# Early start on bad checks

Sheriff Carl Rains is justified in asking that his office not be made a collecting agency for had checks

Last week, the sheriff had a sizeable stack of had checks on his desk which had been turned over to him for collection or prosecution of the

Cold checks, hot checks and forged checks come under the heading of law enforcement, of course, but it is one of those cases where an counce of prevention not only is worth a pound of cure, but also enables the sheriff to devote his time to other law enforcement duties.

The best way to handle the bad check situation, the sheriff says, is for merchants and other businessmen to require positive identifica-

tion before cashing a check given by someone not known to them, and to use common sense in cashing checks given by people whom they know or suspect of being hot or cold check artists.

The sheriff isn't the only county or city official troubled by the periodical rash of bad checks. The county attorney and city law enforcement officers also "catch it."

This year, the bad cheek outbreak seems to be starting a few months earlier than usual. That may mean a heavier-than-usual outbreak during the harvest months.

Caution on the part of businessmen won't stop it altogether, of course, but it'll certainly help to slow it down.-CD,

# Hard work going by boards

We've seen it here in Post and it is evident everywhere in these days and times we see fewer and fewer young people dedicated to a schedule of hard work. The reason is simple-we have more money or mom and pop have more.

As a result, many young people today work a five-day week (what they consider work) or maybe a five-and-a-half day week, without ever hurrying too much or worrying about the ser-

vice they are giving, or the dollars they might be missing, etc.

Nothing can or will be done to harden the routine of the "post-war darlings" as of now. Money and jobs are plentiful. But we are soft, and the people of Russia are hardened and hungry and harder working. Throughout history the hungrier people have sooner or later taken over from the complacent, soft and self-satisfied. There is a lesson here, very plain to see.

# Let's hope it doesn't happen

Take it from a country boy-one far removed from the international hotspots, but who tries to keep up with what is going oo-the next global war isn't going to be child's play, not by any means. Let's hope it doesn't happen.

It takes a hopelessly naive person to indoctrinate himself with the idea that the next war will be fought along the same lines as the last one. There'll be no resemblance.

Before you jump to the conclusion that we've been watching too many science-fiction plays on TV, let us assure you that we have not, but that

we've seen one or two superbly presented dramas having to do with the next war and its aftermath that every person would have done well to watch-and heed. We'll grant you that these plays were far-fetched in spots, but basically they presented a warning-whether intentional or notthat we'd do well to heed.

This is the atomic age, remember, and the next global war isn't going to be fought by horse and buggy methods, nor even by Model T nor Model A methods. It is going to be one that staggers the imagination even trying to think what it will be like,-CD.

# How will it finally work out

If the new Texas Election Law hadn't changed things, right now the political candidates would be heading down the home stretch toward the first primary election. As it is, both the first and second primaries have been held and it is nearly five months until the general election in

We've heard arguments from both sides as to whether or not setting up the primary elections by something like two and a half months was a wine thing to do. In the final enalysis, it'll more than likely turn out that it was.

For one thing, the change got the primary elections out of way before the heat of mid-summer. It also affords party leaders throughout the state more time to marshal forces for the upcoming national conventions and presidential campaigns, which, however, come along only once every four years.

The earlier primary election dates cut down considerably on the size of the absentee vote, which saved county clerks and election officials throughout the state considerable time. When the primaries were held in July and August, many voters were away on vacation trips, and most school teachers also found it necessary to vote

We'll probably have to wait until well after the general election and then take a backward look at how things turned out before being able to say whether it was better to hold the primaries in May and June, as this year, or in July and August, as in the past.--CD.





# **Excessive speed** cause of most rural accidents

AUSTIN-"Excessive speed was the principal cause-factor in 53 per cent of every rural fatal traf-fic accident in Texas during 1959

J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, stated this fact today as he sought public support for the Slow Down and Live program being conducted throughout the state between now and Labor Day.

"Excessive speed does not neessarily mean violating a speed law," Musick said. "But, is driving at any speed which is too fast or conditions—such as may exist because of heavy traffic, rain storms, a mechanically poor car.

The safety expert said that one of the objectives of the Slow Down and Live campaign is to encourage people to maintain an even and prudent speed that will reduce congestion and danger by an even flow of traffic.

He said that this calls for the elimination of any speed-too fast or too slow-that disrupts the orderly movement of traffic

"It is important the public realize the dangers of improper speed, understand the speed laws, the meaning of speed signs and above all, how to adjust their speeds to conditions of driver, vehicle, weather and roadway, Musick said. "A bit of commer sense goes a long way in traffic safety. Every driver on the road must accept his responsibility and remember to drive safely."

PLANT PATHOLOGIST'S PREDICTION

# Heavy summer rains will pose problem of cotton root rot

high. This prediction comes from Dr. Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist. He bases it on the amount of disease carry-over in the soil from last year, and the late cotton crop. The disease occurs in all areas of the state except the Panhandle, High Plains and sandy soils of East Texas.

It is known that the disease fungus is carried over in the form of seed bodies or sclerotia. A minimum of 25 to 30 of these sclerotia per cubic foot of soil are necessary to cause disease. Due to the large amount of root rot the past two years, a high count of clerotia are present in all infested soils, according to Smith.

When cotton roots grow close to the sclerotia in moist soil, the seed bodies of the fungus germinate and attack the cotton root Within a few days large patches of dead cotton apear.

The disease is nearly always more damaging on late than on early cotton. Early cotton is more likely to escape some of the dam-

Smith advises growers to start planning preventive measures immediately for the 1961 cotton crop. Deep plowing, 10 to 14 inches deep, with a mold board or disc type plow is recommended. In a areas, because of the type of sub-soil, this will not be possible




