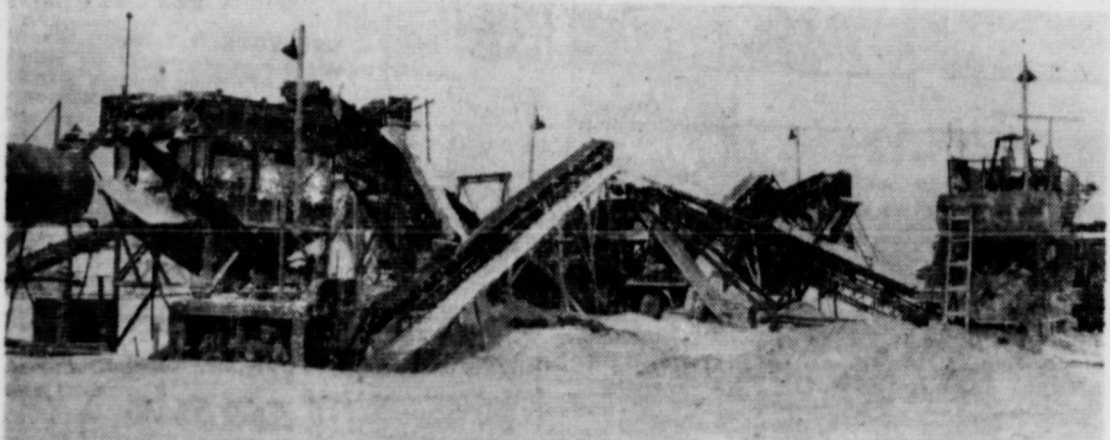

Rock Crusher Has A Good Payroll Here



What is not generally known is that O'Donnell has a splendid year round industry right at our door that has been in production for more than 4 years. That industry is the Lone Star Material crushing plant six miles south of town.
 The above photo gives some idea as to the investment and size of operations. The plant employs 25 people and most of the labor lives in O'Donnell with some in Dawson county. Also there are 20 trucks which haul the crushed rock daily with the capacity of the trucks running from 8 to 15 cubic yards. Also there is a loading ramp at Hindman switch where rock is loaded on gravel cars.
 The rock quarry is tested and approved by the Texas Highway Department each year. Good rock must be HARD and this rock is very hard. Because of this hardness production is expensive. The rock is drilled on 6 foot centers and then blasted with dynamite loaded from top to bottom. The firm buys this explosive in 10,000 pound loads and use it about a month. Also they have a blast and strip the pit to a depth of 6 feet and haul the stripping away to waste piles. At present the plant is being electrified complete with electric power through out.
 Of great importance to O'Donnell is the fact that the annual payroll runs to \$80,000 and the truck delivery payroll to \$200,000 annually. Most of this money goes into local circulation.
 The plant is managed by C A

Lacy and Fred D. Moore is superintendent. Both men live and trade here and are top citizens. Mr. Lacy is a Lobo booster as are most all O'Donnell folks.
 The firm extends an invitation to all who will visit the plant when in that area. The firm is deeply appreciative of this area's business and will sell a pick up load or a 15 yard load with the same efficient service. Many from here buy their chat or screenings from rock, for their driveways, garage floors, etc from this firm. The chat sells at \$1 a yard load on your truck or pick up. They sell rock within a 100 mile radius of here.
 O'Donnell salutes this firm especially the fact that it has given us some fine fellow citizens.

5 teaspoons salt
1 1/2 cups lukewarm water
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
5 tablespoons shortening

Cheerful Dressing Table Helps Outlook of Drab Room

Attractive dressing tables can change bedroom, bath or dressing rooms into real decorative assets just with a different skirt. Often they can do as much for the room as new curtains or draperies or a more expensive piece of furniture.

When you want to make just a small investment in the room that's now drab and colorless, and expend only a short amount of time and energy, then the smartest possible solution is to change the cover on the dressing table, or to install one where now you have only an empty space.

Much more than a decorative asset, the dressing table can give you storage space for some of the smaller items now cluttering a crowded chest of drawers. If you have a seat for the table as well as a mirror, you may be certain that it will be of great value for cosmetic sessions while the chest mirror is in use by the man of the house.

Some dressing tables are designed with drawers to fit at the sides or underneath. If not, you can easily

get inexpensive chests to fit, or even make some out of cartons or boxes. It need not matter that these are not things of beauty in themselves, as a pretty skirt will cover a multitude of faults. The main thing is to get the storage space out of sight.

The top of the table can hold your cosmetics prettily and within easy reach, right at the mirror where they're to be applied.

Seats for these tables can be purchased, but with budgetary strain, a barrel, an odd piano seat or ottoman, or even a wood box can be covered to match the table to be used effectively as well as comfortably.

Variety of Tables Are Available

The type of dressing table you have depends greatly upon what funds you have to put into it, and what happens to be available at the time you acquire it. Some of the smartest finished tables may be an old kitchen table with shortened legs, a crate that's been altered to fit the needs or simply a shelf installed in a corner.

What the table is in the beginning has very little to do with what you make of it. The most inexpensive kinds can be covered as attractively as expensive purchased items as the whole table top with its skirt is covered.

In general, however, the covering

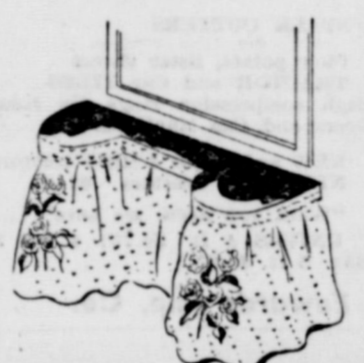
put on the table should match the style of the bedroom. If it's informal, you can use gay chintzes and cotton prints; for more formal or tailored rooms, some of the textured fabrics with rich weaves and colors are more appropriate.

Whether the table is to have gathers and ruffles or neat pleats also depends a great deal on the room in which the dressing table is used. There should be harmony even though the dressing table is a big item of interest, and frequently is gay and colorful.

Glass or mirror tops for the table are most practical in the long run for they're easy to keep clean. When clear glass is used, paper or fabric used elsewhere in the room may be cut to fit the top to be placed under the glass. Do this before hanging the skirt.

Fullness Gives Luxurious Note

If you decide you want a gathered skirt, measure the dressing table

from both sides, where you want the material end to hang. Usually this

will extend to the back a few inches and rarely will it go all the way around. Add to this measurement the necessary allowance for pleating or shirring.

Whether pleated or gathered, the skirt should be made full, as this gives an impression of luxury. Pleats should be deep so they do not look as though they will open. Gathers should be full, and you may need two to two and one-half times the original measurement for this.

Filmy materials will require more yardage for fullness than the heavier ones as the gathers are softer, the more sheer the fabric.

For length of the skirt, measure from the top of the table edge to the floor. Add to this the seam allowance for finished top as well as the hem. In cases where the skirt opens at the front, and where the separate sections come together, the figure of the pattern should match. You may have to allow extra yardage in material for this, so as to have pattern repeat itself properly. With plain materials you need not consider this.

An easy way to gather the skirt, especially when you want to iron it flat is to make a narrow casing at the top, as you do for curtains put on rods, and run a heavy cord through this to gather the skirt properly. Make knots on each end of the cord and put a large headed tack at the back edge of the casing, and tack to the table.

The center front may be tacked in the same way as the back if you need to hold the material in place properly, and especially if the table has a center front opening.

Unusual Treatments Add Decorative Accents

Be experimental about dressing table skirts if you want to give your room a distinctive note. A Victorian or somewhat formal type room can use a skirt that looks sedate and saucy at the same time if you have the regular gathered skirt, and then shir it at intervals to show a petticoat in plaid or print. Ruching at the top of such a table may be finished with pinking shears instead of hemming, if desired.

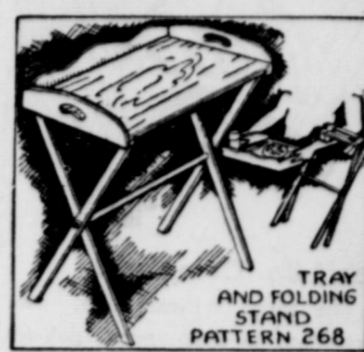
Plain gathered skirts can be made interesting if you want to add small appliques of the floral used in curtains or draperies to them. Another idea is to cut tassels from fringe which is purchased by the yard to sew them on a plain skirt of taffeta or another of the luxurious materials.

Several rows of ruffles sewed on a plain underskirt are very effective for feminine rooms. Using a plastic material you can have ruffles which do not wilt easily, even in hot, humid weather, and at the same time, you can keep them neat simply by wiping off with a damp cloth.

Give Expensive Look To Budget Fabrics

To cut the expense of covering a dressing table, it's possible to use materials that cost little or nothing, and still have them look new. What about an old net formal? The full skirt of this yields enough material for a skirt, and may require little sewing, especially if there are ruffles on the dress that can be utilized.

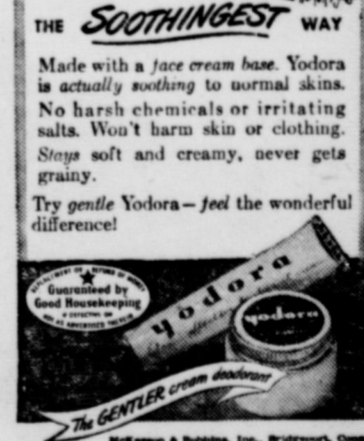

Rundown Pastures Can Be Productive
Soil Test Is First Step In 'Face-Lifting' Plan

A "face-lifting" for old, rundown, weedy permanent pastures is recommended by Purdue University agronomists. A good renovation program supported by liming and the use of commercial fertilizer can bring a pasture back to lush, vigorous production, they say. It can double the pasture's carrying capacity and improve the quality of the herbage.

First step in the program is a soil test to find out the needs for



limestone and for nitrogen, phosphate and potash fertilizer.

Making a new seedbed on an old sod can be satisfactorily done with a disc harrow or field cultivator, the agronomists say. The operation can be eased considerably by working the soil in one direction and then working it crosswise.

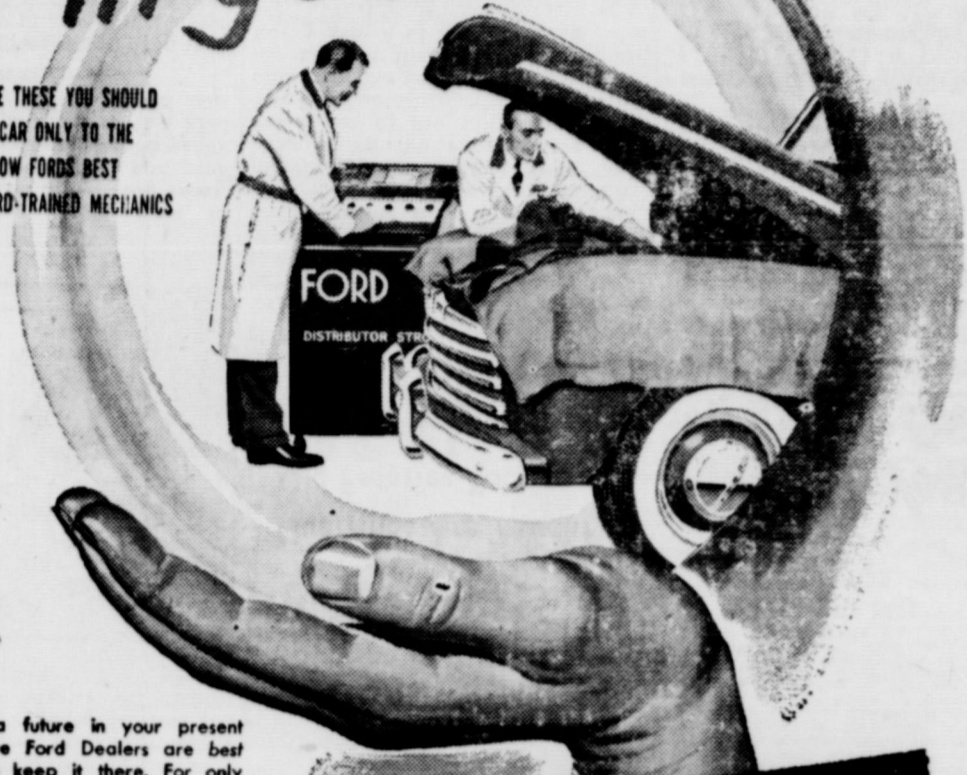
Timothy and smooth brome grass are excellent for supplementing blue grass. How much these grasses increase pasture output depends on the legumes used in the mixture and the amount and analysis of fertilizer. The agronomists say that a good seed mixture should contain two pounds of red clover, three pounds of broadleaf trefoil and a quarter pound of Ladino clover. The Purdue agronomists stress that a good application of commercial fertilizer is essential in pasture renovation. They recommend using 400 pounds per acre of 0-20-10 or 0-20-0 fertilizer at seeding time. The phosphate and potash fertilizer helps get the new seeding off to a good start, and supplies the nutrients the legumes need most.

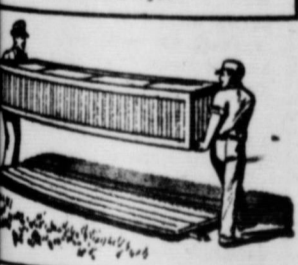

The study also indicated a close relationship between electrification and general home improvement on farms. For example, approximately \$100,000 was spent from July, 1947, to December, 1948, alone for home modernization. Approximately 4,900,000 of the 10,000,000 occupied farms and almost 100,000,000 of the occupied rural population will soon have electricity.

Skid Carrier



An easy and time saving way to move turkey poult and young chickens from brooder house to range is the skid carrier described above. Build the crate on a hay sled or other farm carrier and divide it into sections. Carrier is loaded through sliding doors at top, then is rolled to the range where two men lift the top and the birds are sent away.

Plans to Build Grain Elevators Will Continue

The commodity credit corporation program which provides loans to farmers to finance construction of new farm grain storage facilities will be continued in 1951. Secretary of Agriculture announced that the loan program, initiated in June, 1949, and scheduled to expire June 30, 1951, has been extended another year. The program is extendable on a two-year basis.

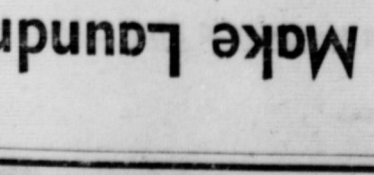

Household Hints

Changing Woodwork Finish
QUESTION: We bought an old cottage which has grained woodwork. It is badly marred in places. Is there any possible way this can be removed and an oil stain applied? The baseboards are rather wide and I am afraid if we were to enamel them white, it would make them look still wider.
ANSWER: I don't agree with you on that point. I believe that if you were to enamel them, to match the color of the walls, the width of the baseboard would not be so apparent as it would be if it were a contrasting, and probably a darker color than the walls. You can remove the present finish with a small portable electric sander (if you can buy or rent one), or else by softening it with varnish remover and scraping it off, then cleaning off the remover thoroughly with turpentine. You can finish with two coats of enamel undercoater and a coat of enamel, or else with your oil stain and varnish. I hope you will not make the woodwork too dark.

The attractive sea shells you find this summer will make fine ornaments and ash trays. Clean them thoroughly and dry. Then apply two thin coats of fresh white shellac, allowing each coat to dry first.

If aluminum sink edges blacken aprons of persons standing against them, rub the aluminum with steel wool. Then apply two thin coats of fresh shellac.

Discolored glass flower vases can be cleaned by filling them with a solution of warm water, baking soda and a few potato peels. Let this remain for several hours, then rinse in clear warm water to which ammonia has been added.

An attractive bedroom has walls painted a soft cactus green with woodwork done in a grayed coral tone. At the window, which serves as a dressing table site, there are small folding shutters instead of draperies. The blond wood of the furniture blends with the beige tone of the ceiling and chair upholstery echoes the coral of the woodwork.

A novelty hanging vine can be grown from sweet potato by planting in a hanging basket or pot of sand or sand loam and watering occasionally. The leaves are dark green and resemble certain types of ivy.

Yes and No Taft

SENATOR ROBERT A. TAFT of Ohio has made another of his now famous Yes and No speeches, this one a recent radio address on the subject of controls. The Ohio solon set up every known obstacle to the imposition of price controls, even going back to a statement by President Truman in 1947 in which the latter referred to wage and price controls as "police state controls."

Senator Taft listed wage and price controls as ending free collective bargaining, as ending free competition in industry, commerce and manufacturing.

"The best way to get prices lower for the consumer in the long run is to encourage unlimited production, and, of course, prices held below normal by government decree discourage such production over any long period of time. Certainly we don't want to give the federal government power to regulate every one of a billion transactions a day in the United States and every detail of commerce and wage payments unless it is absolutely essential." And then in the next breath, Mr. Taft says:

"I happen to think that today it is essential, but there are a lot of people who conscientiously do not think so."

Then Senator Taft, in his next paragraph, listed those who oppose price and wage controls, such as the national manufacturers association, the united mine workers, the carpenters union, the American farm bureau federation, the national grange, the United States chamber of commerce, the American retail federation, and the American individual businessmen. Then he points to a poll of Ohio farmers showing 71 per cent are opposed to any price and wage controls, and continues his Yes and No picture by saying:

"Nevertheless, I have come to the conclusion that we must continue wage and price controls for the present. I think the people who oppose them do not allow for what is going to happen in the next few months."

Continuing along this fence straddling, Mr. Taft declares the need for controls "arises out of the tremendous mobilization program, which we have undertaken to meet the threat of Russian aggression, the danger of which was brought forcibly to our attention by the Korean war." Then despite the fact that President Truman has again and again, starting in 1948, asked for price and wage controls and a strong defense production act, Mr. Taft blames inflation on the President, not congress, for the reason he says, that the congress finally passed the defense production act of 1950 in September of that year, and the President did not exercise his powers under the act until four months later.

Big Business Benefits

Then Senator Taft takes up the line followed by a large segment of big business when he declares that because the President asks for powers to build plants, if necessary, and to license business under the act—that is nothing but straight socialism. The fact is that the language of the bill asked for by the President follows almost word for word the same section which was in effect during the war, under which all business was licensed and under which the government built such additional facilities as aluminum plants, steel plants, rubber plants and what-not. And this was so socialistic that today most of these government-built plants have been taken over by big business at bargain prices and are being operated today—not by the government, but by American business under the free enterprise system. But we needed more aluminum and synthetic rubber and more steel ... and got it during the war through this method.

GOP and Dixie

Mr. Taft then deftly sidesteps any responsibility for what may happen by pointing out this congress is a Democratic congress and that the President's fight is with members of the Democratic party, not with Mr. Republican. The facts are, however, that Senator Taft and the Republican minority is playing "footsie" with the southern Democrats in a coalition move, with an eye single to 1952.

Flood Relief

The losses in the tragic floods in Missouri and Kansas prompted Senators Kem and Schoeppl to plead for some remedial action. The congress quickly passed a \$15,000,000 relief bill. Senator Kem could not refrain from pointing out that his Missouri taxpayers were "pouring lavish gifts of dollars down foreign ratholes" for flood control in Holland and other countries, while nothing was done for the Missouri valley.

Food Retailers Put Emphasis Upon Vegetables During Week

In season, the price of vegetables makes them especially tempting to the housewife shopping within the limits of a difficult food budget. At the peak of the vegetable harvest, grocers strive to keep the wide selection they offer. Grocers employ attractive displays in their stores and announce their green wares in home town newspaper advertising.

The newspaper helps by printing appetizing new ways to serve vegetables and also time-tested recipes, all emphasizing the nutrient value in the various soil-grown products.

To further the advantages to food consumers arising from the large supply of garden supplies upon the home town market this time of year and to minimize the economic chance dealers take in this sudden and large supply of perishable foods, an unusual health food event has been inaugurated. This is National Vegetable Week (August 5-11), now being observed in your home town and other home towns like it across the nation.

National Vegetable Week is designed to teach local grocers the most effective way to move vegetables from their bins to family tables with the health and budget of consumers as a prime consideration.

This big project was inaugurated three years ago. Although nationwide, it is a strictly local affair with a committee in your town entirely in charge of the program. The committee invites your mayor to issue a proclamation dedicating the week to vegetables. A local or



state vegetable queen may be chosen to appear in your town's observance in cooperation with community organizations and services.

The National Vegetable Queen, Miss Elaine Tesson, Osseo, Minn., an attractive brunette, is appearing as the guest of honor at many related events during the summer.

Local newspaper editors and program directors are receiving many helpful ideas upon vegetable promotion, recipes, crop and production facts and local marketing from the county agent, home demonstration agent and marketing agents for vegetable growers.

In home town newspapers and in the windows of food retailers are seen such slogans as:

"It's the green stuff that counts!"
"Don't peel away that Venus Vegetable Goodness!"
"For health's sake, eat more vitamin-powered vegetables!"
"Eat away that hay window with tasty summer vegetables!"
"This is vegetable season that gives that lettuce complexion!"
"Don't get overheated rendering HOME ON THE RANGE—eat more crisp delicious vegetables."

The president of the Vegetable Growers Association of America, Walter F. Pretzer, Cleveland, who is conducting the sponsorship of National Vegetable Week, recently stated: "National Vegetable Week and the American Vegetable Queen have done much to bring to the attention of our nation the importance of vitamin-powered vegetables and the real place of agriculture in the life of the community than any other activity our 42-year-old association has ever undertaken."

Vegetables in Shell

The favorite recipe of Elaine Tesson, Minnesota State Vegetable Queen, is her recipe for "Vegetables in A Shell."

Scone Shell
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 t. baking powder
1 t. salt
1/2 cup fat
1/2 cup milk
1 egg beaten
Mix dry ingredients, cut in fat, add egg and milk. Roll on a canvas covered board to 1 1/2 inches larger than the 9 inch pan. Flute the edge. Prick bottom and side of shell. Bake 15 minutes at 425°F. Keep warm until ready to fill with creole mixture.

Creole Filling

1/4 lb. bulk pork sausage
1/4 lb. ground beef
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup cooked carrot strips
1 cup cooked lima beans
1 cup cooked string beans
1 1/2 t. salt
1/4 cup chopped onion
2 T. butter
1/4 cup sour cream
1 cup water
1/4 cup sifted flour
3/4 t. pepper
Brown meat in butter in skillet, add onion and pepper. Cook over a low heat until vegetables are tender. Stir in flour mixed with salt and pepper. Add sour cream and water. Stir and cook until all ingredients are blended, about 5 minutes.

Add carrot strips, lima beans and string beans. Heat until the vegetables are hot. Serve in scone shell. Serve with tossed salad, hot rolls, oatmeal fruit cookies, berries and cream, coffee.

SOAP BOX DERBY TIME
Racing Benedicts Tuning Cars For Big Soap Box Race Prizes

SOAP BOX DERBY racing is often a family affair in White Plains, N.Y., where many brother-combinations have competed in the last 12 derbies. But, as families go, the racing Benedicts, of 8 De Kalb Avenue, have gone a lot farther than most.

There hasn't been a Soap Box Derby without at least one of the six Benedict brothers since 1940. This year there are three in the race: David, 15, Robert, 12, and Edward, 11.

Tune-up headquarters for the Benedicts' cars is Ted Skitt's service station. Skitt is an official distributor for the special Soap Box Derby lubricant that Shell Oil Company gives to all Derby entrants.

Dave Benedict, the Derby veteran of the three, knows it pays to keep his car properly lubricated. In 1949, as Class A runner-up, he won a bicycle. He won two heats last year, one in 1947. Now in his last year—he'll be too old next year—Dave is tuning his car to perfection.

The big Derby lure is a trip to Akron, Ohio, in August, where the White Plains champion competes against champions from other cities in the All American Soap Box Derby finals. This poses a problem for Mr. and Mrs. Benedict. Although they naturally want the boys to win, they realize that if one of them does, the others will insist on going to Akron to cheer him on in the "big one"—and vacation plans will have to be changed, their effecting the whole family's plans.

The three other Benedict brothers are either too young or too old for Soap Box Derby racing. The oldest, both Derby veterans, are Jim, who teaches industrial arts in the Dalton, Mass., high school, and Alex, a Marine stationed at Le Jeune, N.C. The youngest is Brian, age 4, and already an enthusiast. He won't be eligible for the Derby until 1958. Then, he undoubtedly will keep the Benedict name rolling for another four years.

Christian's Spending
Lesson for August 12, 1951

ONCE upon a time, so they say, a Scotchman opened his pocketbook in December, and a June-bug flew out. That story belongs to the class of stories that sound funny because they are impossible, like the Paul Bunyan stories, or the one about the fly that fell off a marble and broke his back. No man is so stingy that he could go from June to December without opening his pocketbook to spend a single cent. Spending is something all of us do, all the time.

Is Your Money Yours?

"IT'S my money and I can do what I please with it." That is the average man's attitude toward his money. But it's not the Christian attitude.

In the first place, Jesus' parable of the talents reminds us that all the conditions, and all the energy, and everything else that makes earning money possible, are in the long run the gifts of God. "It is he that hath made us and not we ourselves" is just as true now as it ever was.

God it is who gave us life in the first place, who has preserved us, and endowed us with whatever gifts and capacities we have. We are not our own, we are bought with a price, as Paul puts it.

However, we earn our living, whether as farmers, business or professional people, if it had not been for the blessings of God we could have earned nothing at all. One bedrock principle of the Old Testament is that the earth is the Lord's. Put that together with the New Testament principle that the Christian belongs to God, and you have arrived at the great principle of "stewardship."

Profits or Profit?

THE earliest Christians of Jerusalem pooled all their resources and dealt them out to all, in proportion to their individual needs. This experiment in sharing the wealth failed; and one main reason for the failure was that they paid all their attention to consumption and none at all to production.

No matter how smoothly you distribute the wealth, if some one is not producing, the whole pile will vanish in time.

Nevertheless, those earliest Christians did have a firm grasp of a real truth; namely, that when a Christian spends money he ought to have the needs of the community first in mind, and not his own profits. Does this sound too idealistic?

Well, even the law, slanted though it may seem toward the protection of wealth, puts limits on the ways a man can spend his money. If it can be shown that what he pays his good money for is hurtful to the community, the law will clamp down on him, in many cases. You can't keep a skunk farm on Broadway. It may be your money, and your skunks, but it's not your Broadway.

To take another angle: down in Atlanta (Georgia) a highly successful industrialist, when he died, left the stock in his company to his employees. They had helped him earn his fortune, he said; they should share in the proceeds.

Does not our community help us earn whatever we do earn? And doesn't the community deserve consideration in the spending?

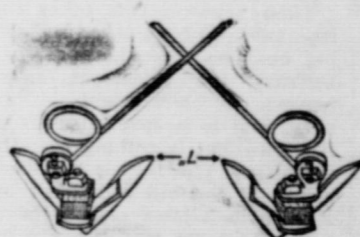
