It's a kindergarten, one qualified to give something approximating first grade work to children whose sixth birthdays fall in October and November. just late enough to have them incligible to enter the public school. These six-year-old children present real problems, many parents tell me; particularly those who are large for their ages and normally healthy. Their friends are getting a year ahead of them in school, they will be the biggest children in a class of younger children when they do get started. and they are also a problem at home. Their parents would gladly pay a tuition fee to get them in school, many of them tell me.

The need for a kindergarten, however, is a simple problem compared with our other needs. This town has been recognized by the State Health Department as being badly in need of a hospital and it has been published the Associated Press that Post has a top priority for fedgral aid on such a project.

Since publication of this news, almost a year ago, the Chamber of Commerce has been studying the situation and is now in a position to push the project if sufficient public interest is shown.



#### **Best Portion Of** Cropland Is That Which Washes Off

The cream of the cropland goes first, when land is washed or blown away, says Will Wright, chairman of the Garza County Agricultural Conservation Committee. It is the top few inches of soil that usually hold the humus and fertility which produces crops. In most soils Ralls Sunday with Mr. and Mrs. the deeper we go the less humus and fertility.

A heavy rain on a cultivated field where the soil is unprotected breaks up the surface soil and the finer and lighter particles are carried away with the water that runs off, the chairman explains. This finer and lighter material is the humus and fine particles of soil that hold most of the fertility. The coarser sand and gravel that settle back on the first are the least fertile.

The action of wind is about the same. The lighter and finer particles are carried away while the coarser particles and less fertile soil remains.

This emphasizes the importance of holding the top-soil. Damage by gullies and "washes"

is more spectacular but the most widespread damage, says the chairman, is that done by sheet erosion that "skims the cream" off the land.

Evidence of sheet erosion are found in the muddy water that runs off during the storm and in the pock-marked field with its little hummocks of soil which were protected during the storm by pebbles or leaves and which stang up above the rest of the soil after the storm is over.





#### Old Vegetables **Should Be Taken** Out Of Garden

Gardeners should take advantage of the mid-summer moisture. If old vegetables have not been high time to do so, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. and M. College. The old rows can be used for the new plantings in the next few

After the old vegetables have been removed-roots and allapply two or three pounds of 5commercial fertilizer for every 100 feet or row space, stirring the soil to a depth of four or five inches. Mix the fertilizer thoroughly with the soil so that there will not be any possibility of damage to the germinating

This is a good time to get collards in the ground. The Georgia variety is an old stanby which grows best in the east and southeast sections of Texas. Sow seed at the rate of six to eight per foot and cover them with about an inch of soil. By placing a few old boards over the planted area, says Rosborough, the soil will be kept cool and the loss of moisture reduced. The seed will sprout sooner, too,

When the young plants begin to show up, remove the planks. Should the weather become dry and hot during late July, it will be necessary to give the young plants a good watering every week or ten days. By late August the collard plants will be large enough to be thinned to two feet apart in the row - and plants that are removed may be transplanted to: adjacent rows.

Now is a good time to plant seed for fall tomatoes, Rosborough says. The Stokesdale variety for large slices or the Porter variety for small fruit are recommended. Plant the seed in single rows, care for them as in a small plant bed, and thin them in 30 or 40 days to a spacing of three feet apart. Additional rows may be set from the plants which are removed from the original rows.

The alert gardener should take advantage of favorable moisture in the soil, and prepare rows for planting of Irish potatoes, turnips, radishes, onions from sets and other garden plants which will be started in late August or early September. By preparing the soil now, it can be kept in a loose, workable condition so that with the coming of fall showers, planting can done immediately.

A few hours in early morning or late evening given over to the garden at this time of year will mean plenty of early fall vege-tables and make you the garden leader in your neighborhood or community, says Rosborough.

Eggs should be gathered several times duced as soon as possible. All eggs should be held below 68 degrees F.; higher temperatures break down the egg rapidly.

As a matter of fact, says Beanblossom, quality may be lower in eggs after three days of improper handling than in eggs which have been properly stored for as long as six months.

Quality egg rules for the flock owner include: Keep hens in the laying house until late afternoon on rainy days; put ample clean nesting material in the nests; remove broody heas from nests; remove male birds from the flock; cover dropping pit with wire; gather eggs three to cleaned from the garden, it's five times a day; cool eggs promptly after gathering and store them in a cool place.

For business firms: Handle eggs carefully; store eggs in good cases with clean flats and fillers; keep eggs at proper refrigeration and away from strong odors.

For the housewife: Keep eggs in clean containers, under refrigeration in the hot summer months and away from other foods which have strong odors


