Individual cases of profiteering in the sale of canned goods by retail dealers have been discovered by the special agents of the department of justice in Dallas.

A meeting of the executive committee of the democratic national committee will be held at Atlantic City, September 26 and 27, Chairman Cummings announces.

News of successful European flight of a Caproni triplane, equipped with Liberty motors, is made public by D. G. Conti, American representative of the Caproni company.

Honorary membership in the Western Union Employees association, a national organization, was denied Postmaster General Burleson at the first annual conference of the association.

Decision has been reached, according to military authorities, to erect a permanent aviation camp east of Camp Harry Jones, near Douglas, Ariz. Thirty-five buildings will be constructed.

Insurance companies, both life and accident, are considering steps to include in policies a clause invalidating a claim if the insured shall have been injured or killed while riding in an airplane.

Announcement was made at Dallas recently that enlisted men will be permitted to remain at Love field. The government order notifying the men at the field to move to Kellefield, it is said, has been rescinded. There are at this time, more than a hundred enlisted men at the Dallas field.

The Shawnee Indian agency announces that the Shawnee, Pottawatomie, Sac and Fox, Kiowa and Kickapoo Indian school, located two miles east of Shawnee, Okla., was closed. The action was taken after the order was received from the department of the interior that Indians should attend the public schools when possible. The school cared for 125 pupils.

### WASHINGTON—

The industrial situation in Great Britain at the present moment appears far less grave than a few months ago, where there was a threat of a complete upheaval of labor. ### DOMESTIC—

J. R. Brooks of Pilot Point, Texas, has been re-elected president of the Texas association for teaching vocational education.

The city hall and Oklahoma State Bank building and a number of residences at Konawa, Seminole county, were demolished by a cyclone which struck that city recently.

The four brotherhoods, including trainmen, conductors, engineers, and firemen, following a meeting at Los Angeles, voted by a two-thirds majority to return to work at once.

Arthur A. Everetts of Dallas, Texas, has been elected president of the American National Retail Jewelers' association. The convention will be held in Louisville, Ky., next year.

At the beginning of the new fiscal year there was a balance of \$4,682,416 in Texas' general revenue fund, according to a statement prepared by State Treasurer John W. Baker.

R. L. Strime, representative of the national campaign and director of the American Cotton association, will establish headquarters in Dallas, for organizing Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

Problems of the packer and the producer, factors in the fight against the high cost of living being waged by government and state officials, will be the principal subject of discussion when more than three thousand representatives of many nations and provinces meet at Kansas City September 25.

## EPITOMIZED NEWS OF ESPECIAL INTEREST

IMPORTANT NEWS OF THE ENTIRE WEEK REDUCED FOR BUSY READERS.

### BOTH FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC

Carefully Prepared for Those Who Desire to Keep Thoroughly Posted on Events.

#### FOREIGN—

The Italian chamber of deputies has adopted the bill giving Italian women the right of suffrage.

A great deal of curiosity is being evinced by the British public regarding the effect of the reopening of trade with the central European powers.

King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, has decided to surrender all the crown properties in favor of the peasants and for national work for former soldiers.

Confirmation of the occupation of Kiev by the forces of General Denikin, the anti-bolshevik leader in southwestern Russia, has been received by the London war office.

Food prices in London are still rising and nothing in the situation at present promises anything in semblance of relief to the consumer. A four-pound loaf of bread now goes up to 9½d.

Cholera and dysentery are reported to have broken out in Petrograd. Secrecy is maintained regarding the number of cases, but public meetings have been held for the teaching of elementary precautions. There is a lack of medicines and famine threats.

The government of Premier Friedrich has offered to step down and out. It is reported that the premier has offered the entente the resignation of the entire cabinet, his ministry to be succeeded by one under Franz Heinrich, the present minister of commerce.

It is understood that the commission of allied generals sent to Flume to investigate disturbances there in which French soldiers were killed has made recommendations to the

## STOCKMEN FAVOR PACKER REGULATION

TEXAS ASSOCIATION VEHEMENTLY DENIES IT IS OPPOSED TO PASSAGE OF MEASURE.

Washington.—Telegrams have been placed before the senate committee on agriculture tending to disprove the impression given before the committee that the Texas cattle producer was opposed to legislation along the lines of the Kendrick and Kenyon bills. Senator Kendrick offered a telegram from A. B. Roberson, vice president of the cattle raisers' association of Texas, reading:

"From my acquaintance among stockmen and newspaper reports I am convinced that most of those appearing before the committee in opposition to the Kendrick and Kenyon bills are not actual breeders of live stock. The propaganda being sent out by the packers is not creditable even to them. Their strenuous opposition to regulatory measures convinces me that the enactment of some legislation is necessary in order to restore public confidence in the industry and prevent a monopoly of the nation's food supply."

Senator Kendrick received a telegram from P. H. Landergerin of Amarillo, member of the Buyer's and Seller's association, advising that he had telegraphed J. H. Avery, secretary of the organization, not to testify against the bills, as the association favors them.

Mr. Kleberg voiced his opposition to the legislation, venturing the belief that it would be harmful to the cattle industry, and based his opinion upon views from the standpoint of the producer and stated that a regulatory measure will prove impotent.

## NO RACE AGITATION WANTED BY THE NEGROES OF TEXAS

Adopt Resolution Advising Trouble-Makers to Stay Out of Texas.

Austin, Texas.—Resolutions advising agitators who stir up strife between whites and negroes to stay out of Texas, and pleading themselves to help in the enforcement of law and order, were adopted at a mass meeting of negroes and whites held upon call of Dr. L. L. Campbell, negro mediator of the St. John's association. About 2,000 negroes were present.

There seems to be an organized effort springing from somewhere that would array the negroes against the whites of the south, the resolutions state. "The inconsistency of such a course is plainly shown by the northern negro himself, for while he seeks to estrange the whites and the blacks of the south, he takes good pains to stay on friendly terms with the whites of the north."

The resolutions then call the negro's attention to the fact that he lives in the south; that here he must hope for his success and that here he will find plenty of white friends who are ready and able to help an honest and industrious negro.

"That we tender our services to the local and state authorities in allaying this nervousness and uneasiness now existing between the races," was embodied in a resolution.

## PEACE TREATY TEXT GIVEN TO AUSTRIANS

Chancellor Renner, Head of Delegation, Leaves for Vienna With Terms.

Paris.—Chancellor Karl Renner, head of the Austrian peace delegation, has left for Vienna with the peace treaty which was handed to the Austrians recently. He indicated that he would probably ask for an extension of time, as the Austrian general assembly would meet Saturday and Sunday to discuss the terms. The supreme council, it is announced, will extend the time if Austria so requests.

The treaty was presented to the Austrian delegation by Paul Dutasta, general secretary of the peace conference. He also handed them the allied reply to the Austrian counter proposals and a covering letter reiterating that Austria had precipitated the war by an ultimatum unacceptable to Serbia. It was set forth, however, that the allies were willing to assist Austria to adapt herself to her new situation and to admit her in the near future to the league of nations. The treaty was presented in French, English and Italian texts.

No official summary in which territorial changes in the peace treaty has been given, but reports from conference circles from time to time have indicated that several alterations in the original provisions were to be made. It has been declared unofficially, however, that the treaty did not provide for a settlement of the Fiume controversy at present, the inference being that Austria would simply be informed of the territory she would have to relinquish and that the disposition of this territory in certain cases would be left for subsequent adjustment.

## FRANCE OFFERS U. S. PERSHING'S SPECIAL

UNDERSTOOD FRENCH GOVERNMENT IS WILLING TO SEND IT OVER ON REQUEST.

## WAS IN MUCH WAR SERVICE

Three Frenchmen, Including General's Cook, Want to Accompany Train to This Side.

Paris.—The French government is seriously considering the suggestion that the special train which was put at the disposal of General Pershing early in 1918 be presented to the American people as a souvenir of American participation in the war.

The train would be given to the general and shipped to the United States, where General Pershing would then turn it over to the war department. It would be exhibited throughout the United States. General Pershing made his last trip on it the night of Aug. 31, when he left Paris for Brest.

The train comprises eight cars, of five for the general and his aids, stenographers, chief of staff; private car for the general, two cars for officers, dining car, car for enlisted men and one for the clerks guarding the army records and one for the records and baggage.

In addition to its war record, the train has been used by General Pershing on all his European tours, including the recent one to Italy. There are three Frenchmen, one of whom is a cook, who were members of the train staff, who would like to accompany it to America.

## WILSON'S SPEECH-MAKING TOUR IN NORTHWEST

President's Schedule Will Take Him Through States Bordering Canada.

Des Moines, Iowa.—After a day's rest in Des Moines, President Wilson will strike into the northwest for a week of speechmaking there in the interest of the peace treaty.

His schedule for the six days will take him through every state that borders Canada west of the lakes and will end at the Pacific coast, where on

Saturday afternoon he will review the Pacific fleet.

Dr. Grayson, the president's physician, said Mr. Wilson had been much benefited by his Sunday stop and was in good trim for the strenuous week before him. He said he would urge, however, that the president make few rear platform speeches along the way, saving his voice for the eleven scheduled addresses that are to be made before next Sunday.

## INSANE PATIENTS TO BE REMOVED FROM JAILS

All Counties Will Send Their Insane to Asylum at Rusk for Care.

Austin, Texas.—Governor Hobby has sent notification by wire to the county judges of the various counties in Texas notifying them that the east Texas hospital for the insane at Rusk has been completed and patients are now being received. The county judges are instructed to transfer insane patients in the county jails to the new asylum, saying that the institution is prepared to care for patients at the rate of 75 per week.

Statistics gathered by the governor from the various county judges in the state disclose that there are at present confined in the jails a total of 278 insane patients, divided as follows: Ninety-four white men, 49 white women, 71 negro men, 63 negro women and six Mexicans.

## ARMS SMUGGLING ON BORDER IS CHARGED

Former Secret Service Man Says Villa Gets Supplies in This Way.

New York.—Between \$17,000,000 and \$20,000,000 worth of goods are smuggled annually across the Mexican border, more than one fourth of which are arms and ammunition, according to a statement issued by the national association for the protection of American rights in Mexico, quoting Dr. P. B. Altendorf, former member of the United States military intelligence department, as authority.

"Villa smuggles over 60 per cent of his munitions," Dr. Altendorf said. "If that part of his supplies were cut off he would be forced out of business."

Gov. Tom Campbell favors Bryan for the Democratic nomination next year. Just wants to hear Bryan's hock rattle in a fourth race to defeat, we suppose.

The three main planks of the American Party in Texas are opposition to National Prohibition and Woman Suffrage and the League of Nations. The first is settled and the last two likely be before the next election, and then the only thing they will have left is just to kick at existing conditions.

Gov. Hobby says the members of the new American Party are just mad because the whiskey is taken from them. Just a kick at his creators. These men are responsible for Hobby's election as governor, because they elected him lieutenant-governor twice on a ticket with Ferguson. The Governor ought not to feel unkindly towards the men who pulled him out of obscurity and made him governor of the greatest state in the Union, but gratitude does not seem to be considered by William Pinktea Hobby.

Ferguson's Forum, organ of the new American Party claims that 98,000 voters have pledged themselves to support that party's nominees. Unless the Democrats should make the mistake of nominating Hobby for a third term, we do not believe the new party will develop much strength at the general election next year, no matter what strength they may show now; but no one can tell a year ahead what may happen.

If President Wilson had appointed several leading Republican senators on the Peace Commission, does anyone believe there would have been any serious opposition to the treaty? As a part of the treaty making power of our government we never could understand why President Wilson did not appoint a number of Senators from both parties in the Senate, but no use to express regrets now. We still have hopes that the treaty will be ratified, but to say the least of it, the outcome is doubtful.

President Wilson is receiving a hearty welcome on his Western tour in behalf of the treaty, but just what effect this will have upon the opposition in the Senate no one knows. We really doubt if President Wilson helps the cause any when he charges the opposing Senators with ignorance. They are not ignorant, but many of them are blind partisans and think they can help their side by discrediting the President. They do not seem to realize that if they do discredit President Wilson just to that extent they discredit the United States in the eyes

of the world. No matter whether we like or dislike President Wilson personally, he is the President of these United States and we do not see why Republican leaders cannot see the danger of making the ratification of the treaty a party issue, as some of them are trying to do. They can thus defeat the treaty and place our nation in a most unfortunate attitude before the world. They can thus discredit President Wilson but they cannot discredit the head of the nation without discrediting the nation in the estimation of the world. This may cause a greater upheaval in a political way not dreamed of by stand-patters like Lodge, Borah, Reed and Knox. 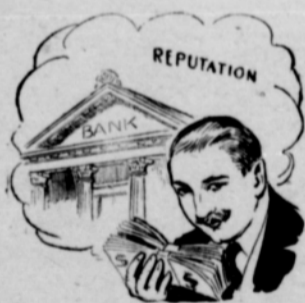

## ANOTHER RAILROAD SOLUTION ADVANCED

COMMISSION TO FIX WAGES AND COMMENSURATE RATES IS SENATOR'S PLAN.

Washington. — Establishment of a governmental commission or board with powers to fix both railroad wage scales and transportation rates, is advocated by Senator Underwood of Alabama, a democratic member of the interstate commerce commission.

Without disclosing whether he favored the interstate commerce commission as the proposed tribunal or discussing the Cummins bill's plan to prohibit strikes and lockouts of employees, Senator Underwood said the interests of the public, of capital, and of railroad employes require such a plan. It is clearly within the right of congress, he declared, to create such an agency to determine wage as well as rates.

"Men will not strike," said the Alabama senator, "against the just decisions of the government. After a fair determination of the controversy by an impartial tribunal, public sentiment will force the contending parties to accept the verdict rendered as final. It must be done in the interest of the men involved, 'the industry of the people, and the peace of the nation.'"

"There is but one way out, in my judgment," he continued, "and that is to appoint a tribunal with the power to adjust these matters, which has the time to consider and opportunity to know the facts. Such a tribunal must not only have the power and be prepared to do what is right and just by the labor employed on the railroads, but must have the power and authority to see that property is not confiscated by its decisions.

"It is essential that the board or commission that is given the power to adjust the wage scale of the men must also have the power to reflect its findings in the rates charged for the transportation of persons and property over the railroads."

## PRESIDENT WILSON STARTS ON SPEECH-MAKING TOUR

Starts His Tour of West and is Warmly Received by Large Crowds Everywhere.

Indianapolis, Ind.—President Wilson arrived in this city Thursday evening and made the second speech on his trip through the west in behalf of the league of nations.

He was escorted to the coliseum at the state fair grounds by a committee which included Gov. James P. Goodrich, Mayor Charles T. Jewett of Indianapolis; Thomas Taggart, former Governor Samuel L. Ralston, and Franklin McCrary, president of the Indiana branch of the league to enforce peace. Thousands of persons, including many visitors to the state fair, crowded the streets and cheered lustily as the president passed.

Before a crowd that filled to overflowing the fair grounds coliseum, with a seating capacity of 16,000, President Wilson made a forceful plea in behalf of the league of nations.

James P. Goodrich, republican governor of Indiana, in a brief address welcoming the president, said everyone wanted a better understanding among the nations; but that every true American citizen also favored a strong nationalism. He pleaded for all parties to lay aside partisanship in deciding the issues of the peace treaty.

## NEW PACIFIC FLEET IS FORMALLY REVIEWED

Forty-Two Battleships Make Naval Spectacle in San Francisco Bay

San Francisco, Cal.—A flag-flung covenant of protection, 42 gray giants of the American navy, steamed from their anchorage off Bolinas bay, north of San Francisco, and, piloted personally by Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander in chief, swept through the Golden Gate and passed the famous old battleship Oregon, the reviewing ship in a marine spectacle which thrilled a multitude of spectators. It was the review here of the new Pacific fleet before Secretary of the Navy Daniels and other national, state and municipal officials. In addition to those in the review, a train of nine supply and fuel ships later entered the harbor and cast anchor.

From every hill and structure overlooking the broad sweep of the harbor, countless thousands had gathered since early morning to view the pageant. Not since May, 1908, when the Atlantic fleet visited this port on its tour of the world, had San Francisco been spectator to a naval review.
