Santa Fe Reports On Texas Crops

While little moisture has fallen in northwest Texas during the past month, wheat is looking good and with favorable spring weather could produce a normal crop. Summer fallow wheat, comprising third of the total acreage, i quite promising, but more moisture is badly needed and the sooner it comes the better.

Very little wind damage or whater killing has taken place anywhere in the northwest and acreage abandonment is small, probably less than 5 per cent. Wheat and other small grain elsewhere in the state are in good condition, marred only by reports of considerable green bug activity n the northern section.

Farmers in the northwest have prepared most of their land for spring crops but moisture is necessary before planting time. They plan an increase of 5 to 10 per cent in grain sorghums, and some increase in sudam grass and other feed crops.

Potato planting is underway in this section, with an expected acreage increase of 10 per cent, and sugar beet planting will start early



FROM WASHINGTON, D. C. By Congressman Geo. Mahon

Legislation is in the making which will provide so-called termand leave pay to enlisted men of the Army and Navy. The policy of providing terminal leave pay for officers and denying it to enlisted men cannot be justified. The Miltary Affairs Committee of the House of Representatives is giving onsideration to the proposed legslation, and I expect to vote for he bild when it is considered in

During the war, commissioned officers were allowed "leave" at the rate of 2 1-2 days per month. But many officers, particularly hose overseas, had little chance to take this "leave," and it was permitted to accumulate and the officer was paid for this "leave" at the termination of his active ser-

Enlisted men were allowed certain furlough privileges, but by reason of their service overseas or duties otherwise, they, too, had inadequate opportunity to take the furleughs to which they would ordinarly be entitled.

Under the proposed legislation, the "leave" of the enlisted man would accumulate and would be paid for it in like manner as ofigers are paid for terminal leave, officers and enlisted men being thereby accorded the same treatnent. The proposed legislation involves the checking by the War and Navy Departments of millions f servicemen's records and the expenditure of a targe amount of money, but simple justice demands that such action be taken.

The final draft of the bill proiding federal aid to communities which are interested in airport onstruction is scheduled to pass the Senate this week and go to the President for his signature. The House took final action on the bill several days ago, having passed the bill originally on October 18, 1945.

The bill commits the United States Government to a broad natimal airport development program and the expenditure over a seven-year period of a total of \$500,000,000. The work will be lone on a basis of cooperation with the States and local communitles.

The bill provides that the Fedend Government may contribute not exceeding \$25 per cent of the cost of the land for an airport; the Federal Government would contribute 50 per cent of the cost of construction incident to the development of the airport.

Air transportation will become ncreasingly important throughout

Among the Government Corporations involved are the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, ommodity Credit Corporation. Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, a group of corporations which operate under the Farm Credit Administration, Government corporations which operate in South America in connection with the good neighbor policy, and many others, large or small and of varous types. We are investigating the programs and spending policies of a total of 40 Government Corporations A law enacted last December provides for the first time that Congress undertake to delve into the working of these Corporations and seek thereby to seep a rein on their operations. indications are that we will recommend the liquidation of a number of the Government Corporations and, in some instances, s definite change in policy in

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





FERTILIZER, IRRIGATION HIGHLY DESIRED IN W.T.

LUBBOCK-Analysis of West Texas soils conducted at Texas Technological College shows that the average soil in this area is low in phosphorous and nitrogen, moderately well supplied with potassium while most soils are low in organic matter, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department at Tech.

Fertilizers and irrigation are both highly desired and recommended in the production of most crops in West Texas, Young says.

Irrigation is profitable before planting in the case of both cotton and grain sorghums. For sorghums the general recommendation is one irrigation two or three weeks before planting and one irrigation about the time sorghums are booting. Cotton fields should be irrigated in late March or early April and about two weeks prior to planting. The general practice for alfalfa is irrigation a week before each cutting of hay followed by another irrigation as each cutting is removed.
