## C. of C. good business investment

Post's Chamber of Commerce is planning an all-out membership drive in the near future to raise funds for an even busier budget in the activity field for 1959 than it had in 1958.

Directors and committee heads discovered in a budget planning session the other night that there are almost unlimited promotional projects available for the Chamber this year—providing the organization has the money and membership to get the job done.

The tentative budget discussed at the informal planning session was a real eye-opener in that approximately half of the funds would go into project activities. Housekeeping activities—the cost of running an office and hiring help—usually takes up a good 75 per cent of any Chamber budget. A real push is desired this year in the retail promotional field—certainly a healthy sign. The Christmas promotion is going to be even bigger and better. There is a big new agricultural project under discussion and other new ideas.

But it all takes money and the active support of every local business. A vigorous, busy Chamber of Commerce is a good business investment

for every local business man.

In 1958, the Chamber budget was raised with the idea of hiring a fulltime, professional Chamber manager if enough money were raised. The campaign fell short of that goal, but provided enough additional funds for a greatly expanded activities schedule.

This year the Chamber directors are aiming their year at expanding these activities without employment of a professional manager fulltime. If present plans for an organized membership drive go through every business in Post will be contacted and the Chamber plan explained so the businessman will understand what is going to be offered.

It is hoped the smaller Chamber members this year will see fit to enlarge their membership contributions in view of the success of the 1958 activities program.

1958 was a year in which the Chamber stepped out. Business men now have a good idea of what can be accomplished. We should be ready to give our support more enthusiastically and in larger measure.—JC

A new sport sedan is making its debut today at Caprock Chevrolet Co. 111 South Broadway. The car is in the Bel Air series and was inspired by universal admiration for the distinctive 1959

"hardtop" styling introduced exclusively as an Impala sport sedan. The Bel Air model makes available the same sportive appearance at a more moderate price.

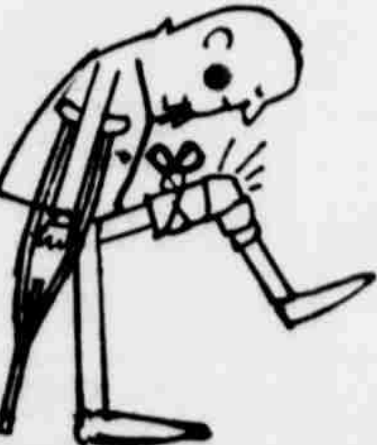

**AN UTTER DISREGARD OF TRAFFIC LAWS**

Dear Editor: As the chairman of the Civic Improvements Committee, I am wondering what has happened to our high-powered one-man city police force?

The thought prompting this remark was caused by an incident which occurred Thursday, Jan. 15. On this date, from 11:30 a. m. until 12:15 p. m., a young man drove a car continuously through the business district of Post, disregarding all traffic laws, ignoring traffic lights, and seemed to be wantonly and arrogantly defying law enforcement. The horn on the car was continuously blowing the entire time.

I personally made an effort to contact our one-man police force, or the sheriff, even called the mayor, but none of these men could be located by phone. To my knowledge the potential murderer on wheels was never apprehended. Is it any wonder that we have utter and malicious disregard for law enforcement in our fair city?

To begin the new year in Post, to my way of thinking, nothing is more vital than the city em-

ploying a full-time police department. This can be done if the city authorities want it. I understand that the present city government is planning to put it to a vote in the April election, to be decided by the people at the polls, whether they think a police force necessary.

This is all well and good, but it has been intimated that propaganda will be spread that a tax raise will be necessary to support a police department in Post. I sincerely trust that the eligible voters in our good town will not be fooled by such propaganda, because it has been pointed out to the city council that we can have a city law enforcement department without it costing the taxpayers one single dime.

I am sure that I express the sentiments of every member of our committee when I say that I sincerely trust some favorable action will be taken to give our good town adequate law enforcement before it is too late.

The Civic Improvements Committee will have its first 1959 meeting in the near future to make further plans for city law enforcement.

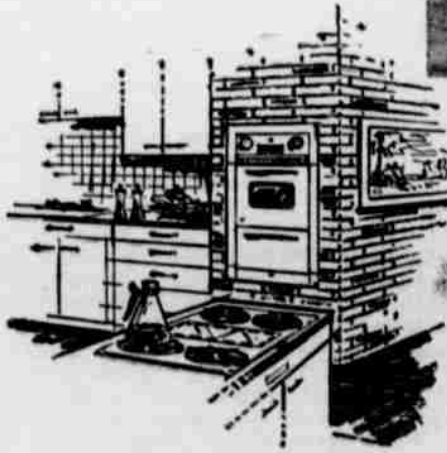
