

### Fast, Efficient Way To Fertilize Shown Liquid Nitrogen Sprayed On 1,000 Acres by Plane

How to fertilize a 1000-acre field in a day was recently demonstrated in Madison County, Ohio.

A new liquid nitrogen product was used. The feat was made possible by direct transfer of the fertilizer from a railroad tank car to a small plane on a landing field adjacent to the train siding. The loaded plane flew to a farm 20 miles away, sprayed the wheat field, and returned to the siding for another load, all in about 15 minutes. Six thousand gallons, in all, were used in this first rail-plane fertilizing operation.

The railroad predicted a large-scale system of fueling centers for liquid fertilizer in the future.

For many farmers, the event recalled other chapters in the story of railroad agricultural development and assistance to farmers.

On March 1, 1911, in Broome County, New York, the first county agent in the United States was hired at the suggestion of a Lackawanna vice president. The railroads, in fact, paid part of his salary. Subsequently, many eastern railroads established their own agricultural departments, and worked with the agricultural colleges, running farm demonstration trains into rural communities. 


### Described as Effective **Against Rootworms**

Growers of corn, peanuts, sugar beets, sugar cane, small grains and similar crops may get economical control of soil insects with Aldrin, a new insecticide.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently accepted the new chemical for registration for use against soil insects, grubs, harmful worms and other burrowing pests, following proof of its effectiveness by many experiment stations.

It is described as being particularly effective against rootworms, wireworms, and white grubs—and in far smaller doses than those needed in previously known treatments. Damage to crops by aboveground insects is easily seen, and until recently has been the primary concern of the farmer. But damage to plant roots by soil insects, while not so readily recognized, is often more widespread and serious.

The new insecticide may be applied by any method available to the average farmer; by mixing with starter fertilizer, with manure, or



### Restricted Feeding Plan Is Outlined Plan Will Cut Feed Cost in Half, Report

A barnyard "diet" worth millions each year to American farmers is being advocated by Dr. O. B. Kent of Chicago, widely known poultry scientist.

Dr. Kent, research director for the Quaker Oats Company, believes that chickens should scratch for part of their living. Pullets being raised for egg production on the "full feed" method eat too much for their own good, he says.

As much as half the feed cost of growing a pullet can be saved, he asserts, by using a "restricted feeding plan." Pullets raised under this plan need only about 20 pounds of feed, compared to an average of 34 pounds or more on the usual full

feed grain and mash plan.
Pullets on the "diet" are fed
moderately five days each week, with the accent on more oats and less mash. On the other two days they get no mash and only a few The restricted method could be worth as much as 440 million dollars a year to poultry raisers, Dr. Kent declares.



Pretty Kay Norris demonstrates that there's more than one way to feed a pullet. Big pile of poultry mash at right weighs 34 pounds, the amount required to raise a pullet to egg produc-tion state by conventional feed-ing methods. Small pile weighs only 20 pounds. That's all that is necessary says Dr. Kent.


Dr. Kent says birds grown on restricted feeding have demonstrated better egg producing ability—to the extent of about 1¼ dozen eggs per year in tests over the past 12 years.


### Father and Son Team **Set Production Record**

A father and son team on a north eastern Iillinois dairy farm have set a production record at a minimum of cost. They produced 383,000 pounds of milk last year-enough to give a pint a day to 1,050 persons for a whole year.

Father and son milked 35 Holsteins on their 225-acre farm. Be sides nearly 192 tons of milk, the two men produced 17,800 pounds of pork, 3,250 bushels of corn, 1,600 bushels of oats, 850 bushels of wheat, 150 tons of corn and grass silage and 150 tons of hay.

Their secret for high production is made up of labor-saving tricks, careful records and good soil care. But mainly these five things spelled high returns for the team: (1) High crop yields, especially roughage, on land that is well suited to growing roughage; (2) maximum use of good-quality roughage, which means cheap feed cost; (3) high production of milk, veal calves and hogs at a low cost; (4) healthy livestock through strict sanitation, vaccination, and balanced rations; (5) attention to details, such as farm records.





Here is a way to cut down the death rate at farrowing time. It eliminates much of the danger of pigs being crushed by the show. The sow is placed in the jacket or pen for farrowing and left there two or three days after pigs are born. Sow is fed in front and pigs nurse from pen alongside. It is simple and easy to construct.

### Undulant Fever is Described

This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may expected, according to the Health Department.

An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever. The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of mild type, the patient may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tries to geep on with his work he finds he has not sufficient Symptoms often continue for

number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunate undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temper ature may reach a higher each day than the day before for some time and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and come back in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temper ature chart will resemble smooth waves or undulations. The appear ance of the temperature typical cases has given this disease the name undulant fever.

Undulant fever is one of the infectious diseases known to be trans mitted from animals to human beings. In hogs and cows, the germ produces a great economic because it causes contagious abort ion. When this same germ invades the human body, the resulting dis-ful pasteurization of dairy produ ease is undulant fever. Prevention and avoidance in so far as possible is dependent upon eradication of of direct contact with infected at the disease in farm animals, care imals.

### Higher Production Is Goal of U.S. Farmers

Again American farmers are being called on to turn out high yields of food, feeds and fibers. The preduction goals recently announced by the Department of Agriculture for 1952 anticipate a total production of 4 per cent higher than the record production of 1951 and 50 per cent more than the prewar average from 1935 to 1939.

This production is being asked although farmers will have about 200,-000 fewer farm workers available in 1952. During 1951, 400.000 workers left the farms. About 80 per cent went to work in other industries. Armed forces took the other 20 per

Production at the goal level will require increased yields per acre in all major crops, and selective acreage expansion in those most needed to insure our economic stability in these pressing times.

The task for farmers is made more difficult because their need for fertilizers will be far greater than the supply. At the same time farm machinery production in 1952 will be considerably less than farm-





Ways to Control Farm

Pond Fish Loss Outlined

Wild life specialists warn farm

owners they should be on the lookout for possible death of fish in their

ponds during spring and summer and outlined methods to control this Only a few ponds show a partial kill of fish each year, and in practically all cases the cause can not

be determined. In some instances,

however, the loss of fish has been directly connected with a deficiency of phosphorous, a high concentration of carbon dioxide, and a lack of oxygen, specialists report. Should a pond owner see a number of bluegills and bass swimming close to the surface of the water, he should distribute 50 to 100 pounds of 18 per cent superphosphate per acre over the pond in the early morning, specialists suggest.
Then, between three and four o'clock in the afternoon he should stir the water thoroughly by use of an outboard motor attached to a boat. Several motors on boats should


