Smith and Fluitt, who saw only limited action against Ralls because of injuries, are expected to wear top shape for the Plains game.

The doubtful list for Friday night's game are Bill Blacklock, Ronnie Little and Ronald Storie, all of whom missed the opening game because of injuries.

The Antelope squad is being put through fast-action drills this week

to iron out first-game mistakes showing up in their 20-6 victory over Ralls.

"Generally, we are well pleased with the boys' showing, but they made lots of mistakes, both offensively and defensively, that we are working on this week," Teal said. "We were especially well pleased with their hustle and the way they hit," he added.

"If we expect to beat Plains, we're going to have to do better than we did against Ralls," Teal said. "They have a faster team and a more experienced one than the Jackrabbits showed us here Friday night."

Eight of the Plains boys expected to start are seniors.

Crane, a pre-season pick to win its district with ease, had to kick a field goal with less than a minute remaining in the first half Friday night to go home with a victory.

Three times, Plains held the vaunted Crane offense inside the 20, stopping them once on the five-yard line. Crane was on the Cowboys' 13 when the game ended.

20 to 6! First opening victory since '56

Antelopes open with win over Jackrabbits

The football season opened on a new and happy note for the Post Antelopes Friday night when they defeated the Ralls Jackrabbits, 20 to 6, for their first opening game victory since 1956.

The Antelopes, looking better than they have in an opening game for at least 10 years, sent several hundred Post fans home happy and eagerly looking forward to this Friday night's game against the tough Plains Cowboys.

It's early yet, but under a new head coach Harold Teal it looks as if it might be the first winning season for the Antelopes since 1956, when they won six and lost four.

As if in league with the first Post opening game victory in six years, rain began falling just before the kickoff. It was the first rain to threaten a football game here in many years, but it let up in time for the fans to settle back and enjoy the game.

And the fans did.

Coach Teal's young gridders made his head coaching debut a successful one with a grinding ground attack and an effective aerial assault against a Ralls team that outweighed them by 10 pounds to a man.

After penalties and the game's only fumble had halted two Post scoring drives in the first quarter, the Jackrabbits scored 10 minutes and 35 seconds deep in the second quarter after guard Donny Moore had blocked quarterback Pat Cornell's punt on the Antelope 40.

Ralls scored in 10 plays with fullback Elvin Verett tearing big chunks of yardage out of a Post line that had held like a stone wall throughout the first quarter and most of the second.

From the 40, the Jackrabbits made a first down on the 20 in three running plays, with a 12-yard gainer by Verett the biggest thrust.

Four plays later, they had another first down on the six. Halfback Ernest Esparza hit center for three, Verett plowed for two, and halfback Eugene Deering barreled through the right side of the line for one and the touchdown. End Gary Daniel's extra point try from placement was blocked, and Ralls led 6-0 with 4:25 remaining in the half.

It took the Antelopes less than two minutes to tie the score.

Fullback Benny Owen returned the short kickoff from his 30 to the Post 46, and the Antelopes marched the distance in just five plays, aided by two unnecessary roughness penalties against the defenders.

On the first play after Owen's kickoff return, halfback Ken Rankin, Post's leading ground-gainer for the night, went for seven yards and Ralls drew the first of two 15-yard penalties on the drive.

After Owen got only one at the center of a stiffening Ralls line and fullback Freddie Simmons gained four at end, Cornell picked up two on a keeper, and the Jackrabbits drew a 15-yard penalty to the 10. Rankin swept right end for the touchdown.

Rankin's run for the extra points was successful, but the Antelopes were penalized 15 yards for holding. Cornell elected to pass to end Ronald Storie for the EP's, and pass interference was ruled against

There was more than usual for Post fans to cheer about Friday night, not the least of which was the large number of boys suited out for the game. All of them played except Ricky Little, who was still bothered with blisters. Fullback Delton Robinson, center Bill Blacklock and halfback Ronald Storie were not suited out. Blacklock and Storie were nursing injuries and Robinson won't be eligible until the Morton game on Sept. 21.

The longest running gain of the night for Post came in the second quarter when alternate halfback James Mitchell racked up 25 yards the only time he carried the ball.

It was strictly a team victory, but defensive standouts included co-captains Buddy Moreland and Jerry Bush in the line, along with Billy Shumard, Frankie Gary, Pat Sullivan, Nichols and defensive lineman Freddie Simmons.

The pass receiving of sophomore Ronald Simpson, who snagged four of the five aimed at him, was another bright spot.

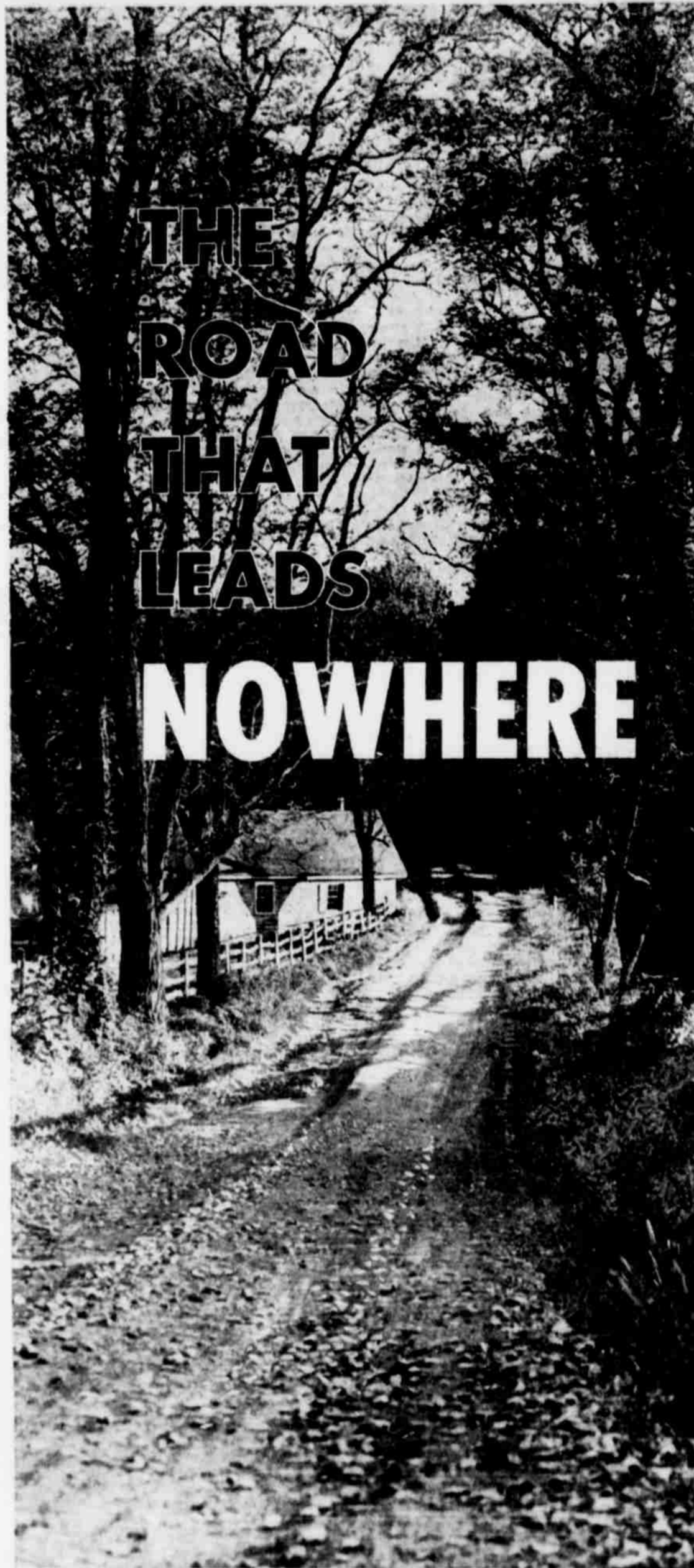

Let's help swell the total!

More than 100 million people throughout the world have been given the Sabin oral polio vaccine with satisfactory results reported. Millions of doses have been given in the United States. Residents of Post and Garza Counties are asked to help swell these imposing figures by availing themselves of the opportunity here this weekend to take the first dose of the three separate oral vaccines against all three types of poliovirus.

In the mass immunization at the Postex Mills Friday and at the school cafeteria here Sunday, we are concerned only, of course, with the Type I vaccine. The second and third doses—Types II and III—will be given in October and December, according to present plans.

It is wise to take the oral vaccine. If it wasn't we wouldn't be hearing about all the mass immunizations already held, being held, and to be held throughout the United States and in every corner of the world.

Taking the vaccine will increase our protection and help us protect other persons in the community.

The administering of the vaccine is absolutely painless and practically effortless, at least as far as the individual is concerned. The big effort is being made by members of the committee now completing plans for the mass immunization, including the physicians of Post responsible for bringing the program here. There'll also be a big effort on the part of those administering the vaccine at the first clinics Friday and Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. Average Citizen of Garza County are asked to reward the efforts of these workers by turning out in big numbers for the clinics and by bringing in all members of their family.

Some counties have gone nearly as high as 100 per cent in the number of residents taking the vaccine. Let us here in Garza County finish in the top tier of counties from the standpoint of participation.

Mark the date on your calendar, even if it is only a day or two away—Friday, Sept. 14, if you are a mill employe . . . Sunday, Sept. 16, if you are not.—CD

Poll Tax headed for oblivion

Something that appears to be on its way out about as surely as anything we know of is the poll tax as a qualification for voting in Texas.

The handwriting is on the wall. It won't be long until the poll tax has completed its journey to oblivion, there to join other anachronisms which limited the right of suffrage, such as the white man's primary.

The tide of public opinion has been running strong against the poll tax for a long time, and it will not take long for the necessary 38 states to ratify the federal amendment. Since only four other states besides Texas retain the poll tax, its abolition on the national level is inevitable.

Meanwhile, it behooves the next Legislature to adopt some form of voter registration as a substitute for the poll tax.

Forty-seven state legislatures meet either annually or in odd-numbered years, so it is entirely possible, probable in fact, that the requisite number of states will ratify the federal amendment in 1963.

This would mean the abolition of the poll tax provision in the Texas Constitution, as far as federal elections are concerned. Conceivably Texans could find themselves disenfranchised in the 1964 presidential election unless the Legislature acts promptly to set up a system of voter registration.

Also needed at the earliest possible date is an amendment to the state Constitution doing away with the poll tax as a requirement for voting in

state and local races, since the federal amendment does not apply to them. There is little doubt the people would adopt it, for they indicated in referendums in both the Democratic and Republican primaries last spring that they favor abolishing the poll tax.

Here in Garza County, the vote was 648 to 621 in the Democratic primary against abolishing the poll tax, and four for and four against in the first Republican primary ever held in the county. Statewide, however, the vote was decisively against the poll tax.

The \$1.50 Texas poll tax produces about \$2.2 million in revenue annually. This is a negligible part of the total state income, but even so some means of replacing it must be found by the Legislature. It will also be necessary to finance a voter registration system with public funds.

Some people already are wide awake on ideas for a registration system suitable to Texas needs. The League of Women Voters has been making a study of the problem for some time, and has agreed on 17 criteria that are desirable in a permanent voter registration system.

This study, and no doubt others, will be available to the 1963 Legislature as a guide to its deliberations. With proper care and thought, a new system can evolve that should allow Texas to make the transition without too much difficulty.—CD

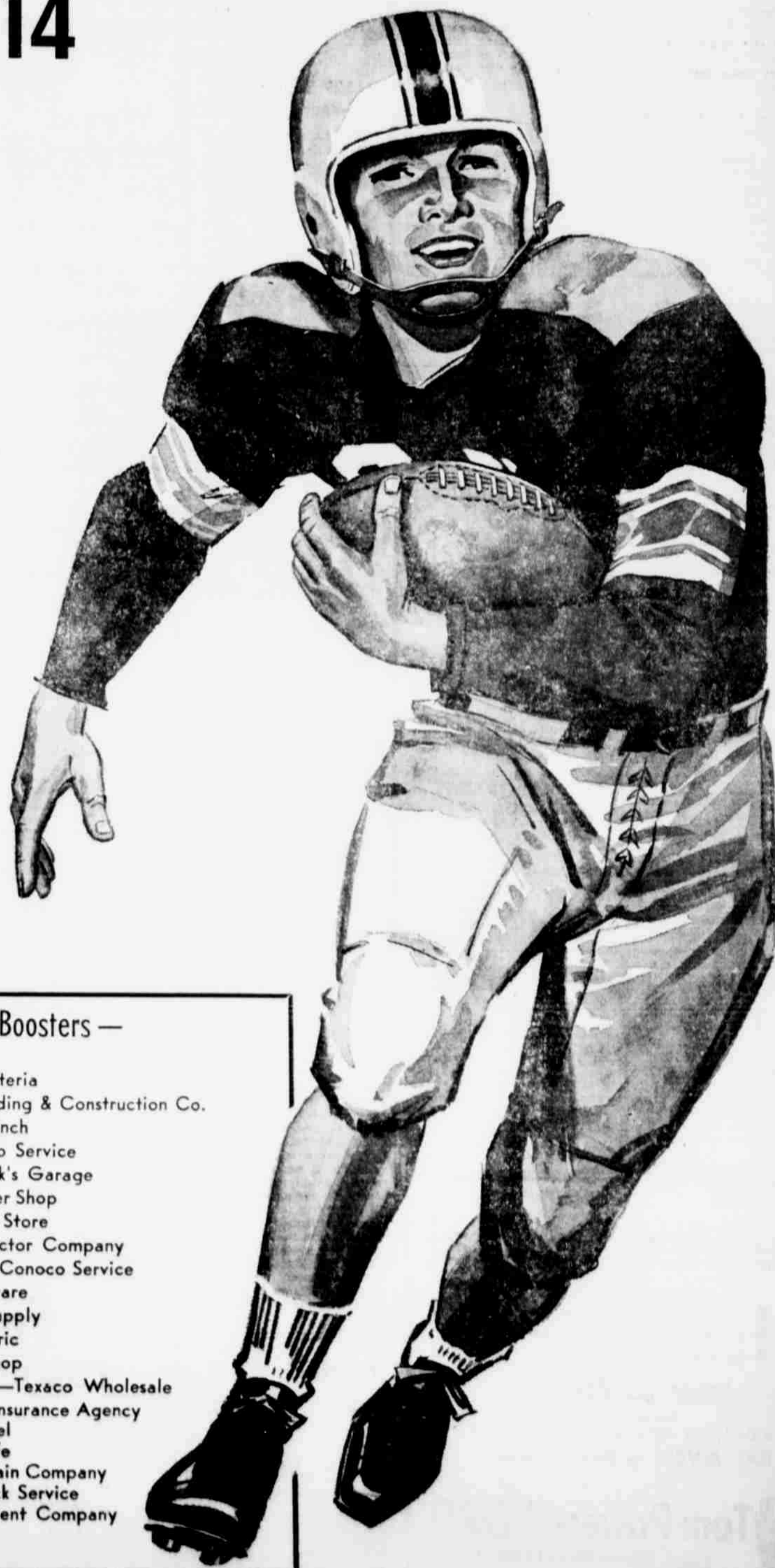

5 persons killed in highway wreck

Funeral services were held here at Tulia Monday and Wednesday for five persons killed Sunday morning in one of the worst, if not the worst, automobile accidents in Garza County's history.

Killed instantly in the one-car wreck, which occurred on U. S. Hwy. 84 about a mile and a half southeast of Post, were Marcario Hernandez, 36, of Tulia; Mrs. Marcario Martinez Villaneuva, in her early 30s, and Mrs. Villaneuva's 11-year-old daughter, Electicia.

Mrs. Villaneuva's son, Robbie, about five years old, and Trinidad Muniz, 42, of Tulia, died later Sunday in Garza Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Villaneuva's daughter, Mrs. Villaneuva, died at Tulia Monday afternoon from the hospital here. The accident occurred about 5:10 a. m. when the automobile, believed to have been driven by Muniz, skidded out of control, crashed into a bridge guard rail and overturned four times. The car was traveling southeast toward Snyder.

Highway Patrolman Henry Harden, who with Sheriff Fay Claborn and City Policeman Dearl Croft investigated the accident, said the car skidded 544 feet before the left front of the vehicle struck the metal railing at the left side of the southeast-bound lane of the four-lane divided highway.

Harden said the car traveled 71 feet in the air, across a creek bed, and then overturned four times on the median, coming to a stop 96 feet from where it hit the ground. All the occupants were thrown out of the car. Hernandez' badly mangled body was found in the creek bed. Mrs. Villaneuva's body was pinned underneath the car, which was resting on its right side, almost completely flattened.

Muniz and the two children killed in the wreck were thrown from the car.

Funeral services for Norman Luther Busby, 32, of 412 South 1st St., who died late Saturday night of a gunshot wound, were conducted at 4 p. m. Monday at the Calvary Baptist Church.

Justice of the Peace D. C. Roberts, following an inquest, returned a verdict of death from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Busby, a resident of Post for two years, was dead on arrival at Garza Memorial Hospital after being taken there from a local restaurant shortly after 11 p. m. Saturday.

Sheriff Fay Claborn, who with Highway Patrolman Henry Harden investigated the shooting, said Busby had been shot in the chest with a .22 caliber pistol while sitting in a booth at the restaurant.

Friends of Busby said he had been dependent for a few days preceding the shooting.

The Rev. Graydon Howell, Calvary Baptist pastor, officiated at the funeral services. Burial was in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Mason Funeral Home.

Witnesses were Lonnie Welborn, Ed Odom, Albert Odom, Pete Mills, Lanham Johnson and Billy Strickland.

Mass immunization polio drive set Friday, Sunday

S. O. S. (Sabin Oral Sunday) following S. O. F. (Sabin Oral Friday) for employes of Postex Mills will be Step No. 1 in freeing from polio all the people who take it.

Garza County's two-part affair in the drive to eradicate polio will begin at 3 p. m. tomorrow at Postex Mills with the employes of both incoming and outgoing shifts receiving the vaccine.

All other Garza County residents will receive the vaccine between 1 and 6 p. m. Sunday in the school cafeteria here.

The mass polio immunization program, which is being made possible here through the affiliation of local physicians with the Lubbock-Crosby County Medical Society, is

to be sponsored by the Garza Memorial Hospital staff, it is announced by Phil Crenshaw, chairman of the

immunization program's steering committee.

Assisting the chairman and other steering committee members in the project are various clubs and

organizations of the city, the hospital auxiliary, physicians, nurses and pharmacists.

The immunization, which consists of the Type I Sabin vaccine, is being offered free to everyone. Contributions will be accepted, however, from those able and willing to pay to defray the cost of the program. Any surplus funds will go to a suitable community project in the county, with the project to be benefitted to be selected by a neutral committee.

Two other doses of the vaccine—Types II and III—will be required, since a person is not immunized against polio until he has had the three. One Sunday in October and another in December are to be designated for the second and

third doses, Crenshaw said. The first dose here will consist of three drops of the vaccine on a lump of sugar to be taken by mouth.

Appearing on page 8 of today's Dispatch is a form to be filled in with the names of all members of the family who will receive the vaccine. Readers who have not already filled in one of the forms obtained elsewhere, may fill in the one in today's paper, clip it and take it with them to the immunization clinic site.

"Now that this vaccine has been made available on a mass basis, each of us should feel it his responsibility to use it," said Dr. James R. Matthews, Garza County health officer.

School enrollment stays about same

Mrs. Bull, whose husband, Malcolm T. Bull, is a member of the school board, orally submitted her resignation through her husband at Monday night's board meeting, but upon a motion by Dr. John E. Carter, the board voted to rescind its action rather than accept Mrs. Bull's resignation.

The board took action on the matter after reviewing state school laws, which forbid the employment in a school system of relatives of a board member.

No further action was taken at the meeting on the hiring of a new junior high secretary but Supt. R. T. Smith recommended to the board that one be employed. The position is a part-time one.

Also Monday night, at its regular September meeting, the board voted four to two—trustee Ronnie Boucher was absent—against using former Lincoln Elementary School teachers Mrs. Zeta Pennie and Matt Reese in the school system as faculty members at this time.

The school district is paying their salaries, since their one-year teaching contracts were already in effect when the school district voted to integrate earlier this year. The two salaries total about \$10,000.

The motion that a place be found in the school system for the two teachers was made by Dr. Carter and seconded by trustee A. Lee Ward, with Dr. Carter and Ward the only two voting for the motion when it was put to a vote.

Dr. Carter suggested that Reese be used as a physical education instructor and Mrs. Pennie as a teacher for slow-readers among starting students, who he said are

Dennis Taylor campaigns in Post Tuesday

Dennis Taylor, slender Crosby County farmer who is out to unseat Congressman George Mahon in the November general election, reported "things look good" during a day-long campaign visit to Post Tuesday.

Taylor has traveled 28,000 miles over the 20-county congressional district since late February and has already handed out 30,000 campaign cards "one at a time."

"I took off three weeks in June to plant cotton and cut wheat," Taylor said. He has a section of Crosby County farm land, most of it dry land. His two eldest sons have been running the farm since June while he has stayed on the road campaigning.

Asked what he considered the issues of his campaign, Taylor replied:

"I oppose aid to Communist countries and disarmament for this country. My opponent voted for both of them."

Asked as to when Mahon, who heads the house military affairs committee, voted for disarmament, Taylor said Mahon had voted in favor of a unilateral disarmament program through the United Nations.

What about the farm problem? Taylor said he favors less gov-

County approves 1963 budget

The Garza County Commissioners' Court at its regular September session this week unanimously approved the 1963 county budget calling for the same tax rate.

The court authorized employment of A. Arthur Davis, Lubbock accountant, to audit all the county records, including the hospital's, for 1962, the audit to be completed during the first quarter of 1963.

The court also voted again to allow discounts, as in past years, on payment of state and county taxes for 1962. Three per cent will be allowed if taxes are paid in October, two per cent in November, and one per cent in December.
