Texas Tech Choir, On 1,500-Mile Tour, Includes Former Post High Students

Four Post students at Texas Technological College are members of the college choir which left Monday on a tour which will take the group of 60 persons more than 1,500 miles. The four choir members from here are Jack Ballentine, Shirley Jackson, Billie Ticer and Claudia Ticer. On Monday, members of the group sang two concerts in Big Spring. Tuesday, they sang two concerts in the morning, one at the Junior High school in San Angelo, and one for the Kiwanis Club there, and then moved to Odessa for an evening performance in the high school. Wednesday, the choir was in Crane for a morning program, and in Midland for a night concert. Today, they are to be heard in two concerts, one in Monahan and one in Wink. Directed by Dr. Gene Hemmle, the choir is singing music from the Baroque and Romantic periods, spirituals and songs of today's idiom. Counted as part of the Tech Choir, but in actuality a separate group, the Madrigal Singers and a combo six musicians also are making the tour. The Madrigal Singers are presenting early English madrigals, as well as some more modern numbers.

Tech Student Union Building Opens Soon

LUBBOCK, April 2—The public will get its first view of Texas Tech's new Student Union Building Sunday, April 12. The building, valued at more than a half-million dollars, will be open for inspection from 2 to 6 p. m. No formal program has been planned. Like the other main buildings on the campus, the Student Union Building conforms to the Spanish Renaissance architecture theme in its exterior, but the interior is plush and modern.

First, there is "Your Social Security," covering, in a general way, all the major provisions of the law. In addition, there are booklets on "Self-Employment," "Household Employment," "Regular Farm Employees," "Soldiers and Sailors and Social Security," and "After 15 Years," a report on old-age and survivors insurance. Other publications include "An Easy Way to Estimate Social Security Payments," and one describing the changes in the Social Security law made in 1952. These pamphlets are free to employees, and in limited quantities they may be secured free at the nearest social security office.

TIPS FROM YOUR COUNTY AGENT

Shopping for women's gresses can prove an exasperating experience as there are no standards to guide in making selections, each woman must determine her own needs and judgment in dress selections.

Here are a few points that will help in judging a dress. Style is very important. A conservative dress of the latest fashion that will be in vogue more than one season is always a good buy.

The fit of the dress is of utmost importance. There are no standard sizes for ready-to-wear, each manufacturer sets his own, so the only way to know if a dress will fit is to try it on. A good fit is one that brings out the best lines of the design and affords comfort for the wearer and ease for service.

Another suggestion for good buying is careful consideration and evaluation of the dress. Is the dress cut on the true line of the fabric? Does it have enough fullness of cut to avoid pull and wear? Are the seams at least one-half inch wide with stitches short enough to prevent spreading? Are buttonholes closely stitched with threads firmly fastened? Buttons sewed on firmly and individually? Is the zipper concealed? Is the hem cleanly finished with edge turned and stitched, or in the case of a non-washable fabric, finished with tape? Are the materials in all findings washable?

The label should tell the home-maker whether the fabric is washable and information about shrinkage and color fastness, ironing temperature and finishes.

The shopper should realize that she cannot get all features in a low or medium priced dress. She will have to make her own decision as to desirable and suitable features to get the most personal pleasure in feeling well groomed in her dress.

Garza 4-H Members To Share In National Center

Garza County's more than 250 4-H Club members, leaders, agents and friends are sharing in plans for a National 4-H Club Center in Washington, D. C. According to G. G. Gibson, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the idea of a National 4-H Club Center is not new, but is reaching a long dreamed of stage with the purchase of a college site in Chevy Chase, Md., where the National 4-H Club Foundation of America will have headquarters. Each club member in Texas and the other 48 states, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and Alaska, will have a share in the Center by contributing ten cents each.

"Since 4-H club work is an important part of the Cooperative Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture and the Land Grant College, it is natural that the idea of the Center has widespread endorsement by agricultural leaders interested in youth," Director Gibson says. "The 4-H camp and other national events usually held in Washington will be housed at the Center, and it will be available for activities where facilities and opportunities are needed for research and training in citizenship and leadership."

Cal Johnson, Sears Roebuck Foundation, represents the friends of 4-H club work on the committee.

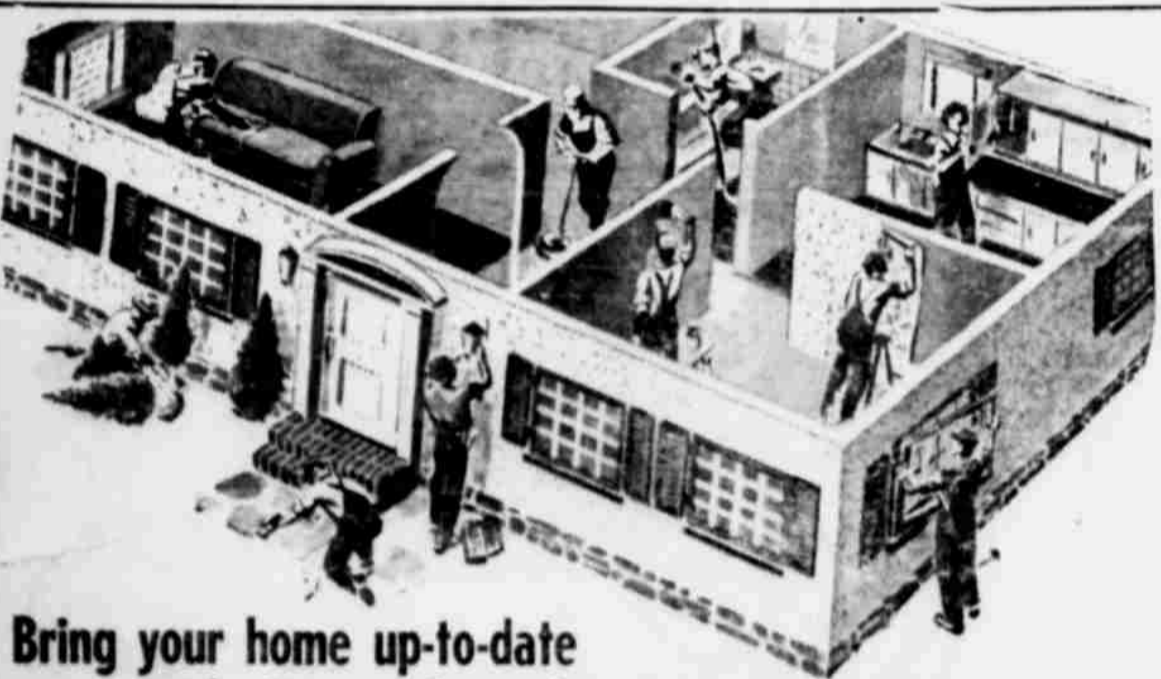

2,498 Traffic Deaths Are Counted In 1952

AUSTIN, March 26—Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today released the State's final traffic fatality figure for 1952.

Complete tabulation of motor vehicle accidents for last year show that 2,498 persons were killed, according to Garrison. This is 48 below the figure for 1951 and sets the death rate at 7.0, the lowest point since the creation of the State Department of Public Safety in 1935. The death rate is based on the number of fatalities per 100 million motor vehicle miles traveled. The national death rate for 1952 was pegged at 7.3 by the National Safety Council.

"This means," said Garrison, "that for the first time Texas fared a little better than the national average."

Total number of accidents was up some 31,000 over the preceding year and the estimated economic loss from traffic accidents was set at over \$154 million, up \$21 million dollars over 1951.
