Is It Going To Be Another Case Of "TOO LITTLE, TOO LATE"

OF concern to many Post parents will be the findings and report made to a woman's committee by a structural engineer of Lubbook, who came to Post Wednesday morning at the request of the committee, to inspect the Elementary school building in north Post.

While his findings are not being published by this newspaper to excite parents who have children attending classes in the building, the facts are of public interest and should demand the prompt attention of those who are charged with administering our school affairs. The findings are given at the request of the committee, numbering more than thirty mothers who took it upon themselves last Monday night to attend the monthly meeting of the Board, and requested that an inspection of the building be made. The Board, apparently showing little concern over the structure, and an incident which occured about two weeks ago when a section of plaster and metal ceiling crashed over desk-tops in one of the class rooms shortly after classes had been dismissed, gave permission to the committee to have the building inspected.

The inspector, W. G. McMillan of Lubbock, graduate engineer of A. & M. College and widely-known West Texas contractor informed the committee and a Board member, who has evidenced more interest in the condition of the building than other members. that the building was unsafe and in a bad state of deterioration. In discussing the structure, Mr. McMillan said: "There is no danger of the building collapsing, but it is in a bad state of deterioration, due to age, roof leakage, and poor upkeep."-

"Three of the class rooms are in very bad condition, and require immediate attention. A prolonged wet spell and further leakage could cause the heavy metal and plaster ceilings, some of which have already turned igose from their moorings, to come crashing down," he continued. "In one of the rooms, the ceiling above the teacher's desk has sagged two inches. The damaged area covers more than six square feet and may drop at any time." Weight of each class room ceiling is said to approximate 2,100 pounds.

The section of celling which crashed to the floor in one of the class rooms two weeks ago was reported to have been heavier than could be removed in one piece, so readers can readily understand the anxiety of mothers.

Mr. McMillan recommended that an inexpensive way of making the ceilings safe, would be to strip them at right angles to the joists with wood strips, using long screws to secure them instead of driving mals into the joints. These supports would distribute the weight of the heavy plaster ceilings and prevent more of the lath nails from pulling away from the joists.

Garza Fails To Meet Its Final E-Bond Quota

BE CONTINUED THROUGH REMAINDER OF DECEMBER

With less than half of the Ebond quota subscribed up to Saturday, scheduled closing date of the final war bond drive, Garga county has been called upon to continue the drive until December 31 in an effort to meet the \$75,000 goal.

A telegram received Tuesday by T. R. Greenfield, chairman of the County War Finance committee from Nathan Adams, state war bond chairman, urged that this county meet its E-bond quots, and that the campaign be carried through December 31.

Final figures released by Greenfield Monday morning totaled \$194,577:25 subscribed on the iver-all quots set by the state at \$235,000. E-bond sales up to that date totaled only \$35,593.75, less than half of the \$75,000 goal.

Although this final war bond drive got off to a bad start in the State, many West Texas counties reached their quotas before the drive ended, and the State as a whole climbed up to 46th place in national percentage from closeto-bottom position it held for marry weeks.

Government To Cut Price Guarantees On Farm Products


The government in 1946 will reduce virtually all farm price guarantees to the lowest level allowed by law, it was disclosed Friday by the Agricultural Department at Washington,

The government underwrote prices of more than two-thirds of all farm products at 98 per cent of parity as a wartime measure to encourage high production. The promise holds good for two years after the war. On commodities most needed in the war effort, support levels were pegged somewhat higher than at minimum stag dinner on Tuesday night at levels. This was true of the oil crops, potatoes, milk, sugar, hogs and others.

Next year, officials pointed out, there will be but few cases where it will be necessary to keep these exceptions, sugar beets, sugar cane and flaxseed, were named.





What's Back of My Gas Burners?

This is the second in a series of four advartisements being published in the belief that you would like to know more about the natural gas business, which so vitally affects your daily lives.

CHAPTER II The Gas Is "Squeezed"

In Chapter I we told you something about drilling a gas well. Now we will see what happens to the gas when it is released from the reservoir in which it was trapped sometime back in geologic history.

A small meter house is built near the well and connected to it with a short pipe line. Then a gathering line is installed and connected, and the well is ready to yield up the wonderful fuel which means so much to us all,

The natural gas comes up through the well casing to the surface of the ground and thence to the meter house where it is measured, so that proper accounting may be made to the owner of the land. Measurement of the gas consists of installing an orifice in the gas line and making calculations from the resulting pressures on each side of the prifice. These pressures are recorded in ink on circular, clock-revolved charts. From the meter house the gas passes into the gathering line which leads it to a field compressor station.

From the well to the field compressor station, the gar travels on its own power-that is, it is forced along by the natural pressure in its underground reservoir. The gas could travel a considerable distance in this manner, but due to the loss in pressure through pipe line friction, the delivery of large quantities of gas would require a pipe line of such large size that the cost would be prohibitive. Therefore the pressure of the gas must be increased, this being the function of the compressor station.

Compressing gas is very much like baling cotton-le merely squeezes it into a smaller space so that more of it may be transported with the same facilities, and in shorter time. Gas compressors are large, precision-built machines of great strength to withstand tremendous pressures. Our compressors are driven by gas engines. The gas enters the compressor cylinder, is compressed by the action of the piston, and is discharged at a much higher pressure.

Some folks have the impression that compressing natural gas consists of pumping air into a gas line. This of course is not correct. If air were introduced into a gas line under pressure, there would be great danger of an explosion of the whole line, due to the air mixing with the gas and forming an explosive mixture.
