

Teenage passenger killed in one-car accident on West 11th

Post High School senior Marlin Valdez, son of Garza County Commissioner Precinct Three John Valdez, was killed early Saturday morning while riding in a vehicle which crashed in the 400 block of West 11th Street. The 1972 Plymouth Duster was reportedly driven by 34 year old Kenneth James Hair, who remains in Garza County jail on charges of felony failure to stop and render aid. Bond was set in district court at \$25,000.

The accident is still under investigation and is expected to be presented to a grand jury.

Law enforcement investigators report that alcohol, excessive speed and failure to use safety restraints were contributing factors in the accident, which was reported at 2:06 a.m.

The vehicle was headed east when it rolled one time and came to a stop in the front yard at 316 W. 11th Street, the home of Mr and Mrs Gene Hair, the parents of the accused driver.

The 18 year old Valdez was apparently killed when he was partially thrown out of the vehicle, which either rolled on top of him or landed on him. He was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

The driver allegedly fled the scene of the accident and was apprehended at approximately 7 a.m. Saturday at 110 East Third Street.

Texas DPS officers assisted the sheriff's department with speed calculations, which indicate the vehicle was traveling in excess of 60 miles per hour at the time of the accident.

Sheriff issues explanation of 911 call procedures

When emergency calls are answered on the Post 911 system, the call goes directly to the Sheriff's Department dispatcher, who then determines the needs of the caller.

If an ambulance is needed or a medical emergency exists, the dispatcher then tells the caller to "we are transferring your call to the hospital."

A dial tone then comes on the line while the dispatcher transfers the call to the Garza Memorial Hospital. The staff there will then get the information and take appropriate action.

The reason for the transfer of call is that ambulances here are dispatched by the hospital.

Sheriff Kenny Ratke also explained that there are a number of rural homes are not listed in the computer for 911 response. "It is really important that people call us with instructions as to how to find their homes," Ratke emphasized, "a brief description of where your home is located can mean the difference between life and death when you call in for an emergency."

Council members discuss ideas, gripes at work session

At Monday night's city council work session, local attorney Pat Walker launched a stinging attack on the Garza County Commissioners Court, the Post Independent School District and the Post City Council, charging the government units with "wasting the taxpayers' money" by hiring 'outside' attorneys and specifically "bungling" the redistricting attempts.

Walker said that Lubbock attorney Don Dennis was the "least competent attorney" on the staff of the law firm representing Post ISD. Dennis has been preparing the redistricting plans for the school district.

Also getting a dose of criticism from Walker were county commissioners for appointing an Amarillo law firm, which cost "\$10,000 to prepare a plan" and then had to spend thousands more "correcting their errors on the first one" he said.

City attorney Harvey Morton also came under attack, taking the blame from Walker for the "unpopular sign ordinance, which was patterned after Lubbock's." The sign ordinance underwent tedious scrutiny from the city council as well as the planning and zoning board for months prior to its approval, which included public hearings where little or no public interest was demonstrated.

"We have five fine attorneys in this town who could do the same work and ought to be considered," Walker added.

"Since this is a work session, and we will not be making any decisions," Mayor Jim Jackson said, "we'll take this up at a later time."

In other discussions, council member Maxine Conoly said that she wants to

see some action on the loose animals around town and see city maintenance crews working together.

Council member Jimmy Holleman said that the "hands aren't doing the job, not getting the leadership." Holleman openly admitted that he is spending his time checking on city employees and seeing that they do the job. He did not seem to be bothered by the fact that interference with city employees on duty by a city council member is a violation of state law with cities operating under the council/manager form of government.

Management of employees is the sole responsibility of the city manager.

Giving direct orders or other interference with city employees by elected officials is not only illegal, but is disruptive and exercises poor management as well.

Dan Lamb said that Holleman had already mentioned "my big one." "We need to bring everybody together."

Jim Schooler reminded the council that the citizens put "their trust in us." He also said that frequently things are not as they seem and when citizens complain, council members should check with management to try to get corrective action. "A lot of times there are reasonable explanations for the situations."

Schooler said he thought priorities for the council should be the redistricting, solving the landfill problem and studying the curfew ordinance.

Larry Mills included the joint agreements with the county as a priority. "With every election there are different people serving and we need something in writing for continuity." The city and county share funding of the parks, library, community center and airport. "We also need to continue our systematic replacement and upgrading of the water lines."

He recommended a systematic reviewing of city ordinances, the revise or delete as the council feels necessary.

City manager Bob Turner explained in detail employee policies and requested the council's ideas about designing job descriptions, "especially when we have several employees who do a wide variety of different jobs."

The work session also included discussion about capital improvements, the landfill, employee retirement plans, curfew ordinance and recycling.

Attending the meeting were council members Maxine Conoly, Jimmy Holleman, Dan Lamb, Jim Schooler, Larry Mills, Mayor Jim Jackson, city manager Bob Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Harvey Morton.
