Oil Activity Locally

A new deep wildcat thru the Pennsylvanian pay has been staked 5 miles northwest of O'Donnell in Dawson county. The well is the Standard Oil of Texas No. 1 Mrs M. V. Smith. The well will go to 9500 feet. Drilling will start immediately. There is more need for housing as new wells go down in this area.

Houston Oil Co and Seaboard Oil Co No. 1 Howell near Red mine was drilling ahead after hitting salt water in a Spraberry test. The well was last reported below 7278 in lime and shale to test the Ellenberger.

Magnolia No. 1 W. W. Caswell, offset to the Draw discovery in Pennsylvanian lime, was reported drilling ahead after developing extra good shows in a Spraberry drill stem test. The Caswell test was last reported drilling below 6200 feet in lime and shale with the hope of tapping the pay of O'Donnell's fine lone producer at about 8750 feet.

City Enacts Cotton Burr Burning Law

Elsewhere in this issue of the index is the official publishing of the newly enacted ordinance outlawing the open burning of large piles of trash and cotton burrs with in the City except as provided by the new law. It is thought that this ordinance will ease the condition that has prevailed in the past when the wind blew toward town from the gins. Many suffering from hay fever and asthma should welcome this regulation. Nearly all gins in town have, or are preparing to comply with this new ruling. 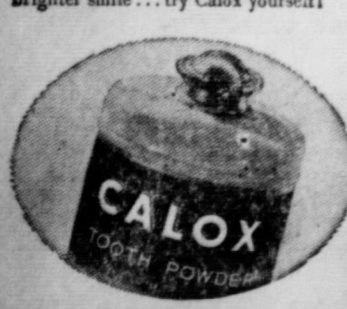

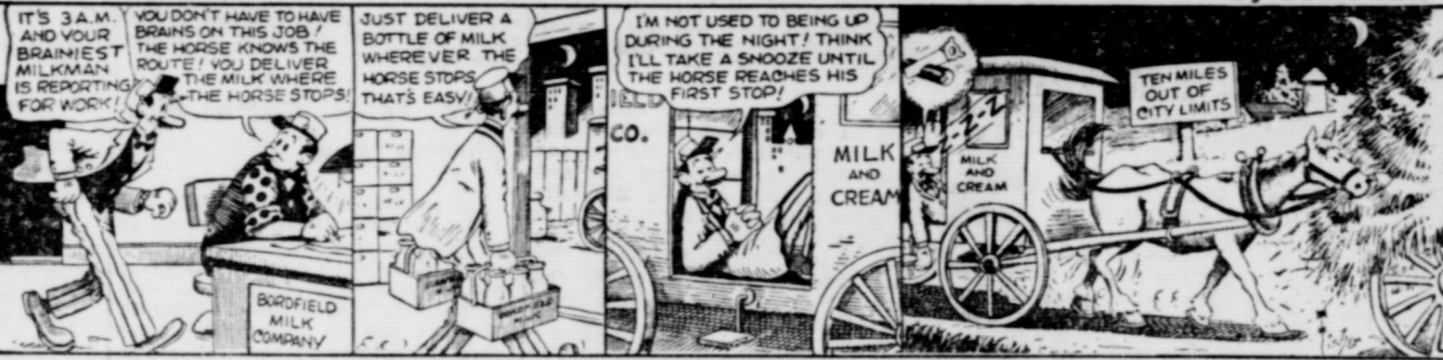

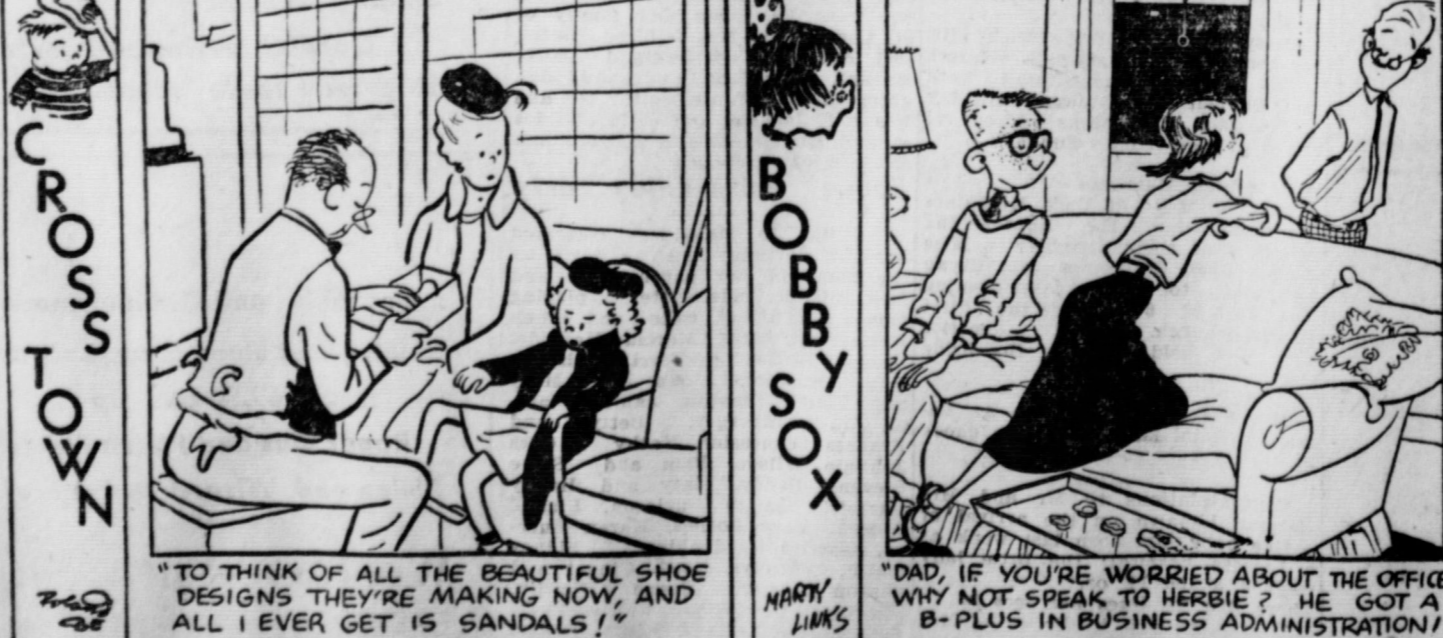

The Thundering Herd Is Back

IN A FEW DAYS NOW, close to a thousand mammoths, mastodons and gazelles will be turned loose on the public domain. These represent the pro football crop for 1950, with peace finally established. There will be 13 teams in action, where each squad will be large at least in the earlier days of practice, before the pruning knife falls.

Just what the aggregate weight of these 13 squads will be is beyond our guess but the weights run from 155 to 235 pounds and there are more players over 200 than under 200. The 13 head coaches and their aids have a tough job to face in reducing the oil and fat content where steaming blubber must be taken off in tons.

The new season will open with a Philadelphia explosion where Eagles and Browns are figured to draw some 100,000 clients. So many players, good and average, have been shifted around, back and forth, that it is only a raw guess now to start picking any winners, but you can be pretty sure the Eagles, Browns and Bears will be up there. Bo McMillin's Detroit squad will be another effective outfit, especially with Leon Hart's 270 pounds in the cast.

Hart may not weigh quite that much but it won't be far away, according to Frank Leahy's judgment last fall. "The boy is still growing," Frank said, when Hart reached 260. "He is only 20 years old."

Among those who will be featured this season are Van Buren of the Eagles, Lujack of the Bears, Waterfield of the Rams, Graham of the Browns, Conerly of the Giants, and other good passers with the Yankees, Colts, etc.

Both leagues are well fixed for passers but the Eagles still look to have the better passing and running combination for an all-around attack. The others, however, getting first call in the draft have all been well strengthened where Greasy Neale had to stand pat—or nearly so.

The Williams Goal

Ted Williams has apparently fixed both eyes on the Babe Ruth home-run mark of 60.

Ted sensed the fact that 1950 was about as good a season as any other with the ball at least giving a good imitation of jack rabbit in action.

Ted also remembered that he isn't getting any younger. He will be 32 years old in October, which isn't venerable, but which also isn't too youthful.

In other years Ted has mixed his home-run hitting with more attention to mere base hits. This season he is really giving it the full treatment at a time where as Ford Frick says — "Even the pitchers are trying for home runs."

Williams will have plenty in the way of competition the rest of the way from Rosen, Kiner, Drogo, Stephens, Campanella, Snider and a few others, including DiMaggio and Easter. But from the way long Ted is taking his cut at the ball, he is the one more likely to reach the goal, if anyone does.

Ralph Kiner is leading the National league and he is sure to pick up his pace later. As a rule he falls into the groove after July Fourth. A year ago he hit 20 home runs the last 30 days of the season. The same output in 1950 might just push Kiner over the top. He is the one drawing factor the Pirates have left for the season.

It might interest Joe McCarthy to know that no manager ever left the scene with a better press than the departing Red Sox leader drew around the circuit.

Maybe a manager who wins nine pennants and seven world series doesn't need too many boosts.

What's With Baseball?

It has become pretty evident that something has been shaken loose from the baseball we all knew as it is now played in the two big leagues and the leading minors.

Either an extra charge of TNT has been inserted in the ball or an extra zip has been removed from pitching arms, something is wrong — to break the news mildly.

We have the Red Sox scoring 20 runs against the Browns in one game and a day later the Red Sox piling up 29 runs against the same team. Then the Cleveland Indians pile up 14 runs in the first inning against Mr. Mack's disintegrating Athletics who have hit the soapy chute at record speed.

Is this baseball or cricket? Scores ranging from 12 to 16 runs are common. Few pitchers ever complete seven innings. The pitching can't be that bad. The war has been over since

Easily Made Night Clothes Relief to Family Budget

TAKE A GOOD look at your clothing budget, those of you who have big families. Is it out of line and hard to meet?

You may not have enough time to sew all the clothes for all the members of the family, but if you can make your own night clothes, such as gowns, house robes and pajamas, you can relieve a lot of strain on the family's clothing budget.

These are easy garments to make, and you can frequently press old clothing, pieces of remnant or good but inexpensive pieces of material into service.

Gowns and pajamas are usually given to beginners so they can learn to sew, so you need not worry about their being difficult to make, if you are interested in sewing. If you feel pressed for time, then this is a job that will require little of precious time and energy.

With home sewing, you can make garments that are suitable and fitting, as well as those which will offer few laundering problems. With good materials and carefully chosen styles, you can also eliminate many mending problems, which will be a saving in time for you later.

For warm weather, choose lighter weight materials such as seersucker broadcloth and percale. Nainsook, batiste and voile may be used for girls' gowns.

Old robes discarded by older members of the family frequently yield enough serviceable material to make garments for the younger set. These will not have to be ripped

to the youngest four-years old or younger.

If you desire, you can also make the younger child's pajamas in a style that has a back belt which slips through the side seam belt loops and ties in front. In this way, buttons are eliminated and the child can tie the pajama in front and requires little help.

One-piece pajamas require less material than two-piece and can be used in the four to seven year age group. After this, two-piece pajamas are preferred again, but if they are made in a midly style top, buttons again can be eliminated. When there are no buttons, you can cut down button and buttonhole sewing, and thus make mending and ironing much easier.

If you're planning making pajamas for colder weather, make those for tots with feet so they may have greater protection and warmth. Some of the older children may prefer them, too, if the climate is cold.

Gowns for girls may be of ankle or above ankle length, especially

at the seams. The new garment can be cut from back or front, especially if it's a small size.

Robes should provide warmth, but they shouldn't be too bulky, as this makes them difficult to sew and uncomfortable to wear.

One of the best aspects of being able to sew pajamas at home for youngsters is that you can assure proper and comfortable fit. This is decidedly important, especially if the child is a chubby and has difficulty in getting ready-made clothes.

The legs on the pajamas should be comfortable without bagging; shoulders and neck should fit smoothly to have proper set and comfort in the garment. The armholes should be roomy to accommodate different sleeping positions, and the crotch must be long enough.

Smaller children do best in two-piece pajamas that button at the waistline. Two pairs of pants, and one top are usually ideally suited

Mother-in-Law's Acts Are Legal

Would the Courts Enforce A Purely Moral Obligation?

Just before his death, a broker asked his business partner to "look after my wife when I'm gone." Solemnly the partner promised to do so. Soon after the broker died, the partner realized that the company's future was none too bright. He sold his share — but did nothing about the interest of his partner's widow. It wasn't long before she realized that she had been left "holding the bag." Angriously she sued the partner for damages, claiming that he had broken his deathbed promise to her husband. But the court refused to do anything about it. The judge said the partner's promise was unenforceable because it was based on mere "friendship and good will" — instead of some legal obligation.

If a Workman is Stabbed By a Maniac, May He Collect Compensation?

A laundryman finished making a delivery, and started back toward his truck. Just then a maniac appeared on the sidewalk, wielding a knife with great ferocity. He rushed up to the laundryman and, before other bystanders could restrain him, inflicted several wounds on the man's shoulder. When the victim later tried to collect workmen's compensation for his injuries, the company opposed the claim on the ground that the mishap had no connection with the job. But the court disagreed and granted the claim. The judge pointed out that a laundryman's duties require him to be on the street at times, and therefore he should be protected against "street risks."

Must the Mother-in-Law Help to Make the Marriage a Success?

A young man married a girl whom his mother considered a social inferior. After the wedding, the mother continued to treat her son's wife very coldly—making no effort to establish a friendly feeling in the family. The marriage didn't last long, and the girl finally sued her mother-in-law for alienation of affections. However, the court turned down her claim. The judge said that the mother-in-law's conduct, whether wise or unwise, was still legal. His Honor explained: "Parents may hold aloof from their son's wife, may decline to recognize her, may show no interest in her. The law doesn't require anything from in-laws, except that they don't meddle with the domestic felicity of the young couple."

May a Judge Act Gallantly Toward a Female Witness?

Injured in a night club brawl, a girl sued the management for damages. At the trial, she appeared in the courtroom with a nurse. The judge realized that the girl was still ailing so he handed the nurse, a blanket and pillow to help make the girl comfortable on the witness stand. When the jury brought in a verdict against the night club owner, he immediately filed an appeal. He claimed that the judge's gallantry was improper because it showed prejudice on behalf of the girl. But the upper court found nothing wrong in the judge's behavior. The court said that a judge can be quite impartial—and still show a little simple courtesy!

materials around the house that can be pressed to use for such items as night clothes. Now is a good time to check through storeroom, closets and drawers, so that you can make space for some things which will be purchased this fall.

Seersucker, percale or broadcloth bedspreads frequently yield materials for night clothing. If there is not enough material in the spread for both pajama parts, use something that will harmonize with what you have.

A broadcloth top can easily go with seersucker pants, or two contrasting cottons, one in print, and the other in a solid, might well go together.

If you have enough material for both pajamas and robe, then by all means make the three-piece outfit, as it will thrill the child.

Cotton flannel materials are excellent when you make cool weather materials. Choose masculine prints for the boys, no matter how young they are. Flowered prints and plaids are nice for the girls, either by themselves or combined with a solid color to match one color in print or plaid.

Dad's old house robe or a light-weight suit in a flannel would make appropriate robes for the boys when cut down. A robe in dark blue or gray would be good even for girls, especially if piped in bright red or maroon, for the girls.

Chenille, purchased by the yard, or cut from an old spread, might also be used to make robes. It's

warm without being too bulky, and is excellent to use after a bath.

Durable Construction Helps Clothes Wear

You'll encounter no great construction difficulties with pajamas or nightgowns because the seams are straight and simple. The stitches should be adjusted to weight of material and threads, as for any other clothing.

Simple seams may be used in the pajama top, but flat fell or French seams are usually employed in the pants, as they give better tailoring, more comfort and wear.

If you're using elastic bands at the pants' waist, make certain it's of good quality, so it doesn't have to be changed during the life of the garment. It should be tight enough to keep the pants on, but not too restricting as this interferes with sleeping comfort.

Buttons which will not withstand laundering are a poor investment on clothing such as this which needs frequent laundering. Have them simple but durable, and with buttonholes that will accommodate them readily.

Trimming Should Conform To Style of Garment

Trimings are not at all essential on pajamas and nightgowns, but if they are used should be of the simplest variety. Contrasting bands are seen on sleeves and sometimes at the pants' ends, the latter being used to lengthen them when the child gets too tall.

Girl's Mother Is too Ambitious

TODAY'S rather sad and difficult appeal comes from a St. Louis girl of 15. She is not strictly a resident of that city, but her father works there, and she does not want her particular suburban town identified. "It's the goal of most Americans to make pink personalities of their children," Birren says. He characterizes a pink personality as one who likes life and who is interested in the world, but doesn't want to be reminded that it isn't a kind and gentle world.

City of O'Donnell, to burn or destroy any cotton burrs, leaves, parts of cotton stalks, waste lint or other combustible matter mentioned in Section 1 of this Ordinance, within the City limits of the City, except to burn the same in an incinerator of the following specifications, viz:

Such incinerator shall be a cylinder shaped structure standing upright on a suitable concrete foundation and not less than fifteen (15) feet in diameter nor less than (18) feet in the height of its main walls, and such walls shall be constructed of heavy iron, lined inside with either common or fireproof brick, laid flat, to a height of at least ten (10) feet above its concrete foundation; or the walls of such incinerator may be constructed of fireproof brick laid flat, to the height of at least ten (10) feet above its concrete foundation, and the remainder of its walls may be of heavy iron structure up to the required height of eighteen (18) feet; and such incinerator shall be covered by a spark proof and windproof conical shaped iron cover securely attached to the top of its walls; and such incinerator shall be provided with a smoke stack of at least thirty inches in diameter, which shall be connected to the body or reservoir of such incinerator near its top and which said smoke stack shall extend vertically at least twenty five (25) feet from its point of connection with the body or reservoir of such incinerator; and such smoke stack shall be supported by a substantial and sufficient concrete foundation; and the earth shall be removed from the inside of such incinerator to a depth of at least three (3) feet below the grade level; and such incinerator shall be provided with one (1) "clean out" doors near the bottom of such structure and placed on opposite sides of such structure from each other; and the smoke stack of such incinerator shall be equipped with an efficient spark screen or arrester. Such incinerator shall be subject to inspection for approval or dis-

approval by the governing body of the City of O'Donnell, or under its direction, and when so approved, a proper permit shall be issued for its use.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars \$100. Each day during which any violation of this Ordinance may occur shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. The fact that the City of O'Donnell does not now have adequate regulations covering the fire hazards caused by the accumulation, storage, and disposal of the combustible matter mentioned in this Ordinance creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule which requires that ordinances be read three separate meetings of the City Council, said rule is hereby suspended, and it is hereby ordained that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Section 3. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation operating a cotton gin within the City limits of the

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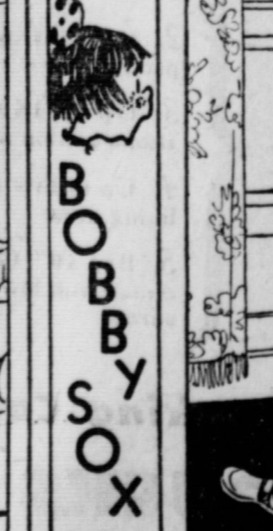
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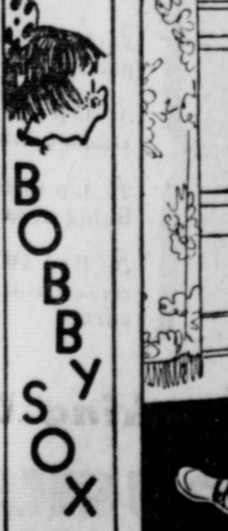

WOMEN WHO really care how they look can really achieve beauty. This does not come about by accident and miss care or snap judgments on choice of clothing. It is the result of careful study of the good points as well as weak points, then playing down one feature while pointing up another.

Many women say they are content with all that's offered them in the way of clothing, they don't know they should choose. You can learn principles and then apply them in relation to yourself for most effective application.

Sometimes helps to know why you should not wear certain hats or dresses, because this helps you remember them and also teaches you to look for certain details which help dramatize best features.

Good for all face and figure, but naturally they must be applied differently so they can look to the best.

The same applies to colors. Blue, for example, has been called the American woman's best color, because whether you are redhead, brunette, blonde, gray, white or in-

Two popular sizes in red, green, yellow, blue, plum, chartreuse and grey are available.

One of the smartest ways to decide what hats or clothing are right for you is to pick those which do for you what face or figure does not. A good example of this is in sloping shoulders. The hat should have some upward movement to counteract the slope in the shoulder. Wearing a soft hairdo will help, too. Avoid the severe hair dress and mushroom-brimmed hat that only accent shoulder sag.

Most women can wear berets, but the style should be chosen carefully. An older woman or one with a large nose looks stunning in profile types now shown. If you're tall, have one that's worn flat and forward to cut down height. Those who are young and short wear them best to the back of the head.

accent your best features.

handsome, should never be set on uncovered ears. Soften them by placing a curl or cluster of curls at ears, or place a bow which fits near the ear on the hat.

Complexion Helps Determine Best Color For You

Those who have coarse complexioned skins should soften the harsh

effect of their skin by wearing soft, in-between shades. It's best to avoid brilliant colors right next to the face, as well as hat materials like rough straw which will only emphasize the coarseness.

Too delicate materials will give the same effect as too harsh colors and materials. Cute bows and trimmings, brilliant flowers and metallic trimmings should be eliminated from hats.

Sallow-complexioned individuals should also avoid harsh colors. Colored veiling is excellent for minimizing this fault, and so are muted shades of dusty rose, gray, pale yellow, green and gray-blue.

You can well imagine what effect polka dots have if the face is freckled, but also to be avoided are anything which might suggest or accent freckles such as flower centers and perforated bags and other accessories. Freckles are less noticeable if you wear plain materials. If you must wear figured materials, choose stripes.

If you're blonde, feminine, with hazel eyes and the pink and white complexion, you have few worries. Stay with feminine clothing, but avoid frills or fuss.

With chestnut hair and brown eyes, you can wear daring color combinations and choose those which are vivid and striking. Pale, in-between colors will age or sober you too much.

When you have good gray or blue eyes and want to dramatize them,

place matching or lighter blue next to the face. If the eyes are dull, use a deeper blue shade. Too much eye make-up and too bright colors should be discarded.

Normalize Necklines With Proper Apparel

Anything which would emphasize thinness is to be avoided if the neck is long and thin. These include V-shaped necklines, curls piled high on the head, tight, narrow waves, or highly perched hats. Try to get width in the hairdo by smoothing the crown and having curls at either side. Have hats that cover the head, forehead, ears and back of the neck so the thin neckline can be broken.

Circular hair arrangement, yokes and full gathered bodices are on the taboo list if the neck is short and thick. Open necklines, simple bodice lines and tapered effects in the hairdo will counteract the short look.

Head For Car During Storm

HERE'S COMFORT for those who dive under the nearest bed at the first crash of thunder. The National Geographic Magazine has some advice on how to dodge lightning.

Don't head for the nearest bed. Your automobile is much safer. It's one of the safest places you can take refuge in because the steel of the body will conduct the current away from the occupants. That goes for airplanes too.

Your chances of being killed by lightning in the United States are about one in 365,000. And this is true despite the fact that over the earth some 44,000 lightning storms occur every day, with 10 flashes of lightning every second.

Moreover, some strokes at their peaks generate temperatures as high as 27,000 degrees Fahrenheit. It is "turned on" only 35 millionths of a second during the 20,000 mile an hour flash.

Lightning is known to strike between two clouds, or within a single cloud far more often than between a cloud and the ground. A flash may speed more than 10 miles between two clouds, and it may race to the ground from a distance of only three miles.

Strikes Same Place Twice
Lightning can and does strike the same place twice. It has hit the Empire State building in New York city as many as 12 times in 20 minutes, and as often as 50 times a year.

Another feature recently discovered is that lightning may strike upward from the ground. That is because it is really a high speed flow of current back and forth between powerful electric charges.

Another is to say, "I agree with you in principle, but..." and the third is to say, "I am with you—but don't quote me!" What we need nowadays is men who are willing to stand up and be quoted, quoted for good and against evil. All men are "against sin" in general; it takes a braver man to be against it in particular.

In a large town in Kentucky recently the grand jury indicted the whole police force. In the course of the jury's report they said they had heard a good deal of testimony about rotten places and practices in and around town, but most of those who had come before the grand jury had said, in effect, "Don't quote me." It is hard to make any indictment stick if people who know damaging facts are not willing to come out in broad daylight and testify. So abuses go on and on, all because every one is too shy to point an accusing finger.

Man of Courage

WE NEED more men like the prophet Elijah. God providentially removed from him all the usual temptations to keep his mouth shut. He had no investments to protect—all he had he wore on his back, and that was not much. No family depended on him. He did not represent any institution. He could speak his mind—without worrying about the effect it might have on investors, or his family, or some institution. Of course Elijah had Elijah to look after; but for himself he was not afraid in the least. Lone figure though he was, he stood out against lies and exploitation in varied forms. He stood out against popular opinion, and that is not easy for any normal man.

So many thousand votes or voices must be right we think. But Elijah did not think so. He knew that "one man with God is a majority." He stood out against official opposition; this was more dangerous still. The crowd's favor or dislike comes and goes, the crowd soon forgets; but a tyrant like Ahab (and still more like Jezebel) neither forgives nor forgets a man who has stood up to contradict and condemn him.

Then Elijah stood out against the most difficult enemy of all; organized religious leadership, that is, the false prophets. Even in the Christian era that organized church has sometimes taken the wrong side of some important questions and persecuted men who were on the side of right. But church tyranny is at least as bad as any other kind, and it takes a brave man to face it.

In Our Time

THANK GOD for all the Elijahs! Every generation has seen a few, and we have them in our time. They have not all had the spectacular success of the original prophet of Carmel, but they are here all the same.

In public life one thinks of those senators—and your state is fortunate if it has even one—who stands up for persons against profits, for the advantage of all against benefits for a few, true representatives of the people as against invested privilege.

In church life we need more men like that pastor down in Alabama who was recently "fired" because he would not take his stewards' advice and use more "tact" in his sermons against sin in general and drinking in particular. It takes courage to do such things. And Elijahs are needed in the business and professional worlds, not only in the pulpit.

Is Liquor a Sacred Cow?

THE LIQUOR traffic alone, to name but one public evil, is doing our fellow-citizens a vast amount of damage. What other business makes necessary wards in hospitals to cure its customers?

But how few men will stand up and be quoted for the facts! Newspapers will editorialize against gambling when they won't against liquor; gambling doesn't advertise but liquor does. Count the big newspapers or magazines which for the benefit of their readers are willing to go without the income which liquor advertising produces.

The judge said that if he wanted to sue, he should have refused to pay his fare and gotten off at the first stop.

Divorcee Lose Her
Money if She Remarries?

After several years of unhappy married life, the wife of a contractor went to court and got a divorce. She also was awarded weekly alimony payments "until further order of the court." Some time later, the woman remarried—this time choosing a laborer who was making a living for himself. The contractor promptly asked the judge to stop his alimony payments, but the judge refused to do so. The judge said that remarriage was not enough to end the woman's right to alimony. It was necessary, the judge ruled, that the second husband be able to support his wife properly. If he couldn't, said the judge, the first husband just had to keep on pay-

The judge said that, unless deprived of his child's custody by actual court order, the father had just as much right to the boy as the mother had.

A southern woman owed some money to a large New Jersey corporation. After collection efforts had failed, the company filed a lawsuit against the woman. At the trial, her lawyers made an impassioned plea to the jury on behalf of their client. "I appeal to you as southern gentlemen," he cried, "to rule in favor of this southern woman—and against this soulless corporation from the North!" But the court declared that this line of argument was improper, and ordered the jury to disregard it. The judge said that the lawyer should not try to win his case by appealing to the sectional feelings of the jury.
