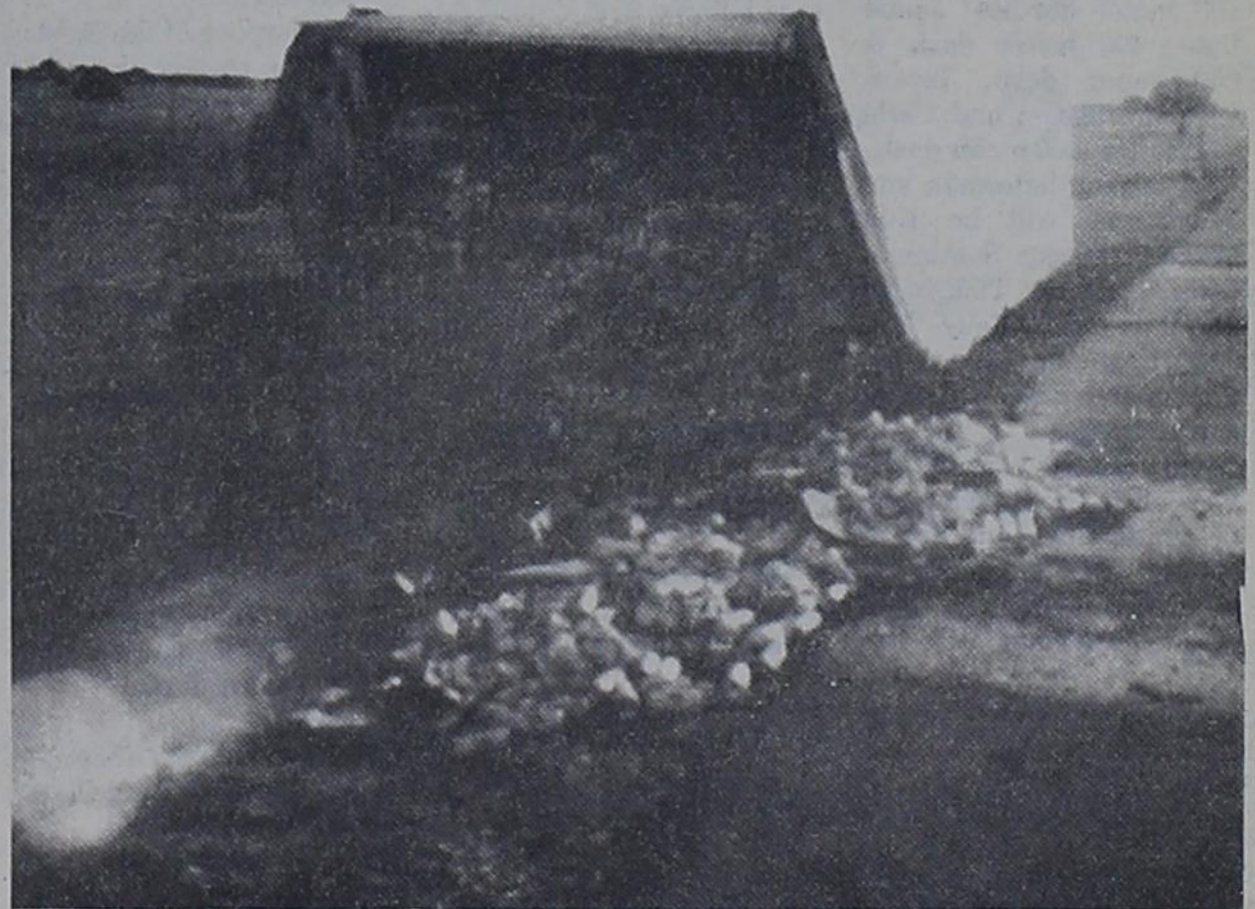

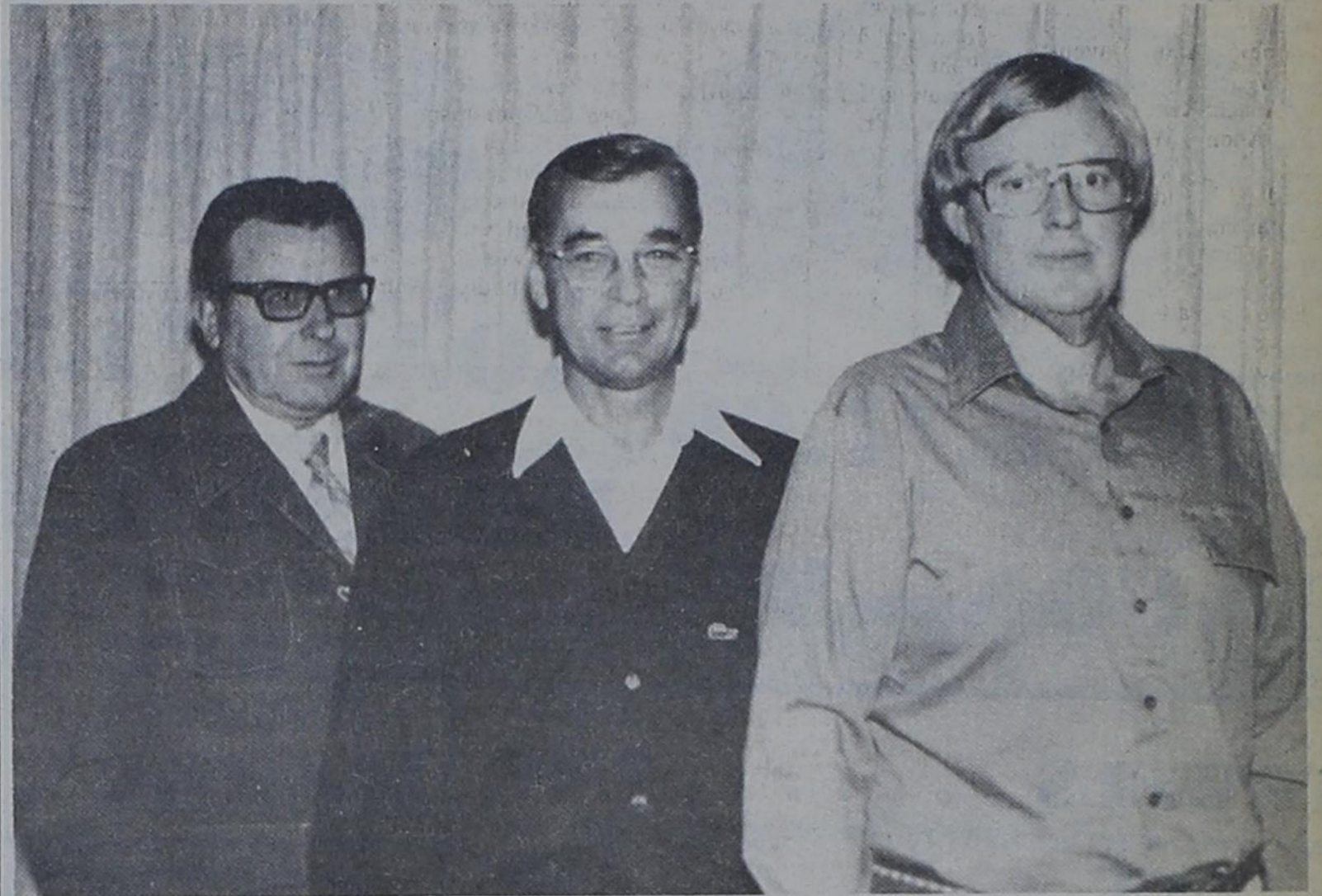
Whitleys Have New Son

MEET THE "BIG" TEAM



The recently formed political organization, BAIRD IMPROVEMENT GROUP, (BIG), has announced the three candidates they will support in the upcoming April 5th City Council election. They include H.L. (Buddy) Brame for Mayor and Lee Roy Brooker and Scotty Mitchell for City Council.

Maurice Newton, Chairman of BIG, said the citizens' group is backing the three candidates because "We feel they will represent fairly all the citizens of Baird and not the special interests of a select few."

Buddy Brame, who is running for Mayor, cited a five point platform, including 1, Respecting the wishes of the majority, 2, Establish and execute a city budget, 3, Plan and Program repair to City facilities including streets, sewer, water and electrical distribution system, 4, Keep Baird citizens informed, and 5, Institute a program to foster growth of business here.

The 51 year old Brame is a graduate of Baird High School and the U.S. Naval Academy. He served 26 years in the Air Force including 17 years in Civil Engineering (Public Works). Brame, who resides at 531 E. 10th, with his wife Beckie is the father of two daughters and one son. He is a member of the Baird Chamber of Commerce.

In announcing his candidacy Lee Roy Brooker said he wants "to serve the majority of the people of Baird in order to establish much needed improvements to our electrical systems, streets, sewer and water."

The 51 year old Brooker, owner of Baird Auto, served on the City Council 1976-1978. He also is past City Fire Marshall, past Chief of Baird Volunteer Fire Department and is a member of the Baird Chamber of Commerce. The longtime resident is the father of one daughter and resides with his wife, Jean, at 1133 Ross Drive.

BIG has also endorsed Scotty Mitchell for City Council. The 33 year old Maintenance Construction Supervisor for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation said he wants "to represent the people of Baird for the improvement of our public works and all aspects of our City government."

Mitchell, a life long resident of Baird, was raised by the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Miller. Mitchell is President of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Association. Previously he served on the Board of Directors of the Callahan County Sheriff Posse and the Highway Department Credit Union. Mitchell and his wife, Charlene, reside at 735 E. 6th with their three boys.

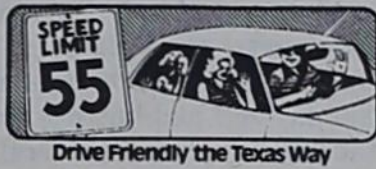
The Rev. Klel Quesenberry, pastor of the church officiated. Burial was in Moran Cemetery.

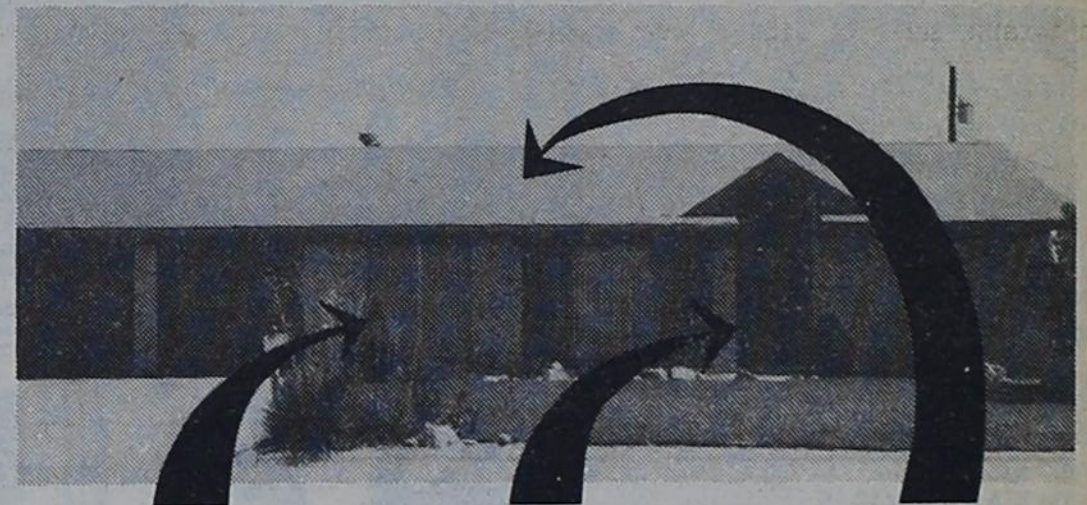

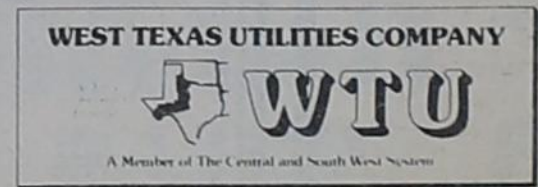

Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

I feel I would be remiss if I failed to publicly express my thanks to Mr. Gilbert Hinds for the compliment he has paid me concerning my aduaciousness. I am proud that I have the audacity in my writings to tell the truth about matters and call a spade a spade.

I would suggest to Mr. Hinds that he get his facts straight before he puts them in print. I do some work for Baird Auto Repair and I can assure him they have not moved. Baird Electric and Big Country Grocery are not new businesses, just moves and alterations.

I think the Chamber of Commerce is justified in their concern about the retrogression of Baird. Look at the figures: the Texas Almanac shows Baird's population in 1939 to be 1,965 and here in 1980 they show 1,547. Now, isn't that going backwards? I have just obtained the sales tax figures for 1979. Cross Plains received \$43,621.14 for a 35% increase over 1978. Clyde received \$39,203.62 for a 19% increase but poor Baird received \$21,285.95 for a 6% decrease. Convert that figure to taxable sales and put in the inflation factor of 13% and you are looking at a decrease in taxable sales of \$153,531.00. It can safely be assumed that taxable sales represent 50% of the total dollar volume so that makes a decrease in business of about \$300,000.00. I don't call that peanuts and that

certainly indicates the direction the town is going. So...concern is warranted.

Now, I would like to pose some questions to Mr. Hinds.

In regard to the Telephone situation, you say "our poles and lines are in compliance with the code"! I assume you refer to the National Electrical Code. The copy I have shows they would not be in compliance, so what edition do you have?

Where did you get the false figure of \$75,000.00 to move the lines?

Before the referendum of 1978 you and other members of the "Light Plant Clique" (yes, I know what it means) were making statements that the System was worth over a million dollars and it was good for 25 years, but, within a few months the City started tying in to WTU for electricity. What does that show about those pre-vote statements.

The City Council met in a special session February 21st and made a slight reduction in electrical rates. The City recently had to borrow money to pay bills and before this slight reduction was barely keeping up with obligations. With a City election coming up shortly, could this slight reduction, however unwise, be politically motivated?

You Baird Citizens are indeed fortunate to have this "Light Plant Clique" in control. The new rates which I understand will be on your February bill will

really be something. If you have used 1000 kw your bill under the new set-up will be \$65.13. The same consumption, under the same conditions, in Clyde for February would cost you \$39.75. See how much the "Light Plant Clique" is costing you and it will continue no matter what they promise. If that 1978 sale had been consummated the City would be virtually out of debt, you citizens would have saved gobs of money, and the present problem with the Telephone Company would be non-existent.

The US Constitution guarantees me freedom of speech, so, I can say what I wish. If one understands the financial workings in the business community he should understand one of my interests about the happenings in Baird. Most of my buying is done there. Unreasonably high costs for electricity must be reflected in prices I have to

pay for what I buy.

Let's add this. You are not going to intimidate me into shutting up. When I do shut up it will be of my own violation.

Several months ago when the plan was started to buy current from WTU I was told that anyone who couldn't see that was a good idea was stupid. I couldn't see it. Was I stupid?

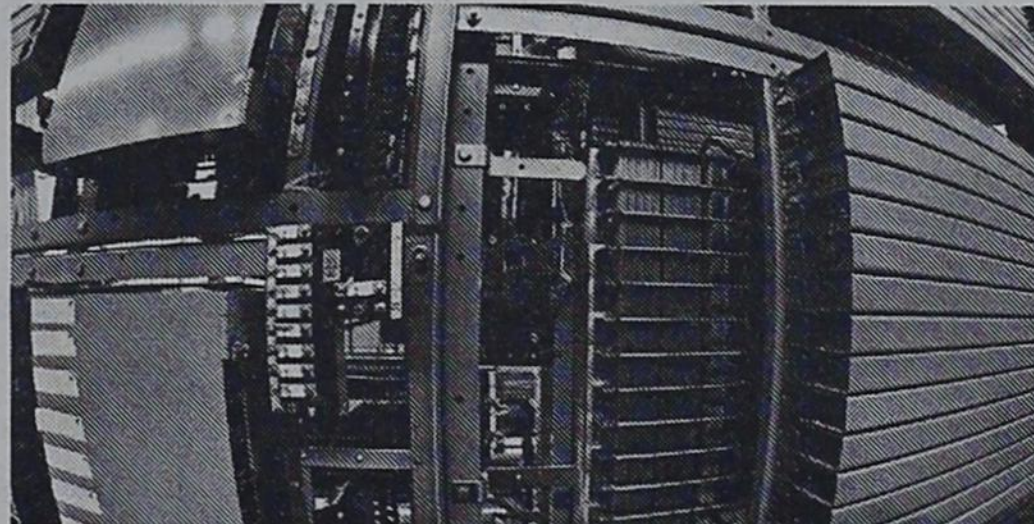

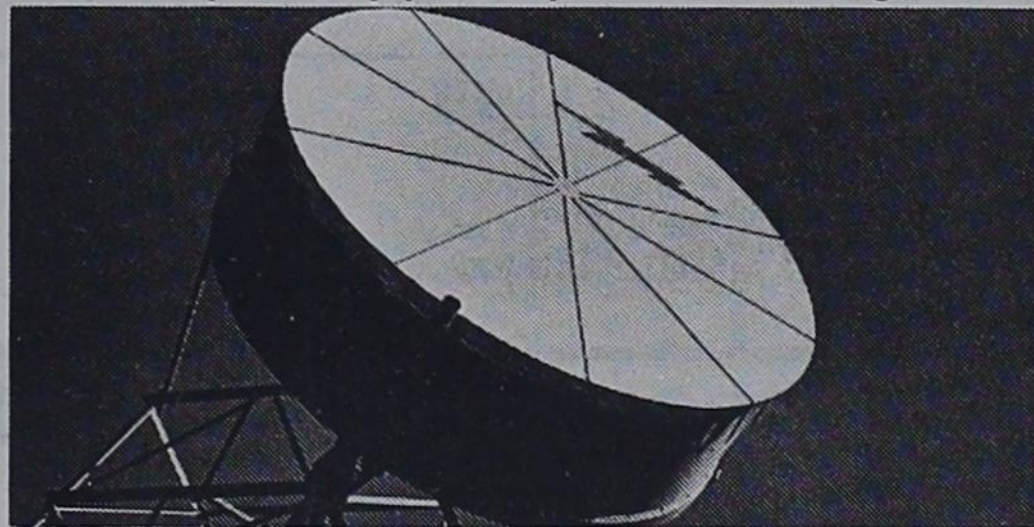

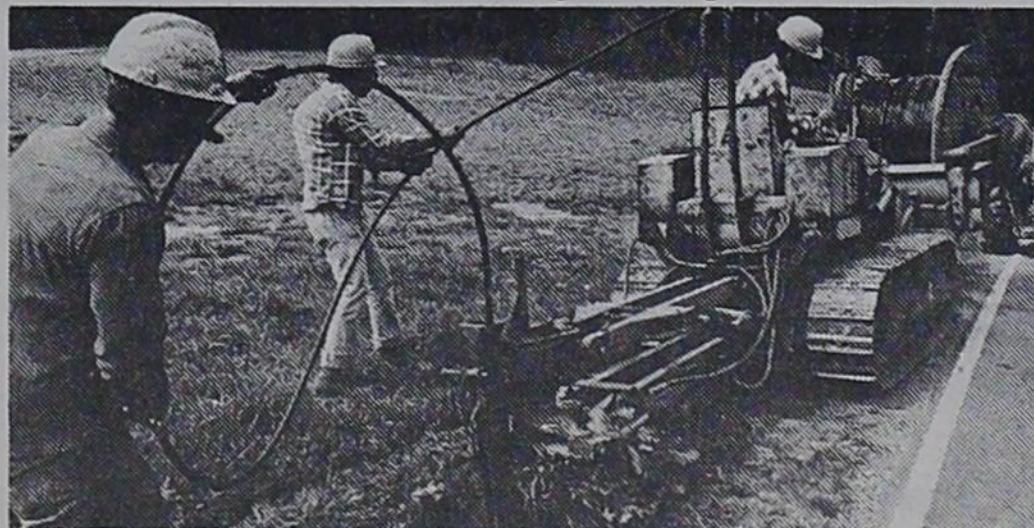

Sgt. Rutherford To Retire

Master Sergeant C. Wayne Rutherford, son of D.C. Rutherford of Abilene and Mrs. Edwin Laurice Weir of Ft. Worth will retire March 31, 1980 after 24 years of military service.

Sergeant Rutherford was born in Baird, Texas on February 16, 1939. He attended school in Baird, Moran, Abilene and Wylie Texas before enlisting in the Air Force.

Sergeant Rutherford entered basic training at Lackland AFB San Antonio on March 15, 1956. He graduated in June 1956. He was then assigned to HQ, MATS, Kelly AFB. (MATS formerly Military Air Transport Service—now known as MAC—Military Airlift Command.) From September 1956 until April 1959 he was assigned to the 5th Communications Group at Kadens Air Base, Okinawa.

From May 1959 until May 1960 he was assigned to the Missile Wing at Cheyenne, Wyoming. From May 1960 until June 1965 he was with the Radar Bomb Scoring Squadron, LaJaunta, Colo.

In July 1965 he was sent

to the 313th Air Division Kadena Air Base, Okinawa; he remained at Okinawa until October 1966 at which time he was assigned to the 6595th Aerospace Test Wing, Scout Missile, Vandenberg AFB, Lompac, Calif. 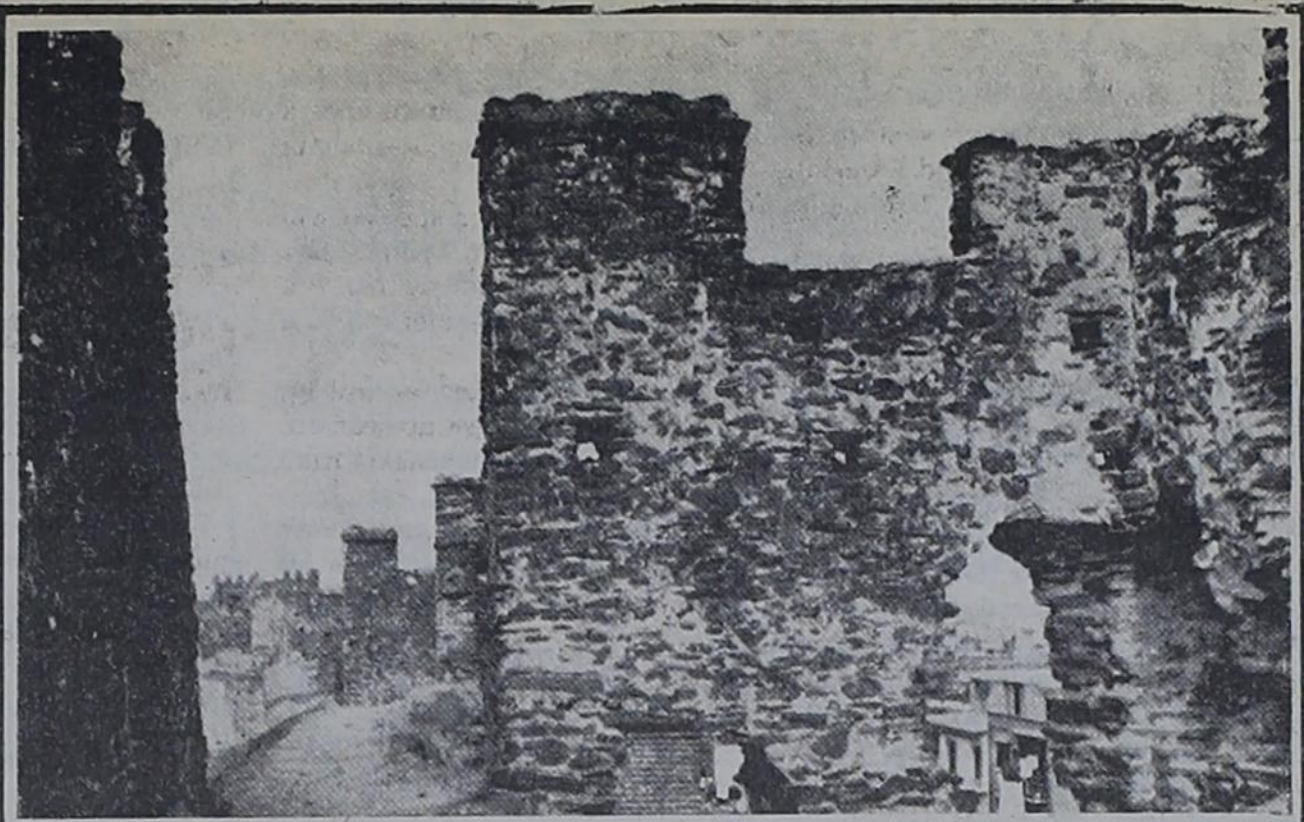
