DINCLAIR LEWIS, who made terms like "Babbitt" and "Main Street" a part of the American language, has a new novel, "Cass Timberlane," which the Book-of-the-Month Club has chosen for October, It is his nineteenth, and is being

heralded as among his best. In other books, the American Business Man, the Social Worker, the Ambitious Doctor have been the victims of Mr. Lewis' own brand of irony. In "Cass Timberlane" he has chosen a more extensive field for his guthless inspection-the institution ofmarriage, particularly as it exists among the more respectable citizens of the Midwestern town, Grand Republic. His conclusions are devastating. This in spite of the fact that the marriage of his hero and heroine, with all its ups and downs, turns out happily.

Cass Timberlane is the town judge, forty-one and considered middleaged by the younger generation. He is quiet in his tastes, dignified, incorruptible. He has had one marriage with a selfish and ambitious beauty, and is apparently being slowly and steadily led into another with a plump, pleasant woman who "understands" him. Then he meets Jinny, who is little more than half his age-and becomes immediately and irrevocably her slave. How Jinny grows up to her husband through the painful process of falling in love with a "heel" (and, incidentally, Cass' best friend), is the gist of Mr. Lewis' story.

From the time he was ten, Sinclair Lewis decided that he wanted

to be a writer. His father, a doctor, would have none of it. Why shouldn't the boy be a doctor like himself, or anyway a teacher? Writers were a bad lot, he said. He'd stay out nights, if he got to be a writer. He'd get to drinking. He'd never make any money. . . . But when "Main Street" came, out in 1920, Dr. Lewis had to admit that his son was making a name for himself.

Sinclair Lewis was, incidentally, the first American novelist to win the Nobel Prize for Literature. In 1926 he had been awarded the

Pulitzer Prize for "Arrowsmith," and he had refused the honor, stating that he did not believe in prizes and that there were other authors more worthy than he to receive it. When, four years later, the Nobel award was announced, Mr. Lewis went to Stockholm for the formal presentation. This was more of a world event than a mere provincial prize-giving, he said,

In the European theatre, the remains of our men who lost their lives on German soll are now being removed to semi-permanent cemeteries in France, Belgium and Holland, Our cemetery at Henri-Chappelle, Belgium, not farm from Auchen and Liege, is the resting place of 17,323 American dead. This is our largest cemetery in Europe.

About two hundred thousand of our brave fighting men of World War II, who gave their lives for this country, rest beneath White crosses overseas. One-fourth of them are in the Pacific area and the others are in Europe. Congress plans to provide at later date to return to the United States the remains of these men for re-interment in national or local cemeteries, in acordance with the wishes of the next of kin.

#### PAPER HOUSES

The Institute of Paper Chemlatry has armounced plans for paper-panel homes to serve for at least temporary emergency shelter. Waste paper is pressed into panels which can be assembled erase pencil marks. into a small one-room house in iess than an hour at a cost of about \$100. Materials will come in a single bundle weighing about half o ton. Of course several of these single-room structures can be put together to form a larger house The paper panels are treated to be fire and weather resistant. Between the strips of chipboard about an inch apart is a curved strip for bracing and insulation. The panels are numbered for sequence in assembly, have cellulose windows, and even have paper shades. The only metal is the flanges.



MAKING THE HOME CHRISTIAN

LESSON TEXT-Lake 18:38-47; I Coristhiers 12:4-12.
GOLDEN TEXT—Love sufferesh long, and is sind —I Corinthians 12:4.

Things do not just happen. It takes praying and planning and real effort to accomplish a worth-while purpose. We are thinking these weeks of the home as a Christian center of influence. We trust that many are asking in their hearts, "What can I do to make my home really Christian?"

The answer is clear. A home will be Christian when those in it are Christian and put their Christianity into daily practice. First, you must be sure of your own salvation and that of the members of your househeld. Then you can proceed to put the principles of godliness to work. Our lesson presents the believing

home as one that is well-balanced, I. Work and Worship (Luke 10:

28-42), No home can be a place of comfort and pleasant fellowship without much work. A disorderly, dirty or run-down house is a disgrace and a discouragement to all that is finest in the relations of those who live in

Home need not be a mansion. It does not have to be righly furnished. but it does need to be clean and orderly. Meals must be made. Cleaning must be done. So far Martha was right, but she went too far. She let the labor of the household hinder her from what she so deeply needed - fellowship, not only

with her family but with the Lord. Now, notice that Mary had not shirked her duty to share the work, Observe the word "also" in verse 39. She had worked, but she also sat at Jesus' feet. She knew when it was time to call a halt to labor and make the most of good comradeship. Blessed wisdom! Would that many burdened housewives would learn of

Jesus made it clear that life in the home is to strike a proper balance between work and worship. If you do not know where to make the division in your home, err on the side of worship. Give that more time than it should have rather than less.

Alas, is it not true that in most homes, even in Christian homes, worship is almost, if not entirely. forgotten! Something should be done about that, Will you do it in your

II. Love and Longsuffering (I Cor.

We are apt to think of love as the warm feeling of interest and emotion which suffures one's nature in not made up of a succession of pleasant incidents, of sunny afterons and moonlit evenings.

Life is real; it is earnest, and often it is drab and irritating. What about such times? Can love meet them? Yes, for love knows how to re longsuffering.

But someone may ask. Does love really work, or is this just a finesounding but obsolete theory? It

Think of the things in life which irritate and depress us. Then put opposite them the qualities of Christian love as given in verses 4 to 7, and you will agree that what this world needs most of all is love.

Remember that talking about love, or reading about it, or studying it in the Sunday school will not make it effective. We must put it into practice. Why not start now? You will be surprised at the results.

III. Promise and Perfection (cv.

Christianity has a hope, and that is not just a vague wishing that something might come to pass; it is g sure hope. In Christ all the rich promise of prophecy, of faith, of hope will come to pass.

The Christian home is the place to teach boys and girls to believe with essurance that He who has begun a good work in us "will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil.

We who see only dimly shall one day see our Lord face to face, and love shall abide through all eternity. Many gifts are only temporary in their usefulness; in fact, almost everything that man makes or does (apart from his service for God) is translent.

Even as vital a matter as prophecy shall one day find its end in fulfillment. Hope shall eventually find its longing expectation satisfied. Faith will be justified in seeing what it has believed. Childish things will be put away by the full-grown man; knowledge will increase

and darkness disappear But love - love it eternal. It never fulls, and will never full. God is love, and God is eternal. From all sternity and unto all eternity love continues. Therefore, we agree with Paul who, in the verse preceding this chapter (I Cor. 12:31) says that while you may covet the best gift, here is the more excellent way.


