NASSAU COUNTY, N Y — Acting Police Captain Adam Yulch has taken the dividends out of crime for many a law-breaker. The Nassau police officer, a consultant for the F.B.I. on his specialty, traces criminals through laundry marks on their clothen. For instance, if a thug binds his girl victim with a laundry-marked handkerchief, Yulch can check through his files, compare identification, and usually have the man arrested within a few days.

The recent murder of 6-year-old Susanne Degnan in Chicago hinged in its solution on the question of laundry marks, according to the American Institute of Laundering. The murderer used a handker-chief marked with the name of a man who, it turned out, was innocent. But Yulch usually can "get his man." Even the new invisible laundry marks, now used by some laundryowners, come to life as plainly as neon signs when Yulch puts them under ultra-violet light.

Benefits Being Paid Farmers On 1945 Practices



FROM WASHINGTON, D. C. By Congressman Geo, Mahon

This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, March 9, and will be air-mailed to Texas before 3 p. m. During the war, mail service between West Texas points and Washington, D. C. was quite erratic and undependable. The service is now improving. Regular mail requires about three days, sometimes four, and airmail deliveries are usually made in two

Recently I made some tests on airmail service between Washington and the two towns in our District that have commercial air line service-Lubbock and Big Spring. All of the letters were delivered within two days; a few of them were delivered overnight.

The eight cent air-mail postage rate is too high and, in my opinion, it will be only a matter of months before the rate will be reduced and the service improv-







DON'T WATER FRUIT TREES TOO EARLY

Spring-probably West Texas most fickle season—is in the air. For the fruit grower it is sometimes a disastrous season. We refer to the practice of watering fruit trees. It is a natural inclinution to dig in the soil and turn water on vegetation at the first hint of warm weather.

This watering, however, can in a large measure be responsible for the build-up to later ills of the fruit grower and to a more or less degree affect all other vegetation. This is the opinion of experienced agriculturists.

The first warm days of spring starts sap to rising, and "it will usually rise too fast for the senson in this section. Late freezes are common to this area. Waterng serves to increase and speed this flow of sap, and consequently the plant goes into bud ahead of its normal time.
