Callahan County Gains In Population - Housing

The first official results of the U. S. Census Bureau's population count was released Monday. This report is subject to further verification, and may differ from the final figures to be released in early 1981.

According to the report, Callahan County had a population increase of 34.5 percent, 11,039 in 1980 from 8,205 in 1970.

Clyde showed the largest increase with 58 percent, from 1,635 in 1970 to 2,584 in 1980.

Baird was next with a 10.3 percent increase with 1,697 in 1980 compared to 1,538 in 1970.

Cross Plains showed a 4.1 percent increase, with 1,192 in 1970 to 1,241 in 1980.

In housing gains, the County showed a 40.6 percent increase with Clyde having the largest with 61.1 percent gain.

Baird was next with a 16.8 percent increase, followed by Cross Plains with a 10.4 percent gain.

On the ballot this year for president is Ronald Reagan and George Bush for the Republican Party; Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale for the Democratic Party; Ed Clark and David Koch for the Libertarian Party; and John B. Anderson and Milton S. Eisenhower as Independents.

The United States Representative 17th District has Charles W. Stenholm-D. running unopposed.

For Railroad Commissioner is Henry C. (Hank) Grover-R. against Buddy Temple-D.

The Railroad Commissioner (Unexpired term) is a three way race with H. J. "Doc" Blanchard-R., James E. "Jim" Nugent-D., and David Huzelma, Libertarian.

Jim Brady-R., and James P. "Jim" Wallace-D are in a race for associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1.

Running unopposed for associate Justice, Supreme Court, Court, Place 2 is Sears McGee-D.

Also running unopposed is Robert M. Campbell-D for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3.

Will Garwood-R and C. L. Ray-D are both running for the unexpired term of Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4.

The next spots on the ballot are all unopposed races. Marvin O. Teague-D running for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place #1; Mike McCormick-D, Judge, Court of Criminal appeals, Place No. 2; and Tom Davis-D, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place #3.

Lynn Nabors-D is unopposed in his bid for State Representative, 55th District.

For Associate Justice, Court of Criminal Appeals, 11th District, Bob Dickenson-D is unopposed.

Running unopposed for District Judge, 42nd District is Don Lane-D.

In the local election, all candidates are unopposed. They are Don Wilson-D, for County Attorney; Bill Skinner-D, for Sheriff; and Albert Lovell-D, for County Tax Assessor-Collector.

In the County Commissioners race we have M. D. Ellis-D, Precinct #1, and F. P. (Jiggs) Shackelford-D, Precinct #3.

Running unopposed for Constable are Glen Curtis-D, Precinct #1, Glen Smith-D, Precinct #5; Howard Hicks-D, Precinct #6; and Arnold Pruet-D, Precinct #8.

In addition to voting for elected officials, we will also be voting on several amendments to the Constitution.

Written in their entirety, they are as follows:

No. 1-The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience.

No. 2-The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused.

No. 3-The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

No. 4-The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, non-profit veterans organization, fraternal organization or a non-profit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations.

No. 5-The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law.

No. 6-The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate.

No. 7-The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5,000 or less to perform private road work.

No. 8-The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts.

No. 9-The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property.

Ricky Defosses led the defensive charge with 16 tackles. Defosses stayed in the Blizzard Backfield all night. Lucky Walker also wrecked havoc on Winters from his left tackle position. Linebackers Mike Duncan and Alan Bohannon roamed from side line to side line to shut down Blizzard ballcarries. Davy Vestal was credited with one interception, and along with Sid Grant, Eddie Graham, and Larry Segura helped the secondary play a tight defense. Defensive ends Dana Gillit and Brian Fears contained the once productive Blizzard outside game. Brent Shaw and Greg Austin played their usual steady game from their inside positions. The game also saw the return of 6'5" 235 pound Jeff Day. Day had been out since the second ballgame of the year.

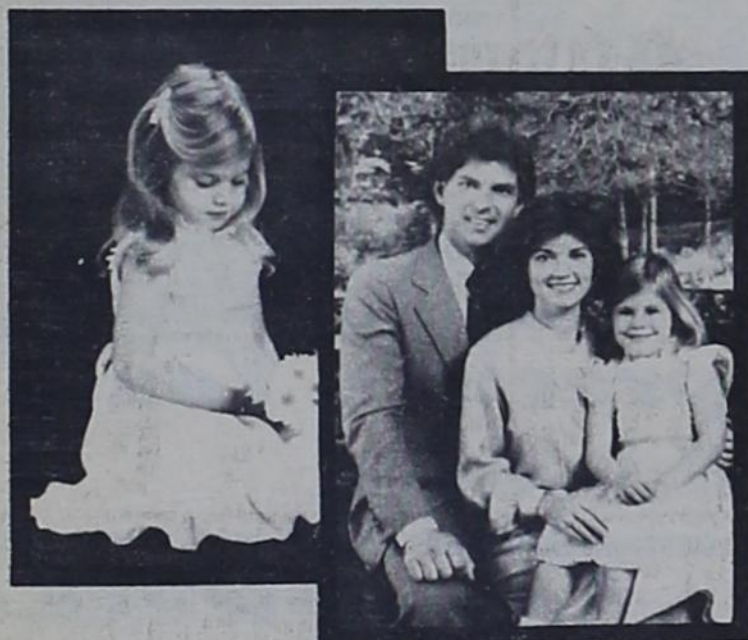
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Rowden Area News

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City Council Denies W.T.U.'s Rate Hike Request

The City Council met in regular session Monday night October 27, 1980. Mayor Brame called the meeting to order and the minutes from the last meeting were read and approved.

West Texas Utilities Vice-President, Holman King was present to inform the council of the rate increase W.T.U. has applied for. He noted that W.T.U. is the only utility that has not had a rate increase in the past ten years. Mr. King informed the council that they have several options open to them in regard to the rate increase.

The city can deny the request to the Public Utilities Commission, giving W.T.U. the option to appeal.

The city can suspend the request for 120 days, at the end of which the increase will go into effect.

The city can deny the request and surrender jurisdiction to the P.U.C. If this is done, the city would no longer have any control in an increase. The request would go straight to the P.U.C.

The city also has the privilege of approving it or ignoring the increase. In both instances it would become effective Nov. 1, 1980.

Mayor Brame suggested denying the increase, noting W.T.U. option to appeal. The council approved this by a unanimous vote.

Also on hand at the meeting was Ken Shultze, representative for T.V.

Cable of Brownwood. Mr. Shultze was here to discuss the problems of T.V. Cable in Baird. He told council members that as soon W.T.U. gets the new poles put up, they will be able to go ahead with the rebuilding process in Baird. This would include a new earth station that was begun Monday between Clyde and Baird. After a lot of discussion on the lack of service to the North Village addition, Mr. Shultze agreed to try extend service to that area as soon as possible.

In other action, the council voted to stop all utilities to the home of Jerry Wilson due to a delinquent bill.

According to Mayor Brame, all efforts to clear this matter up have failed, and this was the only option open to them.

The council passed an ordinance to increase the refuse rate for the City of Baird.

In final action, the council voted to appoint Evelyn Fox as acting city secretary.

All council members were present, as well as eight citizens.

After meeting as a city council they called a Board of Equalization meeting. After looking over the School Districts Accessed Property Valuations, the Board decided to use their own. They then postponed action until the city's Accessed Property Valuations had been rewritten. They will meet again Nov. 3.

City Accepted In National Flood Insurance Program

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced today that effective Oct. 29, 1980 the City of Baird, TX has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program.

This means, said Federal Insurance Administrator, Gloria M. Jimenez, that property owners here are now eligible to buy flood insurance protection at affordable rates subsidized by the Federal Government.

Policies are effective at 12:01 a.m. of the day following the application date if purchased during the first 30 days of your community's eligibility (in some cases there is a five day waiting period after the first 30 days have elapsed).

The policies can be purchased from any property insurance agent or broker licensed to do business in the area in which the property to be insured is located. Agents and brokers may obtain policy forms, rates, flood insurance manuals, and any other necessary information on the insurance aspects of the program from the servicing agent for the National Flood Insurance Program at the following address: National Flood Insurance Program, P.O. Box 34294, Bethesda, Maryland 20034.

"Since flood insurance is now available," Mrs. Jimenez said, "owners of property in areas shown on maps by FEMA as being flood-prone must, according to the law, buy flood insurance when seeking any form of Federal or federally-related financial assistance for the acquisition or construction of buildings in those areas."

"This would include grants from Federal agencies, FHA, VA, and FMHA mortgage loans, loans from the Small Business Administration, and conventional mortgage loans from any federally-

regulated or supervised banks and savings and loan associations."

While flood insurance is available to all residents of the community, Mrs. Jimenez emphasized that the Federal requirements to purchase flood insurance as a condition for receipt of federally related financial assistance do not apply to property outside the danger zones.

Under the program, coverage can be obtained for all buildings and their contents. The available limit of insurance for single-family homes is now \$35,000 and \$100,000 for other residential buildings, at the subsidized rate of 25 cents per \$100 for coverage. The rate goes to 40 cents per \$100 for nonresidential buildings.

The contents of all residential buildings can be insured up to \$10,000 per unit at 35 cents per \$100 of coverage, and the rate goes to 75 cents per \$100 for contents of all nonresidential structures up to a maximum of \$100,000 in coverage per unit.

The Federal Insurance Administration, Mrs. Jimenez explained, will also prepare additional maps showing the elevation of the base flood (i.e., the flood having a one percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year) in approximately 20,000 communities across the Country. When this Flood Insurance Rate Map is published for the community, an additional increase in the present limits of coverage will be made available under actuarial rates.

The program is designed to stimulate individual participation in it as protection against flood disasters, and to help promote sound flood plain management on the part of local governing authorities.

Mrs. Leonard Parker chairman of the Flower Show Committee explained details of the overall plan for the show to be held April 24, and urged members to plant bulbs now so as to have blooms ready for that date.

Mrs. R. D. Williams, chairman of the Yearbook Committee, introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. E. A. Parker of Abilene Garden Club, a well known bird enthusiast and researcher, director elect of District VIII Lereas Garden Clubs.

Grand Jury Returns 8

Indictments Here

The 42nd District Court grand jury met Thursday, Oct. 23 at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

There were eight cases presented, ranging from rape of a child to forgery. Two of the indictments were sealed.

formal senior party at Clyde Lake on May 24.

Jeffery Wayne Herd, 22, of San Angelo, and Michael Lynn King, 24, of Tyler, were both indicted for possession of a controlled substance as a result of a Sept. 22 arrest by Clyde Policeman Glen Smith.

A Putnam man was indicted for forgery, involving a \$20 check allegedly forged on the account of his father. Louis Manriquez is accused of forging a check on the account of Pedro L. Manriquez, and passing it at the Party Port in Putnam on Aug. 26.

Ted Ray Moore, 18, of Abilene, was indicted for burglary in the Sept. 19 break-in of the Kerr-McGee service station at Clyde.

Assistant Criminal District Attorney George Solis of Abilene said he could not comment on the two sealed indictments until they are served on the defendants.

4-H To Hold Harvest Happening

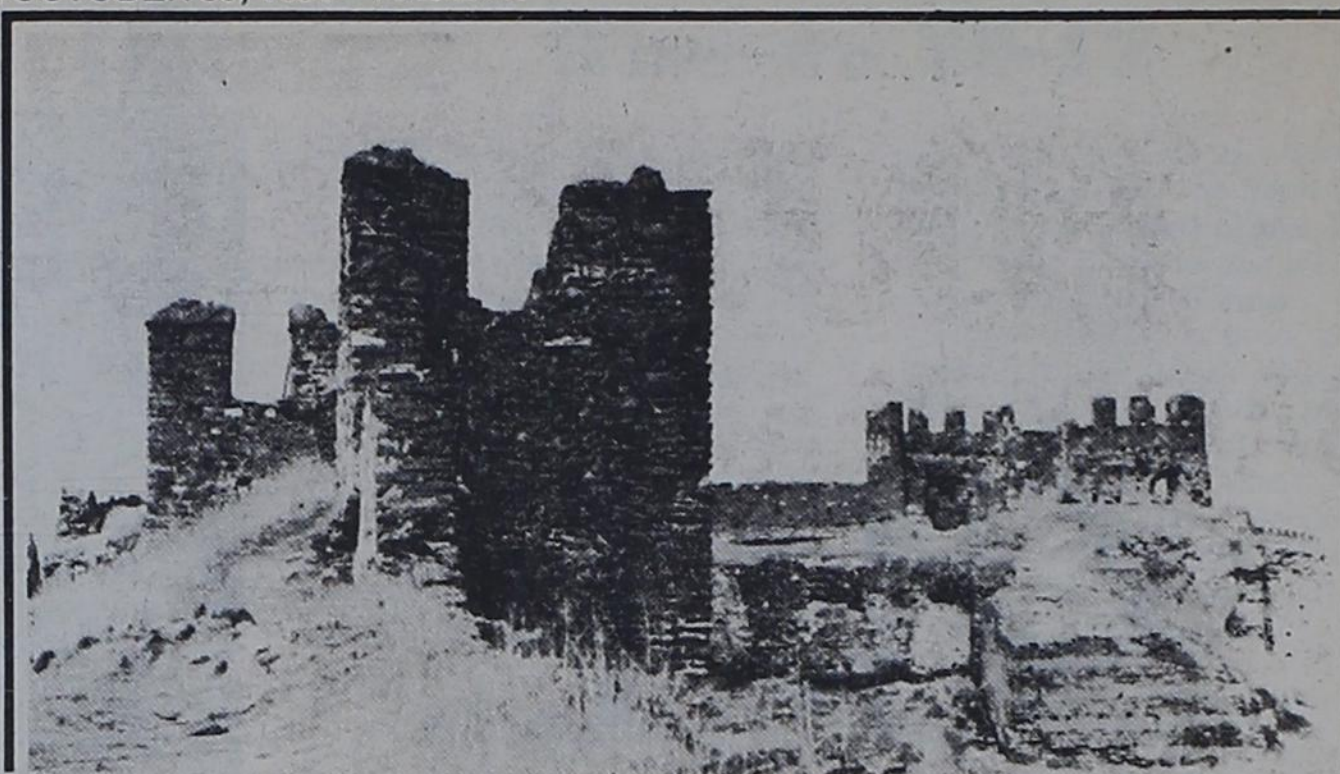

Comfort Stations To Be Dedicated

Two comfort stations on I.H.20 in Callahan County just east of Abilene will be dedicated on Friday, October 31, commemorating the highway transportation efforts of Judge Walter R. Ely. The dedication ceremony to be held at 11:30 A.M. at the comfort station on the east bound lane (south side of I.H. 20) will include the installation of a commemorative plaque.

The Highway Commission on which Judge Ely served is credited with a major role in establishing the beginnings of the modern Texas Highway Department.

Judge Ely died January 31, 1978, only two months short of his 100th birthday.
