





Situation called 'unhealthy one'

"An unhealthy situation for the community" is the way one city councilman described the City of Post's law enforcement set-up at the city council's regular February meeting Monday night of

That particular councilman was referring to the fact that the city council was taking no action at that time on hiring of a second city police officer to assist City Marshal Junior Shepherd.

In view of the fact that the city council placed enough importance early last month on the need of a second city police office to hire a man who didn't last out the week before resigning. we're inclined to go along with the city councilman who spoke his mind at last week's meeting.

Added to that is the fact that the city council has even discussed a police force of as many as three police officers. It stands to reason that if they deem three officers as ultimately necess-

ary, then surely as many as two officers are not out of line at this time.

Another thing that struck us as peculiar at last week's council meeting was the fact that 12 bona fide applications and perhaps as many more not so bona fide was not acted on by the council. Some of these applicants undoubtedly are good men. You can't expect them to wait forever to have their application acted on.

We'll go solidly along with the city council in wanting to hire the right man for the job. But, if they can't hire him from among some 24 applicants, what is it going to take?

If the City of Post needs two police officers, then another one should be hired-as early as possible. If, in the future, it takes as many as three, that many should be hired,

The only thing is, let's not keep 'an unhealthy situation" going. It isn't good for any of

No flying saucers, AF contends

The U. S. Air Force is still telling us folks here in Post, and elsewhere throughout the land, that we just aren't supposed to see any unidentified flying objects floating around or zooming through and that if we do, they are nothing more than ballions, airplanes, birds or searchlights.

In its 15th annual report on unidentified flying objects, the Air Force's "project Blue Book," which investigated such things, stated these conclusions:

(1) To date, no unidentified flying object has given any indication of threat to the national security.

(2) There has been no evidence submitted to or discovered by the Air Force that unidentified sightings represented technological developments or principles beyond the range of our present day scientific knowledge.

(3) There has been nothing in the way of evidence or other data to indicate that these unidentified sightings were extra-terrestial (from out of this world) vehicles under intelligent con-

In other words, no flying saucers.

ings reported in 1961. Five cases are still pending and 10 remain unidentified. The rest were identified as 175 stars and planets, 55 airplanes, 33 balloons, 55 satellites, 99 insufficient data, and 56 "other," which included birds, searchlights, fireworks displays, kites, and similar easily explained phenomena.

Okay. We'll go along with the Air Force on the UFO's on which they have "sufficient data." But, how about the 99 on which they themselves admit they have "insufficient data?"

We're not carrying the banner for flying saucers. Like the proverbial purple cow, we hope we never see one. But, neither are we taking as firm a stand as the Air Force against those people who say they have seen one-or some sort of UFO. At least, we're not until the Air Force clears up those 99 cases on which there is insufficient data.

It all boils down to this: If some UFO alights in your front yard some night and some inhuman looking creature alights and asks you to take him to your leader, just rear back and tell him the U. S. Air Force says he doesn't even exist. If he argues about it, tell him to take it The Air Force report covered 488 UFO sight- up with the Air Force-or with Jack Paar .- CD.



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
