Winners

Callahan County voters helped to pick the winner in two of the three statewide judicial races in Saturdays Democratic runoff election.

Houston Court of Civil Appeals Judge Jim Wallace defeated Austin Court of Criminal Appeals Judge John D. Phillips for the Place 1 spot on the Texas Supreme Court both statewide and in the county, where he polled 63 votes to 54 for Phillips.

Incumbent Judge Tom Davis beat Austin attorney Edith Roberts in the Place 3 Court of Criminal Appeals spot, getting 83 Callahan County votes to just 30 votes for Ms. Roberts as he went on to win statewide.

The only non-winner that carried Callahan County was incumbent Place 2 Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W.T. Phillips, who beat Austin attorney Mike McCormick 59-55. Statewide, McCormick was the winner.

There were no local races in Callahan County Saturday.

Pushbutton Dialing Service Available Soon In Baird

Touch Calling Service will soon be available for Baird customers of Continental Telephone, reports Alan Armstrong, Customer Services Manager for the firm. Touch Calling lets the user tap out telephone numbers on pushbutton phones instead of turning the usual dial.

Electronic call processing equipment is being installed in the telephone company's switching office in Baird and is about to undergo initial testing. The new equipment responds to tone signals created by dial phones.

Numbers are dialed by customers who have Touch Calling Service by pressing buttons on the face of the new style phones. Telephone users place a call by entering a phone number like on an elec-

tronic pocket calculator. Armstrong says that this not only saves time, but people find that they get fewer wrong numbers.

Besides having pushbuttons for the numbers one through zero, Touch Calling phones have two extra buttons marked "*" and "#". These buttons are reserved for future use when additional features become available for telephone users.

Touch Calling phones will be available next fall in standard and Trim-Line models in five colors. Special telephones for business applications are also on order. Readers interested in the new service can call Continental Telephone's Customer Service Center at Baird for pricing and information.

Mr. Fox will be the defensive line


coach and also a math teacher.
