Farmers Urged To Apply Now For Chiseling

Mr. Claude E. Spence, chairman Garza County Production and Marketing committee urges farm operators in Garza county who wish to carry out the practices of deep chiseling or deep plowing to call at the Garza County PMA office and make application for assistance on these practices before the work is begun. It has been necessary to limit the amount of assistance received on deep chiseling to one-fourth of the operator's cropland. The amount of assistance on the practice of deep chiseling is limited to one-fourth of the operator's cropland, not to exceed \$500 per operator.

Robert J. (Buddy) McGinnis, an oil field welder, was killed instantly when his pickup overturned a mile south of town on the Snyder highway Thursday afternoon. Hudman Funeral home prepared the body for burial before shipping it to Settegast-Kopf funeral home in Houston where a service was conducted Sunday. McGinnis was born April 26, 1911. He and his wife and their 14 year old son, Tommy, had lived here more than a year. He was a member of a state championship softball team when a resident of Houston. It was understood by local friends that his teammates were to be pallbearers. Survivors other than the wife and son are his mother, Mrs. Minnie Josephine Porter of Houston and a sister, Mrs. H. W. Schmidt of Post.

Total of 9550 Bales Is Record Since 1947 Here

Garza county gins have processed just under 10,000 bales of cotton up to this week, a record for this time for the past three years. In 1947, 10,861 bales had been ginned by the last week in November. In 1948, only 3527 were processed by this time and last year's total was 9131, compared with 9550 for this season. While cotton is still coming into the gins plentifully, one manager expects to have the main part finished by the end of this week and another by the end of next. Graham has ginned more than any other gin this season, with a total of 2275 bales up until yesterday morning. This is an increase of 669 over last week. Grades are lower now that the farmers are gathering with machines. Bill McMahon, manager, reports, but the cotton is coming faster every day. "There are usually 1000 bales on the lot by 7 o'clock at night," he said. McMahon estimated he would be virtually through in one more week. Cotton at Southland is grading out one grade lower, gin officials said. Total ginnings for the season are 2240 bales. This is an increase of 775 bales over last week. This week is expected to finish the season there. Cotton coming into the Close City gin, which processed 484 bales this week, continues to be of good grade. Season total is 1775. Three hundred fifty-seven bales were ginned at Storie gin in the Garnolia community this week, making a full total of 794. Farmers are using machines and the grade is falling, testing out middling, spot light, full spot, and strict low spot with a seven-eighths staple. Only 236 bales were ginned by Planters in Post this week. This brings the season total to 1564. The grade is not as good as it has been. C. M. Murphy, manager, reports, with a few tinges. It is low middling and strict low middling in grade. Cotton is coming to the gin at the rate of 100 bales daily. Cotton is now coming in good at Pleasant Valley where 912 bales have been ginned this season, 192 this week.

LAST MINUTE AP... Korean Bulletins:

Another lull was in progress according to radio reports this morning in fighting in Korea. Speculation was rife as to whether the Reds were merely regrouping or were planning a diplomatic play. Hard fighting flank forces today had checked the attempt by Chinese Communist hordes to trap the withdrawing U. S. 8th Army in northwest Korea. An abrupt and strange quiet fell over the wintry front. In a speech last night Secretary of State Dean Acheson said Communist aggression had put world peace in "unparalleled danger," and that history shows the United States will fight if it must to preserve freedom and justice. President Truman was concerned with the colder war in Europe and asked Congress for \$38 million to aid famine stricken Yugoslavia and widen Tito's breach with Russia.

Oil News Is Slow and Discouraging Here With No Show of Oil or Gas on Swenson

Oil news is slow and discouraging in Garza county this week with no show of oil or gas developing on a drillstem test in the Cisco lime stringer at the Continental Oil company's No. 2 Swenson in northeast Garza. Twenty miles northeast of Post, the operators are drilling ahead in the Pennsylvanian, below 6122 feet. The test recovered only 30 feet of drilling mud in a one hour attempt from 5944 to 5962 feet. The formation was previously reported as a reef, but since the operation went on down in shale, it proved to be only a stringer. In southeast Garza county, 10 miles southeast of Post, Kerr-McGee Oil Industries No. 1 Cranel was drilling in Pennsylvanian lime and shale at 6897 feet when last reported. Prospects in Lynn county continue to be plugged and abandoned, with Placid Oil company being one of the latest to quit. Its No. 1 Holland, found barren in Strawn lime. Total depth was 8012 feet. Plans to deepen the venture to granite did not materialize. Originally a shallow failure by W. E. Dunigan of Midland, this venture was reentered after it had been plugged and abandoned at 4197 feet. Location is northeast Lynn county.

November Freezes Cost Cotton Crop 1000 Bales Here

Early November freezes were estimated to have cost the Garza county cotton crop 1000 bales, K. N. Clapp, area representative of Anderson, Clayton and company, Houston cotton firm, says. Late cotton was still maturing when the freeze hit and the drought caused much of the cotton to be planted late this year. Clapp's survey indicates that Garza, Lubbock, Dawson and Gaines suffered less than other South Plains counties. On Nov. 1, he estimated a 15,000 bale crop for Garza; on Nov. 28, he cut his estimate to 14,000.

and sold out here, renting out their house. Then they moved to Amarillo. After staying there awhile, the family returned to Post. Then they had to rent the two front rooms of Mell Pearce's house. They could not get into their own house for sometime. Later they moved to Snyder where they stayed five years on a Dr. Towle's farm. Before Mr. Wade died in 1942 the family moved back to Post. Willburn and Tommy, the younger boys, were in the service during the war. Willburn was in the Navy and Tommy in the Army. Now Willburn is on the West Coast and Tommy is in Ohio. Mrs. Wade's oldest son, N. H., lives in Camado, N. M. Her only daughter, Mrs. R. C. Beard, lives in Houston. **Seven Grandchildren** Mrs. Wade has seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Although she is past 70, Mrs. Wade has never accepted the old age pension, she points out. After her husband died, she bought and paid for her present home, with the aid of her children. Now she rents rooms and apartments for her livelihood. For company, she has two dogs and three birds. One bird she has had for nine years, one for three, and the third was brought to her from Houston by her daughter, last year.

She reads a great deal, most-ly the Bible—"I have worn out occasionally visits her friends.

oldest boy helped lay the water and sewer lines here. He preached in churches all around here—at Southland, Ragtown, Justiceburg and the Calvary Baptist church here. An arbor was built in the 300 block on South Washington street and covered with cotton bagging. All denominations used it for protracted meetings. Many cottage prayer meetings were held at the Wade home. Mr. Wade was a soldier during the Spanish-American war. At the St. Louis World's Fair, he was a member of the honor guard for Jeff Davis, then governor of Arkansas, Mrs. Wade said. When the Wades came to Post, there were no houses next to the railroad. The next street was just building and was so crowded, it was called Jam Road. Mrs. Wade recalls. Since moving to Post, the Wades moved away and returned numbers of times. They left first for Itasca, from there they went to Waxahachie, then to Knox City and then to Waco. In Waco, they adopted their son, Tommy. When Wade was pastor at Maybelle, the late Frank Tillman, father of Floyd Tillman, was a deacon in his church. Mr. Wade's health broke and the doctors advised his return to this area. The two younger boys went to school here. They lived in the second house north of the old Postex hotel. The Wades put their membership in the First Baptist church and it went to work in the mill.

The oldest boy wanted to be a railroad mechanic, Mrs. Wade relates, so he and his father went to Sweetwater to see about getting on with the railway company there. They told him to go to Amarillo, so they came home

He had to travel by bus, boat, rail, airplane and dogsled to reach the cold Arctic coast area where the reindeer herds feed on reindeer moss in the snow. Carothers had to sleep on the snow after he lassoed the reindeer. This year's trip alone required seven weeks.

Each year a reindeer sheds those huge antlers—and promptly grows a new set. They grow at the rate of a half an inch a day, and in 90 days a reindeer will have grown himself a brand-new set of horns. Up in the Arctic the reindeer use those antlers for snow plows, to push drifts out of their way.

It's natural, Carothers says, for a reindeer to breathe with his mouth open and tongue lolled out, like a dog, when he's pulling a sleigh. The antlered natives of the Far North have been equipped by nature for life in the Arctic. Hair protects the ends of their noses, between their hooves and all parts of their bodies.

Uncle Sam is mighty particular about reindeer, and that's why it took Carothers two years to arrange to bring the first ones out. The Eskimos are particular, too, but now they know Carothers and Santa will take good care of the reindeer while they are in Texas.

Their native food is a lichen called reindeer moss, but down here they fare just fine on breakfast food. Rolled oats, that is, with a little mixed grain and a little peanut hay.

Eskimos help Carothers round up and train the wild reindeer to work in harness hitched to a sled. Sometimes they're teamed up with sled dogs at first, until they get used to harness. Then they're allowed to pull a sled by themselves, and finally they learn to draw Santa's bright sleigh.

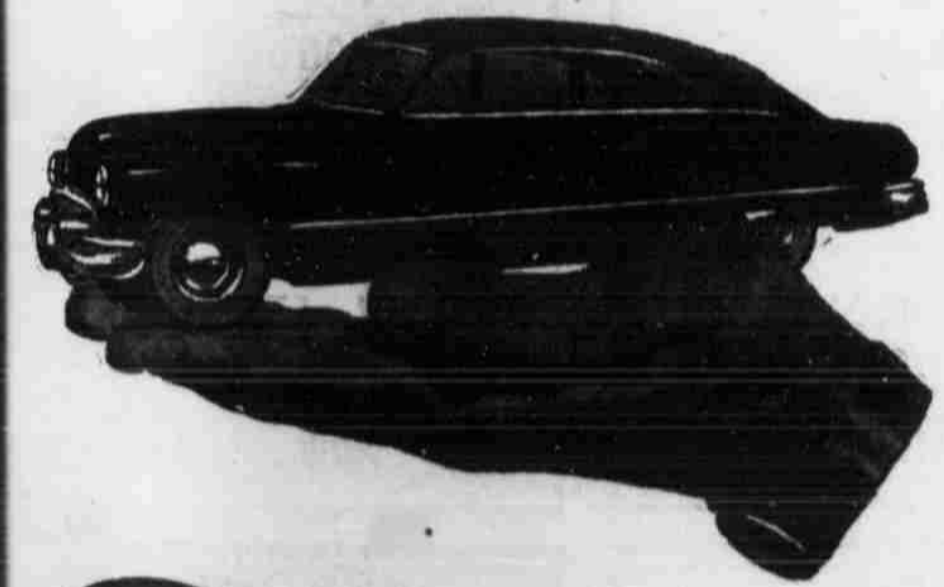

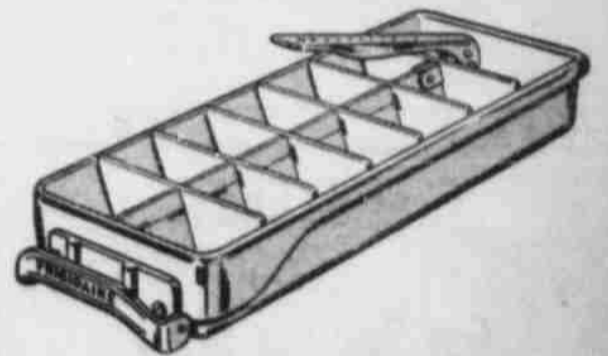

Swine To Compete for \$12,755 in Prizes at Fort Worth Stock Show

Swine will compete for \$12,755 in awards at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Jan. 26 through Feb. 4 in Fort Worth. This total includes \$2,040 for the boys' pig show and \$645 for the Negro boys' pig show. In the open competition premiums offered amount to \$10,070. Seven breeds of swine will show in the breeding classes—Berkshire, Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, O. I. C., Poland China and Spotted Poland China.

In each breed, the judges will name the senior fall boar pig, junior fall boar pig, senior fall sow pig, junior fall sow pig, champion boar, champion sow, reserve champion boar, reserve champion sow, get of sire, produce of dam and breeder feeder litter.

The seven breeds also will be shown in the fat classes where prizes will go to barrows, 190-220 pounds; barrows, 221-250 pounds; barrows, 251-280 pounds; pen of three barrows in each of these weight divisions; champion and reserve champion barrow and champion pen. There will also be eight awards for truckload of 10 market pigs, barrows or gilts, any breed, 190-210 pounds, owned by exhibitor.

The champion and reserve champion barrow of the open show will be chosen and like champions will be named in the boys' show and then from the top winners will be named the grand champion and reserve grand champion of the entire show. Grand champion pen and reserve grand champion pen also will be named.

The prize money given by the Stock show will be increased by awards from breed associations; Chester White Record association \$95; Hampshire Swine Registry \$275; O. I. C. Swine Breeders association \$200; Poland China Record association \$150; United Duroc Record association \$180.

Deadline for swine entries is Dec. 15. Barrows will be weighed and sifted beginning at 8:30 a. m. Jan. 28. Any barrow weighing under 185 or over 285 pounds will be considered sifted. Barrows in single classes also may be shown in pens of three but only as the property of the original exhibitor. An exhibitor may have three entries in any single class and two groups in any group class but can place in the money only two hogs in and single class and one group in any group class.
