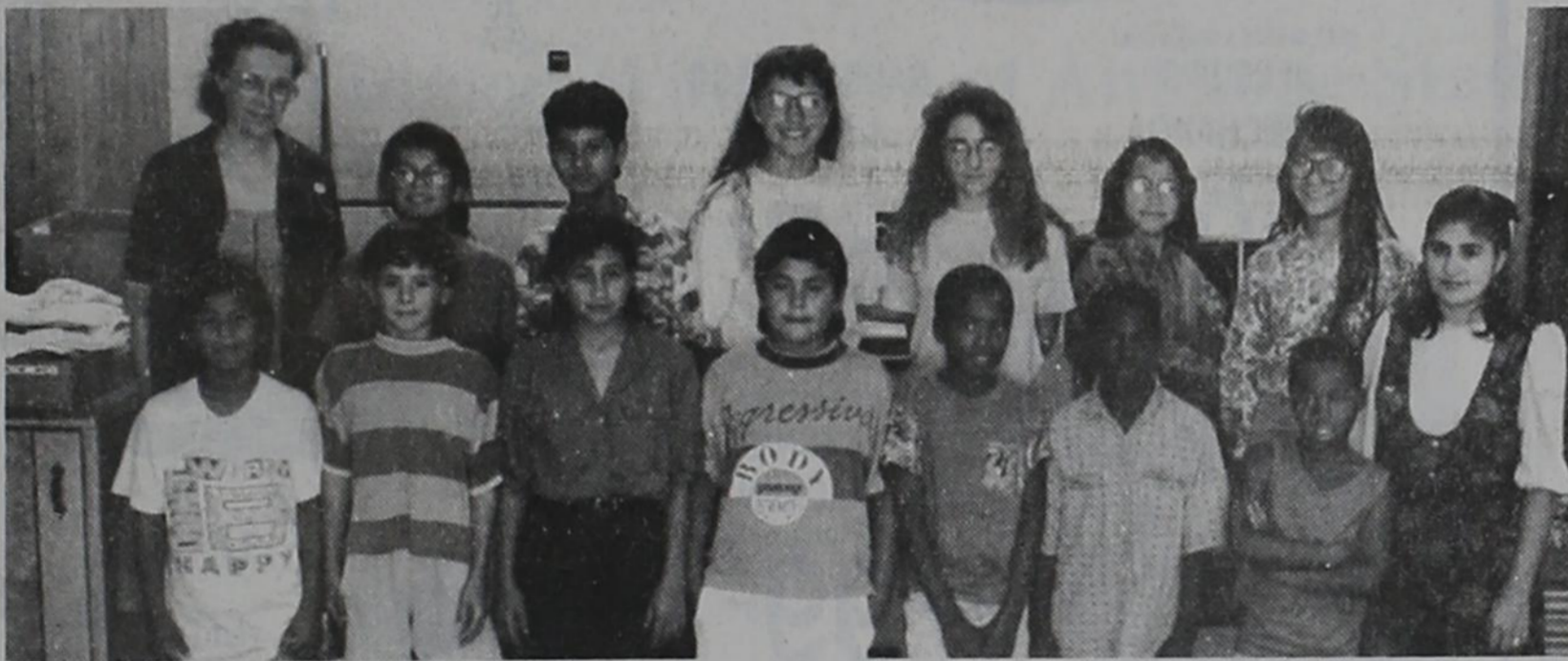

Wallace Chariton to autograph books at Handy Gifts

Wallace O. Chariton, author of several popular books about Texas, will be in Post October 17 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Handy Hardware and Gifts to autograph copies of his books, which will be on sale here.

A fifth generation Texan, Chariton was born in Forth Worth and moved with his family to San Antonio when he was 10 years old.

Following graduation from MacArthur High School, he attended Texas Tech University, graduating in 1974 with a BBA degree. After college he lived in Plano and worked with The Southland Corporation and Dr. Pepper.

Fiercely proud of his Texas heritage, Chariton dreamed of one day pursuing a career in writing about his beloved state. The opportunity came in 1988 when Wordware Publishing Inc. of Plano purchased the rights to six of his books and took options on all additional books about Texas he might write.

Chariton's first book was an entertaining Texas Dictionary entitled "This Dog'll Hunt," which became an instant success and has been a best selling regional book ever since.

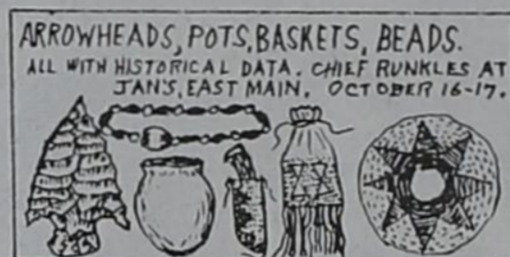

Seagraves survives Antelope upset bid 21-7

The Antelopes were on their way to their first win of the season last Friday night at Seagraves. The Bold Gold even held a half-time lead over the district leading Eagles. But on the way to their best effort of the year, the 'Lope victory train got derailed by one very speedy gazelle.
The 'Lopes were prepared for the speedy gazelle, Seagraves quarterback Tim Cavazos. Cavazos had run ribbons through some very good defenses during the first few weekends of the season. Yet, the young quarterback for the Eagles only broke loose three times for gains over ten yards. The Lope defense again rose to the challenge.
The 'Lope offense avoided the turnovers which had plagued them through their first four games of the season. The Post offense only turned the ball over once, on an interception late in the game when the outcome had already been decided.
In fact, the only 'Lope score came on

a near perfect pass from Jim Riley Simpson to Anthony Martin which covered forty yards in the air and 81 yards in total. Simpson ran the Post offense with confidence and poise throughout the evening.
It looked like Seagraves would take command early and never look back. After Post was unable to move the ball on their first possession, Seagraves marched 52 yards on 5 plays to put the first 6 on the board. Ben Henderson got a first down on a 15 yard quick trap play right up the middle to set the Eagles up in Post Territory.
Then the gazelle broke loose for one of the few times during the evening. Tim Cavazos took the ball on a roll out option play and broke loose for a 35 yard TD run. The Bold Gold defense put pressure on Cavazos on the extra point attempt and the junior hooked the ball wide left. Seagraves led 6-0.
Then the two defenses took over the contest. Seagraves held Post and forced

the Bold Gold to punt after only three plays. The 'Lopes responded by nailing Henderson in the backfield for a loss of five and not allowing Cavazos any outside running room. The Eagles punted after not being able to make a first down.
The defenses continued to play well until the beginning of the second quarter. Seagraves began a drive from their own 35 and looked to have found the right combination. After just barely picking up a first down, Seagraves brought out the passing attack. Cavazos faded back in the pocket and hit Ruben Garza for a 30 yard pass play. But a hard hit by Bodie Simpson knocked the ball loose from Garza and Post recovered at their own 19.
Post struck quickly as Jim Riley dropped straight back in the pocket and threw a forty yard strike to Anthony Martin. Martin never broke stride as he gathered the ball in and ran the rest of the way untouched for an 81 yard

touchdown play.
Bodie Simpson kicked the extra point dead center through the uprights and Post owned a 7-6 lead.
The momentum was to change two series later.
After an injury to Jamie Ayala delayed the contest for over fifteen minutes, an official had the downs keeper change the down marker from third to second. The action was not explained. Ayala only suffered a minor injury, but was taken to the hospital just to be safe. Post came out fired up and nailed Cavazos for a loss and thought they would get the ball back in Seagraves territory.
But the official's call stood and Seagraves was able to get out of the tight spot thanks to the extra play. The momentum had shifted away from Post again.
The defense stopped the Seagraves' drive and Post went into the locker room at the half owning a 7-6 lead.
Second Half
Seagraves took the ball on their second possession of the half and marched 60 yards on 12 plays to regain the lead 14-7.
The game continued to be close until the Seagraves' last possession of the third quarter.
The Eagles started a long drive by just barely edging out first down after first down by inches each time. Seagraves marched down the field to the Post 30.
On first down from the 30, Seagraves was flagged for a holding penalty which negated a 30 yard touchdown run by Henderson. The ten yard penalty was followed on the next play by a five yard penalty against Post. That brought up a first down and thirteen. Seagraves had gained two yards in the exchange of penalties. The penalties seemed to swing the momentum back in favor of the Eagles.
Cavazos capitalized on his speed two plays later to score on a 24 yard roll out. It was the last score of the contest as Post went to their fifth loss 21-7.
Give credit to Cavazos. He made big play after big play to stretch the Post defense. The 'Lopes played remarkably well to contain him throughout most of the night. The Post offense showed great improvement and regained some of the confidence needed on the attack side of the ball.
The Post players played with heart and character in what was their best performance thus far.
Officials are human and occasionally make mistakes in the performance of their Friday night duties. The errors

made Friday night, in my opinion, hurt Post at inopportune times and changed the flow of the game.
The team and the coaching staff are to be congratulated for the tremendous

effort against the Eagles. Post next plays the hottest team in the district, the Idalou Wildcats. Kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 Friday night at Antelope Stadium.

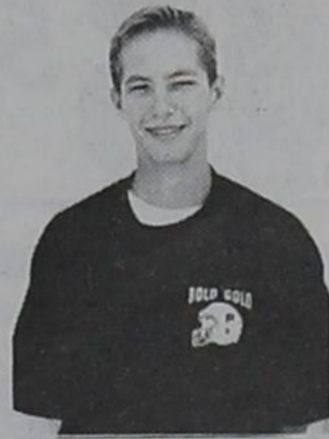

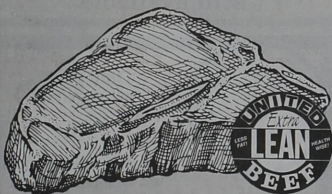

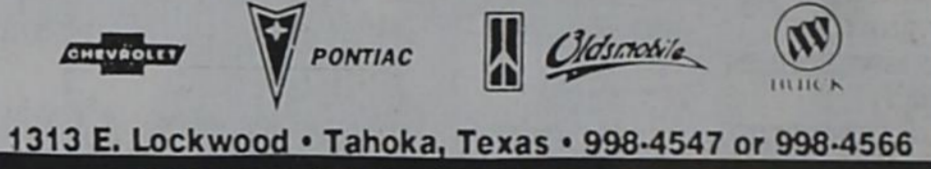

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This ANN That

I hope everyone will take time to come to the Garza County Health Fair today.

Valuable screenings and educational information will be available. Health screening tests are very useful if they are followed by a visit to your regular doctor to check out any potential problem.

It is important for you to realize that the test does you no good if you do not follow it with a consultation with your own doctor. Those who are providing the screening test are not there to treat you, but to see if you need to see your doctor. The county Extension Home Economics Committee hopes that you will take advantage of this opportunity.

One thing we can all do to improve the state of our health is to increase the amount of exercise we get each day. Exercise benefits the cardiovascular system by improving heart efficiency and circulation, thus getting more oxygen to the brain, and improving condition of the veins and arteries.

Bones and joints are also helped by exercise through increased strength and range of motion. Degenerative effects of arthritis are decreased as is osteoporosis (thinning of the bones).

Muscle strength and flexibility are increased by exercise at the same time tension and tightness in the muscles are decreased. The internal organs benefit from exercise because digestion, elimination and hormonal functions are improved.

Exercise reduces stress, is fun especially in the company of friends, and can give renewed confidence and self-esteem.

How much exercise is enough? Many authorities recommend that we exercise at the exercise heart rate for at least 20 minutes 3 times each week. To determine the exercise heart rate subtract your age from 220. Figure 60-80% of that number. That is the maximum number of heart beats you should achieve during exercise.

As a general rule, if you are over 70 or have not exercised before, you should limit your heart rate to between 90-115 beats per minute. Use your exercise heart rate zone only as a guide.

Use your personal feelings too. When exercising you should be able to carry on a conversation with your exercise companion, be pain free and "feel" that the exercise is just right.

You can take your heart rate where there is a large artery near the surface of the body. One good place is the carotid artery at the neck. Or you could use the temporal artery at the temples, or the radial artery at the wrist.

I prefer to count for six seconds and multiply by 10, but you can count for 30 seconds and multiply by 2 or count for 15 seconds and multiply by four.

You may want to begin by walking to the end of the block and back.
