



The war has been over more than a year, the country is undergoing a spending boom, employment is at an all-time high, tax revenues are unprecedented for peacetime-and the budget remains unbalanced. There, in a nutshell, is the discouraging fiscal picture as it exists in

We are demonstrating an extraordinary irresponsibility so far as our national credit-on which the credit of every individual and every business must ultimately depend—is concerned. It is true that the President has ordered some reductions in the Federal establishment, and that minor cuts have been made. But almost nothing has been done in the direction of real economy.

This is a suicidal policy for a country with a \$300,000,000,000 public debt. It is a policy whose consequences must be more inflation, more dollar depreciation-and, if it is not checked, ultimate bankruptcy. Government economy now means infinitely more than saving a few million or billion dollars. It means the preservation of our institutions and our way of life.
