
Three dances will be held featuring the music of Jody Nix. The dances will be held on a covered slab after teach nights events.

City council studies variety of items for 92-93 budget

Surplus funds could easily cover costs

Citing a history of prudent city management and foresight, Post city manager Bob Turner informed the city council Monday night at the budget work session that all of the proposed capital improvement items could be paid for from surplus funds and still leave the city with more than adequate reserves.

"In two years we have put aside \$327,000," Turner explained, "and even with though the surplus this year will be down more than \$100,000, we still have in excess of \$700,000 in reserves."

"I am recommending and will place in the budget for your consideration, the improvements you have discussed tonight, and I think you all realize that everything you have proposed are items that will benefit the city and its citizens."

Among the proposed projects is a long range plan for improving the city park, with immediate work on a permanent covered slab and removal of the cat tails in the south lake. The total cost of the park improvements is estimated at \$25,000 to \$30,000. Mayor Jim Jackson said that the commissioners' court would be requested to assist in the improvements.

Replacing the old floor at the community center was also addressed, with council member Larry Mills outlining the history of the floor problem and his concern about the safety of patrons. "The floor is sinking, and leaving the tile

exposed and cracking," Mills said, "we have patched and are getting by, but I'm concerned." The total estimated cost of the repairs is \$15,000.

A new city pound facility, which could cost as much as \$40,000, was also discussed. Mayor Jackson pointed out that the current facility "is a mess, and if you haven't been to see it, you should." He cited the odor and poor conditions as reasons to consider the improvement. Mills also emphasized the poor conditions and said, "there are times when what you see there would make you sick."

Turner pointed out that eventually the state will inspect the pound and force the city to correct the problems. He showed the council a plan which is being used by Slaton at its city pound.

Mills was appointed by the mayor to prepare specific proposals for the council to consider.

The addition of living quarters to the building at the cemetery met with approval by the council. The cost for the addition, which would provide for the city cemetery maintenance employee to live on the site, to be up to \$15,000. Jackson said that the employee on duty would like to be able to stay at the cemetery in order to control the vandalism.

Jackson cited a series of water hose damage as well as other vandalism when there is no one at the cemetery at night. Council member Dan Lamb suggested moving the fence at the cemetery to enclose the triangular entry site to deter late night gatherings and vandalism.

Turner proposed improvements at the fire station to provide for an addition making the building into an "L" shaped facility. The addition would give volunteer firemen a location for training and meetings. "We need to do all we can to give our volunteer firemen the equipment and facilities they need," Turner emphasized.

Another \$8,000 would be needed to repair and replace curbing on Main Street from the courthouse to the end of East Main. The improvements would include cutting the curbs back to allow for vehicles to park without damaging the curb and installing three more handicapped ramps.

The plan would provide for a coordinator to assist Main Street business owners to pay for sidewalk improvements in front of their buildings.

Turner also suggested the budgeting of an additional \$10,000 so that city employees would be included in the Texas Municipal League's retirement plan. He explained the advantages and said that almost all Texas cities participate.

The uncertain future cost of the landfill and solid waste management was included in the discussion about sanitation rates. Turner recommended rates be increased for residential to \$12 from the current \$9 and for commercial to \$30 from the current \$28. "We aren't in trouble now," he said, "but that is because a few years ago we anticipated the additional costs and began to raise our rates to put money aside... we see no reason to believe costs are going to go down, they are only going to go up and we have to prepared, whether we stay in the landfill business or not."

"The City of Post does not owe a single penny," Turner added, "and we have the lowest tax rate in this area and the cheapest sanitation rates as well as the lowest water rates."

Jackson pointed out that because of the low rates, the city has been unable to get approval for grants from the South Plains Association of Governments and that he and Turner were to attend a meeting in Lubbock Tuesday to request the board change its criteria for awarding the grants.

"It's not fair that our citizens be punished for good management," Jackson said, "while the other cities around us are charging more and getting the grants." Turner added that mineral revenues, which account for 50 percent of the city's collections, are the primary reason for the low tax rate in Post. "We have a total of \$80 million in assessed values, with \$40 million of that in minerals. If you take away our oil money, you could see that our tax rate would jump from 33 cents to \$1.02."

Jackson reminded the council that the Monday, August 3 meeting will include an executive session at the end of the regular session to discuss employee salaries. All the affected employees will be notified in order that they might request a public meeting, in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Attending the meeting were council members Maxine Conoly, Jimmy Holleman, Jim Schooler, Larry Mills, Jackson and Turner.

County to share in initial landfill application

Commissioners set aside \$500 from each precinct

Garza County commissioners voted at the regular meeting Monday morning to set aside \$500 from each precinct to share the initial \$4,000 cost for engineering work on the City of Post application to open a new landfill site adjacent to the current facility.



A contract agreement with Pecos County was entered into the minutes, providing for juvenile offender confinement.


A review of the recent Garza County redistricting plan was approved as required by the Texas Legislative Council.

Commissioners took under advisement a package of information provided to the court by Judge Giles Dalby concerning the City of Lubbock's plan to dump as much as nine million gallons of treated sewage effluent into the Yellowhouse Canyon which flows through Garza County in the North Fork, Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River. That is also the river on which the proposed Post Lake would be located. The permit for that lake is currently held by the White River Municipal Water District.

Dr Harry Tubbs gave almost 40 years medical service to citizens

Widely known physician died July 25

A memorial service was held Monday afternoon for Dr Harry Tubbs, M.D., who died Saturday, July 25, 1992 at the Garza Memorial Hospital. The funeral was a private graveside service held Sunday evening at the family cemetery, under the direction of Hudman Funeral home with Paul Jones, Post Church of Christ, officiating. The memorial service was held at the Post Church of Christ with Jones and First Presbyterian Church minister Rev Dr Charles Somerville officiating. Dr Tubbs was born Sept. 3, 1914 in Enrico Co., Va. to William Johnston Tubbs and Ruth Churchill Rennie. He married Joan Ellis in June 1939. She died in September 1970. On Sept 26, 1972 he married Bobbie Brown in Justiceburg at the C. Miller Ranch. He was a Presbyterian, Mason and life member of the V.F.W. and a Rotary Club past president.



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He is survived by his wife, Bobbie, son Dr Charles G. Tubbs of Garland, Tex.; daughter Dr Elisabeth Schmalstieg of Galveston and stepson Randall W. Baldwin of Littleton, Colo.;

Brothers Rennie Tubbs of DeLand, Fla.; James B. Tubbs of Raleigh, N.C. and Ace Tubbs of Montreat, N.C. and three grandchildren.

Dr Tubbs came to Post in July 1952 from Fredericksburg where he practiced medicine from November 1946 to June 1952.


He graduated from the University of Tennessee in 1935 and Medical College of Virginia, Doctor of Medicine in 1939, serving his internship at Scott and White at Temple, Tex. until 1940.

Dr Tubbs served in the U.S. Armed Forces from October 1940 until January 1946 as a medical officer, orthopedic departmental chief and as chief of surgical section in Australia and New Guinea.

His military service terminated at McClosky Hospital in Temple as an orthopedic specialist with special attention to amputation, reamputation and plastic repair of war wounds. He held the rank of captain at the time of his separation from active duty.

In Post he was affiliated with Garza Memorial Hospital and with West Texas Hospital in Lubbock.

Dr Tubbs was instrumental in the formation and early development of the Texas Academy of General Practice (TAGP), now the Texas Academy of Family Physicians

(TAGP), serving on many committees.

He chaired the committee on health care delivery and environmental medicine from 1967 to 1971 and the medical school liaison committee from 1972-73.

Dr Tubbs served as liaison officer to the Texas Tech School of Medicine in 1973 and was a director of the TAGP in 1960 and vice president in 1967.

He was a charter fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians in 1973 and served as associate clinical professor of the Texas Tech University School of Medicine in 1973-74.

Dr Tubbs served as president of the Post Rotary Club, trustee for the First Presbyterian Church, city health officer and medical consultant for the Post Independent School District.

He held memberships in the American Medical Association, Texas Medical Association and Lubbock-Crosby-Garza County Medical Society.

He was also a member of the American and Texas Academies of General Practice/Family Physicians, American Diabetes Association and Southern Medical Association.

Dr Tubbs' published articles and editorials were featured in Texas and national medical journals, reflecting his interest in education of family physicians in medical ethics and in medical technology.

Special interests included use of throat cultures in diagnosis of pharyngitis, fluorescent cytology and in diagnostic techniques in diabetes.

He successfully demonstrated that it was practical to deliver innovative and scientifically current medical care in a rural community in West Texas.

In addition to his medical interests, Dr Tubbs was known for his support of community library services, wood carving, rock collecting and polishing, jewelry making, bow hunting, in muzzle loading rifles and in the flora, fauna and folks of the South Plains.

The family suggests memorials to be sent to the Children's Home of Lubbock or favorite charity.

RACF is expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$643,000.

This ANN That

Most of us are familiar with telemarketing schemes. Many have been around for a while and we think they have probably died out. Not so! The Alliance Against Fraud in Telemarketing in Washington, D.C. gives consumers this rule of thumb about fraud in telemarketing -- "Old Seams Never Die." It is wise to always be wary of schemes you have heard about even years ago. They can crop up at any time.

One of the oldest is one which secures your credit card number. In one variation of this scheme, you receive a phone call telling you about a prize you have won. To verify that you are the winner, you are asked to provide your credit card account number. You later discover that your card has been used in places you have not been to buy things you would never purchase.

Similar schemes have surfaced involving checking accounts. The caller asks for your account number in order to 'approve credit.' Once they have your account number, a demand draft is sent from their bank to yours transferring funds out of your checking account. In some reported cases, the victims were tricked into signing a form containing an authorization for the transfer in the fine print. This would make it difficult or impossible for you to recover any of the money. Never give your checking account number to anyone.

Just as important to protect is your telephone credit card number. Telephone cards are not protected against liability for amounts above \$50 as are bank and store cards. The consumer is responsible for all charges to the account if the card is lost or stolen and used by someone else. Never give this number to anyone, and I personally recommend that you memorize the number and leave the card at home in case your wallet is lost or stolen. Your number can be sold to individuals who want to call friends and family abroad as well as in the US.

Living on the Edge of the Caprock

 Crop insect update and outlook

After what turned out to be a mysterious article, last week, under a different name, I had thoughts of perhaps taking on the pen name of some famous celebrity - say maybe Syd Conner. But, after consideration I've decided to hold on for a while. Thanks for all the calls of concern as to my where abouts, although I have never really left.

With that little piece of brain storming over, we do have some items of concern to crop producers in the county. If the early floods, hail and cold weather weren't enough we may still have an insect problem to deal with.

Fleahoppers continue to threaten later planted cotton. The insects have been reported to be moving out of weed hosts to squaring cotton fields across the South Plains. Although we have been spared the heavy infestations in Garza County, the fields with the heaviest pressure have been those with heavy white-weed populations. As these weeds are cultivated, fleahoppers are encouraged to move into cotton. When cultivating or spot spraying weeds you may want to consider adding an insecticide to your mix. Be careful - try not to use an insecticide that was effective against aphids last year. There weren't too many of these last year and we need to save them for late season aphids.

Speaking of aphids, the recent cooler, cloudy weather is proving ideal for increases in aphid populations. Aphids apparently have higher reproductive rates when temps are in the 90's or even 80's. According to Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, we have no data from our area to provide management guidelines for prebloom cotton aphid infestation. There is evidence, however, that this year's aphid crop may be as insecticide resistant as those we fought at the end of the 1991 season. Bidrin, Lannate and Lorsban did provide the more consistent control ranging from 80-90% at a cost of \$5.00 to \$8.00 per acre for chemical costs. If you do feel compelled to spray, James suggests either Lannate or Lorsban, saving Bidrin for August infestations which are not far off.

Finally, this Friday, July 31, I plan to have Tommy Doderlien, Dawson County Entomologist in the county for a half day or so of scouting and evaluation. If you have some areas of concern we could look at or if you are interested in quizzing Tommy about "this or that" feel free to give me a call before hand. For now keep an eye on your crops, all reports indicate that we still have a while before we are out of the woods.

Other current scams include:
 *Uncle Scams -- You receive a letter that appears to be from an attorney. It informs you about a large sum of unclaimed money waiting for you to collect in a distant state. They offer to help collect the unclaimed money for a fee. All you get is a list of state agencies handling unclaimed property.
 *Job Offers -- Victims respond to classified ads offering jobs. Inquiries are through a 900 number or an 800 number referring the caller to a 900 number "for more detailed information." Both calls are answered by recorded messages about job opportunities or employment agencies, or a live operator who agrees to work on getting the victim a job for an advance fee. You pay for the 900 phone call and still have no job or job leads.

*Fund-raisers -- Some fraudulent telemarketing firms get permission to use a legitimate non-profit organization's name to solicit donations in its name. It guarantees to generate a certain level of contributions for the organization. It generates substantially higher sums, but only pays the guaranteed amount to the charity. Avoid charitable solicitations asking that funds be sent to an address other than that of the intended organization.

Phone fraud can best be halted when consumers take preventive

and corrective steps. To learn how to protect yourself from common telephone scams, write to: "Phone Fraud," SPRINT Toll Fraud Prevention, 1510 E. Rochelle, Irving, TX 75039.





Economic injury disaster loans available from SBA

Walter Fronstin, district director of the U. S. Small Business Administration in Lubbock announced today that SBA is accepting applications for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) from eligible Garza County small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives without credit available elsewhere.

Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of their dependence upon farmers and ranchers who suffered the agricultural damages. "Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for these SBA loans," Fronstin said. "However, nurseries that are victims of drought can apply."

Fronstin said that businesses seeking loan information and loan applications may call SBA's Area 3 Disaster Office in Fort Worth since all disaster loans are processed through that office. The toll-free number is, 1-800-473-0477 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

Businesses located in Garza County serviced by the Lubbock District Office and were affected by drought, insects and freeze between May 1 and December 31, 1991, also have until March 1, 1993 to file an EIDL application with the SBA.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.


