## Taxpayers To Vote On Re-Allocation Of County Levies

Garza county taxpayers, when they vote on the four constitutional amendments Saturday, will also voice their opinions as to whether the Garza County Commissioner's Court may re-allocate county tax levies for jury, general, road and bridge, and permanent improvements funds within an 80-cent per \$100 valuation maximum.

The present tax rate for this county is 87c, the new rate if re-allocation carries, will be 80 cents.

The local issue is being submitted in connection with the four amendments and should arouse considerable interest, declares County Judge J. Lee Bowen. "Garza folk should avail themselves of this opportunity to reduce their county tax rate."

The constitutional amendment permitting counties to pass by local option upon tax re-allocation was approved at last year's general election.

## Congressman Mahon Visiting Pacific Area With Military Men

Congressman George Mahon in company with high ranking Army officers and other members of the Military Appropriations Committee left last week by plane on an official mission overseas. The Army officers are headed by General George Richards who handles the purse strings for the War Department. Other officers in the group represent the Air Force, the Army Ground Forces, Service Forces and the Office of General Marshall, Chief of Staff.

Mahon is one of the eight members of the Military Appropriations Committee designated for the mission. Under arrangements made by the Secretary of War the group will see at first hand certain bases and installations before authorizing further expenditures by Congress. They will confer with overseas commanders regarding speedier procedure for returning servicemen from overseas. The Committee expects to slash war spending as deeply as safely can be done following their observation of the general situation.

## Football Workouts To Begin Sept. 1 At Antelope Field

### Forty Men Will Be On Hand For First Go-Round

The largest outpouring of prospects for places on the Antelope football team in years is due to take place Saturday morning, September 1, when Post High opens fall training.

Forty or more boys have already indicated they would be at the gymnasium early, so that they could be in the first go-round of workouts slated at 8 a. m., declared Superintendent R. H. Ranson, who will coach the gridmen. Included in the flock will be six last season's lettermen, Bill Fumagalli, Wayne Hundley, A. C. Thomas, Charles Propts, David Buster and Jimmie Bird. This season's team will be centered around these six men, supported by twenty or more last season's squadmen and an aggregation of "green material."

Superintendent Ranson, who has had quite a great deal of experience in handling gridmen, will be assisted in coaching the squad by Huron Poinac, local Baptist minister, who for a number of years coached high school football, and N. R. King, who will work with both the Antelopes and the junior boys' team. The coaches will start the workouts with single and double-wing formations, gradually shifting to the popular T arrangement.

Quite a number of the aspirants have been working out at the gym this past week, tossing the basketball, going thru calisthenics and doing a bit of sprinting around the track... just getting in shape, declared the coach. Interscholastic grid rules prohibit the issuing of football gear or any phase of training until the first of September, so the mentor is toying the line in observing rules. "We regret very much that three boys who lettered last year are ineligible this season and will not be permitted to take part in football," said Mr. Ranson.

Two practice sessions are slated for the opening of season, a light workout Saturday morning after the issuing of equipment, and a good stiff practice at 8 o'clock on the evening. When school begins the following Monday, one practice session will be held daily, from 3 to 4:50 p. m.

The Antelopes will be fitted out with fine equipment, including new jerseys and pants, new helmets, new shoulder and blocking pads, and new shoes. Some old gear will be used for practice, said the coach.

**50 Million Dead,  
Wounded, Missing  
World War Toll**

World War II has cost the people of this world no fewer than 55,000,000 dead, wounded and missing by the most conservative but tentative and incomplete estimates from official statistics.

It will be at least a year before the total cost of World War II can be known.

There is great variance between estimates by various departments of the same government. Hitler, himself, last Feb. 24, estimated Germany's losses at 12,500,000, of which 6,300,000 has been killed. Yet on July 29 a captured document which is now accepted as official and almost accurate lists Germany's war losses at 4,064,438 up to Nov. 30, 1944.

The casualties of all belligerents in World War I amounted to 29,750,000 of which Germany lost just under 7,000,000 dead and wounded. Nor do the German lists give the number of civilian casualties in air raids and invasions.

The said parties have agreed and by these presents do agree to associate themselves in a Limited Partnership for carrying on in the town of Post, Garza County, Texas, the trade, business, and occupation of buying and selling meats, groceries, and allied products under the firm name of "Pure Food Market, Ltd." The said First Parties being general partners and the said Second Party, a special partner.

That said partnership shall commence at the date of these presents and shall terminate on the 1st day of January 1950.

That the said Madge Mathis as special partner has contributed \$4,700.00 in cash to the capital stock of the said firm. That the said First Parties have each contributed the sum of \$4,700.00 to the capital stock of said firm.

The interest of the capital stock of Madge Mathis, special partner, shall entitle her to 33 1-3 of the yearly profits of the business of said firm, and the First Parties shall share and share alike in the remaining 66 2-3%.

None of the parties hereto shall enter into any business competitive to the business of the partnership and will from time to time, and during the said term use their utmost endeavors to promote and enhance the mutual interests of the parties hereto.

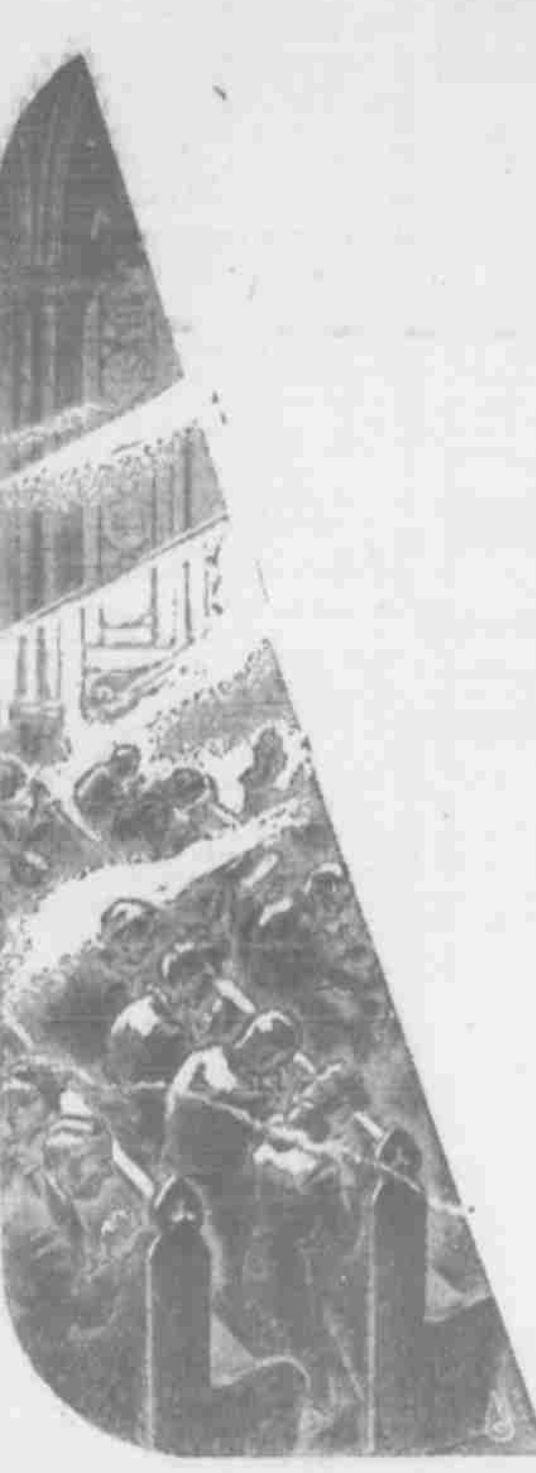

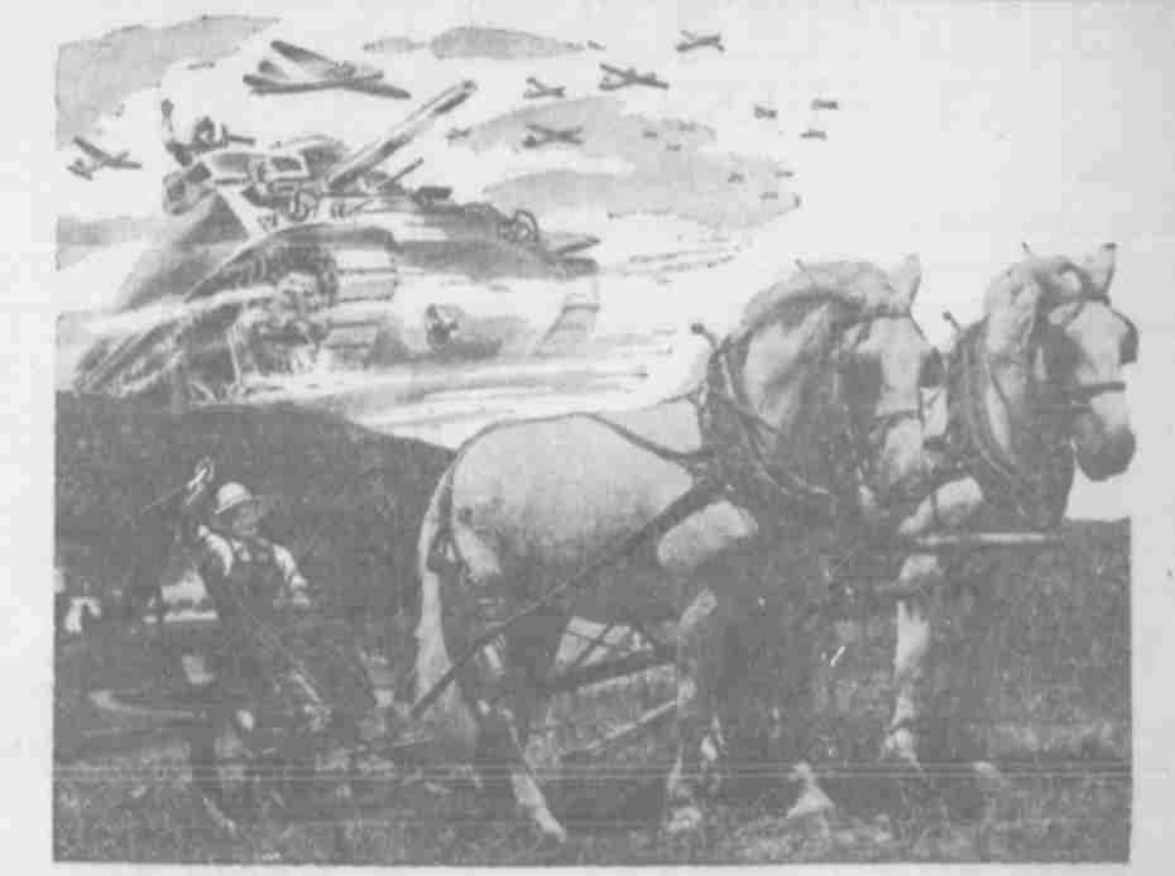

## Congratulatory Wire Message Ban Lifted

The ban on greeting and congratulatory telegraph messages was lifted Friday.

All but nine of the 30 war orders controlling communications were revoked. The priority system for telephone, telegraph and teletypewriter exchange messages was retained.

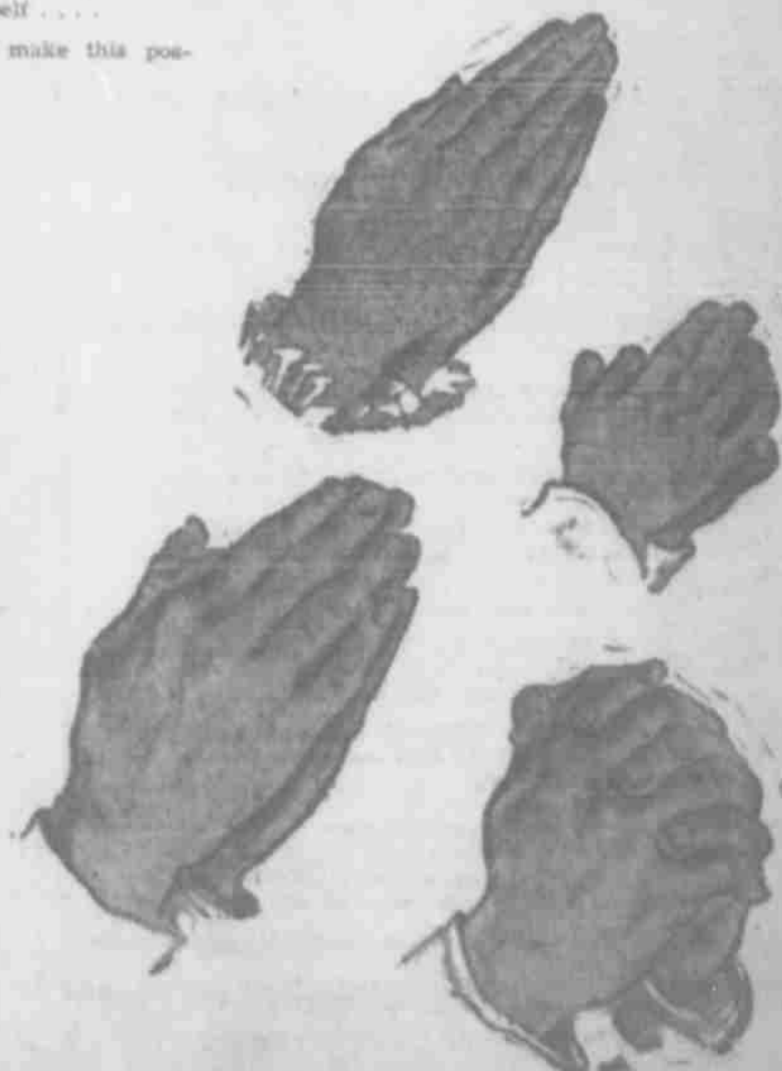

The State of Texas

On this, the 24th day of July,  
1945, the Commissioners' Court of  
Garza County, Texas, convened in  
Special session, at the regular  
meeting place thereof at Frost,  
Texas, the following members of  
the Court, to-wit:

J. Lee Bowen County Judge,  
presiding; and, E. Henderson  
Commissioner, Precinct No. 1;  
Alice Parsons Commissioner,  
Precinct No. 2; E. W. Cross, Com-  
missioner, Precinct No. 3; W. T.  
Parchman, Commissioner, Precinct

other proceedings had by  
the Court were the following:

Commissioner E. W. Cross in-  
troduced the following order and  
moved its adoption by the Court:  
Whereas, at the general election  
held throughout the State of Texas  
on the 7th day of November,  
1944, the qualified electors of the  
State, voting on the proposition,  
approved the amendment to Section  
9 of Article 8 of the Constitution  
of Texas by changing said  
Section 9 so as to provide that the  
Commissioners' Court in any county  
may re-allocate the county tax

Garza County, Texas, that it will  
be to the best interests and gen-  
eral welfare of the County to re-  
allocate the County taxes author-  
ized to be levied annually by  
Section 9, Article 8, of the Consti-  
tution, by changing the rates in  
respect of certain County taxes  
as herein provided; and

WHEREAS, it now being im-  
practicable and impossible to sub-  
mit the proposed re-allocations  
and changes in such County taxes  
to the qualified property taxpay-  
ing voters of said County at a  
general election, it is accordingly  
the judgement of the Court that  
the proposition be submitted to  
the qualified property taxpaying  
voters of said County at a special  
election; therefore

**BE IT ORDERED BY THE  
COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF  
GARZA COUNTY, TEXAS:**

That a special election be held  
in said County on the 25th day of  
August, 1945, which is not less  
than thirty (30) days from the  
date of the adoption of this order,  
at which election the following  
proposition shall be submitted to  
the qualified property taxpaying  
voters, who own taxable property  
in said County and who have  
duly rendered same for taxation,  
for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners'  
Court of the County of Garza,  
Texas, be authorized to levy and  
collect in and for each of the  
years 1945 to 1950, both inclusive,  
the following County taxes, to-  
wit:

Not exceeding Thirty Five (35)  
Cents on the one hundred dollars'  
valuation, in any one year, for  
County purposes;

Not exceeding Twenty Two (22)  
Cents on the one hundred dollars'  
valuation, in any one year, for  
roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Three (3) Cents  
on the one hundred dollars' val-  
uation, in any one year, to sup-  
plement the jury fund of the County;  
and

Not exceeding Twenty (20)  
Cents on the one hundred dollars'  
valuation, in any one year, for  
the erection of public buildings,  
streets, sewers, waterworks and  
other permanent improvements;"

- 1. FRESH SALT PORK**—with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.
- 2. CHOP FAT FRYING**—use the fat over and over, but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it!
- 3. BOATS AND COOKS**—save all trimmings (scrape from plates, too). Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.
- 4. SAUSAGE**—they're better if you parboil them first. Skim the fat off the cooking water—scrape the fat from the frying pan.
- 5. CHICKEN SOUP**—chill it before you eat it. Skim off the hardened grease (soup tastes better, too!)

When the salvage can is full, take it to your butcher promptly. He will give you 3¢ and points and up to 4¢ for every pound of used fat you turn in.

### Sugar Scarcity Is Not To Be Solved Immediately

Today the United States has the least sugar she's had since the last war, reports the A. and M. Extension Service. Our sugar reserves probably can't be rebuilt until 1947.

As you probably know, the release points out, only about one-fourth of our sugar is grown in the 48 states. So when the war started our sugar troubles began too. Not only the United States, but our allies were cut off from sugar in the Pacific areas . . . except from Hawaii. And likely many more months will pass before most of the Pacific producers will ship sugar to us again, even from the Philippines.

In the meantime, our allies who were formerly dependent on home grown sugar and on sugar from the Pacific have had to obtain some of their sugar from the Caribbean area . . . That means less sugar for the United States. With less sugar to buy on the world market and more people to buy it, our national supplies have gradually dwindled.

In the face of that, we used 450,000 tons more sugar for home canning purposes last summer than we actually needed for the food we put up. With the money to buy it and the appetites to eat it, we probably used some of that canning sugar for cookies, lemonade and the like.

Now we have practically no reserve stocks of sugar to fall back on. Unfortunately Cuba has suffered from the worst drought in 87 years. The sugar crop of Cuba was 900,000 tons short of expectations.

Fortunately, more sugar beets were planted in the United States this year . . . but not enough to balance other shortages and we can't expect much improvement in supply for many months.

About 100,000 pounds of raw silk will be produced at Mineral Wells, Texas, this year.

### Servicemen To Be Given Priority In Civil Service Jobs

Dallas, August 17—Until further notice the United States Civil Service Commission will not receive any applications for employment in the Federal service except from those veterans who have the right to have examinations reopened for them.

The Commission has taken this step, according to a statement issued today, in order to make sure that any vacancies which develop in the Federal service will be filled by returning veterans or by persons who are about to be or have been separated from other positions in the Federal service.

"The Federal Government as an employer," stated the Commission, "must set the example in providing the members of the Armed Forces who are coming through our separation centers today with the maximum possible opportunities for employment."

"Also, the Federal Government is determined not to put itself in a position where it is discharging persons in one part of the Federal service and, at the same time, hiring persons from the outside to fill similar positions in another part of the Federal service."

Where the supply of returning veterans and the supply of persons involved in reductions in force in the Federal service are not sufficient to fill vacancies the Commission's regional directors have been authorized to lift the ban on receipt of applications. In certain occupational areas such action will be taken very promptly after the Commission's field officials have had the opportunity of appraising the situation which confronts them as a result of the cessation of hostilities.

The battle lasted an hour and 45 minutes and the ships fought side by side, each covering the other from attacks which came in from all quarters. The Evans was credited with 15 hits and 4 assists and took four kamikazi crashes on her decks and hull.

While visiting here the officer was honored with several parties, among them an ice cream supper given by Mrs. Paul Beach. On Monday night 80 people gathered at the Verbena school for evening of 42 and other games. Two other young service men, Marshal Reno and Dorris Porter, enjoyed the party.
