





Soil technicians saw land list ed where large clods were thrown on the ridge. For several years the bollworm has been showing up in cotton in Garza County and other South Plains Counties, Last year a semi-quarantine was ordered for Garza and some other countles of this area, and this year a rigid quarantine, ordered by State Department of Agriculture Commissioner J. E. McDonald went into effect on Novem-







### **Abilene Reporter Publisher Dies Sunday Evening**

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in Abilene for Marshall Bernard Hanks. publisher of the Abilene Reporter News who died late Sunday

Hanks' sudden death terminated an outstanding career in Texas journalism. He had climbed the ladder all the way-from carrier boy to publisher, ownership or part ownership of a dozen Texas newspapers and radio

late Dr. R. T. Hanks, Bernard Hanks was born in Dallas September 19, 1844. He started working for the Abilene paper when he was 8 years old.

He attended Simmons College, now Hardin-Simmons University. Abilene, and Baylor University in Waco, then he went back to Abilene, into the newspaper

For more than 35 years, he was publisher of the Reporter News, directing its growth from 1.000 at 34,000 circulation.

With Houston Harte, publisher of the San Angelo Standard Times, he was associated in the ownership of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times: Big Spring Daily Herald: Paris Evening News Marshall News Messengek and the Denison Herald. Harte and Hanks also owned partly or wholly radio stations in Paris Abilene, Big Spring, Corpus Christi and Wichita Falls.

### **Governor Urges Travel Safety During Holiday**

With this slogan as its spearhead, the Texas Safety Association Saturday took Governor Jester's campaign against holiday traffic deaths to the far corners of the state.

The Association asked the 41 statewide organizations support ing its traffic safety program to spread the word that there can less than the expected 85 deaths and 2,500 injuries between Dec. 23 and Jan. 1 "if individual Texans will assume the responsibility for making it so."

Governor Jester said the Department of Public Safety has predicted 230 deaths and 6,000 injuries for December. In the two days before Christmas, the prediction said, 30 will be killed and nine hundred injured.

The Safety Association aiscreached out to thousands of industrial workers with a safety message to its 1,600 member firms, and to other thousands of Texans with an appeal to churches to emphasize the holiday danger.

Service clubs were asked to devote three minutes of their programs next week to pointing up the dangers of holiday traffic. Business and trade organizations were asked to emphasize the need for extra driving and walking caution.

The Governor addressed an appeal for action to college and university presidents and school superintendents, asking them to alert students to the hazards of Christmas travel.

In a letter to chiefs of police the Governor expressed confidence that diligent enforcement efforts will be effective in reduc-





