Resigns As Chairman **Of** County Rationing Board

Ralph Ashlock tendered his resignation as Chairman of the County Rationing Board to Mark McGee, Friday of last week.

Mr. Ashlock says that while he regrets to resign from this position, feeling that it is the duty of everyone to do their bit in helping to win the war, he finds it is necessary to do so due to the increase in the rationing he does not have time to attend to The work has his own business. increased rapidly since Dec. 1st and they have not had sufficient clerical help to keep the work up.

On Wednesday of last week Mr. Ashlock said 75 persons called at his office with questions in regard to the rationing of tires, tubes and gasoline. He says that practically every question could have been asked and answered on a penny post card--thus saving time, gasoline and rubber.

On Cotton Announced

Released by Sam A. Billingsley, Administrative Officer, Callahan Co. Cotton farmers will receive loans at 90 percent of parity on this year's cotton crop, according to J. L. Farmer, Chairman Calalhan County ACA Committee. Based on 15-16 middling, loans will be made on all growths of Up-

land cotton during the 1943-44 marketing season which begins August' 1, 1843.

Purpose of announcing the program at this early date is to give produce the longer staples needed in wartime, and thus take advantage of the increased rates offered for the longer staples.

In addition to receiving increased rates for longer staples, grading be given special consideration on essential farming materials and labor and considereation from draft boards type of food and fiber needed the war program. In urging Texas farmers to plant or increase production of such cot-According to present estimates, the The extended date will benefit cotton stapling one to 1-3-32 will be The carry-over of all grades and staples of Upland cotton will be about 85 percent of total needs, while the carry-over of cotton stapling less than one inch will exceed requirements by 25 percent. Farmers who shift from shorter to longer staples and maintain their grade will profit under the new program but premiums will be discounted sharply if there is a decrease in grade, Middling 1-1-4 inch and longer will be 1,035 points above the base for middling 15-16 inch cotton but the same staple length cotton grading strict low middling to good ordinary will vary from 665 points to -460 points, respectively. 




