## Chas. Cathey, 65, Dies In Lubbock

Charles N. Cathey, 65, member of a pioneer Lynn county family and former vice president of First National Bank of O'Donnell died suddenly of a heart attack, Sunday at about 9:50 p. m. at his home at 5305 27th street in Lubbock. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital at 9:55. He had been in ill health some time.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 p. m. in Sanders Memorial Chapel in Lubbock with Rev. John H. Johns, pastor of Trinity Baptist Church officiating. Burial followed in Resthaven Memorial Park.

The Catheys were early settlers in old Pride community south of Newmoore. Charles Cathey was associated with the O'Donnell bank more than thirty years before resigning six years ago and moving to Lubbock. He was a member of O'Donnell Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife, Morene, a teacher in Bowie Elementary School in Lubbock; three sons, Stanley of Hobbs, N. M., Charles H. and Joe Ray of Lubbock; one brother, W. S. Cathey of Lubbock; one sister, Mrs. Zettie Richards of Nora, N. M.; and two grandchildren.

## Proof Of Age Is Required By SS

Effective immediately, the Social Security Administration has established new requirements for proof of age for entitlement to social security.

Claimants must now submit the best proof of age available. "The very best proof of age," according to Mr. John G. Hutton, district manager, "would be a church or public record of birth made before the claimant's fifth birthday. Next best evidence of age would be any other record established before the person's 11th birthday."

"There will be cases," Mr. Hutton explained, "where a person will not be able to present proof of age recorded before his 11th birthday. When this is true, the Social Security Administration will assist them in seeking other proofs."

"Many sources are used for proof of age. They include public school, church and census records, insurance policies, delayed birth certificates, marriage records and military records."

Mr. Hutton emphasized that his office is ready to advise and assist applicants in obtaining evidence that meet the new requirements.

# Only 264 Register For Free '66 Vote

(From Lynn County News)

Only 264 citizens were added to this year's voting strength in Lynn county as a result of the 15-day emergency free voter registration March 3-17 which ended at midnight Thursday of last week, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector.

Previously 2212 citizens had received poll taxes, including 49 under-age registrants. In Lynn county, people over 60 are not required to register, and there are at least 500 or 600 of these.

Thus, total voting strength of the county for elections this year is 3,000 or more.

Mr. McCracken states that only 9 of those registering for a free vote were Negroes, 71 were Spanish, and 187 were Anglo-Americans.

The emergency period in Texas was set up after a federal court had outlawed payment of poll

taxes as a prerequisite for voting in state and local elections, as had previously been done in federal elections.

During a special session of the Texas Legislature, new registration laws were passed, the January 31 deadline for payment of poll taxes as a prerequisite disregarded, and a special registration period set up for a free vote on registering with the tax assessor-collector.

Meeting Attorney General Carr's request to do everything possible to give all who had not otherwise qualified an opportunity to register for a free vote, Mr. McCracken had set up registration posts over the county and had a copy of the blank printed in The News.

Anyone in this county who failed to qualify for a vote by one means or another can blame no one but themselves, local authorities say.

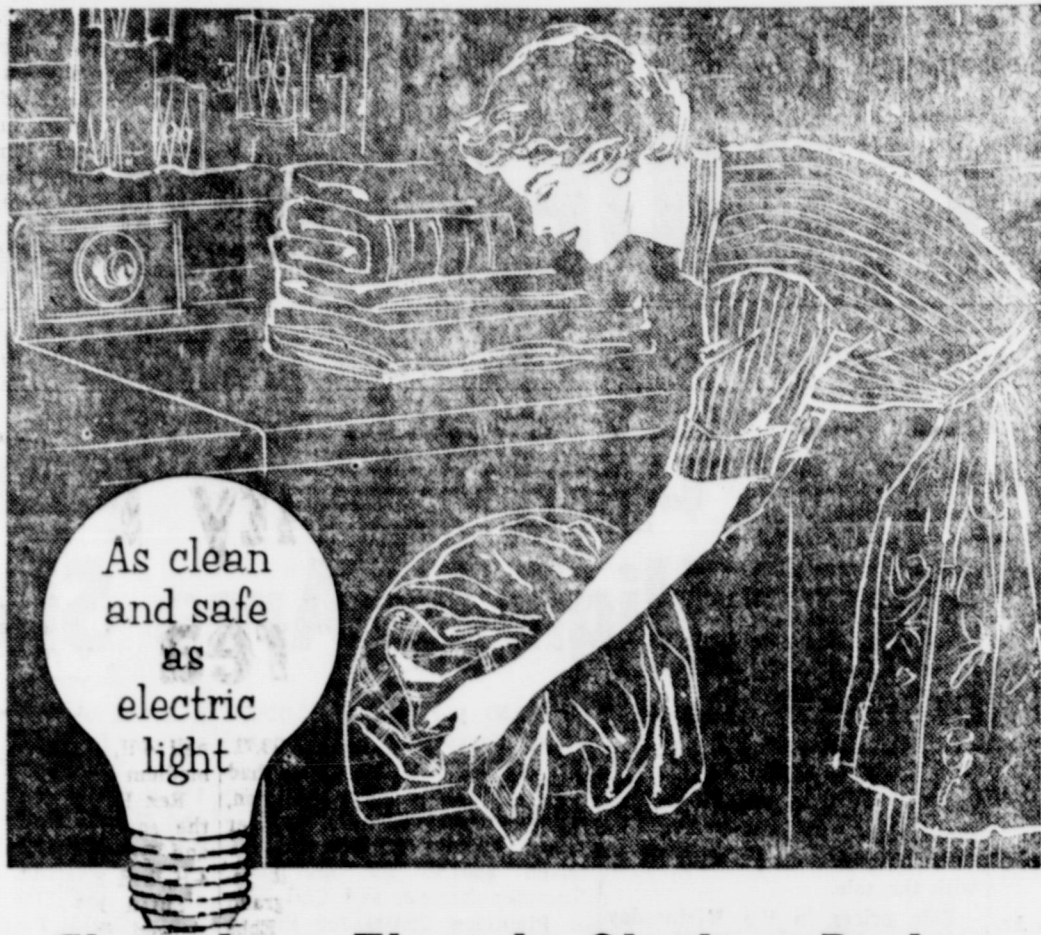
## Future Homemakers of America

# Deadline Near On Sign-Up For Cotton, Feed Programs

Many Lynn county farmers have not yet signed an intention to participate in the cotton and feed grain programs for 1966, states Wallace Dove, Lynn county ASCS office manager.

Since April 1 is the last day for a farm to be signed up in the programs for this year, farmers are urged to contact the office as soon as possible.

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office will be open this Saturday, March 26, from 8:00 a. m. until 12:00 noon to give farmers more time to sign up in the 1966 cotton and feed grain programs.

At the present time, there are 1447 cotton farms with 878 of these farms signed up to participate in the program for 1966, which represents only 60.7 percent of the county total.

There are 1510 feed grain farms with 784 signed up, which represents 51.9 percent of the county total.

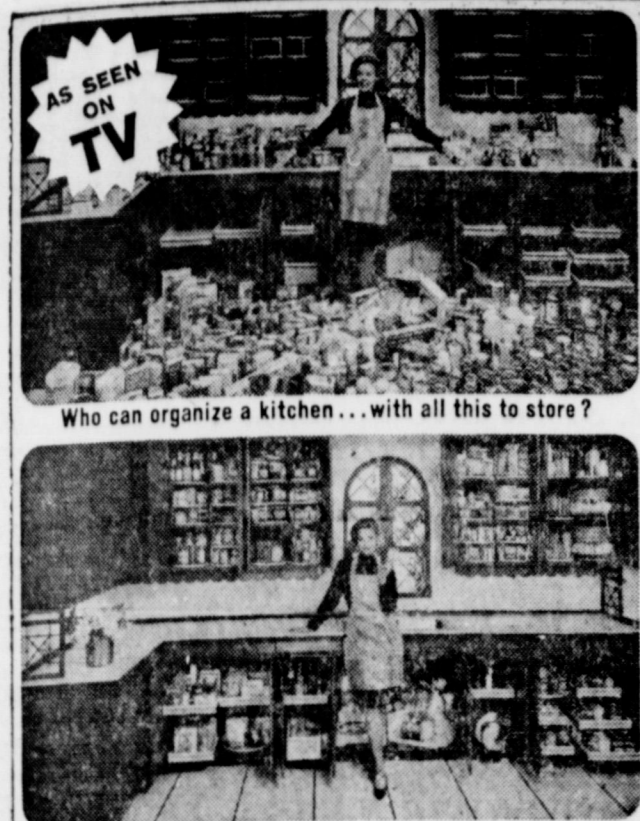

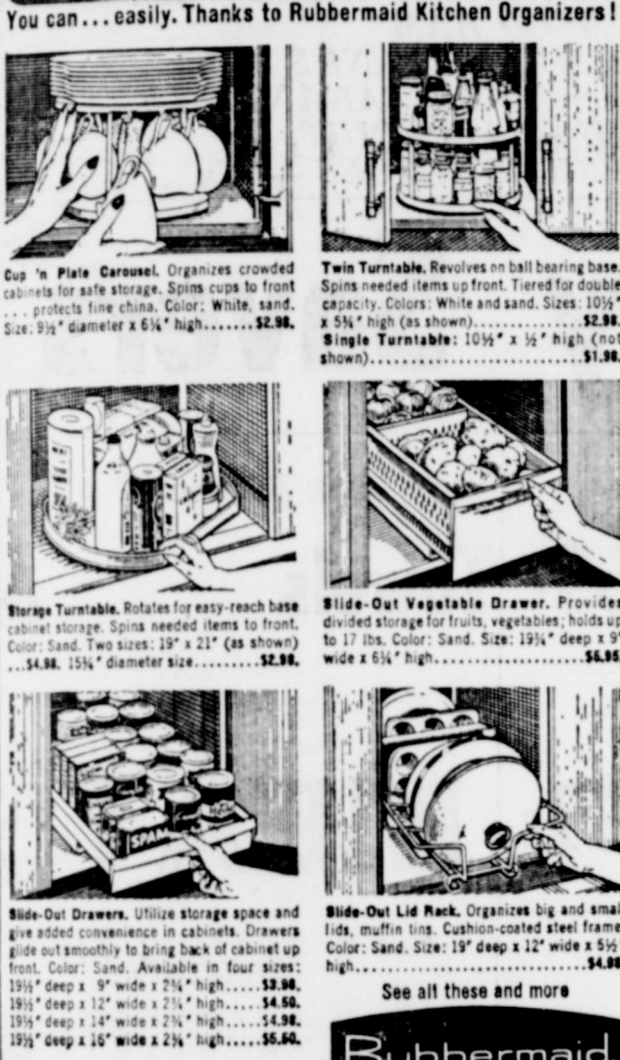

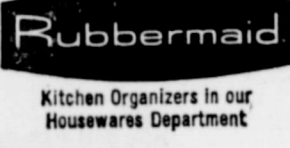
