County Agent Gets Report On Panhandle Wheat Harvest

Garza county farmers and farm youths, who seek employment during the harvest season, will be interested in a report received the first of the week by County Agent Frank Eaton, which gives information concerning the harvest in northwest Texas.

The report sums up the harvest in this manner: "Wheat harvest in all the Texas Panhandle will get underway this week. Combines are moving out of Childress, Quanah and Vernon areas in large numbers and harvest will pass the peak in counties south of these areas this week. The first of the week found sufficient combines and labor in all the Panhandle, but it is now anticipated that more combines and labor will be needed when the peak of the harvest is reached by the first of next week. Adequate labor is reported by most counties listed, but a number of areas are calling for combines. Hartley county lists 14 farmers requesting combines for 9278 acres. Carson county requests 10 combines and 30 or more farm hands.

Post Liberty Ship Docks In Many Ports During Past Year

The C. W. Post liberty ship, launched in 1944 at Jacksonville, Florida, has contributed its part to the war effort in no little way. The ship, named after the late C. W. Post, founder of this city, has hauled thousands of tons of cargo to all parts of the world. The Post Dispatch this week received two pictures of the ship from C. I. Dickinson of New York, showing her docking at City Island, N. Y., where she is now loading cargo. Along with the pictures came a list of the ports where the Post liberty ship has docked.

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD MONDAY FOR JOHN J. VANCE

June 15 Last Day For Candidates To Get On Ticket

June 15 is the last day for candidates seeking county and precinct offices to have their names placed on the ticket, reminds T. B. Greenfield, county Democratic chairman. The County Democratic committee, comprised of all precinct chairmen, will meet Monday, June 17 at 3 p. m. at the county court house to determine the order of the ballot and set the cost of placing names on the ticket, said Greenfield. Candidates have until June 22 to pay cost of the election. Greenfield further pointed out that July 1 is the last day for candidates to file their first expense account.

Body Of Ranch Helper Shipped To Hollis Saturday For Burial

The body of L. D. Weathers, about 17, who was killed Saturday morning on the Beggs ranch east of Post when he was thrown from his horse and dragged to death, was taken over-land by hearse Saturday afternoon to Hollis, Oklahoma, for burial. The young ranch worker, who was employed at the Beggs ranch near Girard, and who came to Garza county one day last week to help move some cattle on the Beggs ranch about fifteen miles east of Post, had pulled off to a mesquite thicket from the others who were riding the herd and no one seemed to know just how the accident occurred. The riderless horse was found about a mile from where the body was found and the boy's right boot and lariet rope were found dangling from mesquite brush. Employees of the ranch believe he was thrown from his horse and dragged some distance before he became freed from the stirrup.

CONSTRUCTION WORK TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK ON NEW BUILDING HERE

Construction of a 96x200 foot modern brick and tile building to house the Post Truck and Tractor Company is scheduled to get underway early next week, according to Bill Baasens of Southland, one of the owners of the implement concern. The building, material of which is being moved to the location on Main this week, will be erected of concrete tile with white face-brick trim. Albert Basting of Lubbock will be in charge of the carpenter and steel work and a Mr. Edwards of Slaton, will supervise the brick laying and concrete work. The structure will have a 96-foot frontage facing north on Main, and is to be built on lots directly east of Dr. Young's clinic.

Cotton Producers Not Required To Report Acreage

The Garza County AAA Committee has been notified by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation that it is not necessary for the producer to report the planted acres of cotton since the insurance adjusters will make an early visit to the farm and obtain the seeded acres, states Will Wright, chairman. "This is not the system that has been used in previous years and is not the system we had expected this year, however it must be used in 1946," he said. Producers are cautioned not to put their cotton acreage to another crop until the farm has been visited by an adjuster and written consent is given authorizing the producer to plant another crop. In those cases where the growing crop has been destroyed or damaged the producer must notify the County Office immediately in order to eliminate all possible delays in making prompt inspections and adjustments," Will Wright said.

The test, drilled by Honolula and Devonian Oil Company, is located on the west side of the proven area. The well was bottomed at 3,806 feet.

County Scholastics Show Slight Gain Over Last Report

According to Garza county school census reports for 1946-47, a gain of forty-five students is shown over last year's census, announced County Superintendent Dean A. Robinson Wednesday afternoon. The 1946-47 census, as approved by the State Department of Education, shows a grand total of 1,431 as compared to last year's census of 1,386. In the Post district the census climbed from 651 last year to 725 for the 1946-47 school term. Four out-of-district students were reported from the 729 sent in by the enumerator. Losses in scholastics were noted in the report from Close City and Southland Independent school districts, with an exact count with last year's report in the common district of the county. The Close City census dropped 6, as compared with last year's report, and Southland lost 22 scholastics.

Garza Countians Urged To Conserve More On Foods

The world food situation is still critical and we must not lessen our efforts in the conservation of food, states Will Wright, Chairman, Garza County Famine Emergency Campaign. "Saving food is hard for the American people - we have always had too much of it. Or course none of us deliberately waste food. But the garbage cans continue to fill up. Now, with as much of the world hungry food waste must be cut, he said. During the war we wasted 125 million pounds of food every day, and according to surveys by agricultural economists this was 20 to 30 percent of all the food we produced. Of this enormous waste one-fourth to one-third takes place in the home. That means that the average American family throws out 400 pounds of good edible food every year. The balance of the waste occurs on farms, in warehouses, and in stores because perishable foods do not find a market soon enough. To avoid this excess waste use more of these plentiful foods. "Every effort must be made to provide food for starvation areas until the emergency is over. Don't stop with a one-shot job. No work is more important than that of saving lives. What you do combined with all that all others do will add up to the saving of millions of lives. These starving people are human beings just the same as you or I. Save for them as you would want them to save for you if you were in their condition," said Mr. Wright.

Officers from the Post club who plan to attend and who will serve as delegates are L. A. Prosser, newly elected president, Ivan Clark, D. W. Billings and Walter Moresman. All members with the exception of Moresman will be accompanied by their wives. The Settles Hotel in Big Spring will be convention headquarters. District business matters will be conducted on Monday, those of the state on Tuesday. Prominent speakers are scheduled to appear on the program. Over 3,000 Lions are expected to attend. At the Tuesday night meeting of the local club District Governor Charles H. Dean was a welcome guest. He spoke on Lions Education and gave some pertinent thoughts on the importance of Lions clubs. ## HITLER POPS UP IN THE NEWS AGAIN

Came now a story from a press service in Berlin, which caused people of America to wonder whether or not Adolph Hitler and relatives, Eva Braun, are still alive and hiding in parts of Germany. The story, which received wide publication last week, quotes a high American official as stating that after a year of secret investigation, he believes Hitler, Braun and Martin Bormann are still alive. He further implied that it was his belief that Hitler and his wife did not commit suicide in the final days of the siege of Berlin.

Because of the nature of his work, the source must remain anonymous. He is, however, considered highly reliable by American diplomatic and military authorities. The informant is quoted as saying "Obviously, I must tell you that Hitler, Braun and Bormann are considered dead, but, personally I am sure they are alive, as or at least they were alive when the war ended. They did not commit suicide during those final hours in the chancellery bomb shelter, as so many stories have tried to make us believe."

Like many of our own notorious killers and outlaws, Hitler will pop-up in print for years to come, until definite proof is established that he is really dead. Not so many years ago we found a man traveling the country claiming to be the notorious Jesse James... there have been others and there will be more Hitlers to come up.

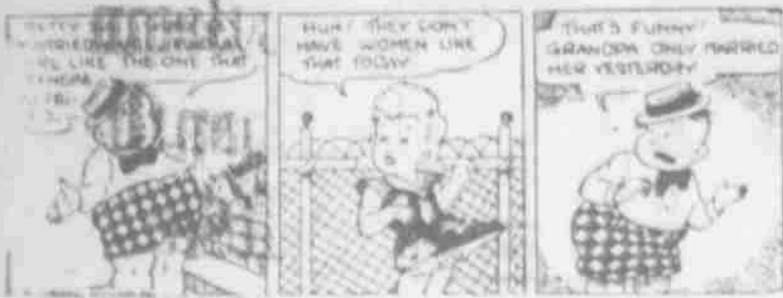

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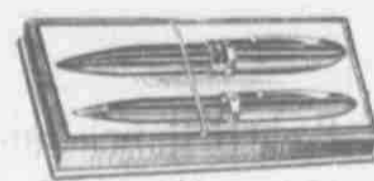

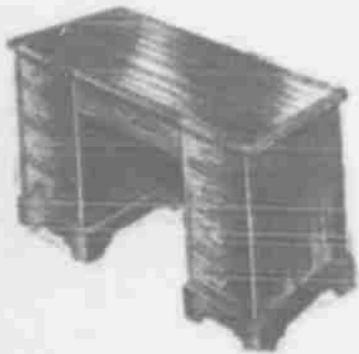

**Growth And Improvement Indicated For Neighboring West Texas Towns**

While most of our neighboring towns were all involved in city-wide clean-up campaigns again last week, one note in thumping through the exchange newspapers that some of the editors are boasting increased wheat yields over estimates given earlier in the season.

The Crosbyton Review claims having already reestimated themselves to the idea of a short wheat crop, farmers of the Crosbyton territory have been agreeably surprised this week with yields much greater than was anticipated. Estimates now place the local crop at from 25 to 30 percent greater than hoped for one week ago. Highest yield to date came from E. E. Claborn, south of Crosbyton, with an average yield of 34 bushels per acre, with some of his wheat producing as much as 20 bushels to the acre.

The Balls Bluffers had this to say about wheat movement. "Bunches of wheat 'eggs' moving out of Balls the first of the week. Thirty cars had been shipped up until last Wednesday. The yield across Falls territory is averaging about twenty bushels per acre. The yield, while considered rather light, is proving to be of good quality. Most of the grain is weighing sixty pounds to the bushel."

Up at Happy the Herald reports that work has been completed on a large 30,000 bushel elevator. Work in that area hasn't started moving yet, but will get underway this week.

The Texas Spur announced last week opening of the city swimming pool. The pool will be opened afternoons and evenings during the summer.

Snyder is getting all set for the annual Scurry County Rodeo, with dates announced in last week's Scurry County Times as July 17-20. Preparatory to staging what already appears to be Scurry County's greatest annual rodeo, workers are busy at the rodeo grounds in Northeast Snyder putting up a new grandstand and installing a new lighting system. The contestant prize list will total \$2,500. Officials of the show are: Charley Welborn, association president; Richard Paris, vice president; Weldon Johnson, arena director and an organization director; Homer Robinson, Bill Riley, Cliff Birdwell and Wayne Boren, secretary-treasurer.

The Stanton Stanton last week announced a city-wide clean-up campaign to get underway this week. The city has been divided into eleven zones and captains named to be responsible for each section in the city. Following the clean-up each property owner whose premises have been cleaned, to the satisfaction of the zone captain, will be given a sticker to be displayed showing that he has co-operated in the campaign.

Colorado City is staging an Amateur program which will run through the summer months, reported the Colorado City Record last week. The first program was staged last Friday night, with the Colorado City band adding a thirty-minute concert to the amateur features. The contests are held free to the public.

The Hamlin Herald reported last week heavy shipment of grain with 131 cars of wheat moving out during last week's period. Grain dealers have estimated 250 cars will be shipped from Hamlin this year. Another article in the Herald revealed a close election held in which citizens turned thumbs down on the county hospital, with 1466 for the bond issue and 1304 against.

**Swing of Southwest Farm Markets**

Cotton prices went up sharply last week but most other southwest farm products remained about steady except for weaker undertones on some vegetables and eggs, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Cotton prices continued to gain ground last week and reached a new 22 year high. Spot market activity increased sharply. Offerings were scarce. Reported sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 61,400 bales this past week as compared with 66,800 the previous week and 110,000 during the corresponding week a year ago.

Grain and feed prices continued to stand at ceiling levels. Demand was good for tight supplies. Some new crop wheat and oats started to market.

Southwest egg prices were slightly lower early last week, but later gained some strength as demand increased due to additional export needs for dried eggs. Current receipt eggs were quoted around 30 cents a dozen, Dallas; 30 to 31 cents, Fort Worth, and Denver.

Moderate to light poultry offerings met with intense demand at steady to firm prices last week. Fixers were especially strong at mostly ceiling prices. Heavy hens brought 22 to 24 cents a pound, Dallas; 24 to 25 cents, Fort Worth; 23 to 25 cents, Denver; and 25 to 27 cents, New Orleans.

Southwest hog markets quickly cleared major supplies at ceiling prices. Top butchers brought \$14-65 per hundred pounds, San Antonio and Fort Worth; \$14-50, Oklahoma City; \$14-30, Wichita and \$14-50, Denver.

Active trading and steady prices ruled most southwest cattle markets last week. Common and medium cows brought 58 to \$12 per hundred pounds, Houston and Ft. Worth; \$9-25 to \$12, San Antonio; \$9-50 to \$12-25, Denver. Medium and good cows sold around \$10-50 to \$13, Oklahoma City.

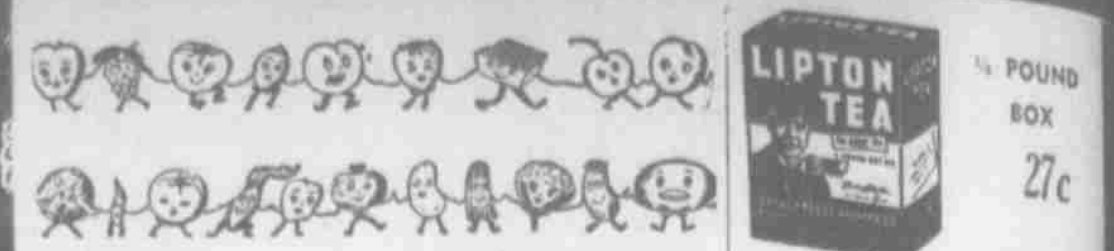
