

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

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EDINBURGH - Stewart clansmen met recently at the site near Ballaehulish, Argyll, where James Stewart was hanged 200 years ago for taking part in the murder of Colin Campbell to protest the innocence of Stewart and to commemorate the bravery with which he met the hangman. An oration was made and the Very Rev. Duncan McInnes, dean of Argyll, held a memorial service.

The Stewarts say that James Stewart was a victim of the most outrageous frameup in history. The murder remains the most celebrated crime case in Scotland.

Stewart was tried by a jury con sisting of eleven Campbells and four others and the presiding judge was the chief of the Campbell clan. the Duke of Argyll.

Robert Louis Stevenson immortalized the murder in "Kidnapped."

Nogh's Ark Still Is Lost on Mt. Argrat

ISTANBUL-Not even a pair of animal tracks was found by a French expedition which battled its way to the top of Mt. Ararat looking for traces of Noah's Ark The expedition, lead by Jean de Riquer, polar explorer, hoisted the French flag atop the rugged peak after climbing through snow, rain

and heavy winds. An American expedition led by Dr. Aaron Smith, a retired missionary from Greensboro, N. C. tried fruitlessly to find Noah's fab-

ulous boat in 1949. Turkey's big Soviet neighbor charged that neither group really was looking for the Ark but just wanted to peer down at Russian defenses on the other side of the mountain.

NASHVILLE-In the Tennessee hills there lives a bear which seems to know bad whisky when he tastes it. NEW HAVEN, Conn .- Four out
