Of special interest to disabled workers is the provision of the Social Security Act which provides for disability payments at age 50. In order to qualify for these benefits, the disabled person must be unable to perform any substantial gainful activity and must have worked under social security for at least 5 out of 10 years immediately preceding the date he became disabled. At least a year and a half of this work must have been during the three years just before the disability began. In addition the disabled individual must have filed an application for these benefits.

Disabled workers who have been unable to work for a prolonged period may lose their rights to disability payments at age 50 if they do not file an application before June 30th. Failure to file for these disability provisions may also affect their rights to benefits upon retirement and to benefits for their survivors in the event of the worker's death. Any disabled person who meets the requirements set forth above is urged to contact his nearest social security office. If the individual is unable to make this contact in person, a friend or relative may notify the Social Security office.

PATROL TO CHECK LICENSES

An effort to rid Texas highways of unlicensed and unsafe drivers was revealed today by Major R. A. Crowder, Region 5, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. At the same time, Crowder pointed out that 16 percent of all rural fatal accidents in Texas during 1956 involved an unlicensed driver.

Officers of the Department will begin conducting driver's license checks in the immediate future on all traveled roads in Region 5 and throughout the State. All motorists that are stopped will be required to show their licenses to the officers.

Crowder said that thousands of Texas motorists are operating motor vehicles on expired driver's licenses or have never been licensed at all. "It is not our desire to surprise motorists without a forewarning," Crowder said. "So we would like to advise them that they may expect these checks at any time."

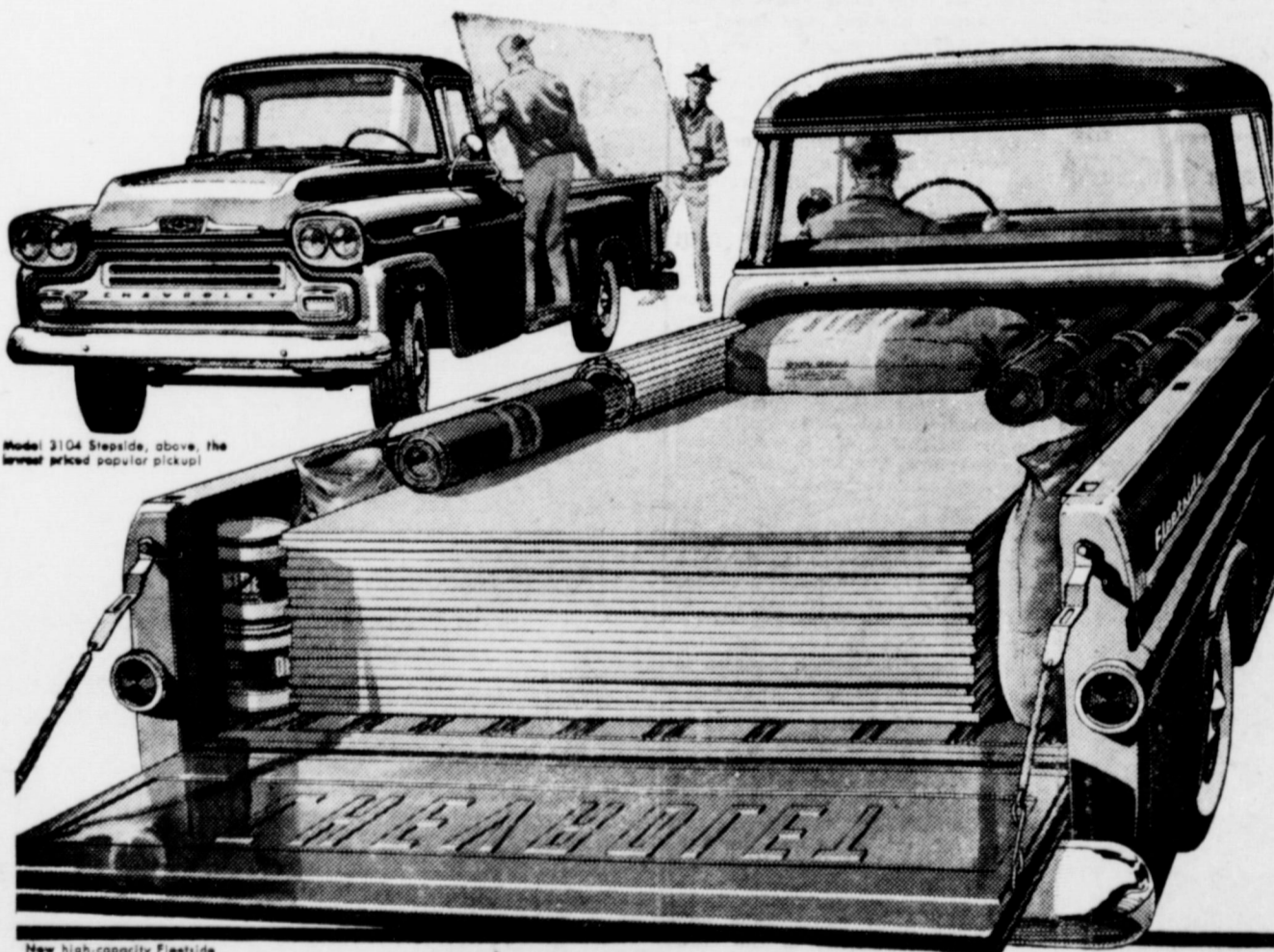
