Garza County a population of 8,400, an increase of a little more than 33.5 per cent over the 1950 population figure of 6,281.

The TEC estimates of population in Garza and 131 other counties were released by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which serves the 132-county region.

The population table distributed by the WTCC shows that Garza County (then unorganized) had a population of 185 in 1900, 1,995 in 1910, 4,253 in 1929, 5,586 in 1930, and 5,678 in 1940.

The TEC 1950 population estimates for adjoining counties show Dickens County, 6,500; Kent County, 2,435; Lynn County, 10,850; Crosby County, 11,050; Scurry County, 27,500.

The new plates are exactly opposite in color this year from the 1958 tags, being white with black numerals and letters.

Feb. 1 is the usual date for beginning of license tag sales, but it falls on Sunday this year and sales will begin Feb. 2.

allout membership drive in the near future to raise funds for an even busier budget in the activity field for 1959 than it had in 1958

Directors and committee heads discovered in a budget planning session the other night that there are almost unlimited promotional projects available for the Chamber this year-providing the organization has the money and membership to get the job done.

The tentative budget discussed at the informal planning session was a real eye-opener in that approximately half of the funds would go into project activities. Housekeeping activities—the cost of running an office and hiring help—usually takes up a good 75 per cent of any Chamber budget.

A real push is desired this year in the retail promotional field-certainly a healthy sign. The Christmas promotion is going to be even bigger and better. There is a big new agricultural project under discussion and other new ideas.

But it all takes money and the active support of every local business. A vigorous, busy Chamber of Commerce is a good business investment

In 1958, the Chamber budget was raised with the idea of hiring a fulltime, professional Chamber manager if enough money were raised. The campaign fell short of that goal, but provided enough additional funds for a greatly expanded activities schedule.

This year the Chamber directors are aiming their year at expanding these activities without employment of a professional manager fulltime.

If present plans for an organized membership drive go through every business in Post will be contacted and the Chamber plan explained so the businessman will understand what is go-

It is hoped the smaller Chamber members this year will see fit to enlarge their membership contributions in view of the success of the 1958 activities program.

1958 was a year in which the Chamber stepped out. Business men now have a good idea of what can be accomplished. We should be ready to give our support more enthusiastically and in larger measure.-JC

There's poll tax to be paid, income tax to file, automobile license to buy, and a host of other contingencies waiting in line for us.

But, leaving the others aside, let's look at the poll tax situation.

A goodly number of us believe in the poll tax, and many of us don't. But who cares whether we believe in it or not, it's the law. Whose law? Well, we certainly can't complain about that. It's our law; we made it. Did you ever stop to think that, perhaps, if more people had voted there would be no poll tax? After all, what's the differ-

A long time ago only the men were considered the voters. Then along came women's suffrage and suddenly they were voting too. So, as it stands now, both male and female vote. That's about the size of it, and as long as they are both voters they should vote.

What makes a perfect representation in our governing bodies is for every eligible voter to vote. Obviously, this never happens. Not even every qualified voter votes. That old attitudebadly worn at the edges-of "What difference can my one little vote make?" is stronger than we

The people run America from the precinct to the national level, just as a group of stockholders run a corporation. If we don't like the laws that our legislative bodies formulate and pass, then it's up to us to get the right representatives in there to make the laws we want passed.

So, pay your poll tax and vote. And you men see to it that your wives have a poll tax. And, remember, time is short; it runs out Jan. 31.-CD

Census takers might be the answer

The annual scholastic census under way here this month won't be much of a success unless a majority of the children who will be starting to school for the first time next September are enumerated

Sunt R. T. Smith save compiling census information on students already in school hasn't been much of a chore, since blanks were sent home by the students for their parents to sign and return. In a few cases, this procedure caught some of the children who will start their first term of school next September-but not many.

There are a number of families in the Post Independent School District in which the oldest child is not yet in school. Parents of these children who will be six years old on or before Sept. 1. 1959, are asked to call at one of the three principal's offices and furnish the census informa-
