Mrs. Gardenhire Attends Ginning Roundup PTA Convention

More than 2,000 delegates from Texas attended the 44th annual convention of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers held in Wichita Falls Nov. 19 thru 21st. Mrs. J. W. Gardenhire represented the local PTA unit.

The theme "Safeguarding Our Freedoms Through Responsible Citizenship" was expanded during the three day convention by means of inspiring talks, dramatic presentations, panel discussions and practical demonstrations.

A new feature of the convention was the demonstration workshop where the delegates got down to business on such matters as ethical ways of raising money, organizing study groups, working out challenging programs and backing legislation related to child welfare.

Democracy, freedom and education were discussed one evening by a group of Allied National students from Sheppard Air Force Base. Participating on the panel were students from Philippines, Thailand, Belgium and Germany.

One of the highlights of the convention was the Thursday evening banquet with Mrs. Ernestine Gilbreath Carey, famous co-author of "Cheaper By The Dozen" and "Bells On Their Toes" as the speaker. She spoke on "American Family Life: Aids to Enduring World Peace". Mrs. Carey emphasized the roles that both large and small families can play in strengthening democratic ideals and preparing children for lives that will help build toward world peace.

Mrs. Carey amused and delighted her audience with reminiscences of early days in the Gilbreath family. Heard on a panel "Opportunity Ours" were six of the eight scholarship holders who are attending Texas colleges. Life membership fund to help qualified students prepare for a career in teaching. A luncheon honoring Life Members closed the convention.

Is Your Home Too Warm?

It is an illogical fact that many people complain about the heat of Texas summers and yet sit indoors during the winter months in a temperature about as high as that about which they complain in the summer season, is the view of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

"If the average person would realize the definite hazard in developing and maintaining an indoor temperature about 70 degrees, or at most 72 degrees, when the outside thermometer registers around freezing," he said, "there would be fewer colds, less bronchial conditions and less pneumonia than there are today."

"Fresh air is one of the body's basic needs and no amount of luxury or artificial pleasure can be substituted for it. It may be a comfortable feeling to be warm, especially with the consciousness of the tough weather outdoors but it is quite another matter to achieve this comfort at the probable cost of health."

"Winners in the temperate zone are sufficiently trying upon the human system with their sudden and sharp temperature changes without adding to the burden of making a hothouse of one's home. Of course, colds and other respiratory affections can be acquired in many different ways, but one of the easiest methods of becoming victims of such hazards is he over heated house."

"To become overheated and perspire, though the latter condition may not be perceived, and in this softened state to brave the cold winter blasts, is to take a

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Brazil Is Sponsor Of Third Set Of Living Quints

RIO DE JANEIRO—The Brazilian government is boasting about the birth of the third set of living quintuplets in the world today—the Alban quints, five girls born recently to Mrs. Maria Aparecida Alban in a mud and bamboo shanty.

The startled father named all the girls after their mother—Maria Aparecida I, Maria Aparecida II, etc.

The government stepped in shortly after the birth and took the parents and a local midwife by surprise. Ambulances, with sirens screaming, were rushed to the shanty, near the metropolis of Sao Paulo, and took the babies and their mother to a maternity hospital, where the infants were placed in incubators.

The incubators had arrived recently from the United States and still were uncrated at the time of the multiple births. While the quintuplets were being sped to the hospital, workers succeeded in uncrating and assembling the incubators, and finished just as the ambulance arrived.

The midwife became panicky after the birth of the second child and called in an obstetrician, who completed the delivery of the remaining three.

The mother's age was not learned. The father's name was given as Joao Albano, 36, a handyman.

The quints varied in weight, but all were approximately two pounds, eight ounces. The last quintuplet was born about three hours and 15 minutes after the first baby was delivered.

COLDS ARE GATEWAY TO INFECTION
 Studies show that most people have two or more colds a year, each lasting about two weeks and causing a considerable amount of stuffy discomfort, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.
 The danger of the common cold lies in the other infections that may follow it. A cold lessens resistance, and is likely to pave the way for other more serious respiratory ailments. Sinusitis, ear infections, bronchitis, and the various forms of pneumonia are frequently ushered in by a cold. Pneumonia, particularly, is likely to attack a person who is overtired or run down because of a severe cold.
 Fortunately many of the respiratory diseases are not as dangerous as they used to be. Modern infection

fighting drugs such as penicillin and the sulfa drugs, offer highly effective treatment for many cases. But, of course, it is always better to prevent a serious illness whenever possible.
 If you have a cold, it is just good sense to stay away from people, to avoid spreading the infection and to get plenty of rest in bed if possible.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
 Q: After World War II, I went to college under the GI Bill where I used my BS degree. After graduation, I went back on active duty. Now I hear there's a new GI bill for Korean veterans. When I am discharged again, will I be able to use this new GI Bill to go ahead with graduate studies?
 A: No. The law states that veterans like yourself, who have train-

ed under earlier veterans training programs, may be entitled to a total of 48 months of training under the old programs and the new GI Bill combined. Since you have already used that maximum under the World War II GI Bill, you are not entitled to any further GI training under the new law.

Q: I was divorced by my wife, and naturally I want to change the beneficiary on my National Service Life Insurance policy. My former wife, however, won't give me the policy so that I can make the change. What can I do?
 A: You don't have to have the policy in your possession to change the beneficiary. Either go to your nearest VA office and fill out a change of beneficiary form or write to the VA district office where you pay your premiums and state how you want the insurance paid in event of your death.

Q: I understand that down payment requirements have been lowered for GI home loans. But even so, I still don't have enough money to make the down payment on the house I'd like to buy. May I borrow money for the down payment?
 A: You may borrow on your life insurance policy for this purpose, but that is all. Other than this, you must certify that you have not borrowed to make the required down payment.
 Q: I have been authorized orthopedic braces for leg wounds I received in World War II. If I ever need emergency repairs, must I get VA approval before I have them made?
 A: Not necessarily. You may get emergency repairs costing up to \$15 from any commercial brace or repair shop without prior VA approval, provided you have the newly issued "Prosthetic Service Card, Orthopedic Braces." These cards are issued by VA regional offices.

Campaign Is On To Teach British How to Drink Tea

LONDON—A campaign is underway to teach the British how to make tea. Some tea producers think the British have lost the art. The world's big tea producers are worried about this loss. They blame the niggardly use of their product for the lack of excellent cups of tea in Britain and for the drop in the tea business.

The tea moguls, owners of huge plantations in India, Ceylon, East Africa and Indonesia, say a dozen years of rationing have knocked the know-how out of British tea-making.

They say the art has become so lost that a whole generation of Britons has never had a decent cup of tea.

Through their London-based tea bureau the tea men have just finished a survey showing that a lot of British youngsters don't drink tea any more. The reason—British mothers just don't make it right.

The main trouble seems to be they don't put enough tea in the pot. And some don't even use a pot—they dip little bags of tea into the cup, American-fashion. To old-style tea-drinkers this is as horrifying as drinking it from the saucer.

To put things right the Tea Bureau has launched a king-sized campaign to put Britain back to these golden rules:

- (1)—Use a pot—china or earthenware and warm it—first.
- (2)—One spoonful of tea for each person plus one for the pot.
- (3)—Bring fresh cold water to the boil—but don't let it boil too long. Pour it on.
- (4)—Let the pot stand five minutes.

First Flight of Pig Is Commemorated

LEWSDOW, Isle of Sheppey—A memorial will be erected here to commemorate the first plane flight of a pig.

Sheppey was the island where British aviation pioneers designed their heavier-than-air machines and where the Short Brothers Aircraft company was founded in a wooden shed. Moore (Lord Brabazon) flew the animal in the first British plane to fly a circular mile, to prove that pigs could "fly."

"He bought it for 70 cents from my grandfather," said a local farmer, Harold Love, who is sponsoring the idea of the memorial. Many persons in the aeronautical world have promised to contribute toward the cost.

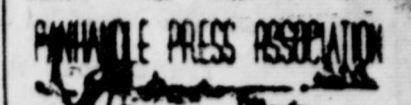

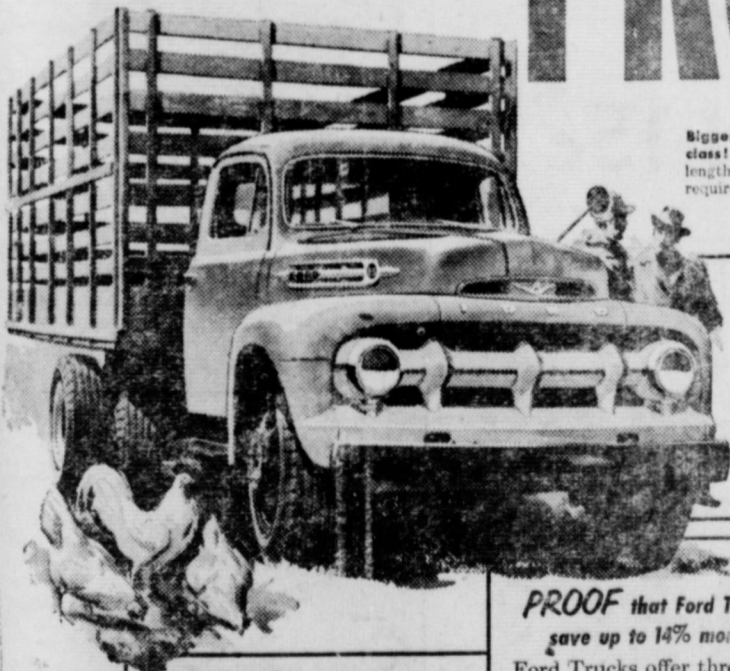
