"TRUMAN FLOUR" . . . By Government Order

Post and Garza county housewives, along with meal planners over the nation, will be interested in the new "Truman Flour" which goes on the market this week.

The order, intended to make more wheat available for hungry nations and to spread domestic supplies as far as possible, places drastic limitations on wheat use.

The use of 80 per cent of the wheat kernel will result in a sandy-beige colored flour. This is a blow to a nation which prefers white flour. Nutrition experts have spent years encouraging use of whole wheat flour, but only about three per cent of flour consumed is whole wheat.

Experiment has shown that new flour requires a little more salt and a little more liquid than ordinary flour, but it can be used with good results in making bread, rolls, and pie crusts, in fact every bakery product except cakes.

Millers have reported they will not market this new flour under regular advertised brand names. These names, on which thousands of dollars have been spent in advertising, are too valuable to risk the resentment which may be built up if the housewives do not like the flour.

Just a personal word, this is a government order, and the miller and grocer are in no way responsible. You are asked to bear with them.

SAVE THE SOIL

Plant Fruit and Shade Trees To Conserve The Soil

With the observance last Friday of Arbor Day, Texas continued a 57-year old custom. Governor Stevenson issued a proclamation urging the use of George Washington's birthday anniversary as a day for planting trees.

Arbor Day was originally observed in Texas on February 22, 1889, after a bill was introduced in the Senate by Gorge W. Tyler of Belton, Texas, and was signed by Gov. L. S. Ross.

Recently a Federal Reserve Bank report revealed that our top soils are being depleted at an alarming rate. Every person who owns a little ground should realize the necessity of saving such a valuable asset.

By setting out fruit and ornamental trees a dual purpose can be accomplished. By setting out fruit trees we can make our land more self sufficient and fruit more easily obtained. By setting out shade trees and ornamental shrubs we can help to beautify our surroundings. No weatherier project could be carried out than helping to make Post and Garza County a prettier place to live.

"TEXAS—Yesterday, Today, Forever"

"The first act in the great drama is now performed. The Republic of Texas is no more"—final words pronounced by President Anson Jones when on February 19, 1846, the Lone Star flag was lowered at the capitol in Austin, were recalled last week when a giant Statehood day celebration was held in Austin.

The governors of Utah and Florida, spoke, along with representatives of governors from ten other states. Gen. Jonathan Wainwright was also an honored guest, leading the parade.

Legally, it is held that December 29 was the correct date, but most people have felt that the day the government was transferred by the Senate and the flag lowered marked the beginning of a new era.

This week brings the anniversary of another date dear to the hearts of Texans. March 2, one hundred and ten years ago, delegates of the people of Texas adopted the Declaration of Independence at the town of Washington on the Brazos.

Today, Texas is a vast empire incorporated under the protection of a United States. However much she has benefitted from this protection it remains a fact that Texas has brought a great strength to the nation, never more fully realized than during the war years.

No state has had a more colorful history or provided a prouder heritage for her sons and daughters today. Proudly we "Honor the Texas flag . . . we pledge our loyalty to thee . . . Texas, one and indivisible."

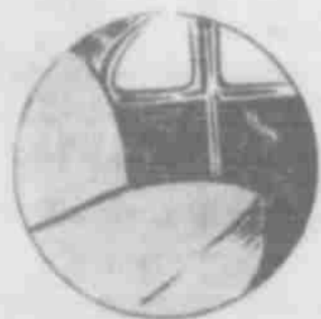

This is being written on George Washington's birthday and shortly after the reading in the House of Representatives of Washington's Farewell Address, an annual custom.

I think the Father of our Country would approve the action we took in Congress yesterday in passing overwhelmingly a bill designed to curb the actions of James Censur Petrillo, head of the Musicians Union. You will remember that this is the man who in recent years has set himself up as the dictator in the field of music.

On one occasion, he refused to permit the broadcasting of a special program at a National Cemetery in Virginia, commemorating Memorial Day, because a U. S. Army band furnished the music. He demanded \$2,800 of one of the Washington theatres because some young women who were members of the armed forces were allowed to put on a home-talent play at a program sponsoring the sale of war bonds. He stopped a home-talent program for crippled children on one occasion. These and other unreasonable actions by Mr. Petrillo have brought down the wrath of the people upon his head.

The general public, as well as labor unions whose cause has been unfairly injured by the unwise actions of Petrillo, will, no doubt, be glad to see Censur's wings clipped.

Only yesterday we also had the final roll call vote on whether to continue Federal participation in the public school lunch program. The vote was 275 for and 101 against. I voted to continue the program.

The program was begun several years ago, the Federal Government sharing in the purchase of the food and seeking to stimulate the wise disposition of surplus farm products. It is felt here that the school children and the people generally approve the program.

My mail on the subject was very light. Six Parent-Teacher Associations and 37 individuals in our District wired or wrote to me, requesting that I vote to continue the school lunch program.

Clint Cook of Post, who is now out of the Navy, called me on the telephone the other day and reported that he was in Washington and back on his old job with the Department of Agriculture.

Naval Academy graduate Lt. (jg) Bob Crawley of Lamesa and his wife, Peggy, came by for a little visit. Bob will be on duty in Washington for a few weeks before returning to the fleet.

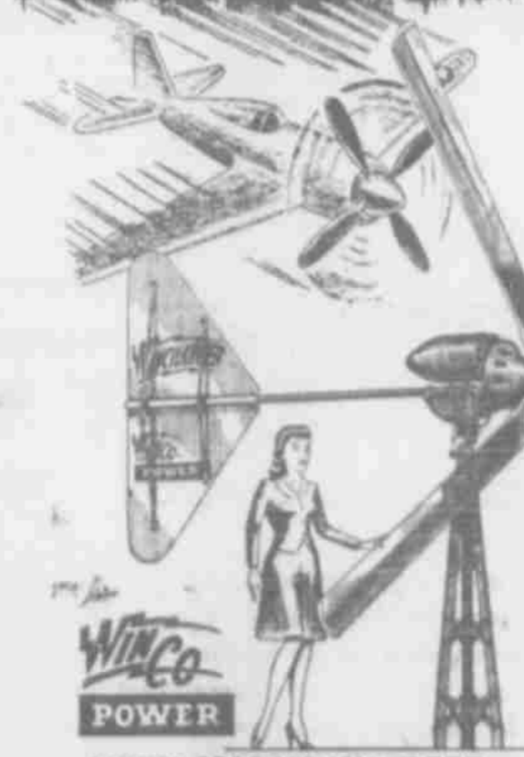
