It is a simple test and one conservation-minded farm leader used it to determine how much soil was being lost. After a terrific rain, the river was swirling with thick dark mud. The farmer filled a gallon bottle with the muddy water. A test showed that each 15 gallons of water carried a pound of soil. Measurements of the river flow showed that on the basis of this sample, 276.182.010 pounds of soil had been carried down the river every hour. Two days of that would have scraped off six inches of soil from 4,416 acres. The top soil on many farms is not more than six inches deep.

What is 4,416 acres of good top soil worth? According to Will Wright, chairman of the Garza County Agricultural Conservation Committee, the answer to that question determines the tices which hold the soil to the

Hairy Vetch, Rye **Fall By Ranchers**

The Duck Creek Soil Conservacooperators have made plans to plant about 300 acres of a mixture of hairy vetch and rye

r a winter cover crop. Hairy vetch is a winter leg ume, which adds nitrogen and aproves the soil fertility, much the same as cowpeas. Unlike cowpeas, vetch makes its growth during fall, winter and spring. Vetch does best planted with rye at the rate of 10 pounds of vetch seed to 20 pounds of rye seed per acre.

There are three "musts" that describe the requirements to successfully grow vetch, the soil technicians say:

1. Vetch must be planted early in September in a moist seed

2. Vetch seed must be innoculated with fresh innoculant at planting time. 3. Phosphate fertilizer must be

used, if the soil is low in phos-Vetch is a new crop for this area. It makes a good legume asture, helps protect the soil from wind and water erosion.

Avoid Labor Disputes

Any claimant for unemployment insurance who is directly participating in, or lending financial assistance to a labor dispute is not considered available for work. Further, a claimant may be disqualified. This means his insurance may be denied him, either in full or partially for the following reasons

If he quit his last job without good cause; or if he was discharged for misconduct, or if he refuses suitable work when offered him by the TEC. Naturally when a worker gets a new job. his payments stop. A claimant may be disqualified and held ineligible to receive unemployment of payments at the same time. One is a momentary deduction, the other a suspension of payments for a certain length of time.

Status Can Change

In case an individual is applying for or drawing old-age pension insurance he must meet certain requirements. For instance, monthly payments may be suspended or denied under such circumstances as: divorce or remariage in the case of adults: adoption or marriage in the case of children. 

Pasture Lice Show Proper Management

The presence of pasture lice indicates that the pasture is being properly managed, say tech-nicians of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District.

Hundreds and, perhaps thousands of kinds of organisms make up the animal life in the soil, they explain. Organisms too small to see with the naked eye help change mineral forms available to plants. Soil organisms are largely dependent on organic material for their food.

Pasture lice are termites which feed only on dead plant organic material. Normally there is enough decay of plant roots to supply their need for food. They come to the surface only when tood gets short in the ground.





Chlorine Smell Is Assurance Of Purified Water there will be no school this com-

Chlorine, in powder form, has been used in the water for a number of years but it was not noticable here because the "home-made" equipment used for injecting it was not adequate found by Mr. Billings, who is to impart enough at one time to result in a residual by the time

Residual is the free chlorine above the amount consumed by the water. The water consumes the amount needed to purify it. Whenever all of the chlorine is consumed, there is no taste or odor because there is no residual. Whenever there is a taste or odor, water users may know that the water is 100 per cent

The higher residual, noticeable for the first time this summer, results from the new Chlorinator which the Community Public Service Company installed at the source of supply last spring. It uses chlorine in a gas form, and it is the type of chlorinator recommended by the State Board of Health.


Chlorine is now used in almost all water systems as a protection against typhoid fever and other diseases which may/ be obtained from impure drinking water.

I see in the Post Dispatch that there is to be an election in four Garza County school districts August 21 for the purpose of feeling the people's pulse on the subject of consolidating the Barrum Springs, Hartford and Cross Roads School Districts with the Post Independent School District.

The proposed consolidation was requested in petitions to the county judge by a number of residents of each of the four districts. -

This is something that should have been done a number of years ago, as the Post schools began educating the children from the smaller, schoolless communities.

If the people vote for this consolidation, they will automatic ally put some badly needed school funds into the operation of the schools that undertake to educate all these children.

It is a step in the right direc-

Lots of folks want to see the Garza County school setup improved. Now is a good time to start such improvement. Voting for the consolidation wi! result in better facilities for the children of four school districts. This is a worthwhile start.

The Post Independent School Board is launching an improvement program that won't quit, as long as the people not only support them but stay in there behind them, PUSHING.

Bids will be let in in the near future for the construction of a badly needed school cafeteria here. This is a major step in the right direction.

There is SO MUCH that needs like we are beginning to accomplish some of them.

When I hear from the parents that the toilet facilities are in good repair and are being kept clean in the grade school. I will know for sure that things are picking up.

I haven't seen a complete list of 1948-49 school teachers and, if I had a list I wouldn't know some of the teachers and so what I am about to say next can't possibly apply to the teachers that have been hired for the 1948-49 term.

But, the teacher shortage isn't nearly what it used to be and it will be less and less of a probiem during the next few years as more and more veterans finish up their college work. SO, now is the time to decide

WHAT TYPE of teachers we want in our public schools and encourage the powers that be to find them, if possible, for the 1949-50 term and all the school terms, thereafter,

In order to keep the best type of teachers we, ourselves, have to be ideal patrons. Many a good teacher has resigned from a school because of the parents.

This year the parents should put themselves on a spot and reform all of their shortcomings, so that the kind of teachers they want the following year will be willing to stay. This is the first step in acquiring good teachers.

So here are a few don'ts and do's for parents to prac-tice on this year's teachers, whoever they may be:

DO treat the teacher like you rould your best friend, rather han like a saint or an out-ofthis-world character. Teachers are as human as parents, moreo in some cases.
