

The Callahan County Co-Op. purchased the first load of Callahan County wheat Saturday afternoon from J. D. Sprawls of

The pickup load weighed 3,680 pounds. The wheat weighed 61 pounds to the bushel and had a moisture content of 13.7 percent

A. G. Black, Co-Op. manager, said he paid Sprawls a premium price of \$2.25 a bushel for the wheat.

Sprawls harvested about 20 bushels to the acre from his land, Black said. He expects other wheat in the area except that 1875, young Cox moved to having been grazed to make about 10 bushels to the acre.

> Black said there was considerable wheat just south of Putnam that would be harvested in the next few days.

> The first load of wheat in 1953 was brought in by Will Jobe, who farms south of Putnam.

"It is the most serious blow that has been struck against the rights of the states in a matter vitally affecting their authority and welfare.

"The Supreme Court reversed its previous decision directing 'separate but equal' facilities for education of

"Nothing now remains for the Supreme Court to do except to determine the effective date and the method of application of its decision.

Senator Byrd continued, "One of the cruel results arising out of the 'about face' of the Supreme Court is that the Southern states, accepting the validity of the previous decisions, have in recent years expended hundreds of millions of dollars for the construction of new negro school facilities in an effort to comply with the policy previously laid down

by the court. 'Great progress has been made at tremendous cost in their promotion of Mrs. J. W. throughout the Southern states to carry out that which our Southern states government had the right to believe president of TFWC, as a candiwas the law of the land.

The decision will be deplored by millions of Americans; president of General Federation and instead of promoting the education of our children it is my belief it will have the opposite effect in many areas of



Americans are hearty meat eaters. We consume 65, 000,000 pounds of it every day-enough to fill 2,500 railroad refrigerator cars. Our annual per capita consumption is 76 pounds, which is well ahead of most other countries.

Yet there are nations which eat far more meat than we do. To take the extreme example, the average citizen of Argentina, a country whose economy has long been largely based on cattle, puts away 248 pounds of beef




