Both Good And Bad

The map shows that 70 years is the life expectance of the plains soil.

In the Barnum Springs Community and around Post, the soil is mostly shallow clay, one to three feet deep with a two to eight per cent slope. The soil loss per year is .12 of an inch. The loss of seven inches will lower its ability to produce by one capability class. The life expectancy of this soil is 58 years.

In the Grassburr area, the soil is deep shinnery sand, three to four feet deep, with a topping of red sandy ciay loam and a slope of one to three per cent. The soil loss is 10 inches a year and, at present, 40 per cent is non-productive. According to Soil Conservation technicians, all the soil in this area will be gone in 15 years if some conservation measures are not put into practice,






