### Running for office isn't easy

The rush of candidates to file for city and school district boards the past couple of weeks is a good indication of public interest in local

And that is all to the good.

The same thing had manifest itself earlier in the county races for sheriff and county commis-

It shows that people are taking more interest in local affairs and local problems. For the community, that is a welcome sign.

An interested, alert community is usually the progressive get-it-done type of town.

Running for public office isn't easy for most folks. Everybody hates to lose and in political races there have to be losers. This negative aspect deters many would-be candidates.

The Post Ministerial Alliance and the Amity Study Club have indicated that they are going to give each candidate ample opportunity to tell the public where he or she stands on the local problems concerning the office to which he or she

In selecting officeholders, the public needs to select the person most qualified for the job. It isn't-or at least it shouldr t be-a popularity con-

The public needs to know the thinking of their candidates and see how candidates come to grips with problems they would be called upon to face

If somebody is to represent us, he or she must represent the community thinking on the problems at hand

In the weeks ahead, here is one suggestion for the voter. Psychologically, we all are too inclined to vote against something or somebody, rather than to vote for something or somebody.

If we want our candidates to stand for things, we must vote for-and not against. If we vote only against things, the candidate who says the least and takes no stands has the best chance, be-

cause in doing nothing be infuriates no voters. To put it simple, if we are to ask the best of our candidates we also must ask the best from

## Ball rolling on city hall building

Early plans for improvement of the city tract calling in experts on the expansion and imhall building and other municipal quarters are taking shape, an account of which will be found elsewhere in this issue of The Dispatch,

The latest development in these preliminary plans was the visit of an architect the first of the week to look over the present city hall, fire station and the expansion property purchased by the city just west of the city hall.

City officials have estimated that for a maximum of some \$20,000 the present city hall can be renovated, with incorporation of the new property into the present structure included. This renovation would include a larger fire department, a larger city hall, more room for the water department and a general remodeling.

Post is going to need an out-and-out new city hall and other municipal buildings, including a fire station. That day, it appears, and the means of financing such a project are some years away. In the meantime, however, any renovation and remodeling project should be made a good one and not something on

He suggests that a nominal reward be paid "for information leading to the arrest and con-

viction" of burglars. "A few solid convictions," he said, "would do more than anything else to

It stands to reason that in most of our breakins someone not directly involved knows who did it. There is a good chance of such a person coming across with some pertinent information if there is a promise of a reward.

We're always glad to "air" the suggestions of any law-abiding citizen who thinks he might have an answer to our law enforcement problem -particularly a citizen who has himself been the victim of lawlessness.--CD,



Since work on only about one-eighth of the site was completed, there's no telling how many more relics would have been found if it had been possible to excavate the entire work area.
