Ulte na-Now that the Red Cross drive in Garza county has resigned quota, and the dozen or more good people of Post and its rural communities, who are called upon each year to assist in the campaign as volunteer solicitors, have been told for the last time-until next time-it might be well to check the records and find out why so many ex-service men who served overseas are down on the organization. So many of our returned overseas servicemen have stated: "I wouldn't give a cert to the blonkety, blank Red Cross" ..., there must be a reason, and the cause should be brought to light before this county is called upon to make further contributions to the organization.

We have heard no criticism of the work done by the organization here at home or within the United States. In fact there has been nothing but the highest praise . . . but from overseas comes a different story from the boys who experienced need from the organization. Occasionally we hear an overseas veteran praise the work done by the Red Cross, but more often the veterans decline to comment on the organization, and quite frequently the returned soldier says "to hell with the Rod Cross."

There is enough criticism of the organization to demand a "know, why" by the people who are called upon each year to support it. While the recent campaign called for a quota of about half that of war-time years, \$2,500 is still a lot of money for Garna countring to contribute, and they are at least entitled to know for what the money is being spirith ..., that's why we should check the records and see if we are being called upon to contribute more than is needed by the organization

This settler, an overseas voteran with twenty-two months in the Paritie, cares little for the Red Cross. We think the organization with all its overms of high-paid executives and supercitions conteen girls, does nothing for military personnel that the Army-Navy could not do as well or better with much less expense to the tax-pagers who support both organizations.

To say that the Red Cross is worthless to the nation, and that it does nothing worthwhile for military personnel would be untrue. We feel that the Red Cross did a reasonable amount of good, but we do not think the organization did as much as its publicity writers would lead you to believe through the reams of publicity stories they are writing. We are among those who believe the Red Cross had only a ninor part in bringing victory to the nation. We believe that if the Army-Navy operated the "blood hanks" the people would have co operated just as readily as they did to the Red Cross ..., we saw and found little use for the Red Cross canteens oversess . . . br-r-r-r to most of the woman canteen workers who were sent overseas. If the Army-Navy had operator the canteens with their personnel there would have been as much, if not more patronage given them. Too, we new no reason for Red Cross workers being given military officer's standings and privilence. To the enlisted men they were just a bunch

But unless prices of cars are increased to take care of increased labor coats, the stockholders are due for a major reduction in profits.



Although our service station is not located in downtown Post, we are not without our traffic problems especially on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. At such times, when the joy-riding traffic is rather heavy, a lot of individuals, through haste, carelessness-or just sheer cussedtirely and come sipping through our driveway as if its sole purpose was to provide a shortcut around the corner. Such a practice is dangerous and unlawful, and, while a good percentage of these trespassers seem to be juvenile in appearance, we are firmly convinced that everyone of them is somewhat less than juvenile in mentality. As for ourselves-we're still agile enough to leap out of the way-but there are offen children and old folks coming in and out of the station and rest rooms who might easily be struck by such careless drivers. In fact, the hear to our own family debts is sometimes allowed to visit the station; and though he is constantly admonished to stay clear of the driveways (and such warnings do not weigh very heavily on a two-year-old mind), he would not stand a chance against a would-be speedster, coming through the driveway at forty miles per hour with no intention of applying his brakes. We realize, of course, that a child shouldn't be allowed to visit around a service stationbut ours is We know, also, that children have no business getting out on the driveway-but they do. We realize further that, should any harm of that nature befall our son, it would be against the law for us to shoot the person responsible - but we're going to. We contend that anyone old enough to drive an automobile should have enough sense to observe the rules governing its operation, We shall henceforth regard any individual racing through our driveway as a direct menace to our safety and property; and we shall treat him accordingly.




