#### Let's do in '62

#### New cotton planting rule

News that the four-row limitation on skiprow planting will not apply to the 1962 cotton crops comes as probably the best word the dryland cotton farmer has had in a long time. "This puts us in a more favorable position

with the irrigation farmers," is the way one dryland cotton farmer put it. Another said that, for many, this will mean

an increase from a third to a half in the amount of cotton that can be planted. Under regulations for 1961 and earlier crops,

skip-row cotton planting was permitted providing the skips left idle or planted to other crops were equal in width to the four rows of cotton. If the skip-rows were any narrower, the entire acreage was counted as planted to cotton for acreage allotment and marketing quota purposes. Under this arrangement, many growers planted a fourand-four pattern-four rows to cotton and four

left idle or planted to other crops.

The change will provide the cotton farmer with more latitude in planning and carrying out his operations. Under the new system, only land actually planted to cotton will be counted as cotton land in determining compliance with acreage allotments and marketing quotas.

Each grower will determine for himself the pattern best suited to his operation. It is expected that many will shift to a two-and-two pattern, that is, two rows of cotton and two rows left idle or planted to other crops.

The decision to end limitations on skip-row planting is in line with recommendations of the Cotton Advisory Committee and many members of the cotton industry. 
