## USDA '82 Crop Loan Rates Now Effective

### 105 MHS Seniors Receive Diplomas

The excitement of graduation was plain on the faces of 105 young men and women Friday night as they marched in the procession to the strains of the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance." A visual flashback could be seen on many of the young faces as

they left one world and entered into another, giving more significance to the event than just a graduation from school.

The 1982 Senior Class of Muleshoe was led in by escorts Kelly Bayler and Michael Isaac attired in school colors of black and white and using the class flower of a yellow rose to carry.

Commencement speaker Rev. J. E. Meeks touched on the future in his address to the gathering. His main topic was "Knocking At Closed Doors." With the idea behind the title being to urge the young people present to continue knocking at those doors throughout their lives. "A continuous knocking will result in the doors being finally opened," he said.

Meeks stated that among the Class of 1982 were some of the finest minds, and gifted lives anywhere if they were properly used. He pointed out several gifted people who had continued their quests, in spite of adversities, such as William Booth, Thomas Edison

U. S. Department of Agriculture loan rates have been established and are now applicable to 1982 Bailey County crops. The regular loan on wheat is \$3.54 a bushel, reserve loan rate on wheat is \$3.99 a bushel.

On corn, the regular loan rate is \$2.69 a bushel, and reserve rate is \$3.04 a bushel. Grain sorghum will go into the regular loan at a rate of \$4.36 per hundred weight and \$4.95 per hundred weight will apply to

the reserve loan. Barley will have a regular loan of \$2.10 per bushel, but will be \$2.39 per bushel in the reserve.

Storage on commodities will be paid at a rate of 26.5 cents per bushel on all grains entering the reserve loan.

County ASCS Executive Director Rusty Williamson has issued a reminder to producers that June 1, 1982 is the final date to enter their 1981 crops of corn, cotton and grain sorghum into the loan. This is an important date for farmers to remember, and is just around the corner, said Williamson.

County producers who wish to have their summer seeded crops measured aerially should be signed up on or by July 1, 1982 to assure that they will receive that service.

Williamson also has issued a reminder to producers that have not certified

### Oil, Gas Leases Exceed 39,000 In County Acreage

Oil lease activities are definitely keeping an upward pace in Bailey County with the filing of over 1200 acres of lease properties this week. Since April 18, an additional 8,354 acres of oil and gas leases have been filed in Bailey County, bringing the total acreage in the first four and one-half months to 39,355 acres.

In reviewing the leases filed since April 18, a heavy concentration of leases have been filed in both the Bula and Enochs areas and north and south of

those communities. There is also a fairly heavy concentration of lease activity in the Baileyboro area, both north and south of the town of Baileyboro.

Another large lease site is that near Goodland, Texas and westward towards the State Line.

Some of the leases filed have been purchased by W. Wayne Gill and S. K. Fisk; however, Atlantic Richfield is also in on the buying activity.

### May City Sales Tax Rebate Reflects 1.58% Increase

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.5 million to 166 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for May.

"This fifth monthly rebate for this year brings the total these cities have received to more than \$318 million," Bullock said. "That's almost 13 percent ahead of what these cities had received this time last year."

Houston received the biggest check, 20.3 million, which brings the total that city has received to \$67.6 million, up 16 percent over last year.

Muleshoe's city sales tax check for the month of May 1982 was \$26,397.08, reflecting a downward trend against the \$29,517.33 payment at the same time in 1981. Payments in 1982 to date amount to \$87,611.28 however, a 1.58% increase from 1981 payments of \$86,251.66 at the same time.

City sales tax rebates in Littlefield for the May period were \$37,931.59; down from last year's comparable payment of \$44,847.33. Total 1982 payments to date have reached \$110,214.12, also down a 7.40% from last year's payments of \$119,023.04.

In Friona, the May sales tax rebate was \$13,777.68, up over the comparable payment in 1981 of \$15,373.59. 1982 payments to date total \$45,752.92, reflecting a 13.48% change from the \$40,318.18 of 1981.

In Farwell, city sales tax net payments for the month of May were \$3,743.48; up slightly from the \$3,542.15 comparable payments in 1981. Farwell's 1982 payments to date reached \$10,270.68, up some 5.35% from comparable payments in 1981 of \$9,748.65.

Dallas received \$10 million, for a 1982 total of \$34.3 million, up nearly 8 percent over 1981.

The cities of Fort Worth and Austin each received \$3.2 million checks and El

### Local Private Club Permits Granted

On March 12, 1982 three Bailey County residents filed with the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission an application for a private club registration permit and a beverage carriage permit. John Curtis Slaughter, Jr., Robert Lee Copeland, Jr., and James Orville Elder, applied for such license to be known as "The Slaughterhouse," located 3/10 mile west of the Muleshoe City limits on Highway 84.

A hearing was held on April 28 before the TABC with regard to this permit and protests filed against it at that time.

Following that hearing, On May 18, Hallie Huttash, Hearings Examiner for the

TABC issued a recommendation following full consideration of the applications and protests. Her recommendation was that the application in question be granted.

The examiner found that it had not been proven that the place or manner in which the applicant might conduct its business warranted the refusal of a permit. Ms. Huttash's findings were also based on the conclusion that it had not been proven that the applicant would sell liquor unlawfully in a dry area, or in a manner contrary to law, or would knowingly permit an agent, servant or employee to do so.

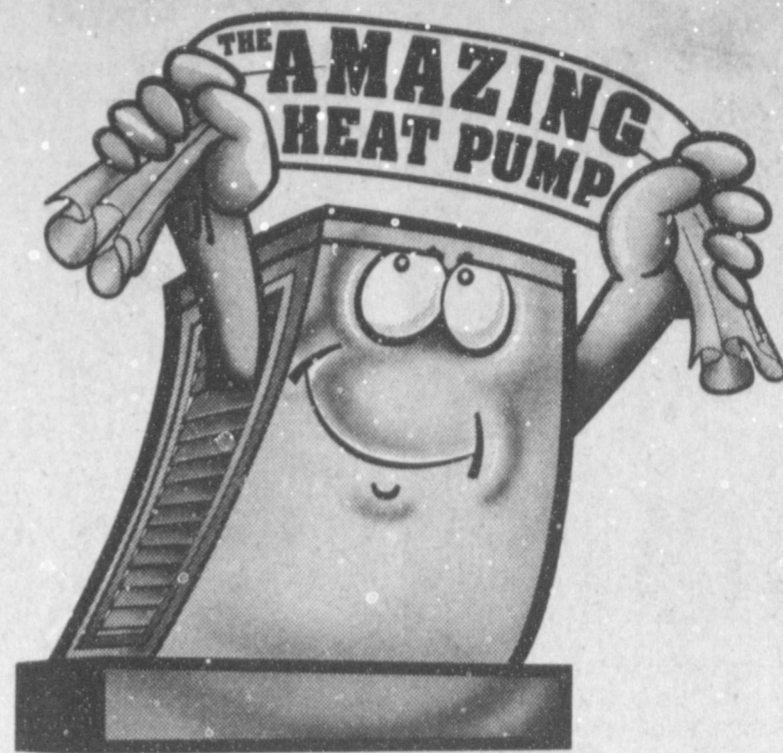

Paso received \$1.9 million. Bullock also forwarded May rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$22.2 million bringing the total received this year to \$74.7 million. The San Antonio MTA got a check for \$2.7 million, bringing the 1982 rebate total to \$9 million. The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Certifying now will help to protect a producer's yields in the future," the Director said. Grain deficiency checks should be delivered to county producers in the near future. The county reports shows that all set aside wheat was clipped, grazed, hayed or plowed by May 15, 1982 in accordance with requirements. Spot checks on this will be starting soon, and producers should take care to make sure that they are in compliance. Aerial measurement on 1982 wheat will begin shortly. Producers will have five days to certify their wheat after the measurement service is performed. Final certification dates will be typed on the measurement forms that are received by producers. Another item of concern is that of the disaster application, said Williamson.

Even though the disaster program is not in effect this year, producers still need to report acres affected by natural disaster. This reporting must be done before the crop is destroyed. Reporting these disasters will protect your planted acreage credit in the event any type of deficiency payments are forthcoming or offered.

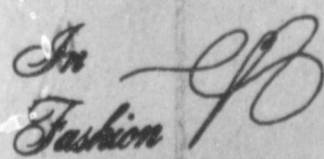

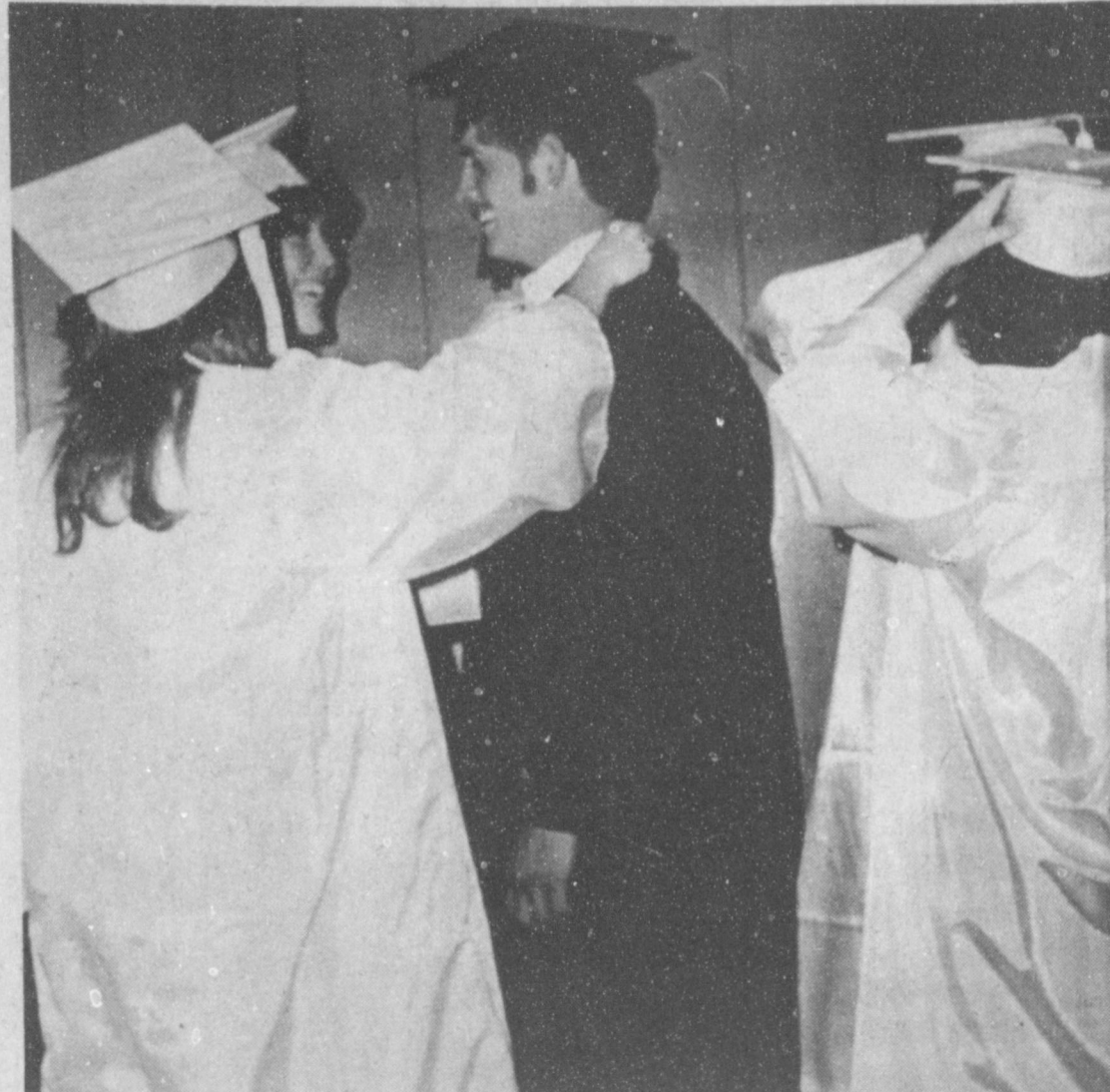
### FFA Officers Elected

### Forfeited Vets' Land Sales Planned June 8

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong has announced that the Texas Veterans Land Board will hold a sealed-bid of 96 forfeited veterans tracts on June 8. Minimum bids will be required.

The land parcels are all 10 or more acres and are located in 49 different counties. Only veterans will be allowed to bid on 84 of the tracts and the board will finance 95 percent of the successful bidding price at seven percent interest for 40 years.

The other 12 tracts will be available to veterans at the seven-percent rate and to non-veterans at eight and one-half percent interest for 40 years.

Armstrong, who sits as chairman of the board, said this was the first forfeited land sale the board has held in almost five years.

"Considering that we have almost 43,000 tracts under contract at any given time, I am quite impressed with how few tracts have been forfeited

and I think we can all be extremely proud of the responsibility with which our Texas veterans have managed their land program loans," Armstrong said.
