Transportation Of School Kids **Is Big Business**

Public school busses travel Texas roads a distance equal to 2,160 een in progress at the Baptist trips around the world every nine months. The 6,074 busses which transported 346,051 pupils a disedist church presented a pageant tance of 54,000,000 miles during the 1946-47 school year.

That transportation of school children is a big business was pointed out recently by Charles H. Tennyson, public relations director of the Texas State Teachers

During the 1946-47 school year there were 6,074 busses driven by 5.750 men and women, They were paid approximately \$3,000,000 for their services.

While 238,821 of the pupils are attending schools receiving supplemental support from the state in the form of equalization funds, 107,230 are in districts which receive no additional help from the J. A total of 230 of the state's 254 ecunties have school districts which own and operate their own school busses, he said.

"The development of the public school transportation system is the result of the public's demand for better educational facilities for their children," Tennyson emphasized. "Should Texas ever get a good rural road system, our schools will improve proportionately. Many of our schools with their present inadequate teaching and physical facilities will then have modern efficient school systems for the youngsters of the state. Frozen Foods Are Easy To Cook And **Most Appealing**

Frozen foods are becoming very popular with homemakers because according to Mrs. Jewell H. Strasner, Garza County home demonstration agent.

They are so simple to prepare they appeal to beginning cooks letter: and business women who have a limited time for cooking. If the following simple rules in preparing frozen foods are followed, good products will result.

Do not re-freeze frozen fruits erce they have been thawed.

If partial packages of frozen fruits or vegetables are to be used, used portion, and keep frozen until it can be used.

Add frozen vegetables to brisky boiling, salted water. Do not defrost (except corn on cob). Begin counting time when boiling begins again after frozen vegetables have been added.

Cooking time varies with varlety and maturity of vegetable. size of pleces and method of preparation. Less water may be needed if heavy utensils and controlled heat are used. Finally, watch cooking time

carefully. Freezing weakens the cell walls, and it is easy to overcook vegetables. Mrs. Strasner says the 10 to

"I know that you and your committeemen realize the impertance of conservation, but I Lelieve you could better understand the importance of this work if you could see what I see here almost every day. As you know this country has been in cultivation for several thousand years. divide the package, rewrap un- A large part of the acrage which was cultivated several hundred years ago is not being cultivated today simply because there is no soil to cultivate. It has all washed away. In many places in this country six to eight feet of soil has been removed through erosion. Many of the hillsides that once produced good crops are day. washed down to rock. Many thousands of acres of land have been completely ruined by erosion.

"I am sure Greece would have no trouble producing ample supplies of food to support the population today if the fertility of the Monday. soil had been maintained to a reasonable extent. People are suffering in this part of the world because of the neglect of the past generations in the proper care of the soil. It is not too much to say Mr. and Mrs. Fred Babb and that people are starving in these parts because of erosion. On many is scarce and very valuable here.

Dollar Saves Life "I was interested in the statement of Secretary Anderson, that is, for every 10c spent on conser-

vation we receive \$1 in return. I believe we might go further than this and say that for every dollar spent on conservation we may save one person from starving. This statement may seem strange to you and your farmers but if you had seen what I have you would agree with me.

"I have been watching with much interest a place near here where a fellow built a farm with a shovel on the side of a gully. He did the work soon after I come here and he has a beautiful wheat crop growing now, about ready to head. He doesn't have over 1-10 of an acre but it looks as if he may make two bushels of wheat. Two bushels of wheat here is lots or food for one family.

It Could Happen

"I hope that we Americans will not practice the ain of neglect in servation as has been done here. We have a large amount of good soil yet in our country. It will support many more people than we have in the U.S., but if neglected we will soon reach the point where it will be difficult to grow sufficient food for our people. Being one, along with the rest of you, responsible for the proper administration of the conservation program provided by our Congress, I want to make sure that I fulfill my responsibility in getting the maximum conservation for the funds provided. I do not want Saint Peter to call me up a few hundred years from now and point to a situation such as I see here and find me guilty of the Sin of Neglect. I do not want reople to starve to death because we failed to carry out a responsibility that is so important.

"Good soil is Life. Without it man will die. We must protect our soils at all cost. If our nation is to remain strong we must maintain a fertile soil. Poor soil treeds communism. Human beings hungry and ill-clothed will follow most anyone who offers a promise of more food and clothes. I do not believe over 5 per cent of the guerrillas here are communist. Most of them have been poorly clothed and fed during the past few years and they are easily led by the 5 per cent who ere communist. The best weapon a country has is good soil on which plenty of food and fiber

Saucepan Canning With Pressure Is **Explained Here**

If the pressure saucepan meets certain requirements, and if correct processing times, which have been scientifically tested, are used, then the pressure saucepan can ecome a valuable addition to your canning, according to Mrs. Jewell H. Strasner, Garza County home demonstration agent.

The question of using the pressure saucepan for canning has been brought up by many homemakers and two specialists of the USDA's Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics in on the answer. Their report has been published recently.

Be sure that the saucepan is tall enough to hold pint jars on a rack with the cover locked in place, and that there is a guage water. which allows pressure to be con-Mrs. Strasner says.



Diphtheria Death Can Be Prevented By Immunization

It is a tragedy that Texas parents continue to ollow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, who says "It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization, they need not have diphtheria."

Dr. Cox said that it is amazing that this disease should be allowed to take its toll of young lives when it can be entirely stamped cut by proper immunization. Yet in a single week, 33 cases were reported in this state this month.

"Babies should be immunized to the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the nced of one. Children who have never been immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.

Regardless of its grade or quality, an egg is one of nature's side that shell is found high quality protein, tron, vitamin A, two vitamins and some vitamin D.

An egg in one of the top quality grades-AA or A-has a large amount of firm white and a round, upstanding yetk. Eggs of these grades are preferred for peaching frying and boiling in the shell. grees. Grade B eggs have thinner whites and somewhat flatter yolks, but are just as good for scrambling, baking and other cooking purpos-

Many families find it pays to my grade B eggs for general cocking because they offer the same food vafue, yet may cost 10 to 12 cents a dozen sess than grade A quality eggs of the same weight. At any rate, Mrs. Strasner says, it pays to read the label on the carton of eggs and figure the cost iri relation to the grade, which means the quality and size. The purpose for which eggs are to be used will have an influence on the grade to be bought.

D. when the Saracen hordes overran Asia Minor and much of the southern part of Europe, These nomadic people fired with a fanatical zeal to displace Christianity with the Moslem faith, had no love for the iand. Their herds of goats, sheep, herses, and camels devoured all green vegetation. Without this natural protection, the fertile soil weshed away. The beautiful Jorcan became clogged with clay. All visitors to Palestine now came back with the same gloomy picture of barren, rocky hills, and scanty vegetation. The soil, which produced the wealth to build the Temple and Solomon's Palace, no longer clothes the Jordan Hills.

The fate that betell Canaan has been repeated over and over by meny civilizations of the past. Babylon, Carthage, Syria, and Rome, neglected to protect their natural inheritance of fertile soil. It can be stated as an axiom that no great civilization can be created or maintained without a good fertile soil to support it.







Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family, Keep flies away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that cutside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of files. Infections from this source can be picked up by flies and spread to human beings through contact wan food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried.

Eliminate all breeding places for Cles and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary ill-

The chemical 2.4-D should not be stored in buildings where seeds, fertilizers or insectives are handled because there is a very good chance the 2.4-D will ruin it.

A committee of research and extension workers, crop growers and chemical manufacturers appointed by Dr. R. D. Lewis, director of the Texas A. & M. College Agricultural Experiment Station, has issued the following warnings on the use of 2,4-D:

1. It is not a good idea to use 2,4-D in the dust form because it sex. may drift several miles onto field c ops or gardens.

2. If a good strong wind is blowing, even the spray form is da ngerous

3. Be sure your equipment is in good condition before you start. 4. Use a separate sprayer for 2,4-D; it is hard to thoroughly clean 2.4-D out of a sprayer.

5. Pressures below 75 pounds per square inch for your ground sprayers, and the nozzles producing coarse sprays are the best.

6. When using planes for spraying, don't get closer than half a mile to susceptible crops downwind. Don't spray when wind is blowing more than 3 miles per

7. Employ only pilots who know their business. (See No. 6)

8. Esters evaporate quicker than other forms of 2,4-D. These fumes cen cause quite a bit of damage, so it's best not to use them.

9. If you can prevent the drifting of sprays, dust and fumes, you will save many of your crops which would otherwise be damaged.

10. Talk it over with your county agent or other men who know about the best times to use 2,4-D. Don't overdose your crops.




