Two county-wide events, one coming next week and the other a month or two from now, bear an unusually strong relationship this year. They are the Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo and the Garza County Fair.

The success of next week's Junior Rodeo will have a bearing on next year's fair, but not on this year's, since it is now too late to do anything about the proposed 4-H Club fair building.

Before the reader becomes hopelessly confused by so much double-talk, it might be well to explain that the rodeo is a 4-H Club benefit affair, with profits going into the club's building fund. Plans are to construct this building at the fair grounds and use it is an exhibit place while the Lions Club-sponsored fair is under way.

Members of the Lions Club think so much of the building project and its value to their county fair program that they have already donated a sizable sum of money toward its construction. At the time the donation was made, it appeared that the building might be constructed in time for this year's fair, but 4-H building committeemen have given up on the idea because of the drouth-provoked economic conditions.

Not counting donations, the 4-H building fund totals approximately \$3,500, not much more than half enough to construct the type of building desired. However, a financially successful rodeo next week would build the fund up to where it would be possible to construct the 4-H building in time for the 1957 fair.

As far as the 1956 fair itself is concerned, the event should be a highly successful one unless conditions become much worse between now and early Fall. A new fairgrounds site has been made available at the City Park, and the Lions have already appointed committees and laid other groundwork for this year's event. They deserve the support of everyone, since fairs are one of the best indications of the progressiveness and civic spirit of a community. They are good for business and deserve to be supported by businessmen, farmers, merchants and all other residents.

In the meantime, the 4-H benefit Junior Rodeo will hold the spotlight next week and, as previously mentioned, its financial success will have a bearing on future fairs from the standpoint of the proposed new 4-H building, if for no other reason

POST RETAINS THE honor of having held the original championship junior rodeo, and year after year it continues to outdraw most of the others from the standpoint of spectators as well as contestants.

AS IN PAST years, this year's Junior Rodeo is a 4-H benefit affair, with all proceeds above expenses going into the county 4-H committee's building fund. That's one of the reasons we'd like to see this year's rodeo prove a financial success. Additional funds are needed if the proposed 4-H building is to be constructed.

INCIDENTALLY, THE building committee has given up on plans to construct the building this year. A few months ago, it was thought that this could be accomplished, but the continued drouth has made economic conditions worse, and members of the committee said they just didn't feel like continuing a call for financial assistance from business firms and individuals.

A MONEY-MAKING rodeo Aug. 8-11 might give the committee sufficient funds to go ahead with building plans next year

Getting Out On The Limb By EDDIE the editor

IT'S NO SECRET that an easy way for any business to go broke would be to adopt Uncle Sam's system of budgeting and account-

Under this system, Congress is appropriating money for a single year that won't be spent for some time to come. The reason is that so many federal expenditures are long-term-stretching over a period of years. Foreign aid programs and purchases of military equipment that takes more than a year to design and build, are examples

Hence, vast sums accumulate in the federal departments far in excess of a single year's expenditures. This money doesn't revert to Congress. It stays with the departments, beyond the control of Congress.

The figures for these unexpended appropriations for the year ending June 30, 1956, is estimated at \$53.9 billion

With that kind of money clogging up the pipelines of future spending, the opportunity for laxness and waste is all too tempt-

That is why every citizen should support legislation based on the Hoover Commission recommendations and now before Congress, to require government agencies to prepare budget estimates on the basis of a single year's anticipated needs. At the end of the year, any funds not spent would revert to Congress for reallocation every June 30. That would end carryover funds, and restore control of the vast federal budget to Congress, where it belongs. Congress could still authorize long-term projects, appropriating what would be needed from year to year.

The Hoover Commission estimated that this single step toward government economy would save, \$4 billion every year.

Roger W. Babson Writes This Week Some 'Unexpected Event' May Pop Bubble Of National Economy As It Has In Past

. . .

BABSON PARK. Mass .-- Last night I finished Burton Crane's Guide to National Economics, entitled GETTING AND SPENDING. It contains ever. valuable statistics and notes. His conclusion is that if we will build up foreign markets "to keep the world safe," prosperity should continue, with an occasional dip now and then, for an indefinite period. He does not, however, mention "unexpected events." The very next day after I read this book, there occurred the great Wanamaker fire in New York City, which crippled its subway system. The following day Ringling Brothers announced the suspension at Pittsburgh, in the middle of its season, of the "Greatest Show on Earth." Certainly these were unexpected events, although perhaps not great gh to disturb stock markets. However, these events made me interested in studying anew the action of the stock market for the past one hundred years. This is what I learned.

Business was prosperous during the Civil ar and started to boom directly afterward. The adden death of President Lincoin, however, on followed.

as usual, followed these anexpected events. Business began to correct itself in a few years, how-

1892 was recorded as a year of great prosperity, when suddenly the failure of the National Cordage Company was announced in May, 1883. This was then one of the ten largest corporations and its stock would today be included in the "Blue Chip" group.

The following year the great Pullman Strike occurred. This was the first serious strike and it cast great fear and gloom over the country. This was accompanied by a series of crop failures and mortgage foreclosures.

Again in 1897 business steadily improved and permanent prosperity was prophesied, accompanied by stock splits, mergers, and large security offerings. Suddenly, in 1903, there came another panic due to the still more unexpected cause of "undigested securities." This panic resulted in the investigation of large life insurance and traction companies which were then very popular. The final crash came with the San Francisco earthquake which dragged prices way

Up to this time the national government had been friendly to business, with no commissions or other retarding factors. The Supreme Court had been content to decide questions between the states. Suddenly in the early 1990's it issued a decision forbidding the consolidation of the Great Northern Railroad and the Northern Pacific Railroad. This came out of a clear sky and took the zip out of the stock market until the first World War broke. After the closing of the New York Stock Exchange for more than four months, there followed some years of prosperity, then a series of surprise business failures, along with the sinking of the S. S. Lusitania and our entrance into World War I. All went well until 1926 when stock market prices, due to very high interest rates, had another collapse. This was quickly corrected and the stock market continu-ed to advance until it reached an all-time high in 1829.
