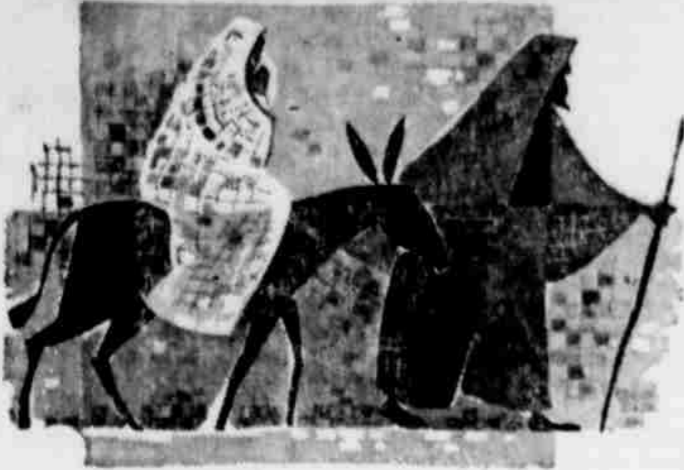
Fudge in 5 minutes

(Makes about 7 pounds)
1/2 cup (small can) undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups (about 16 medium) dried marshmallows
1 1/2 cups (1 1/2 8-ounce packages) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine Carnation, sugar and salt in saucepan over medium heat. Bring to boil, and cook 4 to 5 minutes, stirring constantly. (Start timing when mixture starts to "bubble" around edges of pan.) Remove from heat. Add marshmallows, chocolate and vanilla. Stir vigorously for 1 minute (or until marshmallows are completely melted and blended). Pour into 8-inch square buttered pan. Garnish with nuts, if desired. Cool. Cut in squares.

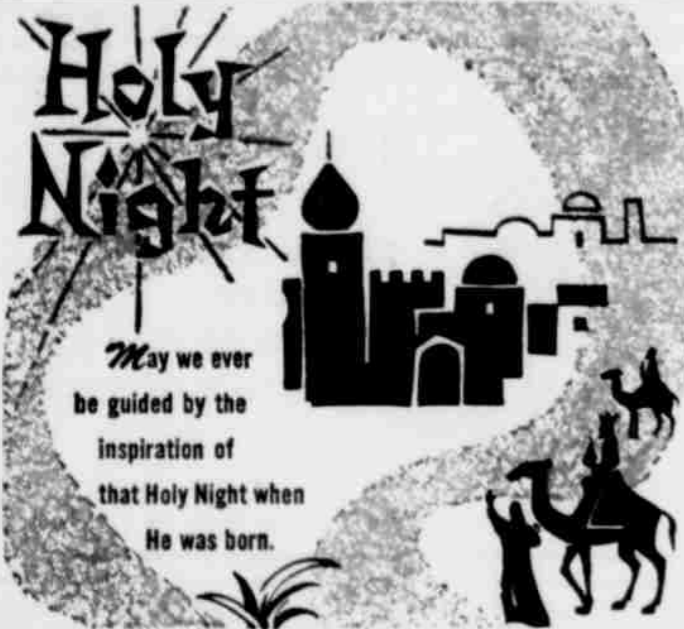

New health care program for aged begins Jan. 1

On Jan. 1, a health care program for persons receiving Old Age Assistance will become effective in Garza County and elsewhere throughout Texas.

The program will be administered by the State Department of Public Welfare, and recipients will be insured under a contract between Blue Cross-Blue Shield and the welfare department.

Texas is the first state to implement the Kerr-Mills Act through private insurance, and the nation's medical community will be watching Texas' experience with close interest.

The Texas Academy of General Practice has stated that "success or failure of the Texas program rests squarely on the backs of Texas doctors... who will bear the responsibility of making the program work."

Eligible for the new health care program is any person who is certified by the State Department of Public Welfare as receiving a grant of Old Age Assistance at the time of admission to the hospital, and who has been certified by a Doctor of Medicine or a Doctor of Osteopathy of the patient's choice...

...that the patient has an illness, injury or physical deformity which requires immediate in-patient care in a hospital and that the illness, injury, or physical deformity is such that the absence of such care would be gravely detrimental to the health of the individual. This declaration must be made within 48 hours prior to hospital admission.

Other essential provisions include:

1. The person is not an inmate of a public institution, except as a patient in a medical institution.

2. The person is not a patient in an institution for tuberculosis or mental disease, or has not been diagnosed as having tuberculosis or psychosis and is in a medical institution as a result of tuberculosis or psychosis.

3. The person is not in a Veteran's Hospital.

4. The care and treatment needed does not relate to any condition for which benefits are provided or available to him under the Workmen's Compensation Laws.

5. The person enters into a hospital listed by the American Hospital Association, American Osteopathic Hospital Association, or licensed by the appropriate legal licensing authority. This does not include institutions for tuberculosis or mental disease, health resorts, nursing homes, rest homes, etc.

Hospital coverage included under the program is bed, board, and general nursing service, paid at the rate of \$10 per day up to 15 days; and the rate of \$5 per day thereafter so long as the attending

physician certifies every 15 days, beginning at the end of the first 15 days, that continued hospitalization is required.

During the first 15 days of hospitalization, the full cost of all services and materials (except blood and plasma) ordered by the physician as necessary will be included in miscellaneous and ancillary services under the program. After the first 15 day, one-half of the actual cost of these services is provided.

Medical and surgical services also included, with certain provisions. When surgery is performed, up to a maximum of \$200 is provided for surgeon's fees according to a schedule for various operations.

If the hospital confinement does not involve surgery, radiology and therapy treatments, an allowance of \$3 per day for the first 15 days and \$1.50 per day thereafter is made to the attending physician for each day he actually visits the patient's room.

Radiology and therapy treatments are also provided up to a scheduled payment maximum of \$200 for all radiation therapy services rendered a patient within one-year period.

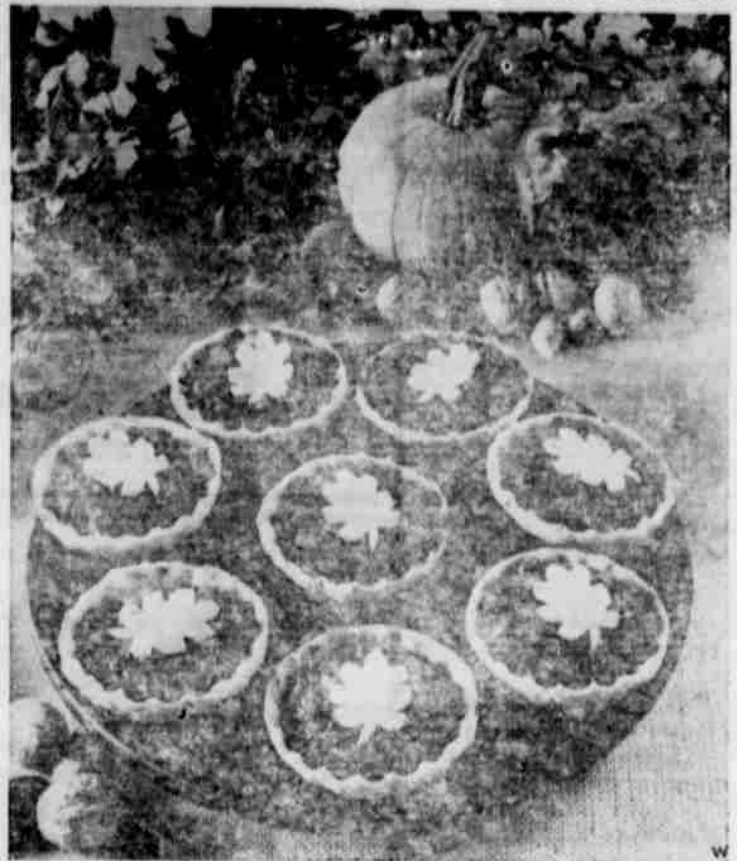

Some Christmas Thoughts

Strip Christmas of its tinsel, its parties, and its prettily wrapped gifts. Don't put up a Christmas tree. Leave all the ornaments on the high closet shelf and forget the greeting cards.

Even send old Santa packing right back to the North Pole and tell him to stay there.

Now! What's left of Christmas?

The answer is plenty—and it's the part we've mostly been missing.

Look back into your own memories and think of all those wonderful Christmases stretching behind you. What do you remember best?

Look closely and you'll probably find that it's the original Christmas story and how we learned it as children, with all its wondrous simplicity. Next we love the beautiful Christmas music—the carols sung out in the cold nights, in the choir lofts, and on the pleasant hush of bright Christmas mornings in the churches of our choice. Third, we remember best that wonderful season when it is such a joy just to give to someone less fortunate than ourselves.

The cry to "put Christ back into Christmas" is the cry of a long decade ago. You seldom hear it anymore—even in our churches.

All the rest of the American Christmas is wonderful too but it is not the really important part of it. Let's not lose the true joy of Christmas this Christmas season.

Why are we nicer as people at Christmastime than through the rest of the year? That's a holiday thought worth considering too. We find ourselves a bit more Christian as we approach His birthday—only to see it vanish again.

When we can learn to live with the joy of Christmas in our hearts the whole year through, then we can truly call ourselves Christian.

A local pastor, talking of Christmas from his pulpit last Sunday morning, pointed out that today's Christians stand with one foot in the church and the other in materialistic world with its vastly different goals. He went on to say that the problem is to find a bridge from religion to our everyday lives.

For if we could, think how different life on this jumpy, old care-worn world would be. Think of how we could mix love with the billions being spent on ornaments this year and carry the nations of this world into a whole new age of finer, more purposeful living.

We can find our best illustrations of this "bridge" between the church and our materialistic world in the Christmas season. It is at this time of year that we project Christ's simple code of living—"love one another"—best into our everyday lives. In the Christmas season, we receive our greatest satisfaction in doing nice things for other people, often less fortunate than ourselves. But the Christmas "bridge" doesn't last long enough—and isn't big enough.

Certainly, it is not easy to transform Christian principles into Christian action. Else this great nation would have a much better "image" to the world today. We try so hard, we often lead with our hearts, and we give much of our material blessings. And all for such small results. We must learn better, as both individuals and as a nation, to build "the bridge" between Christianity and the world.

Looking back over the last 15 years, when America led the rush into the nuclear age, we are owed by the tremendous challenge our scientists have met. We marvel at the methods by which this nation's industrial "know how" and even our democratic educational system were marshaled to the cause of nuclear development, and how the people and government together accepted the task of spending a great portion of this nation's vast wealth to finance the task.

If only a tenth of this brilliant and creative manpower, this organization, and only a few billion of these dollars could be brought together to accept the Christian challenge of finding the "bridge" between the Christian faith and the world in which we live.

Who can foretell how great such results might be?

Somehow even we would judge a "crash program" for living Christianity as impractical. And that again brings us back to the problem pointed out by one pastor here Sunday from his pulpit—how can we build such a "bridge?" In finding such an effort impractical we are admitting in our hearts that the gap does exist between our Christian concepts given to us by Christ, whose birthday we are preparing again to celebrate, and the world in which we live.

Here truly is a greater challenge than any nuclear age, any orbit into space, or any journey to the moon. Let us ask ourselves this Christmas, how can we become "bridge builders?"—JC.

Two closely related stories

We suppose you could call it something of a coincidence that news of the sheriff department's roundup of three juveniles who admitted breaking into 27 places here "broke" on the front page of last week's Post Dispatch at the same time as the story of the organization of a juvenile board of counselors and referees to assist in the county's juvenile problems.

Both groups—the sheriff's officers and the citizens who organized the juvenile board—are to be commended for their parts in the developments that led up to the two major news stories.

It could well be that operation of the new juvenile board will make it unnecessary for The Dispatch to again have to "top story" such an account of three youngsters, one of them only 11 years old, breaking into and looting business

places and leaving destruction in their wake. We sincerely hope so.

As stated in the story in last week's Dispatch, the purpose of the new juvenile board is to serve under and assist County Judge J. E. Parker and the Juvenile Court in its proceedings. Next to a full-time juvenile officer, the newly-organized board might well be the best thing that could "happen" in efforts here not only to deal with juvenile misdeeds as they occur, but—and more important—to prevent them.

Membership on the juvenile board is strictly non-remunerative. The only pay the chairman, six regular members and four alternates expect is the cooperation of the public, especially the parents, in helping reduce the community's juvenile delinquency problem.—CD.

iam Mew Egley. He designed a small card to send to his friends. Only 100 copies were made of his quaintly cluttered design, which depicted a formal banquet, a dancing party and a group of skaters.

Beneath the illustration young Egley wrote: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You"—which still seems to be the most popular phrasing ever written.

The first Christmas card to win complete acceptance was sent in 1862 by a London publisher, Charles Goodal & Sons.

In the 32 years that intervened the idea had spread to the United States, and in 1874 a Boston lithographer, Louis Prang, issued his first Christmas card and an industry was launched.

Prang's cards were world famous for their beauty and craftsmanship. Their price ran to several dollars each.

He used few of the traditional Christmas scenes, so familiar today, but instead depicted spring flowers, harvest scenes and children at play.

Life is much like Christmas—you are more apt to get what you expect than what you want.

County's turn-out jumps to 15,044 bales

'White Christmas' seen for gins with cotton pouring in

It's virtually sure to be a "white Christmas" for Garza county's six gins and the Hackberry gin, across the county line.

Running on a 24 hour a day basis all this week with the first real good weather break, the gins at mid-afternoon yesterday had ginned some 15,044 bales of Garza county and had another 1,539 stacked up on their gin yards.

Harvest progress reports ranged all the way from about "half through" to nearly 80 per cent complete in the Southland area.

For the first time in some gingers' memory, Christmas Day is shaping up as just another working day with "maybe two hours off for Christmas dinner."

Said one ginner: "We've never run before on Christmas Day, but we may Monday if the good weather holds and we can't catch up."

In The Dispatch's weekly check of the gins Wednesday afternoon, most gins reported they probably will be working Christmas if the good weather holds.

"The farmers want to get it out now and we've got to help them," one commented.

It appeared Christmas may be another working day for many cotton farmers too.

The cotton is ginning well, all gins reported. There hasn't been to much damage by the long field wait for the weather to quiet down and let the strippers get to work.

Planters Gin in Post reported 895 bales ginned and another 150 on the yard yesterday. Graham Co-op has ginned 2,550 to date with 350 on the yard. Close City Co-op has ginned 2,075 with an estimated 300 on the yard. The Storie Gin has ginned 1,026 bales with some 80 bales on the

yard. Pleasant Valley Gin reports 2,680 bales ginned with 94 on the yard.

The Basinger Gin has ginned 3,925 bales with 275 on the yard.

Across the line, the Hackberry Gin has ginned 1,893 bales with 290

on the yard. Hackberry figures about 45 per cent of the cotton it has ginned so far is of Garza origin.

So 45 per cent of the 1,893 bales was included in the county total of 15,044 bales.

A. F. O'Brien of Lubbock

WR directors hire manager

A. F. O'Brien, first county engineer of Lubbock County, has been employed by the White River Municipal Water District directors as general manager of the district.

Selection of O'Brien for the key position was unanimously voted last Thursday night at the directors' regular December meeting in Spar.

Directors termed O'Brien as "ideally suited" in experience "for the man we need."

O'Brien, who at the present makes his home in Lubbock, will receive an annual salary of \$8,500 and will move with his family to a home to be furnished on the dam site by the district.

He will begin his duties officially Jan. 1, 1962.

O'Brien was interviewed for the position in November. He came highly recommended from his former employers.

O'Brien, who is 40, has a wife, Wanda Jo, one son, Tommy, 12, and a daughter, Lucenda, 8.

He received his civil engineering degree from the University of Missouri. He was first employed for two years by Phillips Petroleum as a plant engineer and then went into the steel designing business in Lubbock for two years.

He was an engineer in the City of Lubbock's engineering department before being hired in 1952 as Lubbock county's first county engineer. He set up the county's engineering department and served in that capacity for seven years.

O'Brien then went into a partnership in the highway construction business for three years. He has been recently employed by the Goodpasture Grain and Milling Co. (See WHITE RIVER, page 8)

Big 1961 program

New paving is completed here

The City of Post's Christmas gift to the community is completion of the most extensive street paving program here in recent years.

A total of 18½ city blocks have been newly paved, in addition to nearly the same amount of paving in new residential additions of the city, including Westgate, Hillcrest and the William Robinson Addition.

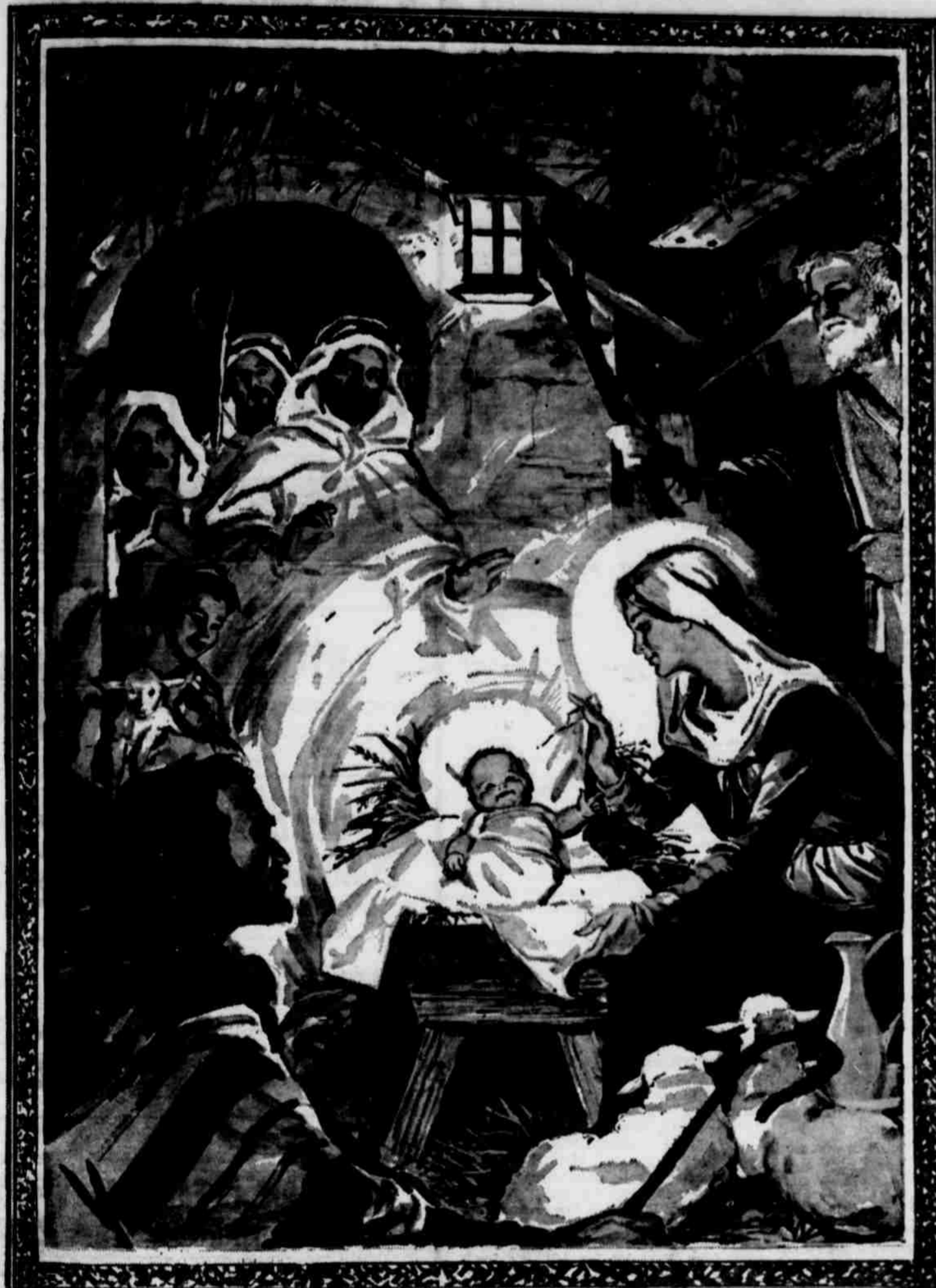
Also, 13 blocks of city streets already paved have been seal-coated under the program, City Supt. R. H. Tate said.

The new paving outside the additions includes three blocks on North R, two on South L, West 15th, West 5th and South I, single blocks

on North P, North K, West 4th, South R, South K, East 4th and East 14th, and a half-block on East 15th.

A separate project, in which the Highway Department is cooperating, is the curbing, guttering and widening of farm-to-market roads within the city. This project has already resulted in curbs and gutters on five blocks of FM-1313, with more scheduled on other county roads within the city limits.

On this project, the city and property owners are building the curbs and gutters and the Highway Department is widening the paving up to the new construction.



Two juveniles are sent to Gatesville

Two of three juveniles who had been committed to sheriff's officers that they broke into 27 places here were remanded Friday to the State School for Boys at Gatesville following a hearing Thursday in juvenile court before Judge J. E. Parker.

An 11-year-old boy involved in the break-ins was probated to his parents. The two boys sent to Gatesville are 15 and 16 years old.

Meanwhile, the sheriff's department is continuing a search for two other boys, one of whom is 17 years old, in connection with the break-ins. The two were implicated by three boys picked up here, sheriff's officers said.

The three juveniles' apprehension and their admission of the break-ins solved a series of burglaries that had extended over the last three months.

The newly-organized Garza County Juvenile Board worked with the juvenile court for the first time in a week's hearings, and Judge Parker was high in his praise of the board's work.

The board did a thorough job; I don't know how we've operated juvenile court this long without it," Judge Parker said.
