

Lesson for September 16

JUDAN'S CONCERN FOR HIS FAMILY

1.ESSON TEXT-General 44 18-24. GOLDEN TEXT-How shall I go up to soy father, and the lad be sat with me? Generals 44-24.

The family is the fundamental unit of society, and is therefore of more importance than the church, the state, or the social order of which it is a vital part. Every force which encourages the breakdown of the sacred relationships of the home and family is set for the destruction of society thack.

Men have too often chosen to go the way of the flesh, and therefore they have disregarded God's plan and purpose. But the home is just as sucred as ever in His sight, and brotherly love still finds a high place among the virtues of real

The family comes before us as we continue the study of Joseph's life. As we study it we bear in mind Joseph's dealings with his brethren, who as yet did not recognize him as the one they had sold into captivity. He was bringing them kindly but definitely to the point of real repent-ance, so that he could show himself gracious to them.

To do so he had brought disaster upon them. Being happily on their way homeward with a new supply of food, they were overtaken and proved to be thieves, and Benjamin, the beloved of their father Jacob, stood condemned to death by their

In that crisis the mouths of the others seemed closed, but Judah, who had really saved Joseph's life (Gen. 37:26, 27), and who had apparently finally come to himself as a man of essential goodness, pleaded

for Benjamin's life. That plea presented a truly sacrificial brotherly love, as he mani-

1. Courage (v. 18). Easy rests the yoke of family life as long as all is joyful and prosperous. But when adversity strikes, when sorrow comes, or sickness, or sin, then the true test of devotion is

It was a brave and manly thing for Judah to stand before the one whom he knew only se the man who was "even as Pharaoh." The circumstances were all against him. He expected the flaming anger of the offended ruler. His brethren had collapsed in despair. It was one of those dark hours which come to every family when someone must demonstrate true love by being strong-hearted and fearless.

II. Intelligence (vv. 19-29). to accomplishing things by the use of words that we are in danger of substituting speech for action. Even in times of sorrow or need we send a well-worsed card or telegram, and regard our mission as accom-

Words have their place, but therecomes a time when they must be coupled with intelligent action. Crises call for more than a cheerful smile or an encouraging word, much as they may mean in such an hour. We must be prepared by our close contact with our loved ones to speak and act with vigor and as-

III. Self-denial (vv. 30-33).

One step deeper goes the devotion of this man to his father and his brother. He had done no wrong that mented punishment, but evidently his brother Benjamin had been guilty. Had he been of the spirit of Cain he would have said, "Am I my brother's keeper?" and let him answer for himself. Why should Judah suffer for another? Why should he allow himself to be imprisoned in a strange land to save his father from sorrow and his brother from what seemed to be the just reward for his deeds?

Thus reasons the man of the world, but such is not the language of the true brother. He says, "Let thy servant abide instead of the lad as a bondman." Well and courageously spoken!

IV. Love (v. 34). Love for father and brother underlies all of the courage, conviction and self-encrince of a man like Judah. In his younger years, and possibly under the influence of his brothers, he had falled in that respect, but now his real devotion to

his brother was evident. That affection was a real, powerful and beautiful thing, and yet it is but a faint prefiguring of the affection of the One who "sticketh closer than a brother," who "though he was rich, yet for your sakes be became poor, that ye through his poyerty might be rich" (Prov. 18:26,

H Cor. B:9) Let us improve the opportunity to review our relations with our own family, to determine whether there is aught that we in intelligent and sourageous self-savrifice should do for our own. Concern for family will pay such dividends, especially in these days of broken homes and disturbed personal relationships, Love will do more than anything size to bold un tegether.

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News

(By Juck Martin) Earl Laneaster, district co-operator, whose farm is in the Conservation Group 42, is a firm believer in proper management of crop residue. On part of the land which he had in combine maize last year he cut the stalks with a stalk cutter immediately after combining. Then, using twenty-eight inch sweeps be plowed out the stalks, plowing just deep enough to kill them. This operation left all of the crop residue on the surface of the soil He left the ground in this conspring. Also it was found that foods ordinarily canned were better than unusual foods. 



Warning Given About Licenses

State police plan to crack down on the 250,000 Texans who have no automobile driver's licenses or whose permits have expired, according to information released Monday to the press by the department.

Saying it was not a matter of revenue or red tape, Director Homer Garrison of the department of public safety announced that a vigorous enforcement campaign would be started to "keep people from being maimed or killed." The deliberately evasive per-

son is likely to be dangerous, either because of known incompetence or, in the case of many new residents and new drivers, ignors ance of Texas safety rules," Garrison said.

"Of those who have expired licenses, probably a considerable number have developed defects or attitudes, or records of traffic vio lation and accident, that gives them cause to fear examination. "Of course most delinquents

are merely lazy or negligent. "But whatever the reason, the impressive facts remain that 15 per cent of drivers cause 85 per eent of collisions, and unlicensed drivers figure in more than a proportionate share of them. As traffic volume and fatalities continue to increase, the citizens obligation to comply with regulaotry measures likewise increases. We are headed for a toll of ten lives lost daily to traffic in Texas, and it will require drastic action to hold the figure that low when post-war traffic gets into
