BABSON PARK. Mass.-Fire losses have so increased that I feel the subject should interest everyone, whether manufacturer, merchant, or householder. The financial loss may be covered by insurance; but insurance does not cover other losses, especially in the case of a successful business or a happy home.

Most Fires Could Be Avoided

Unfortunately, a certain number of fires are set,-some by mentally deranged people, or by juvenile delinquents. Other fires are set by unsuccessful businessmen who use the fires "to sell their business to the insurance company," In view of the large number of "set" fires, the little red fire-alarm boxes at street corners will always remain in use. No one who sets a fire will ever notify the Fire Department! This must be done by someone who discovers the fire when walking along the street. As such discovery is made only after the fire has got a good start, "set" fires are the most dangerous.

In addition to the thousands of lives which have been lost in these 27% of fires, the property loss amounted to \$453,341,831,-all from Matches and

In this connection I wish to acknowledge a debt of gratitude owed the National Board of Fire Underwriters, especially their General Manager, Mr. L. A. Vincent, and their Chief Engineer, Mr. John A. Neal. This Board has various functions. It originates most of the publicity issued to prevent fires; it maintains a legal staff to detect and prosecute those who are suspected of setting fires; and through the Underwriter's Laboratory of Chicago, the Board tests Fire Extinguishers, Sprinkler Systems, Electric Alarms, and gadgets which are publicly offered for the prevention of fires. This latter is very important work But your very best friend is your local Fire Chief.

#### What About Insurance?

Too many people take the position, "Why worry, because the insurance company will pay the bill." Although, in case of loss, you get a check from one or more insurance companies, yet this loss is merely collected by the insurance companies from the premiums which they assess plus the cost of operation to all who take out policies. In fact, the real loss from fires is considerably more than the amount paid out as insurance. Due to the high character of the men who operate these insurance companies and the careful supervision given them by the official State Boards, their financial record is excellent.

Therefore, I urge every reader to see that his factory, his store, and his home are well covered by insurance, Furthermore, in view of the rising cost of building, insurance, in most cases, needs to be increased at the present time. I believe every reader of this column should check his insurance policies today and see that they cover not only fire losses, but also losses from wind storms, accidents, and other disasters. Frankly, I am a great believer in all forms of insurance, and this includes urance,-for family protection, for the ent of estate taxes, and for other pur-

"Most of the accidents," he said, occurred when the school bus was stopped to take on or discharge passengers." Garrison pointed out that state

law makes it mandatory for motorists to stop upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the highway to receive or discharge passengers.

Motorists are allowed to pass a bus only after stopping, and only at a speed of 10 miles per hour or less when safe to do so. Garrison emphasized that cars must stop regardless of their direction of travel in relation to the school bus

The public safety director also suggested that "school bus driv-ers consider themselves guard-

"Many accidents occurred last year because of moving traffic violations on the part of school bus drivers. Vague and improper turn signals and failure to yield the right of way were two of the most frequent violations."



Q. I am in the military serv ice, and I am covered by \$10,000 free indemnity. I recently was married, and I want to change my beneficiary, Am I supposed to notify the VA?

A. No. Service personnel should not notify VA of changes in beneficiary. Instead, they should notify their branch of service. since that's where their records are kept. VA handles the records of veterans, and not generally, of members of the armed

Q. I want to get a GI farm loan. How can I find a lender who makes such loans?

A. You should be able to get the information from your County Agricultural Extension Agent. You also should contact lending institutions in your com-

Q. I am going to school under the Korean GI Bill. Will I have the right to make one change of program for as long as I might

A. No. You have the right to change your program up to the third anniversary date of your discharge from the armed forces. After that, you may change only if you are not making satisfacprogress in your present corres, due to no fault of your orth, and your new course would be nore in keeping with your aptitudes and abilities.

Q. I am eligible for VA outparient medical treatment for my service connected disability. May I simply go to my own doctor and tell him to bill the VA?

A. No. You must get VA's prior authorization for your doctor to provide the treatment at VA's



Teaff, whose 160-acre farm is one mile west of the Close City deceased. a mile north of the Close City community. The family lived on community, still uses unlined ditches to flow water from one of his three irrigation wells, and thus is reminded almost daily of the many advantages of conrete pipe over the older meth-

His approximately 1,900 feet of concrete pipe was installed just a little too late last year to realize full benefits from it, but he got it down in time for it to help him make "a little better than a bale of cotton to an acre."

This year, he has watered the 1930s before tractors started twice and is now watering for showing up here and there on spent the weekend with friends the third time. If other conditions are as good as last year, he expects a higher yield from having the concrete pipe with which to start the 1956 crop

The 1,900 feet of 12-inch pipe and approximately 400 feet of gated aluminum pipe was installed by Teaff at a cost of around \$1,900, with approximately \$750 of that amount being paid by the federal government after qualifying as an Agricultural Conservation Program practice.

"I feel that conservation of irrigation water is very important to the irrigation farmer," Teaff said. "Loss of water from unlined ditches because of seepage and evaporation can be enormous and probably varies from 10 to 50 per cent."

"It didn't take me long," he continued, "to learn the advantages of concrete pipe. It provides close control of water distribution, it saves time and labor. it aids in insect and weed control, it simplifies irrigation of sloping land, and it requires little maintenance. I just wish I had more of it.

Each Scout group whose picture is made is given an 8 by 10-inch print, Morgan said.





The Standard grade will be applied to beef from younger animals while the name Com mercial will be retained by beef from mature animals falling in the present Commercial grade The present grades of beef are Prime, Choice, Good, Commercial, Utility, Cutter and Canner.

According to the USDA announcement the revision was originally recommended by the Cattle and Beef Industry Committee. Comments from individuals and organizations favored the change it was the opinion of the Committee that it is impractical to merchandise, under the same grade designation, beef from young animals which may qualify for the Commercial grade with only a small quantity of far together with beef from much older animals which is required to have a much greater degree of fatness. Also in some parts of the country where substantial portions of the younger type of Commercial beef are produced and consumed, it is believed that some of this type of beef is not now being federally graded because of prejudice against the name "Commercial" which has come to be associated with beef from older
