That was true of the Rays, Mr. Ray left Vernon, Tex., on a freight car with his stock, farm tools and household goods, arriving Dec. 24, 1916 to start farming and making improvements on a quarter section of land purchased from C. W. Post for \$24 an acre plus \$10 for improvements. Mrs. Ray and the children arrived a week later and by that time Mr. Ray had the barn fixed up to live in until the four-room house could be built. Other im-

provements were to include a well and windmill, and outside fences. They still live in that same house although it has been greatly improved and modernized. They started farming just before the 1917-18 drought so Mr. Ray and the two older boys, Wade and Henry, went to Petersburg to harvest maize, bale hay and pick cotton. Mrs. Ray and their daughter, Eva May, now Mrs. Tom Mason, and the baby, John Paul, stayed home and harvested the 1918 crop—all two bales of cotton.

AUSTIN — If you suffer from "midmorning hunger," better revise your breakfast habits. State Health Department nutritionists advise. Here and more people are falling into the habit of skimpy breakfast. Surveys have shown that two out of every nine children leave for school without breakfast, and four out of ten workers leave for work with nothing to eat. "Midmorning hunger" is the expression nutritionists use to describe the feeling which comes after an inadequate breakfast. Victims usually feel weak and giddy by midmorning. They are hungry, yet have no taste for lunch. Or, if they are able to eat a big lunch, they may feel sleepy by early afternoon. Midmorning hunger therapy, nutritionists say, calls for the "patient" to eat a solid breakfast. The extent of breakfast consumption varies from person to person. Individuals with special problems or modified diets can be guided by their physician.

MANY TEXAS TEACHERS and school nurses place special emphasis on breakfast. One school nurse had a breakfast contest in the elementary grades. Near the end of the school year a mother telephoned to report on the improved breakfast habits and general well being of the whole family. Before the contest, the mother said, none of the family ate breakfast. Her child, involved in the school breakfast contest, insisted on having a good breakfast. Eventually it caught on and the whole family began eating breakfast and feeling better.

It is a false idea that skipping breakfast is a good way to reduce. If anything, this highly injurious practice adds pounds. It works like this: Skip breakfast and by noon you

have lost your appetite or else are afraid to eat for fear of being groggy all afternoon. Then for supper you eat the food your body has been demanding all day. Now you go to bed and your supper is converted into fat rather than energy as would be the case had you eaten properly during hours of greatest activity.

AN ADEQUATE breakfast pattern can be adapted to any age, budget or cultural pattern: fruit or fruit juice, protein-rich food—such as eggs, cheese, meat or beans—bread or cereal and milk.

If time is a prohibitive factor, some preparations can be made the night before—setting the table fixing the coffee pot, etc. Breakfast eating is a part of a pattern of daily life that will pay dividends in a higher level of health and well being.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to:

- (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance; and All to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amount expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 51-a and 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same shall hereafter be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Law, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations and regulations as may be enacted by the Legislature, to set up residence requirements for eligibility for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any state of any state-supported institution; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance; and All to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amount expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
