Stock Survey To Be Made Here

Postmaster Hal Singleton, 3rd, announced that Rural Mail Carriers will begin distributing December 1, 1958, Livestock Survey Cards to patrons on their routes about November 20.

This annual livestock survey, which your Post Office and Agriculture Departments cooperatively have made since 1924, provides basic information to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin for estimating number of cattle, hogs, sheep and chickens on Texas farms and Ranches.

In order that our area be well represented in the survey, your Postmaster, Mr. Singleton, requests that each patron receiving a card fill out and return it to his mail box for prompt pick up.

V. A. Quiz

Q—I'm a Korea veteran, holding GI term insurance. I understand by a new law, I now can convert it to a permanent plan. Is this so?

A—You will be able to convert it after January 1, 1959. The new law permits Korea veterans holding term insurance policies with the letters "AS" before their numbers to convert to one of six permanent plans.

Q—On my discharge from the Armed Forces recently I received a lump sum disability severance payment. Will I have to pay this back to the Government if I am awarded VA compensation for the same disability?

A—Yes. The law requires that VA monthly compensation payments revert to the Government until the amount recovered is equal to the amount of disability severance paid the veteran received.

Q—I am planning to sell my GI home but cannot pay off the loan with what I will receive from the new purchaser. Do I have to have VA's consent to make the sale?

A—No. You do not need VA's consent to sell your property. However, if you wish to be released from possible liability to the Government, you must apply to VA.

Q—Is it possible for a disabled "peacetime" veteran to draw VA compensation at wartime rates?

A—Yes—If the disability resulted from extra-hazardous service, as for example, participation in simulated warfare, the veteran may be eligible for compensation at wartime rates.

Poultry flockowners should be on the lookout for cannibalism this time when pullets are being raised. Reminds Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman. The best way to combat the trouble is to break the birds, but there are other ways that will keep it at a minimum. These are a comfortable, ventilated house, plenty of distributed feed and water, no external parasites and high fiber diets which include mash.
A new method of dehairing hides has been developed by the Department of Agriculture which promises to speed up the process and reduce the cost. This treatment may make possible for packers to remove hair from hides before shipping. The new method has a saving shipping and allowing a more accurate weighing of hides at the time of

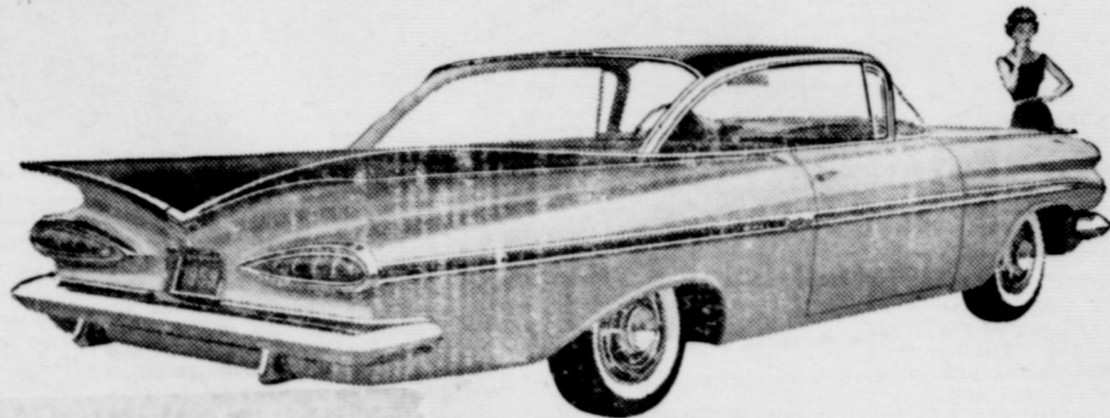

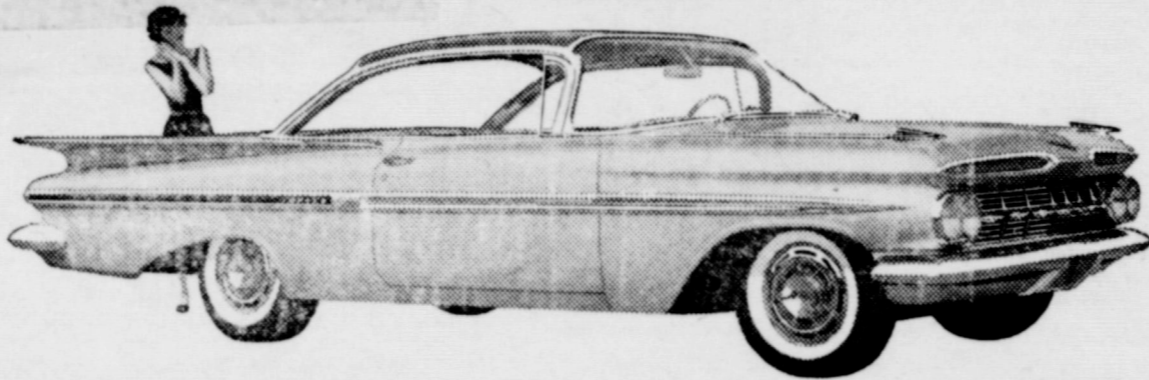

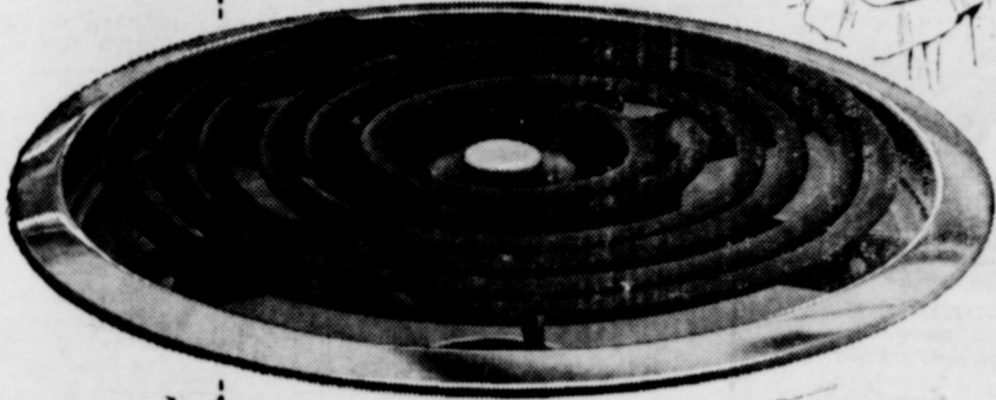

Purple Heart Veteran Deported as Wetback

SAN ANTONIO—Immigration authorities sent a 21 year-old Purple Heart veteran of Korea back to Mexico as a "wetback" recently. The veteran, Cpl. Alberto Gonzalez of Monterrey, Mexico, was sent in an immigration bus to Laredo, Tex., to be put off in Mexico. Immigration Officer W. L. Manuhaiusa said he had entered the United States on a dead man's birth certificate before he joined the American army three years ago. Wetbacks—named for those who swim the Rio Grande—are illegal entrants.

The G.I. Forum, which works on the problems of Latins in San Antonio, assigned an attorney, Richard Casillas, to the case with instructions to "go all the way to the state department if necessary" to allow Mr. Gonzalez to live in the United States.

The immigration office said he was being allowed to leave the country "voluntarily" and predicted he could get a permanent visa from the American consul in Mexico that would allow him to come back in time for the wedding.

Mr. Gonzalez was discharged from the army at Fort Sam Houston.

He joined the Army Sept. 17, 1944, and enlisted for another three years on the same date last year. Felix Sanchez, 20, his fiancé, said he had spent a year in Korea, with headquarters of the Eighth Army.

"He was wounded in the hip and got a broken ear drum," she said. "He has the Purple Heart, five campaign stars, the United Nations ribbon, the Korean service ribbon and a unit citation."

Spare Parts for Body Are Available to Man

NEW YORK—Spare parts for the human body still can't be ordered from a mail-order catalog. Nevertheless, the advance of medicine during the past few years has made available an imposing array of replacements for damaged or ineffective organs.

Following the development of the blood bank, first of the spare-part repositories, ingenious surgeons have found ways to maintain banks for eyes, bone, cartilage, arteries and veins. There are now methods for transplanting whole organs from one individual to another, and for constructing replacement organs from tissues taken from the patient's own body.

Some man-made spare parts, such as the artificial kidney, are already coming into clinical use, while others, among them the mechanical heart and plastic heart valves, are well along in the experimental stage.

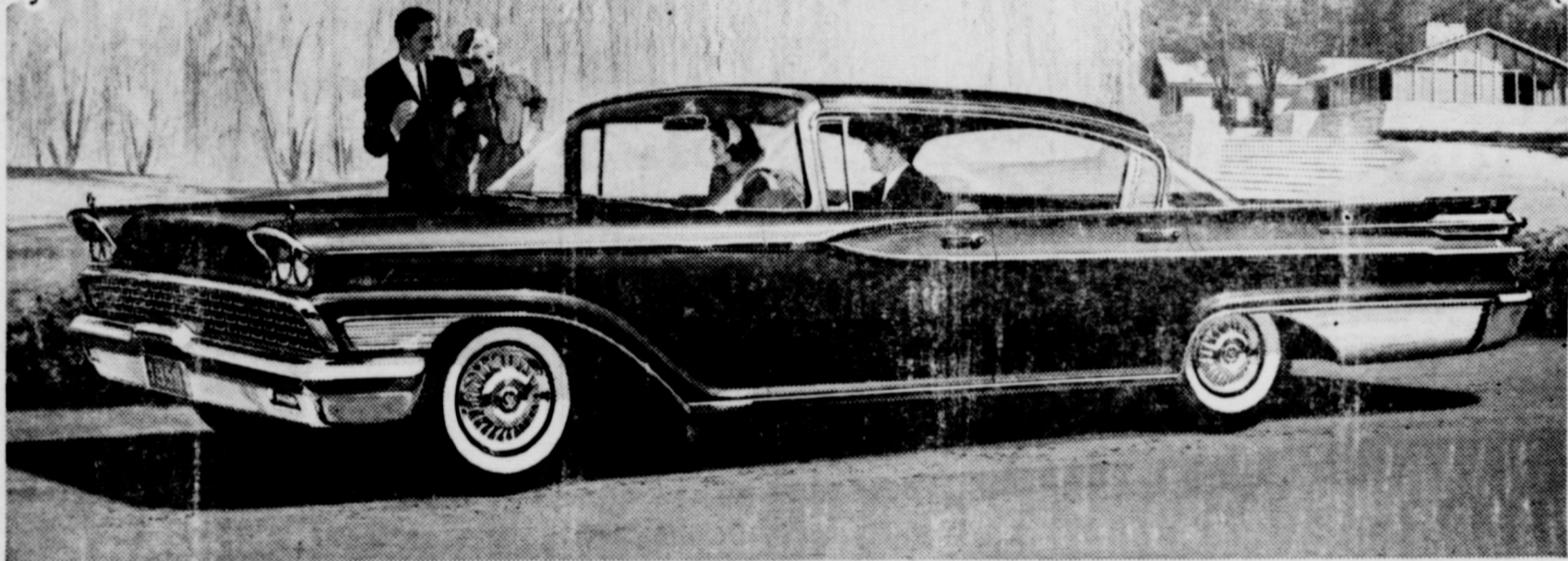

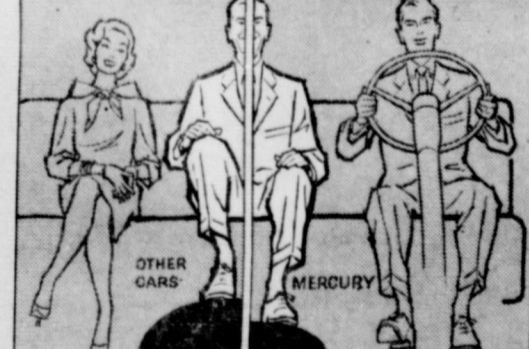

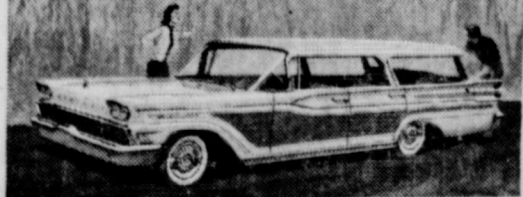
